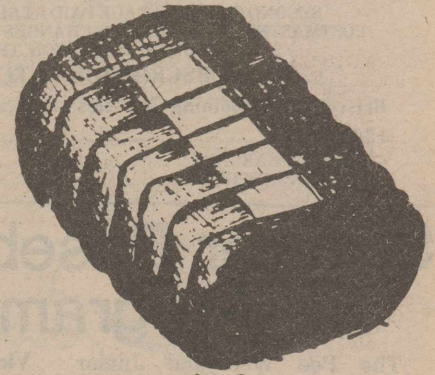

One-Vehicle Accident Kills Quitaque Man

A 21-year-old Quitaque man was killed and two others injured Sunday in a one-car accident 10 miles northwest of Silverton on U. S. 207.

Jose Leal was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident. Justice of the Peace James Edwards ruled his death was accidental.

Two passengers of the car, Hal House and his wife, Janet, of Turkey, were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service. House was said to have lacerations, abrasions and contusions, while his wife received a broken leg and cheekbone. In addition, Mrs. House fell into a large prickly pear cactus and received cactus needles all over her body, including her face, eyelids and inside her mouth.

There were no other injuries in the accident.

Dick Roehr, sheriff of Briscoe County, said the accident occurred as the group left Lake Mackenzie about 7:00 p.m. The car had gone out the lake gate and went out of control on a steep slope approximately one-quarter mile south of the gate.

Funeral services for Leal were conducted at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday at St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic Church in Turkey with the Rev. Father Randy Kreher officiating.

Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery at Quitaque, with arrangements directed by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Quitaque.

JAMES W. [TED] REID

Funeral services were at 1:00 p.m. Thursday for James W. (Ted) Reid, 87, at the First Presbyterian Church in Canyon with the Rev. Baldwin Stribling, pastor, and H. M. Baggarly of Tulia officiating. Burial was at 4:00 p.m. Thursday in the Silvertton Cemetery by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Canyon.

Mr. Reid, a long-time area educator who resided at 600 18th Street in Canyon, died Monday of last week. He was born in Swisher County and was graduated from Tulia High School. He graduated from Canyon Normal School (now known as West Texas State University) in 1917. He was principal at Fairview and Lone Star School, both in Floyd County, and was superintendent at Farwell, Silvertton, Hollene, New Mexico and Dumas schools.

He was a World War I veteran, serving in the Air Service Signal Corps. In World War II, he was an instructor in the Army Air Corps. In 1947 he joined the administrative staff of West Texas State College, where he was in charge of the veterans program. In 1951 he took a position in public relations with Wilson, Patterson and Associates architectural firm at Fort Worth, where he remained for 16 years.

Mr. Reid was a member of First Presbyterian Church of Canyon. He married Ruby Fowler in 1918.

Reid, jr. of Silvertton; two daughters, Mrs. Marcelete Dana of Albuquerque, New Mexico and Mrs. Virginia Borrego of Bethel Alaska; two brothers, Warner Reid of Tulia and Knox Reid of Alpine; a sister, Mrs. Tola Wilkerson of San Angelo; 12 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

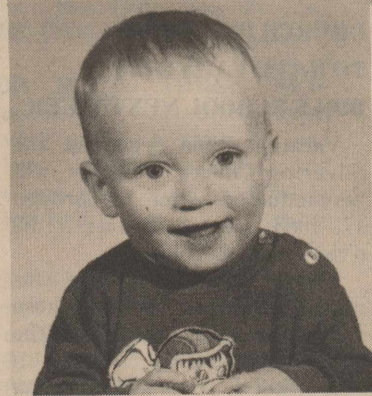

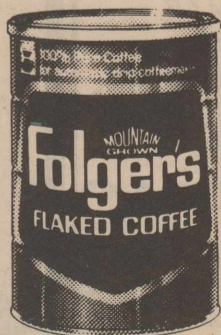

4-H EXTRAVAGANZA TO CELEBRATE 75th ANNIVERSARY IN TEXAS

A 4-H Extravaganza celebrating the 75th anniversary of 4-H in Texas is scheduled for June 11, at the Panhandle South Plains Fair Grounds in Lubbock from 10:00 a.m. until midnight.

The 4-H members, parents, leaders, 4-H alumni and friends of 4-H are invited to participate in the day-long activities ending with a Maines Brothers dance from 8:00 p.m. until midnight.

The events include Olympic events of volleyball, horse shoes, washers, sack races, potato race, tricycle race, egg roll, and many others; share-the-fun acts; judging of 4-H scrapbooks, posters, record books, and box lunches; fiddlers contest; time capsule ceremony; tree planting ceremony and awards programs honoring the oldest 4-H alumni, leader with the most years of service, oldest 4-H club in each county, county with largest attendance, poster winners, and scrapbook and record book winners.

