# **Miniature Monsters** To Invade Neighborhoods

On Sunday, October 31, miniature monsters will invade the neighborhoods and the cry, 'trick or treat," will be heard throughout the land.

Major C. W. Bell, Region 5 commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today, "Motorists and parents need to take precautions to protect children and prevent disasters this Halloween."

He suggests that small children be accompanied by older children or adults and tricks or treating be confined to their own neighborhoods.

Major Bell also stated, "Costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and also be non-flammable. Facial makeup should be used instead of masks or hoods that restrict vision." Parents should not permit youngsters to carry jack-o-lanterns with lighted can-

Children should be told to look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by the child can serve as a warning to motorists, and children should be instructed to use sidewalks when possible. Motorists should use extra caution in residential areas and look for children crossing streets in a haphazard manner. Parents should remind older children not to vandalize residences, businesses or vehicles. Drivers should take caution on this night and not permit passengers to throw objects such as water balloons, paper, etc. from the vehicle.

Major Bell stated, "If parents and motorists join together and think of childrens' safety, Halloween 1982 can be a safe and enjoyable evening for everyone."

The 13,906-acre park is the second largest in the TP&WD system, extending from the Caprock eastward for a distance of about eight miles.

Feature attraction of the park is Lake Theo, which covers 120 acres at high level and provides swimming, boating and fishing activities. Near the lake are shaded picnic tables, a shelter for large groups, comfort station and showers. A beach area for swimmers is also provided, along with a fishing pier and boat

Other park attractions include camp sites with water and electricity, sites with water only, a centrally located restroom with showers, day-use area with shade shelters, interpretative shelter, scenic overlooks, and some 16 miles of hiking and equestrian trails.

According to the local park officials, at the end of the day a total of 2,200 people added that 3,085 people visited the park during the weekend of October 9-10.





kilowatt-hour generated by natural gas was 3.178 cents. The fuel cost of a kilowatt-hour generated by coal was 1.803 cents. So maximizing use of Tolk and our other coal-fired plant, Harrington Station near Amarillo, will help us, as your partners, hold down fuel costs.
