

## All Around the Town

Operations have been "temporarily discontinued" at the wildcat on the Pascal Garrison farm. Drilling is finished at about 8000 feet on the Sojourner wildcat on the Cogdell ranch, and the BJM drilling rig is being stacked nearby. The casing has been set and cemented, and a work-over rig was expected Wednesday to begin the testing operations.

At the Tri-Ex Oil & Gas wildcat on the Cogdell ranch, drilling was down to 6970 feet.

Drilling had been stopped at 8666 feet at the Tri-Ex location on the W. H. Brooks farm. They circulated for five hours early Wednesday, and were coming out of the hole. The well is to be completely tested.

It is expected that a new wildcat will begin about April 15, but as of Wednesday morning no new intentions to drill in Briscoe County had been filed with the Railroad Commission.

Oil production reportedly has dropped off considerably from the completion report at the G. Mayfield location, with the best report we can come up with being that it is now producing 15 barrels of oil a day. This is said to have been holding steady, but that it is a "marginal" amount. Marathon Oil Company had two months in which to file a production report, and according to our calculations, this should be received at the Pampa office of the Railroad Commission about the middle of April. That report should dispel most of the rumors.

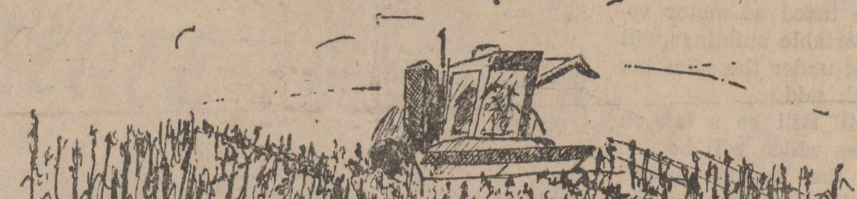

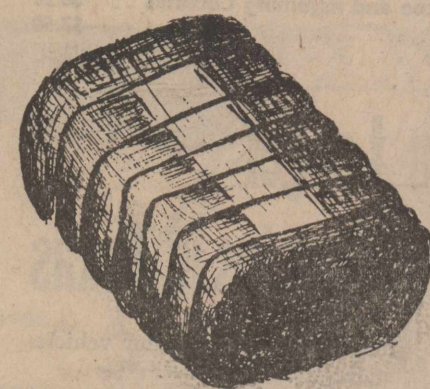

## Burning Workshop Held Here Last Thursday

Rising costs of traditional range improvement practices have forced stock owners to seek cost-efficient alternatives, such as prescribed burning. The increased interest and use of fire carries with it obvious potential hazards and risks. However, the potential hazards and risks can be greatly reduced when a carefully-designed fire plan or "prescription" is followed.

A Prescribed Burning Workshop for interested agricultural agents in Districts One, Two and Three was held here Thursday, March 18. The agents were invited to participate in the day-long workshop which consisted of indoor and in-the-field training.

The morning study, at 9:00, emphasized fire behavior and fire safety, types of fires and how to use them, and design of a fire plan. The afternoon training involved "hands on" experience in conducting a demonstration burn at the Schott Ranch.

Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist, and J. F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist, conducted the workshop.

The Burning Demonstration was co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Caprock Soil Conservation District, Briscoe County Agriculture Committee and W. E. Schott.

The programs will be on Garden Planning, Varieties and Fertilization. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

## Uniform Planting Date Aids Boll Weevil Management Program

The uniform planting of cotton after May 20 is a critical first step in the management of the boll weevil in Briscoe County, according to Earnest Kiker, County Extension Agent.

The peak period of boll weevil emergence from overwintering habitat usually occurs during the last week of May or the first week in June. Overwintered boll weevils live from 10 to 22 days after they emerge. When cotton is planted after May 20, it will be the second week in July before 1/2-grown squares are present. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs, that will survive in squares, until the squares are 1/2-grown. Research has shown that less than 10% of the overwintered boll weevils survive until the second week in July.

The uniform planting date also limits the boll weevil popula-

tions to hot spot fields. These are the fields that are near the most favorable overwintering habitat. Through effective field inspection, the boll weevils can be detected in these hot spot fields.

Since few boll weevils emerge during early July, one insecticidal application just prior to the 1/2-grown square stage will control the overwintered weevils. However, in fields that are planted in early May, two insecticidal applications may be required because of continued emergence of overwintered boll weevils into the field after squares have reached the 1/2-grown stage.

A uniform planting date, scouting of hot spot fields and early season boll weevil control where needed are important parts of the boll weevil management program in Briscoe County.

