Two new intentions to drill have been filed for Briscoe County.

They are both to be drilled on the H. T. Luther ranch north of Quitaque.

The H. T. Luther No. 1 will be drilled by Exploration Unlimited 5000 feet from south and 6500' from west line, section 120, A-1601, W. T. McDaniel Survey, 6½ miles north of Quitaque. Permitted depth of 8000 feet has been approved.

The H. T. Luther No. 2 will be drilled by Exploration Unlimited 100 feet from north and 1000 feet from west line, section 5, A-1459, W. T. McDaniel Survey, eight miles north of Quitaque. The permitted depth of 8000 feet has been approved.

Workover rigs are continuing operations northwest of Silverton on the Ethen wildcat and on two of the Cogdell wildcats. Work is being done on the Sojourner-drilled Cogdell well and on the one on the north rim of Tule Canyon.

Janine Ellis, a junior nursing major at West Texas State University, is one of 70 students to receive caps during the annual convocation ceremony on Friday, September 24.

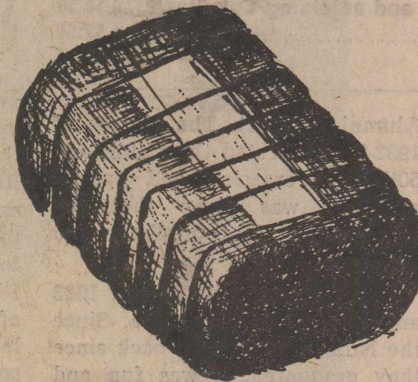
Convocation begins at 7:00 p.m. in the Mary Moody Northern Recital Hall on the WTSU campus.

Ms. Ellis is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John McCune of Silverton.

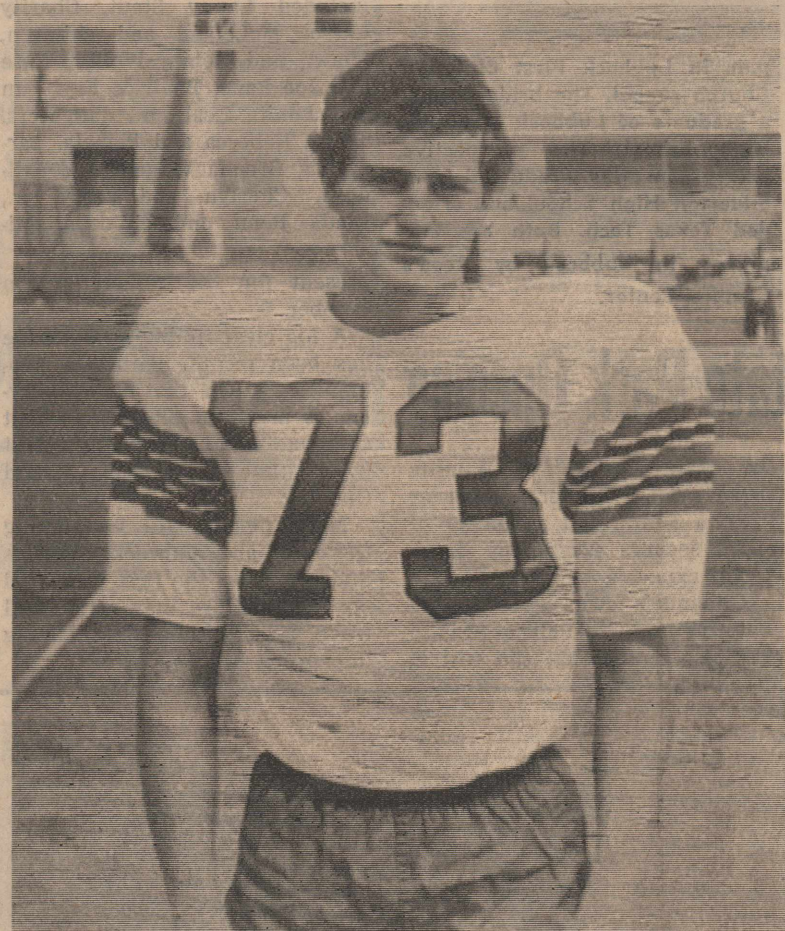

Owls Lose To Powerful Matadors

The Owls traveled to Matador last Friday night and lost their first game of the season 28-0. The Owls now stand 2-1.

