Mr. McMinn was a brother of the late Bud McMinn, and Mrs. Ollie McMinn of Silvertown was among those who attended the funeral.

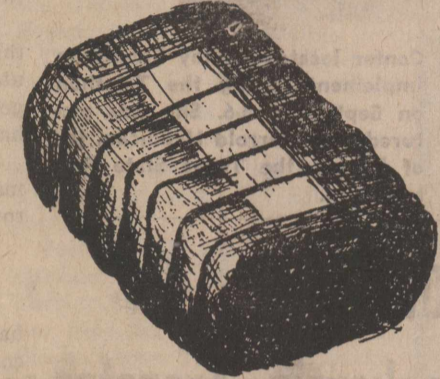
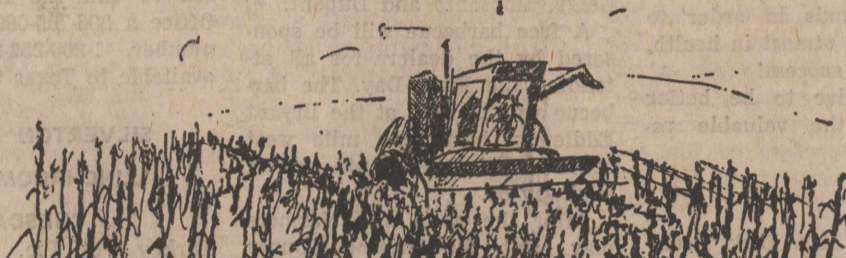
## AEROBICS CLASS TO BEGIN AT VALLEY

## Regional Disaster Aids Increased

Disaster assistance to eligible feed grain producers in the 83 storm-damaged counties of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma will be adjusted upward, according to Everett Rank, administrator of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Assistance will be adjusted from 15 cents to \$1.17 per bushel for corn producers and from 18 cents to \$1.13 per bushel for grain sorghum and barley producers, he said.

Rank said these adjustments were needed to make the assistance payments more comparable to payments already assigned for wheat and upland cotton.

Payments to eligible producers under the special disaster assistance program are being made through the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

**Commission Approves Mackenzie Transfer**

The Texas Water Commission has approved an application by Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority to make a trans-watershed diversion involving water from Lake Mackenzie. The application was heard by the three-member TWC Thursday of last week. The reservoir is located on Tule Creek, a tributary of the Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River. Water from the reservoir is to be provided to Tulia and Silvertown, which are in the Red River Basin, and to Lockney and Floydada, which are in the Brazos River basin. Department of Water Resources Assistant Director of Planning and Development Allen White told the hearing that DWR's studies of water needs in the Red River basin indicate that the 5,200 acre-feet of water involved in the diversion can be moved from the basin without impairing water availability in the basin within the next 50 years. Such a determination is required to allow trans-basin diversions. There was no opposition to the application.

**Texas Extension Homemakers To Meet In El Paso Soon**

Lanita Cantwell and Theta Holt, members of the Southwestern Extension Homemakers, will be representing Briscoe County as delegates when more than 900 members of the Texas Extension Homemakers Association from throughout Texas assemble in El Paso for the annual state convention September 14-16. "This will be the 56th annual meeting of the homemakers organization, and a blue ribbon program has been prepared," announced Mrs. Billie H. McCraw, president of the 22,680-member group. Mrs. McCraw is from Raymondville. Conference sessions will be at the Convention Center. Registration will begin at 1:00 p.m. September 14 and continue through that evening. Special activities for that afternoon and again the afternoon of September 16 will be bus tours to Mexico, with emphasis on several historic cathedrals and a visit to a federally-sponsored shopping center in Juarez. **Field Day To Be Held In Silvertown September 10**

Agricultural Equipment and Chemical Field Day will be held in Silvertown Friday, September 10, according to Earnest Kiker, Briscoe County Extension Agent. Farmers are urged to meet at the First State Bank in Silvertown at 8:30 a.m. for coffee and donuts, and begin the program. Equipment demonstrations, chemical use, limited tillage in cotton, reducing cost with minimum tillage and 1983 Farm Program are a few of the topics to be discussed by Randy Underwood, agronomist for the Soil Conservation Service, Dr. James Supak, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, and James Griffin, County Executive Director of ASCS.

Equipment and chemical companies will discuss and show slides of equipment and chemical use during the morning session. At 10:30 a.m. an equipment demonstration will be held 1/4 mile west of Silvertown on the north side of Highway 86. Dealers who will be present for this Field Day are Brown-McMurtry Implement, Company, John Deere, Ray Teeple Fertilizer, Eversman, Felix King, Ciba Geigy, Monsanto and Dupont. A free barbecue will be sponsored by the dealers for all attending the Field Day. The barbecue will be held at the Bryant Eddleman barn, one mile west of Silvertown on the south side of Highway 86.

After the noon meal farmers may visit the Briscoe County Weather Station located at the Eddleman barn and return to the equipment demonstration. Herb Burns, agronomist for the Soil Conservation Service, Elston Grubburgh, Extension Agricultural Engineer - Mechanization, Pat Morrison, Extension Entomologist for soybean, sorghum and sunflowers, Joe Bryant, Extension communications specialist, Dr. James Supak, Extension Agronomist - Cotton,

and Randy Underwood, agronomist with the Soil Conservation Service, will be available for questions during the afternoon. 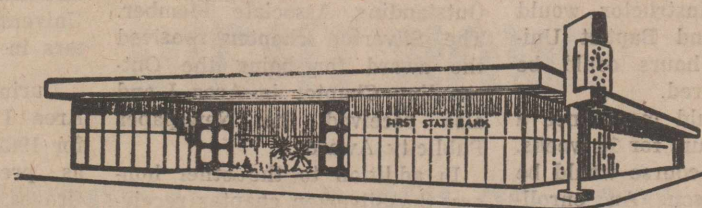

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### DPS Estimating 47 Will Die On Highways

Although motor vehicle fatalities are down by five percent statewide as compared to the same time last year, the Texas Department of Public Safety is estimating 47 traffic deaths over the forthcoming Labor Day weekend.

DPS Director Colonel Jim Adams said he is not optimistic that the holiday period would reflect any fewer deaths than anticipated. However, he said that drivers could help limit the number of fatalities by using seat belts, maintaining a safe speed and refraining from drinking while driving. He said about half of the holiday deaths would probably involve alcohol.

"Some people tend to drink more during the holidays and then attempt to drive. By doing so, they show a low regard for the well-being of themselves, their passengers and other motorists. Drunk driving is obviously one of the most dangerous risk factors facing motorists today," he said.

DPS statistical reports show 23 percent of traffic deaths reported last year involved alcohol. However, Adams said, "About 50 percent or more of the traffic deaths in Texas are alcohol related."

"State law does not provide for mandatory blood alcohol testing on drivers who were believed to have been drinking. When we compare accident reports and national statistics, it is easy to estimate the number of accidents which involve the drinking driver," he said.

Last year during Labor Day, 50 persons were killed in urban and rural traffic accidents. Eight more persons died later as a result of injuries suffered from accidents which occurred during the 78-hour holiday.

At the discretion of command officers, the DPS will have extra patrols assigned to areas where heavy volumes of traffic