## Agriculture Is Most Important Industry In Briscoe County

Agriculture is the most important industry in Briscoe County with an average annual income of \$32 million from wheat, sorghum, cattle, hogs and cotton.

"This contribution to the economy of the county is certainly a reason to have honored farmers and ranchers on Agriculture Day, March 18," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, state chairman, said.

Businesses, financial institutions and individuals here are involved in providing supplies, credit and services to farmers and ranchers and in processing and marketing agricultural commodities.

"Each dollar in agricultural income generates four to five when it hits the market," Brown said.

Briscoe County covers an area of 874 square miles and has an annual rainfall of over 20 inches.

Irrigation is a factor in the agricultural production here, with more than 70,000 acres currently under irrigation.

Cattle and sheep production are responsible for the majority of income generated by the livestock industry here. In 1981 there were 22,000 head of cattle on area ranches, 5,000 less than

were on record for 1980. The sheep and lamb inventory for 1981 totaled 1,800 head, up 600 from the inventory for the previous year. Wool production in the county totaled 11,000 pounds during 1980 as compared with the 10,000 pounds produced in 1979. In 1980 there were also 700 hogs and pigs on area farms.

The fertile soil of Briscoe County is suited to a variety of crops, including wheat, corn, cotton, hay, sorghum and soybeans. The 1980 wheat crop yielded a total of 680,000 bushels, up from the 579,000 bushels produced in 1980. Local corn farmers harvested 2,700 acres in 1980 for a production of 298,000 bushels, up from the 270,700 bushels produced in 1979. The 64,800 acres of Briscoe farmland that was devoted to Upland cotton production during 1980 produced 31,300 bales of cotton, an increase over the 25,300 bales produced in 1979. Two thousand acres were used for hay production during 1980 for a total yield of 4,400 tons, a 3,200 ton decrease from the 1979 yield.

Sorghum production for 1980 totaled 139,000 hundredweight (cwt) as compared with the 271,000 cwt. produced in 1979. Local farmers harvested 5,200 acres of

sorghum in 1980 and 6,600 acres in 1979. The soybean crop for 1980 produced 49,800 bushels, down from the 82,500 bushels produced in 1979.

"Continued crop and livestock production in Briscoe County is important to the future of Texas agriculture," Brown said, "and agriculture is the heartbeat of Texas."

Agriculture is one of the largest multipliers of income in Texas. Including all its agribusiness phases, agriculture added over \$37 billion to the economy of the state in 1980. The estimated value of farm assets in Texas totaled more than \$70 billion at the beginning of 1981.

"While only 420,000 individuals work directly on Texas farms and ranches, four out of every ten persons in the state owe their jobs either directly or indirectly to agriculture," Brown said.

Texas is third in the nation in agricultural production and fourth in agricultural exports. The state's largest export item, cotton, accounts for nearly one fourth of all U. S. cotton exports.

"The potential for further growth is great," Brown said. "With the increasing demand for food and fiber throughout the world, and because of the importance of agricultural exports to the nation's trade balance, agriculture in Texas is destined to play an even greater role in the future."

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## Mobile Homes No Longer Considered Motor Vehicles in Texas

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has good news for mobile home dwellers—their homes are no

longer considered motor vehicles under Texas tax law.

"Mobile homes have been considered motor vehicles and subject to registration and the 4% motor vehicle sales tax since 1941," Bullock said. "The last legislature changed that law and beginning March 1, we will no longer collect motor vehicle taxes on these homes."

Bullock said people who buy a mobile home will obtain a "document of title" from the Texas Department of Labor and Standards instead of registering it as a motor vehicle and obtaining a

"certificate of title" from the Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The new law basically defines a mobile home as a structure providing at least 320 square feet of living area.

"This means travel trailers will still be taxed as motor vehicles and portable buildings will still be taxed under the sales tax law," Bullock said.

"There will still be a tax on mobile homes which will be collected by the manufacturer," Bullock explained. "During the first year the new law is in effect, the rate will be 4.225% of the manufacturer's selling price. After September 1, 1983, the rate drops to 3.25%."

"And, there's a use tax provision in the new law," he continued. "This means that anyone who buys a mobile home from an out-of-state dealer is responsible for paying the tax—which will be administered by the Comptroller's office."

Under the new law, mobile homes will no longer need to have current motor vehicle registration papers when they are sold, but they will need the "document of title" from the Department of Labor and Standards.