Even though some who didn't see the game asked "What happened to the Owls?" the team played very hard in the game and didn't have anything to apologize to anyone for in regard to the game. They played a state-ranked Class A power and lost. It is as simple as that.

A scout from Crowell stated at halftime that he hoped his team would be able to play the Matadors as well as Silverton.

"We matched them play for play in the first quarter but in the second we just could not stop Shannon," stated Coach Marvin Self. "We held Shannon to 162 yards, the least he has been able to gain this season. They are as tough as nails. You watch, they are going to pull some upsets this season. They play tough ball."

The Owls open conference play here with Amherst Friday night. This will be the Homecoming football game, and pregame activities will begin at about 7:00 p.m. when the Owls crown their Football Queen. The candidates are Jeni Denton, senior; Tammi Edwards, junior; Alesha Patton, sophomore, and Kathy Brown, freshman.

At Matador, the Owls took the opening kickoff to their own 30, and Jim Forbes ran for nine yards on first down. They made about half a yard on second down, and on their third play from scrimmage were set for a two-yard loss, and punted to the Matley 39. The Matador offense was completely stymied, and on fourth down they punted back to the Owls.

Taking possession on their own 45, the Owls made a first down on the Motley 40 on runs by Forbes. They moved for another first down on the Motley 25 by virtue of runs by Forbes and Quarterback Shane Reagan. On their next third down, needing about five, the Owls fumbled a pitchout and the Matadors recovered on their own 20.

The teams traded punts, and as the second quarter got underway the Matadors ran 80 yards for a touchdown that was nullified by a penalty. The Owls got a personal foul penalty that gave the Matadors their first first down of the game.

The Owls opened the second half by kicking to the Matadors, who picked up two first downs enroute to payday. They scored from the five with 7:23 remaining in the third quarter, the kick was good, and Matador held a 21-0 lead.

The Owl offense sputtered on their next series, and Reagan punted away. The Matadors fumbled the punt, and Eric Patton grabbed it at the Motley 40 for the Owls. Reagan passed to Craig Patton for a first down and a Matador penalty was tacked onto the end of the play. The Owls gambled on fourth down, and saw the ball go over to the Matadors on the Motley 20.

Motley fumbled and Reagan recovered for the Owls on the Silverton 34. The Owls were unable to move the ball, and punted back to the Matadors who wasted very little time before going into the end zone. With 1:09 remaining in the third period, the Matadors scored, kicked the extra point, and led 28-0.

The Owls made a first down on runs by Reagan and Forbes before seeing the ball go over on downs at the Motley 48 early in the fourth quarter.

Motley picked up about nine yards before fumbling, and Reagan grabbed the loose ball for the Owls. A pass from Reagan to Jarrett was complete and a personal foul against the Matadors moved the ball to the Motley 40. Unable to make another first down, the Owls punted to the Motley 10.

The 1981 county valuation was \$95,862,400.00 and the 1982 valuation is \$90,134,737.00.

