Monday's high was the highest temperature recorded locally by Fred Strange since December 15. The highest overnight low temperature occurred on December 16 at 20 degrees.

Moisture recorded during December totalled .69 of an inch. This brought the 1983 total to 19.66 inches, still below the 20.50 annual normal figure.

Under the option, these producers could receive the special wheat PIK at 50 percent of their farm program yield rather than reducing their acreage conservation reserve.

The special program is designed to encourage greater participation in the wheat program, thereby helping to reduce the current and projected oversupply of that grain.

To be eligible, farmers must first enroll in the regular 1984 wheat program which requires a 30 percent reduction in planted acres from a farmer's wheat base. These acres are then devoted to conservation uses and a farmer becomes eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other program benefits.

Those who divert an additional 10 to 20 percent of their wheat base receive regular payment-inkind at 75 percent of their farm program yield. Those farmers whose program payments are projected to exceed the \$50,000 limit have the option of either enrolling in the special wheat PIK or taking a percentage reduction in the amount of acres required to be set aside for conservation purposes.

The deadline for enrolling in the special program is April 1. The sign-up period for the regular wheat program is January 16 through February 24. Full details are available from county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

ASCS REMINDS FARMERS TO FILE FOR WOOL PAYMENTS

Farmers who have sold or plan to sell any shorn wool or unshorn lambs or mohair this year should turn in their sales receipts to be eligible for incentive payments under the National Wool Act.

Farmers who have a record of their wool and mohair sales are eligible for incentive payments only if the sales are reported to the ASCS office.

The quantity sold does not affect the eligibility; however, sales slips should contain the month of shearing, month of sale, number of head shorn, pounds of wool or mohair sold and net proceeds. Sales slips for lambs must show the liveweight and state that the lambs were unshorn.

The federal support price for 1983 shorn wool marketings is \$1.53 per pound and \$4.63 per pound for mohair. Pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool through payments on unshorn lambs.

Shorn wool, and mohair payments are based on a percentage of each producer's returns from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool and mohair in 1983 up to the support prices of \$1.53 a pound for wool and \$4.63 for mohair. Shorn wool prices in 1983 fluctuated between 53 and 75 cents per pound through October. Mohair prices are expected to average around \$4.50 per pound.

The program is, designed to encourage growers to increase production and improve the quality and marketing of wool and mohair.

1984 COTTON, FEED GRAIN, WHEAT PROGRAM **PROVISIONS DISCUSSED**

On January 16, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will begin accepting applications for the 1984 feed grain

and wheat production adjustment programs. The programs were announced well in advance of the signup period to give farmers ample opportunity to make decisions on their 1984 grain crops.

Before signup begins, as many program details as possible are being explained to farmers so they will know the

requirements as well as the benefits of these programs. The acreage reduction programs are voluntary; however, only participating farmers will be eligible for commodity loans and target price protection. Wheat program participants are also eligible for payment-in-kind.

Program questions most frequently asked relate to acreage bases, acreage reduction and acreage conservation reserve provisions. The cotton, wheat or feed grain acreage base for a regular farm is the average of the acres planted and considered planted to these crops for 1982 and 1983.


The maximum cotton acreage may not exceed 75 percent of the farm's cotton base. The maximum wheat acreage may not exceed 70 percent of the farm's wheat base and the maximum permitted acreage of barley and oats, or corn and grain sorghum may not exceed 90 percent of the farm's applicable. feed grain base.

Farmers may choose to participate in the acreage reduction programs for any of the eligible crops; however, because corn and grain sorghum bases and barley and oats bases are combined, participation of these crops is combined.

To participate in the wheat payment-in-kind program, farmers are required to enroll in the wheat acreage reduction program. Wheat PIK will be offered on the acreage of not less than 10 percent nor more than 20 percent of the wheat base. Farmers may choose any level within this range.

Payments for wheat PIK will be based on the total PIK acres, times the farm's diversion yield, times 75 percent, rounded to whole bushels.

To emphasize the conservation aspects of the 1984 programs, the acreage removed from production is referred to as acreage conservation reserve (ACR). Land that qualifies for the acreage conservation reserve will also qualify under PIK. In areas where it is normal to summer fallow, the land designated for the ACR must be land that would have been devoted to a crop for harvest in 1984 under normal weather conditions. If a cover is required to be established on ACR acreage it must be
