

An intention to drill has been filed for a wildcat in Swisher County, the location of which is 3.5 miles east of Tulia. The legal description of the location is 150' from South and 2501' from West line, Section 28, M-15, D&P. This is designated as the No. 1 Zeeck, and is a core test only, with permitted depth to 8000 feet. The work is being done by Stone & Webster Engineering Corporation, Box 829, Amarillo, Texas 79105.

This core test is in relation to the nuclear waste disposal studies, which are continuing in Swisher County, but we understand that the results of the test are to be made available to an oil company.

The J. K. Patrick wildcat, drilled by the Hanson Corporation, has now been declared a dry hole and has been plugged. Indications are that the structure looked good, but nothing was produced.

Swabbing is continuing at the Pascal Garrison wildcat which was drilled by Marathon Oil Company. Very little information has been given about this location, but it seems that the swabbing hasn't cleaned out the hole as much as it needs to be. It has been hinted that it might be fractured again.

Drilling was stopped Wednesday morning at the Cogdell wildcat being drilled by Sojourner northwest of Silverton. Drilling was down to 7900 feet, and we were not able to learn whether or not drilling would continue.

The wildcat being drilled by Tri-Ex Oil & Gas on the Cogdell ranch north of Silverton was down to 5680 feet Wednesday morning.

BLN's wildcat on the Saul ranch was down to 4000 feet this week, with plans to drill to 5000 feet. Drilling has gone very well at this location, with there not having been a loss of circulation.

Drilling on the W. H. Brooks wildcat was down to 7800 feet Tuesday night, and they were out of the hole replacing the bit. It was estimated that it would take eight or nine hours to get back to work. Tri-Ex Oil & Gas has been drilling about 200-300

NOTICE OF TAX RELIEF AVAILABLE

TO CERTAIN HOMEOWNERS OVER 65

Homeowners who were 65 years of age or older on January 1, 1979, and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the school tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 homestead exemptions.

According to a law passed by the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who were qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but who did not apply for or receive their homestead exemption, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district in which the homestead is located.

Eligible over-65 homeowners in Briscoe County must make application to the Briscoe County Appraisal District, County Courthouse, Silverton, Texas, before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for this tax relief, a homeowner must have Been 65 years of age or older satisfied these requirements on January 1, 1979,:

Owned his home

1/2 Used that home as his residence homestead

The chief appraiser of the Briscoe County Appraisal District will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of school tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he applied for and been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid may be given for 1979, 1980 or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's school taxes on his homestead may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer re-ceived his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain the same as long as the homestead remains the same.