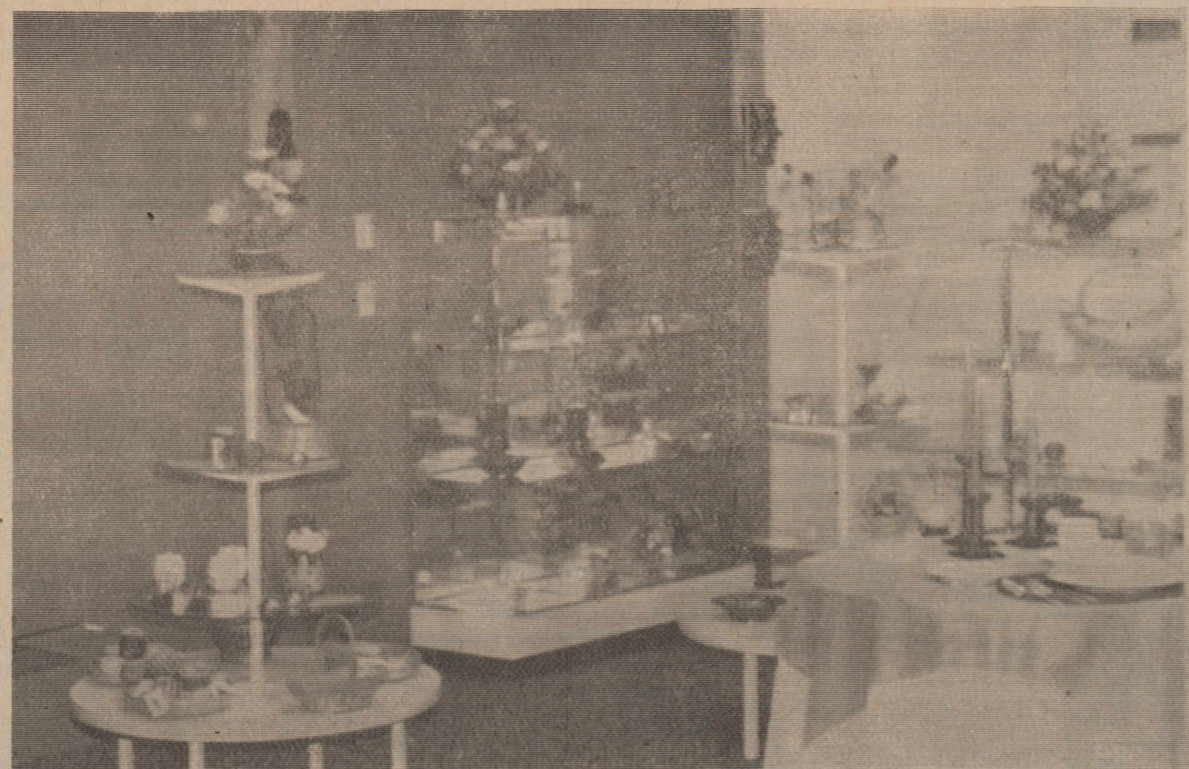

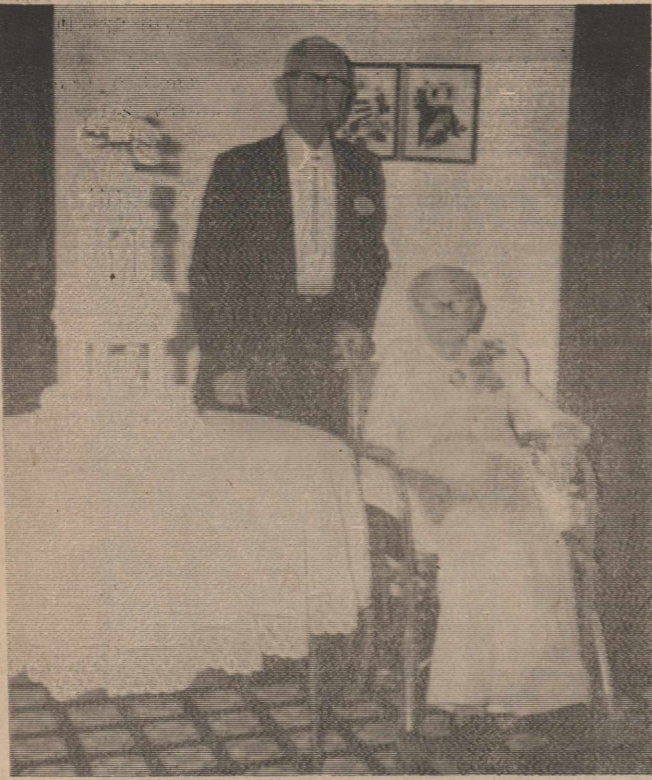

his commitment to the continuation of a good West Texas economy, as well as greater opportunity and independence for every citizen.

