

It's Santa Letter Time Once Again

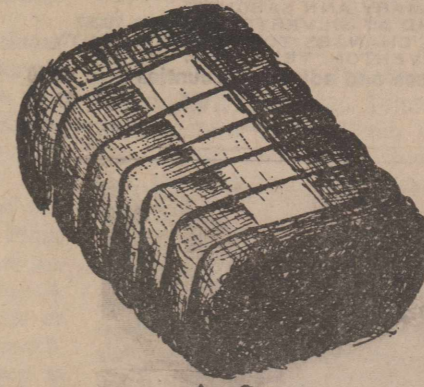
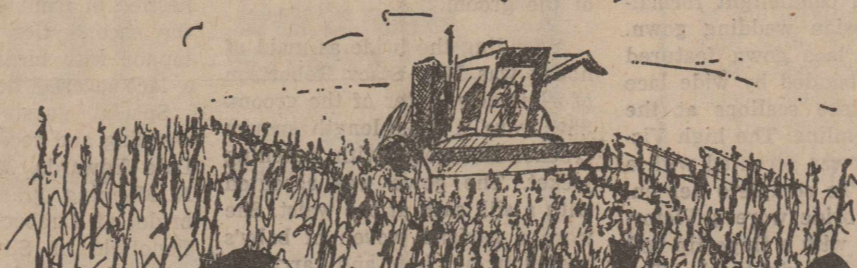
It's that time of year again, when the kids are writing their letters to Santa.

Subscription Rates To Go Up Soon

Subscription rates to the Briscoe County News will go up a dollar at the first of the year, to \$7.50 for those living in Briscoe and adjoining counties and to \$8.50 for those living elsewhere.

This is being made necessary by the new equipment and new printing procedure which will go into operation with the Christmas edition, and also by an increase in postal rates expected in December.

Advertising rates will also be going up. The minimum rate for classified advertising and cards of thanks will advance from \$1.50 to \$1.75. Display rates will go up also to help offset the increased cost of production. This will be the first increase in advertising rates since 1979.

It has become necessary to increase rates to try to keep from having to suspend publication of your hometown newspaper.

