A newspaper has been published in Silverton for many years. One was established in Silverton close to the time of the county's organization in 1892, but it has not been published continuously since that time. In the early 1900's the paper was published as the Light, the Signal, the Star, and possibly under oth-

On January 1, 1983, the Briscoe County News will have been published consecutively for 75 years. Surprisingly, the present owners have published the paper for almost one-third of those years—24 to be exact, as of April

This week marks an end and a new beginning for the Briscoe County News. All through its 75year history, this newspaper has been printed in Silverton on letterpress equipment. Beginning next week, it will be printed in Floydada on offset equipment.

Though we have been working toward this change-over for a number of weeks now, it is beginning to seem like we are taking the paper back to infancy. I know the change-over is taking the people at the Briscoe County News back to infancy in their knowledge of the newspaper business. You know the old saying, "If you can't lick them, join them," and this is exactly what we are doing. We couldn't lick the system to keep printing the paper here in Silverton. It has gotten to the point where our equipment is worn-out, we can't get the materials and supplies we need for letterpress printing, and we can no longer fight what I hope will prove to be

The offset method of printing will ultimately enable us to give you a better newspaper. But we are presently in a period of learning the new method and how to use it to our advantage. Please bear with us during the transi-

As of January 1, 1983, you will see a new smaller size in your newspaper. There will be more bout half the size of the presworked into the already-full printing schedule at Floydada, and it will not be possible for us to get our papers on Wednesday afternoons. This is the part I think our subscribers will like least of all about the change-over, but we are probably going to be forced to mail our papers later on Thursdays. People on the rural routes will not receive their papers until Friday mornning, and those in town will have to go to the post office late in the morning or after lunch on Thursday to get their papers. We apologize in advance for this; we will be looking for a chance to get moved to Wednesday scheduling for our printing, but at this time it looks like Wednesday night will be the earliest possible time it can be printed, and probably it will be scheduled for early Thursday mornings.

Printing the paper out of town will force us to adhere more closely to a deadline, also, so please cooperate by getting your ads and news in to us as early on Tuesday as you can.

**Texas Cotton Failures** 

"We'll have a blue Christmas," said Cotton Fanning of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the state's largest association of cotton producers. "It'll drive a lot of cotton farmers into bankruptcy, there's no doubt about that. Some just won't be back next vear."

The state's cotton production was cut to 2.5 million bales this year —a 56 percent drop from 1981. Texas also lost to California its spot as No. 1 cotton-producing state, falling to the No. 2 position for the first time since

Texas Agriculture Department estimates show that the production drop amounts to a \$758 million loss in cash receipts, but the figure rises to \$2.2 billion when the loss of jobs from cotton-related industries is taken into ac-


