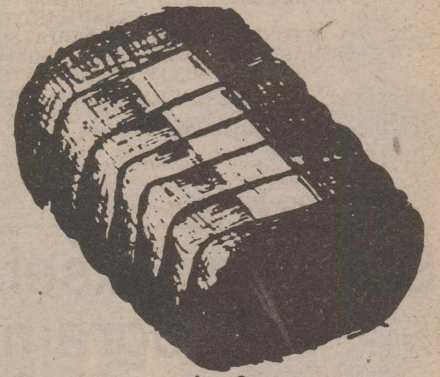
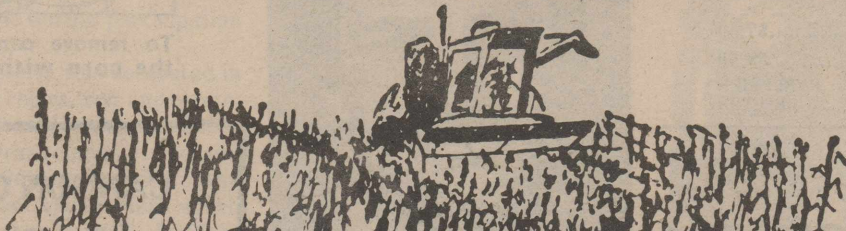

County Show Barn Being Remodeled

Silverton Young Farmers and Silverton Volunteer Firemen have voted to spend \$15,000 on improvements to the Briscoe County Show Barn, and the work is already underway.

A new floor is being installed, new ceiling, insulation, new door and lights. The building includes 7,200 square feet.

Later a concession stand, kitchen and additional restroom

facilities will be added.

The facility is being improved to better serve the community's needs, and a larger number of groups will be able to use it in the future than have been able to do so in the past.

Phillip Shepard Says

"It Pays To Be Small"

Plainview's Phillip Shepard is just about the right size to be a horse-race jockey . . . weighs 120 pounds and is plenty agile. However, he's not involved in the sport of racing . . . he's helping to lay the pipe that will bring Mackenzie water to Tulia . . . a "good lying down job."

Phillip works inside the pipeline. It's his job to take a rubber glove and brush the dirt out of each joint of 18" pipe that is laid.

He's "resting" on a skateboard at the mouth of the joint of pipe that has just been laid. When the sealer cement has been applied, the rubber seal goes on and the joining is complete, he turns on his flashlight and rolls down to the end of the new joint.

Each joint is lowered into the ditch by a backhoe machine.

Phillip has plenty of padding on his elbows, he hardly has time for a nap in the cool dark pipe, because there's always another joint of pipe coming down.

He says working in the 16" pipeline that goes to Floydada is just a little "close." He was in highway construction work before taking this job.

Everything was going great when we visited the pipe laying project Thursday morning (May 19), except they had just accidentally cut some of Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative lines. Fact is, a Mid-Plains man is working right along with the pipe laying crew, attempting to find the lines before they are cut. The pipeline lays parallel with the phone lines, but the phone lines also go across under the highway and across the path of the new water line.

Foreman of the job is Greg Hugdahl of Arlington. He lives at Tule Creek Apartments in Tulia and expects to have the line complete into Tulia in about three weeks. His company, Regional Utilities, has offices in Irving, Texas.

Silverton's Johnny Reyes is also "pipe man" for another crew working on the project.

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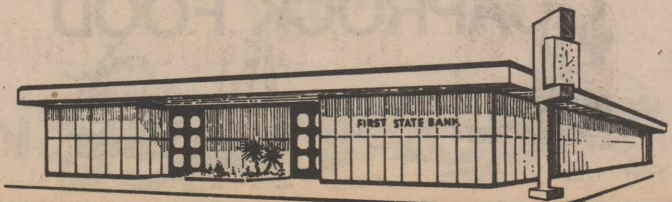
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Athletes Honored During Annual Banquet

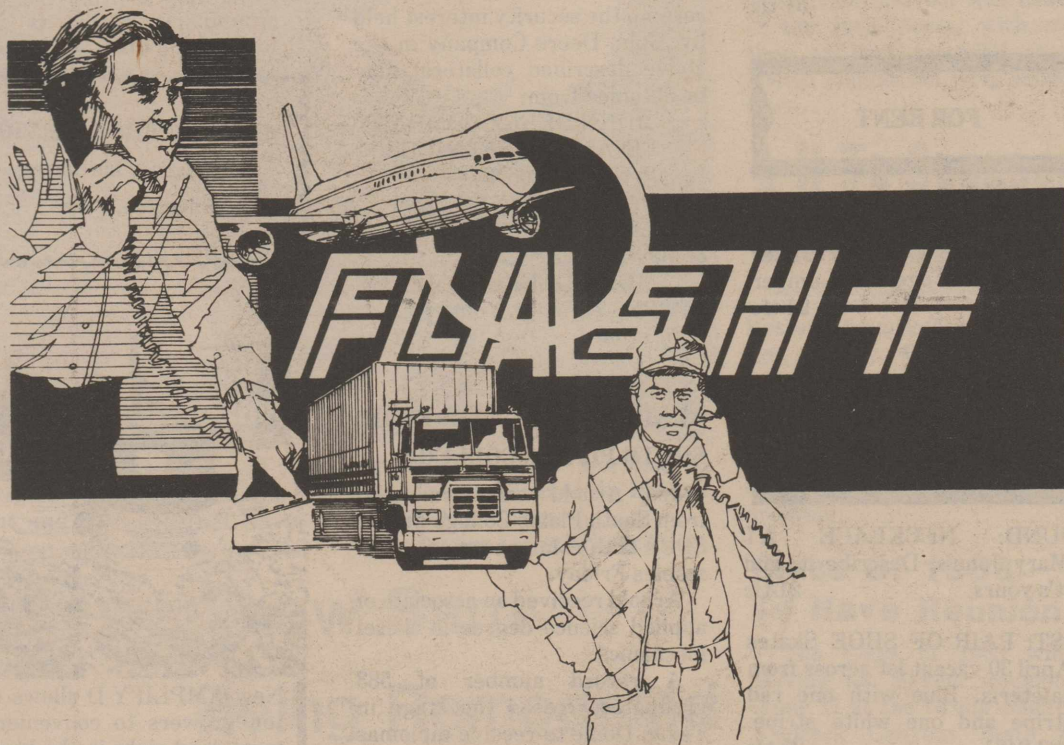