Labels Program Earns Flag For School Lunchroom

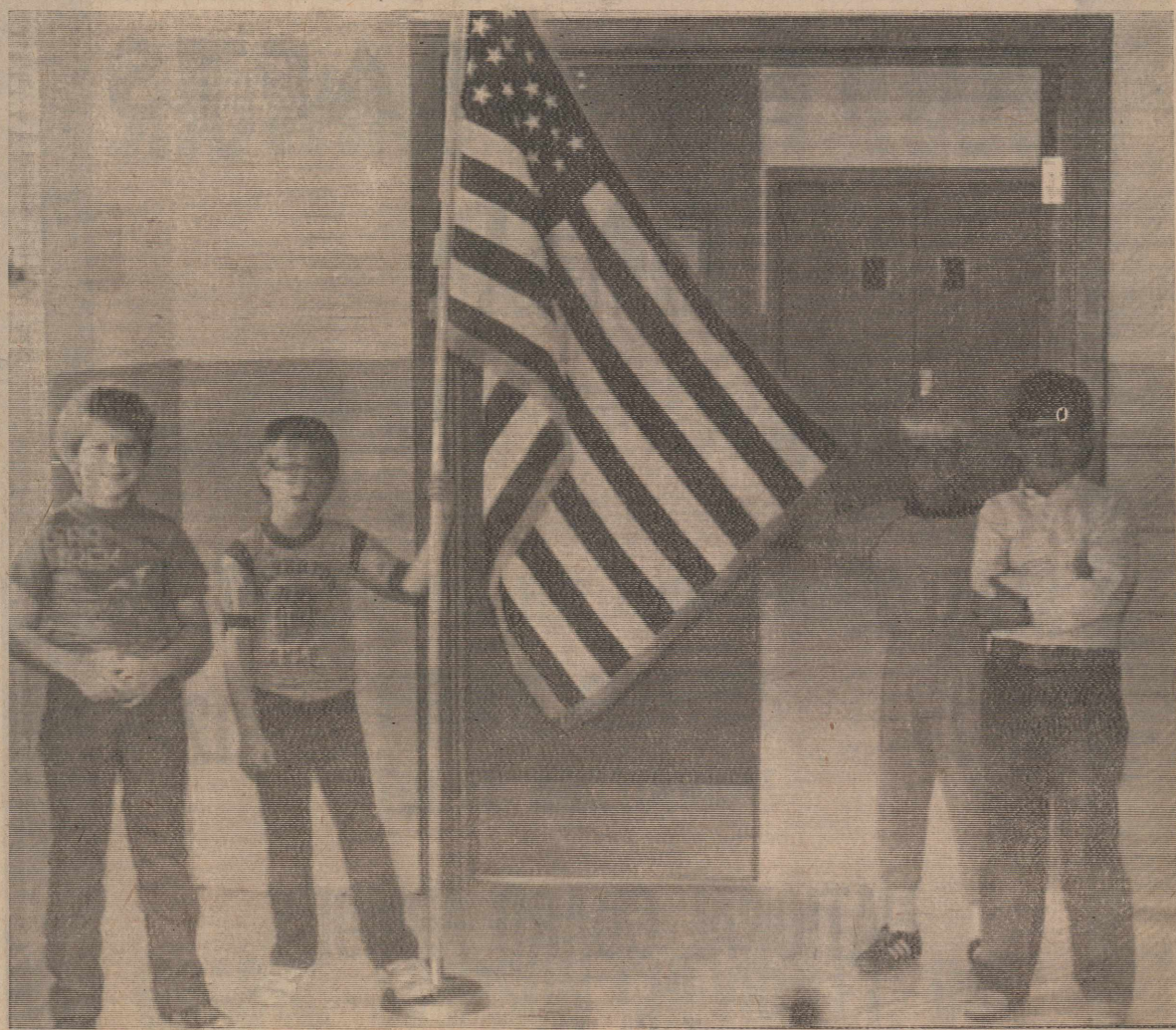
The 1981-82 Campbell's/Swanson "Labels for Education" project collected 3,000 labels and a flag set was placed in the school lunchroom.

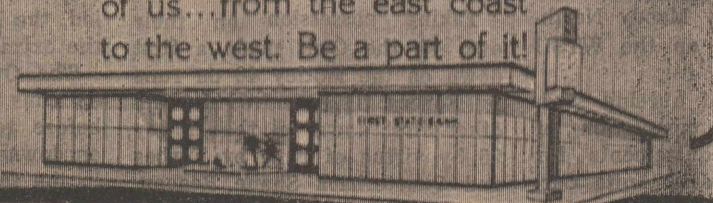

The organization whose goals are to promote wholesome family relationships and to share community responsibilities with other organizations, will be one more voice among many throughout Texas that is bringing a message to drug dealers and users loud and clear—you are not welcome in our state!