"Too often our elected officials forget what kind of people made this country great," Alexander said. "The hard working, middle class, tax paying and law abiding people, that's who." Alexander continued, "We've got to get back to basics, back to compassion and respect, back to rewarding those who seek out and work for an honest living. Ours is a land founded on enterprise, not compromise, and I promise never to compromise a position that benefits West Texas."

Alexander, who now practices law in Lubbock, once farmed in Briscoe County and taught school in Silverton. One Lubbock businessman termed Alexander "a true man of Texas, an heir to its traditions and values. Our district needs someone effective and resourceful in Austin," he stated. ### NOTICE OF TAX RELIEF AVAILABLE TO CERTAIN HOMEOWNERS OVER 65

Homeowners who were 65 years of age or older on January 1, 1979, and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the school tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 homestead exemptions.

According to a law passed by the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who were qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but who did not apply for or receive their homestead exemption, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district in which the homestead is located.

Eligible over-65 homeowners in Briscoe County must make application to the Briscoe County Appraisal District, County Courthouse, Silverton, Texas, before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for this tax relief, a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements on January 1, 1979,:

- ☆ Been 65 years of age or older
- ☆ Owned his home
- ☆ Used that home as his residence homestead

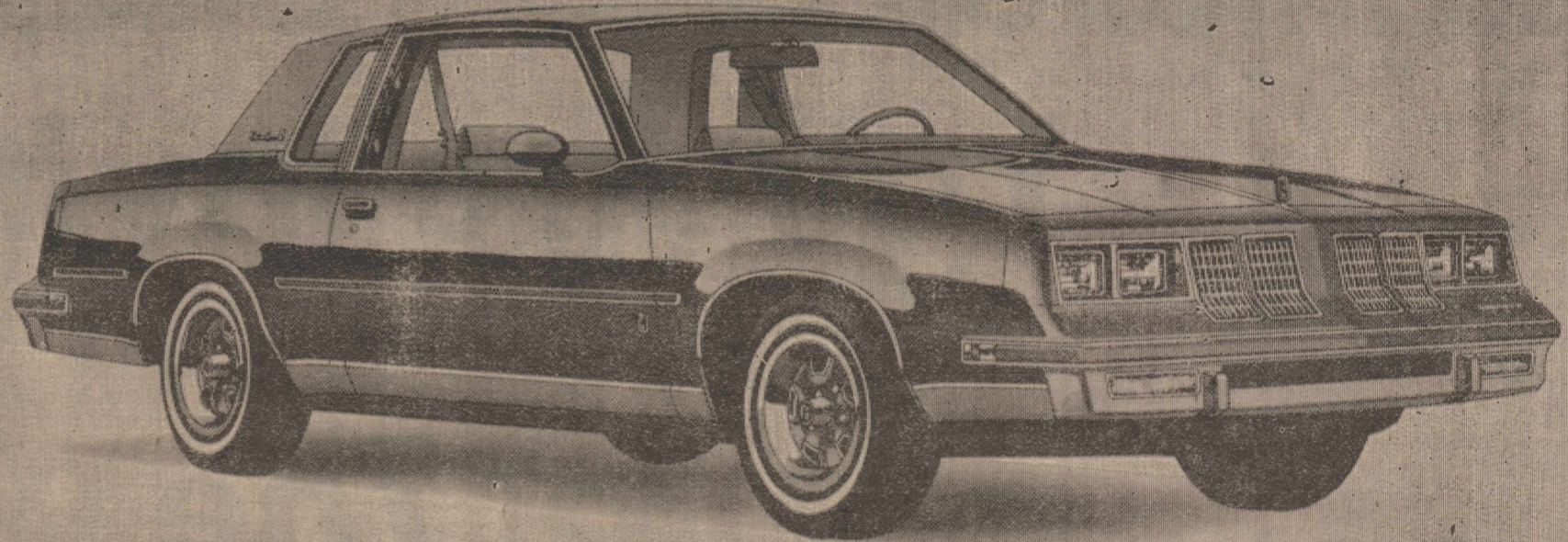
The chief appraiser of the Briscoe County Appraisal District will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of school tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he applied for and been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid may be given for 1979, 1980 or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's school taxes on his homestead may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer received his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain the same as long as the homestead remains the same.