A movie, "Green Promise," starring Walter Brennan and Natalie Wood, will be shown from 10:30 a.m. until noon. The 1949 movie is about a family and how 4-H helped it.

The County Extension Office needs names of past county 4-H members to enter in the oldest alumni contest. Residents are asked to call the Extension Office, 823-2343, before May 31, and give names of those who would be the oldest past 4-H members in the county. Also, old record books are needed to enter in this contest. They must be complete record books and not have been entered in 4-H competition during the last 10 years.

Individual and club 4-H scrapbooks are also needed at the Extension Office to enter in this contest. One old one has been found in the office and will be entered.

Each girl or woman is asked to bring a box lunch that will serve 3-4 people. The box should be decorated with a 4-H theme and these will be auctioned off. A barbecue dinner will be served for supper.

The only cost for the day's activities is for the Maines Brothers Dance which will be \$5.00 per person, \$7.50 per couple, or \$10.00 per family.

Families and individuals should call the Extension Office to register to attend this event. Registration is due by May 31. Additional late registration can

be made by June 10.

This is a special old-fashioned event and all 4-H families and friends are urged to participate.

The 4-H program is open to youth from 9 to 19 years of age regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

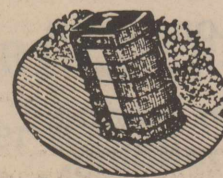

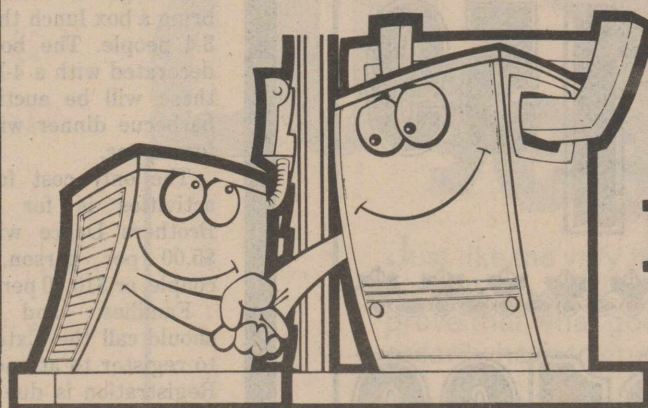

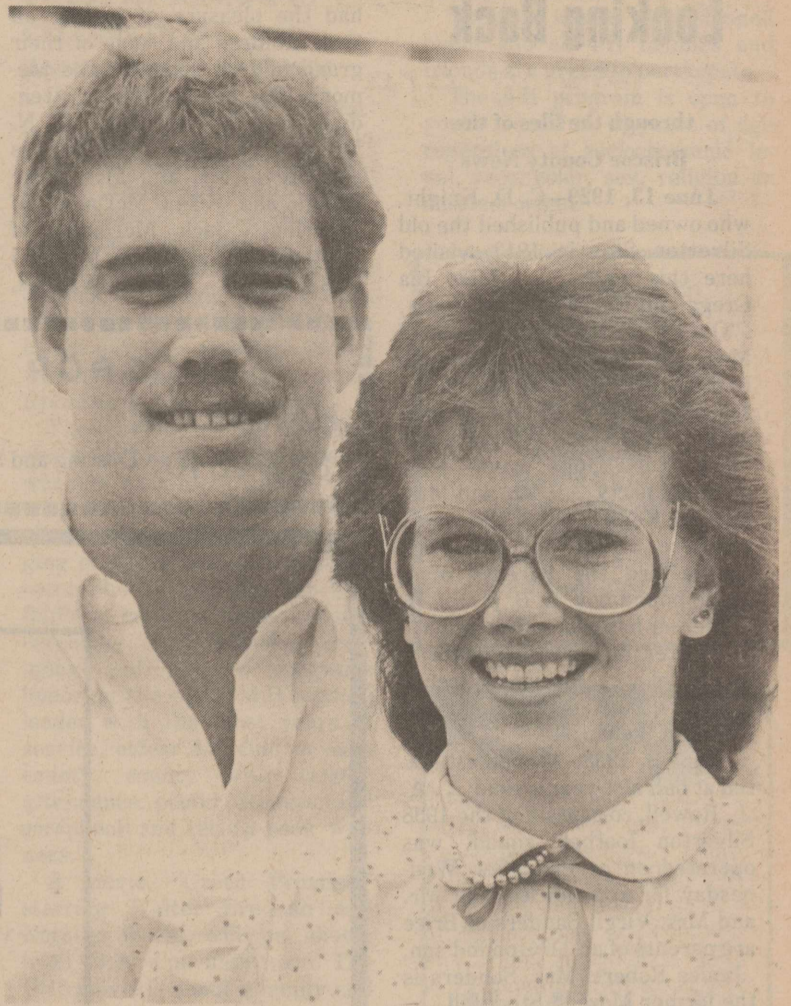
Couple To Marry In Ralls August 6