The Texans' War on Drugs committee was established by Governor Clements and chaired by Dallas businessman H. Ross Perot. The committee established a three-pronged approach to combat drug abuse: education and prevention; legislation, and law enforcement. The action arm of the committee responsible for the implementation of education and prevention has been instrumental in establishing and strengthening community families groups throughout the state. The level of awareness of drug abuse has increased considerably since its inception and programs involving parents and various civic minded organizations have gone far in helping to eradicate this menace that is destroying the youth. By these two organizations—Texas Extension Homemakers Association and Texans' War on Drugs—working together, the goal of drug-free youth appears to be obtainable in the state.

Secretary of State to Tabulate General Elections Returns

Secretary of State David A. Dean announced today the Secretary of State will undertake vote tabulation in primary and general elections beginning with the November 2 general election. Dean noted that the Texas Election Bureau (TEB) had unanimously voted not to tabulate results for the upcoming general election and instead supported a merger of experience and expertise with the Secretary of State's Office.

Secretary Dean stated, "I am extremely appreciative of this vote of confidence and the support expressed by the TEB Directors. I have no doubt that their pledge of support and resources ensures that the undertaking will be a successful venture. Our combined talents will maximize the state's ability to quickly and accurately report statewide vote totals. The natural consequence of our efforts will be minimized opportunity for election fraud and a maximized flow of election results to the public and candidates."

Dean also stated that he was inviting the current members of the TEB to serve on an advisory task force to the Secretary of State to oversee the election reporting project, particularly with respect to formulating the returns to be reported on November 2, 1982. "The TEB has indeed filled a void for the State since 1916 and is to be commended for their service to the state over the years; however, the time has clearly come for the State to assume the vote tabulation function and for it to be carried on by the State."

Burl Osborne, Executive Editor of the Dallas Morning News, and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Texas Election Bureau, stated that the TEB Board of Directors had carefully analyzed the Secretary of State's proposal and had unanimously come to the decision to support the state sponsored project. Osborne stated, "Based on assurances from Secretary Dean, the reports of the TEB staff, and the views expressed by our Board members, we have asked Secretary Dean to proceed with our cooperation."

Dean noted that the Subcommittee on Public Disclosure of the Public Servants Standards of Conduct Committee had, on August 3, 1982, ratified a proposal calling for the Secretary of State to assume the vote tabulation process with full Committee approval expected in October. In addition, Governor Clements, Lieutenant Governor Hobby, Speaker Clayton, and State Representative Gib Lewis, had endorsed the Secretary of State sponsored project. Dean noted that Representative Lewis will be the House sponsor of the legislation to institutionalize the process in the Secretary of State's Office by statute.

Breath Of Life Campaign In Progress Here

The Breath of Life Campaign, an annual appeal for funds to help children with Cystic Fibrosis, began in Silverton on September 19, according to the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

"The campaign is called the Breath of Life because that phrase so graphically describes what this fund-raising effort hopes to accomplish—for children and young people with CF who struggle to breathe," says Wanda Strange, chairman of the campaign.

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited by one in every 1,600 American children. It is incurable and ultimately fatal. Geneticists estimate that one in every 20 Americans is an unknowing and symptomless carrier of the gene which can cause CF in a child. If a baby receives a CF gene from each of two unsuspecting gene carriers, the child has a 25 percent chance of being born with Cystic Fibrosis.

"Progress has been made," says Mrs. Strange. "When the CF Foundation was established in 1955, few children with CF survived to school age. Today, with early diagnosis and comprehensive treatment, a child with CF has a 50 percent chance of living past age 19. Improved techniques have increased both the quality and quantity of life," Mrs. Strange continued, "But these children and young people still require specialized and expensive care and treatment throughout their lives."
