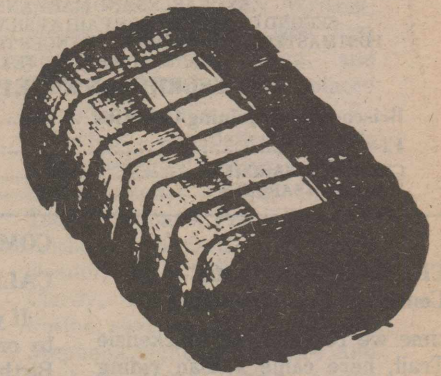

HEAVY RAIN, HAIL FALLS SOUTH OF SILVERTON

Heavy rain and hail fell south of Silverton last Friday afternoon, while .35 of an inch of rain and light hail fell on the city itself.

The Edwin Dickersons reported 1.50 inches of rain and crops and garden hailed out.

Rain and hail were also heavy at the Lane Garvin home.

Water was over the road in places, and it was reported that hail stacked up six inches deep and looked like snow. Tornadoes also were sighted in this system.

A light shower fell on Silverton and Lake Mackenzie Sunday afternoon, with a tornado sighted west of the lake which stayed on the ground only a short time.

Location of the marker and dedication ceremony is FM Road 378, seven miles west and three and one-half miles south of Silverton.

A HISTORY OF THE CELTIC POST OFFICE

One of the first two post offices to be established in Briscoe County, Texas was Celtic, the other, Luther, both being May 2, 1891. Luther was geographically located to the southeast of Celtic. Briscoe County was organized 11 months later, March 15, 1892. Briscoe County was created in 1876 from Bexar District. It is situated along the border of what is commonly called "The Panhandle of Texas," named in honor of Andrew Briscoe, a benefactor in the Texas Independence from Mexico, signer of the Declaration of Texas Independence, and who fought in the memorable battle of San Jacinto in 1836.

This area was roamed by Indians for centuries, tamed by the open range cattlemen in the late 1870's, and permanent settlement began in 1890.

In 1890, E. R. Thomas, born in Hopkins County, Texas in 1858, moved from Cook County, Texas to Della Plains in Floyd County, Texas. Later he relocated in Briscoe County on March 1, 1891. Somehow, between digging a

dugout and building a small frame house for his family, he found time to secure a petition of interested citizens in the area for a post office. The grant was to Thomas, noting the petition was worthy for a post office. E. R. Thomas was named postmaster and he named it Celtic. The application was signed by W. G. Conner, Tulia, Texas, March 5, 1891. E. R. Thomas was now in business, combining a store and post office in one room of the small frame house.

Hayden W. Savage, neighbor to the south, carried the mail for Celtic, from Tulia, Texas post office, nine miles west of the present town of Tulia. Mr. Savage and his wife, Isabel Hadden Hamilton Savage, both born in Tennessee, with their family moved to Briscoe County from Grayson County, Texas. Their claim in Briscoe County was Section 48, Block A, in what now is the Rock Creek Community.

Dr. C. E. Donnell, medical doctor, historian and writer, tells in his book, "Early Day Facts and Memories," "Monday, July 20, 1891, my father, A. P. Donnell, and myself were prospecting in Briscoe County. We drove west from townsite, Silverton. We stopped at E. R. Thomas' store and a post office he called Celtic. After visiting with him for a while, he told us of a section of land north from there. We started toward it, but about the

time we reached the Mackenzie Trail, here came a man riding like going for a doctor to tell us that the land had been claimed. We went back to the townsite, Silvertown."

Celtic, Texas, in the Thomas home, was in the northeast quarter of Section 50, Block A, also on the route from Tullia, 22 miles west to Luther to Quitaque, 25 miles. Red River was the prominent river north, with Rock Creek the nearest creek, two miles north. Fort Worth and Denver, at Clarendon, Texas, the nearest railroad. One hundred population was said to have received mail weekly from the Celtic Post Office.

Of the 100 patrons receiving mail from Celtic, there were the early settlers of the area and cowboys living on the various ranches, one being the Tule Division of the JA Ranch. Headquarters of the Tule Ranch was located 11 miles northwest of the Celtic Post Office, this being the nearest post office to the headquarters.

In 1876, Colonel Charles Good-

If you have not been contacted to order a 1983-84 Community Birthday Calendar from the Silvertown Future Business Lead-

night, who had established the JA Ranch in partnership with John Adair in Briscoe, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Swisher and Hall counties, divided the vast ranch in division. An earthen tank, known as JA or Anderson tank, and large cottonwood trees surrounding the tank, is a landmark today, being the only mark of the large Tule Headquarters house in an earlier day. So as the crow flies, the cowboys rode their horses to Celtic weekly to get their mail.

