Mr. Holt, who had resided at the Lockney Care Center for the past five years, died at 6:30 a.m. Thursday, March 10, at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he had been a patient for about three weeks.

Born August 1, 1896 in Huckabay County, he was the son of the late G. C. and Emma Huckaby Holt. He came to Briscoe County with his parents in a covered wagon in 1900.

In his early teens, he and his father operated a freight line to Canyon, and he loved to talk about spending the night in the wagon yard.

One of the early homes his family built was from lumber that was ordered from Sears Roebuck.

At an early age he sat on the woodpile and learned to play the fiddle. He made his first fiddle in 1966 at the age of 70, and made several fiddles thereafter.

Mr. Holt married the former Leona Seay in Silverton on December 29, 1917, and they made their home here all of their married life, with the exception of one year they lived in California.

They maintained a summer home in Red River, New Mexico for 16 years. While residing at the Lockney Care Center he loved to reminisce about people he knew and the experiences of earlier years. His favorite activities were playing bingo and dominoes.

He was a member of the Silverton Church of Christ. He was preceded in death by

his wife in 1976 and two daughters, Lorema, an infant, and Reba Kitchens.

Survivors include a son, Rex Holt, of Silverton; a daughter, Mrs. Billy Wayne (Peggy) Garvin, of Silverton; two brothers, Charlie Holt of Silverton and Edgar Holt of Graham; a sister, Mrs. Annie McGary of Spearman; eight grandchildren and seventeen great-grandchildren. Pallbearers were Kent Holt,

Born September 29, 1908 in Lockney, Mr. Ayres was a retired farmer and a member of the Main Street Church of Christ.



Agriculture Day. It is hoped that those in our area will join with others around the country in reminding all Americans of the strengths and needs of this country's farmers.

For years, we have enjoyed relatively cheap food, thanks to the productivity of the American farmer. Americans spend only about 13 cents of every dollar of disposable income on food. By contrast, the Japanese spend 22 cents of every dollar on food, and

the Russians, 31 cents. Agriculture also is the nation's largest single positive contributor to the balance of payments in spite of the fact that farm exports dropped last year.

Our farmers have always faced the uncertainties of the weather and potential crop failures. Over the last three years, they have also been plagued by declining farm income, brought on by low commodity prices and other economic and political factors beyond their control.

Our government has recently taken action in the form of the Payment-in-Kind program and other measures to assist farmers. But the approach of Agriculture Week and Ag Day gives all of us the opportunity to thank farmers for their contributions to our way of life.






