I am probably the world's worst when it comes to resisting change and progress when it comes to really important things. I do believe in trying new things if I can reserve the option of going back to the old way if I don't like the new one. Only my husband knows how stubbornly I resist permanent changes.

We at the Briscoe County News are arriving at a crossroads, where a really big decision is necessary. Not if, but when, a gigantic change will have to be made with no option of going back.

I'm sure many of our subscribers are aware that the Briscoe County News has continued to be printed by the letterpress method, while most other newspapers have long been printed by the offset method. (The last I heard there were 13 letterpress newspapers remaining in Texas, and two of these are printed in our shop.)

Going offset usually necessitates that a paper be printed in a central plant, rather than in the home town, as we have always done.

When a paper is printed in a central plant, stricter deadlines have to be enforced.

The situation we are facing is that we will be able to get the zinc plates for engraving pictures for the paper for only a limited time. For years we have received our newsprint from Canada, the only paper mill we know who will still cut it to size for us. Things are getting very tough, when it comes to buying supplies for a letterpress paper. In addition, our old equipment is giving us more trouble every week.

The question at the crossroads this time was whether to go offset or discontinue publishing the paper. But we have to try to earn a living somehow, and we really enjoy what we are doing.

One thing we have been doing this summer and fall is updating our plant with some new offsetrelated equipment. This necessitated that we remodel our darkroom. Last weekend, we purchased a photo-typesetter which will eventually practically end our use of hot type.

This is pretty expensive, and gives me shudders when I think about the economy. The offset company's charges for printing our paper give me more shudders. I sure do hope we've made the right decision.

Beverly and I will be learning to operate the new typesetter, which is nothing but a printedcircuit computer, during the rest of this year, and probably we will go offset at the first of the new year. At any rate, you can look for-

ward to having a paper soon that has a much nicer appearance. It's going to cost us a lot, and I just hope we can make enough out of the paper to afford it. We are proceeding with this plan on faith alone.

The increase of taxes on real and personal property is attributed largely to a realignment of property valuation due to inflation and exemption laws now in effect such as: Household exemptions, Frozen tax exemptions for senior citizens, 100% exemption of livestock, Veterans' ex-\$ 6,679,838 emptions, Disability exemptions, and the \$15,000 - \$30,000 exemption on farm and ranch implements.

Briscoe County lost over \$5,000,000.00 tax value from the cattle exemption and the \$15,000-\$30,000 exemption on farm and ranch implements this year. On the ballot for the November 2, Sunday after having visited in 1982 General Election, Amendment No. 3 asks for a vote for Palmer and the Jim Bairds at or against "The constitutional Alvord while she was recuper- amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation." If this amendment passes, the county will lose approximately \$3,765,000.00 taxable value next