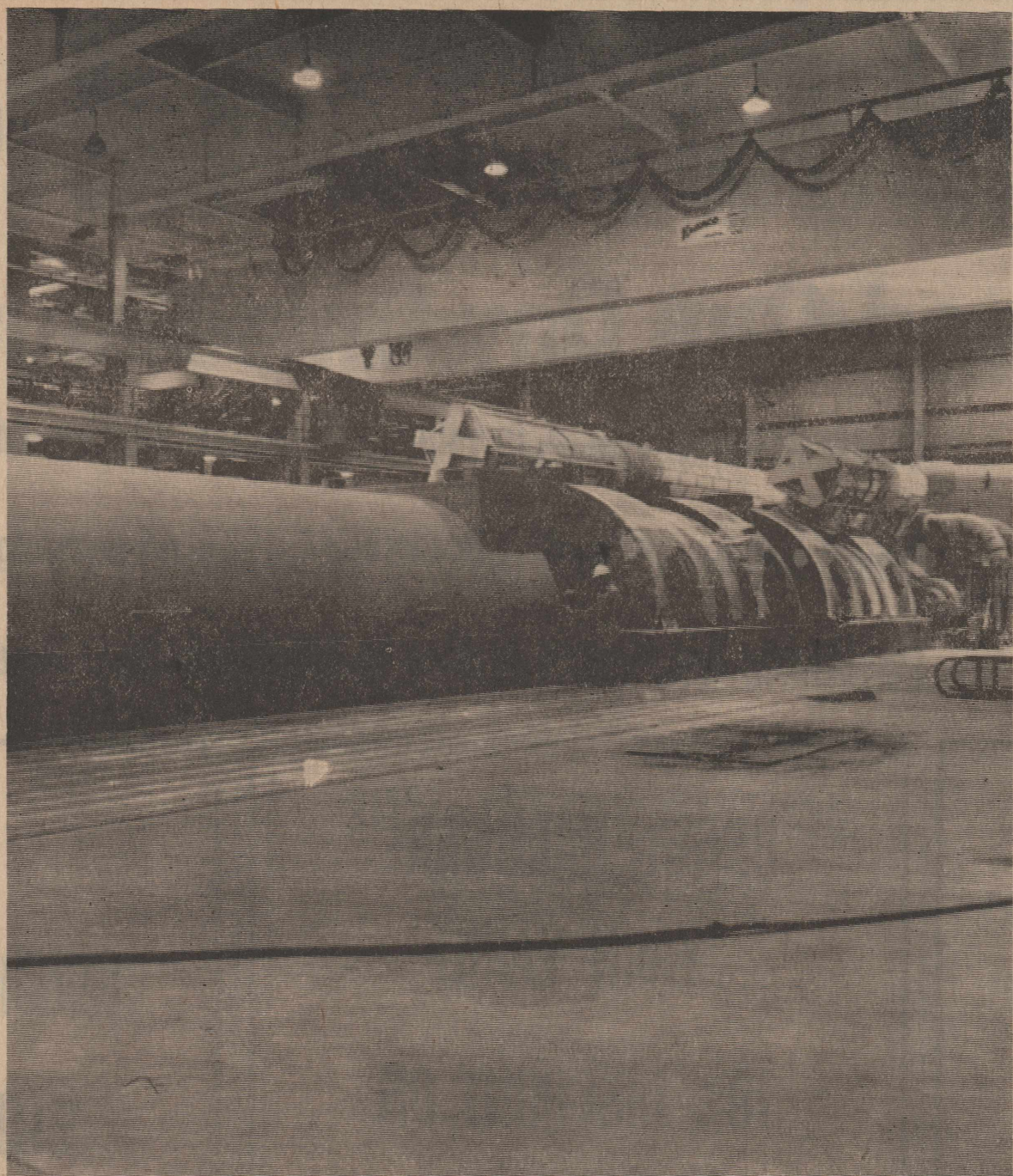

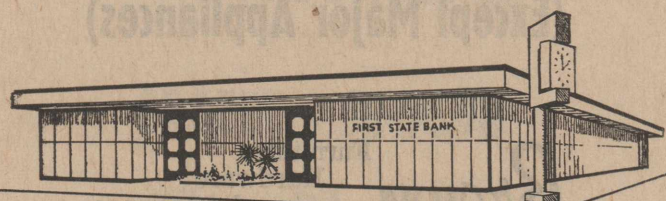

USDA To Permit Support Loans On Substituted Grains, Soybeans

Farmers who participate in the government's acreage reduction program now will be able to take out government price support loans on grain and soybeans substituted for crops produced on their farms, a high ranking U. S. Department of Agriculture official said recently.

Previously, only grain physically grown on a producer's farm was eligible for price support.

Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the change was made to allow farmers who participate in acreage reduction programs to take advantage of government price supports without having to transport their grain to areas where grain elevators will accept the grain for storage.

Rank said the change will permit eligible producers to feed or sell grain produced on their farms and place under loan an equivalent quantity of acquired grain stored in an approved warehouse.

Commodities that may be substituted include wheat, feed grains, rice and soybeans.

Rank also announced that: —Loans will be based on the rate applicable for the county where the loan grain is stored.

—Producers must obtain approval to place under loan any grain which they acquire before an equivalent quantity they produced is sold or otherwise disposed of.

—Warehouse receipts covering the acquired grain must be submitted to the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office as security for the loan within 15 days after the producer's grain is sold or traded.

Rank said, "The farmer-elected county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee has the responsibility to protect the interest of both the producer and CCC in approving the substitution of grain for loan purposes. Producers who wish to

take advantage of this change should contact their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office."

End-Of-Year Crop, Livestock Reports To Be Made Soon

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service began contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in mid-November for final 1982 crop acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

State Statistician Doug Murfield reported that with low prices depressing farm income and the severe weather cutting crop production in the northern part of the state, producers are depending on this information for an accurate picture of the 1982 agricultural situation.

Murfield explained that the confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, provide information used by farm organizations and legislatures in planning and developing farm programs; by extension economists and management consultants in advising producers; and by exporters in planning and promoting sales of Texas agricultural products.

"Without these reports, farmers and ranchers would have to

rely on other sources of information for crop and livestock prospects," Murfield added.

He stressed that the end-of-year crop and livestock surveys should not be confused with the 1982 Census of Agriculture which is being mailed in late November. "While the census is a more detailed accounting of Texas agriculture, our two-page questionnaire is short and can be completed in a matter of minutes," Murfield explained.

To reduce survey costs, Murfield is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state as well as county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

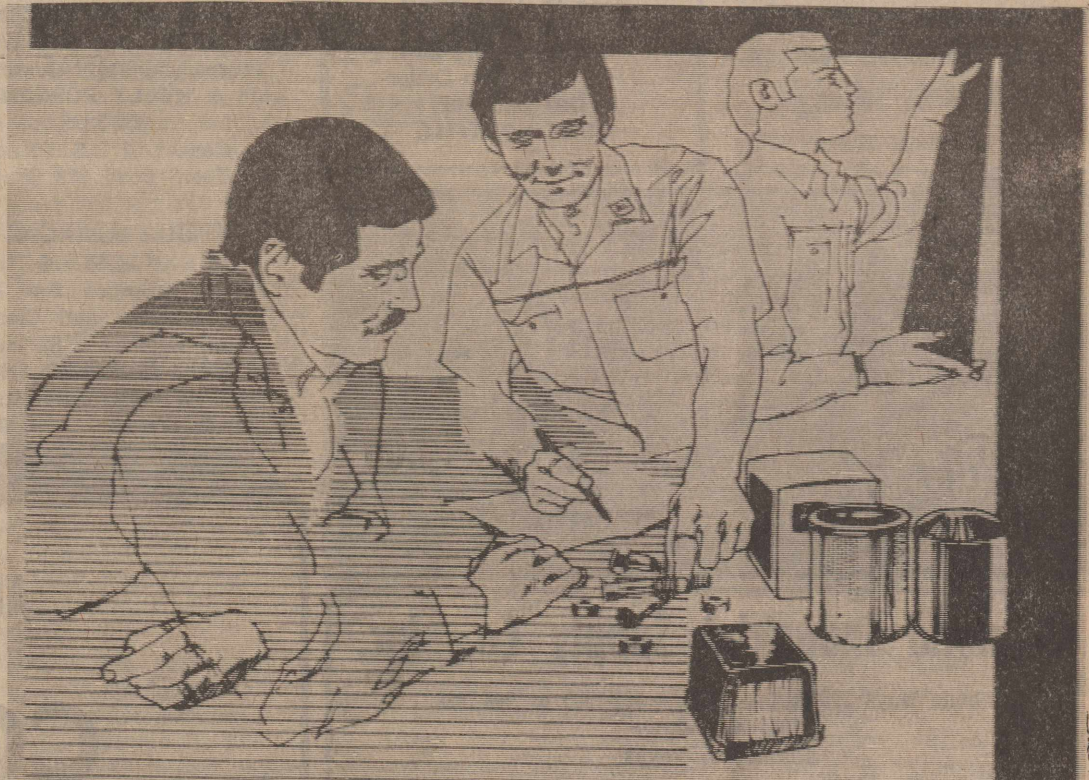