Following excerpts taken from data in the Briscoe County Clerk's office. In a letter from Col. Goodnight, dated March 22, 1923, he stated: "The first settlement in the county (Briscoe) was made on the Quitaque Creek in the fall of 1877 by L. R. Dyer, who brought from the Raton Mountains of New Mexico a herd of about 2000 head of cattle in the inverted known as the Lazy F, and located them about two miles west of the present headquarters of the ranch. These cattle belonged to James and George Baker and were turned over to them by L. R. Dyer in 1878. The ranch was bought by me, as agent for the Adairs, in 1874. In 1874, before I came down here, the Indians attacked a surveying party at the foot of the plains just north of the Linguish near where the old Indian Trail Road now comes See **CELTIC POST OFFICE—

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Statement of Nondiscrimination

Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government, a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities. down the mountain, near where the road is today. I think they killed two of the party, they being Mexicans. This party was in charge of George Spiller who I think is now secretary of the Cattle Raisers Association at Fort Worth. He can no doubt give you full particulars.

"After I took charge of the ranch for the Adairs, there was very little trouble with the Indians. They killed a few cattle and stole a few horses, but no lives were lost."

Among the early Tule Ranch Division Cowboys were Bob Bishop (wagon-boss), Bill Love, Jim Love, Fred Scott, Mitch Bell, Gid Mayfield, Dave Mayfield, Warner Reid, Bob Christian, John Lemons, Frank Christian, C. Woodburn, Charley Heisler, and others.

In 1892, E. R. Thomas sold his claim and relocated elsewhere in the county. Thereafter, Celtic Post Office was in the Hayden Savage home. Mr. Savage continued to carry the mail assisted by a son-in-law, Dave Mayfield. Sallie Savage, eldest daughter of the Hayden Savages, born in Tennessee June 12, 1864, was appointed postmaster November 15, 1892.

In the early days, the post office was wished on the majority of postmasters and was not the sought-after job that it is today.

The Hayden W. Savage family was prominent in the affairs of the community and county. Mr. Savage was instrumental in the organization of the county and the selection of the county seat, also serving as chairman of the board of the Silverton townsite and elected county commissioner at the election when the county

was organized March 15, 1892. On October 29, 1893, mail was discontinued at Celtic, with its mail thereafter sent to Silverton. The Savage family had only a post office, no store as had been the case at the Thomas store. Therefore, Celtic patrons chose to go to Silverton, now a townsite, to buy their weekly supplies and getting mail from the Silverton Post Office.

In 1894, Sallie Savage married Wm. Scott Foster and moved to the state of New Mexico. She lived her lifetime there.

On the 1900 Texas census, Hayden Savage and wife, Isabell, are listed in the Briscoe County Census record. They both are buried in the Silverton Cemetery. He died in 1907, and she in 1926.

Another neighbor to the Savages was the George F. Reid family. George F. Reid, born in Kentucky September 7, 1856, and his wife, Lee Hutchinson Reid, came to the county in 1891 from Wise County, Texas. He settled on Section 56. His house was just over into Swisher County, 3 1/2 miles west of the Savages. The Reid family was considered close neighbors and friends of the Savages. Ted Reid, son of George Reid, born in 1895, remembers accompanying his mother to Silverton for their weekly supplies and mail. She always stopped by the Savage's for a chit-chat. The pigeon holes used for mail boxes were still on the wall in the home. This fascinated the young lad. Ted remembers being somewhat afraid of Mr. Savage, as he had lost an eye in the Civil War and wore a patch over it.

Among the first group of settlers in Briscoe County were Hayden W. Savage, George Reid and R. E. Thomas who shared character with other men in the area, 1890-1900. Practically all had lived during the period of the Civil War. Many of them had been soldiers in that bloody strife in which Hayden W. Savage had lost an eye in battle.

These men were from Tennessee, Mississippi, Missouri, Arkansas and Louisiana. They had been pioneers or sons of pioneers in these states. They were tried in the hardships of a frontier country.

The men who were old enough to enter the army had had more school advantages than those who were under age for war services. Those men were deprived of school during the Civil War. However, regardless of whether they had school advantages or not, they were men of sturdy character and of deep convictions. Men who stood for something in life and who were willing to suffer the deprivations of a frontier to better themselves.

These men were noted for their courageous deeds of other forms of notoriety, and were out to build a civilization for their children and their grandchildren. This applied to the noble women who stood by the side of the men and urged them on to more noble things. Long live their kind and may it be said that their descendants will carry the banner higher if it could be possible.

The present owners of the Savage farm are Walter and Raymond Bradley. It is a prosperous farm with modern irrigation. All that remains of the historical Celtic post office is a few abandoned buildings.
