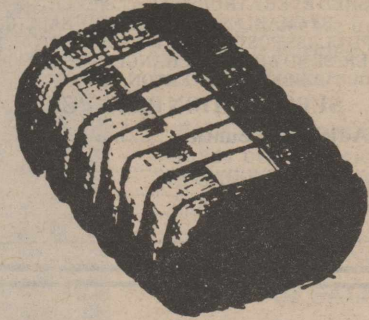

Livestock Show To Be Held Here January 28

The Briscoe County Livestock Show is scheduled for Saturday, January 28, at the Briscoe County Show Barn in Silverton. Sponsored by the Briscoe County Livestock Show Committee, the show will be judged by Scott Doss of Wolfforth.

Show superintendent will be John Schott, and the announcer will be Donnie Martin.

There will be classes and a championship division for barrows, lambs and dairy heifers. In addition, there will be poultry judging with Lynn Smith as the poultry superintendent.

The other superintendents are Warren Merrell, dairy heifers, Stan Fogerson, swine, and Jimmy Burson, lambs.

All livestock must be weighed in between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m. Friday, July 27. Judging begins with the dairy heifers at 9:00 a.m. the following morning. Swine judging is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. followed by the lamb judging at 11:00 a.m. Poultry judging will be held during the morning.

John Schott is chairman of the Livestock Show Board of Directors and Travis Harney is secretary-treasurer. The other members of the board are Joe Brannon, Harvey McJimsey, Stan Fogerson, J. E. Patton, Jimmy Burson, Jerry Baird, Riley Harris, Joe Edd Helms, Donald Hughes, Aaron Younger, Warren Merrell, T. D. West, Jerry Patton, George Martin, Bennie Reagan, Doug Forbes, Donnie Martin, Charles Barrett, Wayne Stephens, Harold Edwards, Lynn Smith and Perry Brunson.

Showmanship awards will be

presented in each division, and judges for the showmanship awards will be Richie Crow and Bennie Butler, Floyd County Extension Agents.

Entry fees will be \$5.00 per head for lambs, barrows and heifers. All exhibits will be under the control of the management but the show will in no case be responsible for any damage that may occur.

Animals must remain on the grounds until all judging is complete, and will be dismissed by superintendent.

All exhibitors must be bonified members of active FFA Chapters or 4-H Clubs in Briscoe County. All animals must have been the property of the owner and exhibitor throughout the feeding period, which shall have begun before November 15.

Each exhibitor may enter no more than three animals in each the steer, barrow and lamb classes.

All bedding for the animals will be furnished by the show; no straw will be permitted.

Animals will be divided into classes following weigh-in.

Use of Radiation Detection Equipment To Be Taught Here

This training will assist local officials in developing a monitoring capability to cope with a nuclear emergency. Also, the use of radioisotopes has increased greatly in Texas, and the risks of an accident involving transportation or use of these substances has increased. This strengthens the need for emergency personnel trained in the use of monitoring devices.

Boulter Announces Candidacy For Congressional Seat

Beau Boulter officially announced his candidacy for U. S. Congress today.

Boulter, an Amarillo attorney and former city commissioner, is the only Republican announced and expects to face Jack Hightower in the November General Election.

In his announcement remarks, Boulter stressed Hightower's change of priorities since first elected. Boulter believes the number one issue facing the country is cutting federal spending.

"All of our nation's problems can be traced primarily to a Congress which continues to spend more money than it has. Jack Hightower has become too much a part of Washington's system. It's time for that to stop."

In his remarks, Boulter said, "Out of the 35 authorization bills voted on the U. S. House, Jack Hightower voted with Jim Wright and the rest of the big spending Democratic leadership 28 times, or 80%. In comparison, Charles Stenholm voted the same way as Wright on 14 times, or 40%. Phil Gramm voted with Wright only five times or 14% of the time, and Ron Paul voted with Wright one time, or 2%."

Boulter also cited "27 final votes on the actual spending measures in 1983", in which the Republican Congressional candidate said Hightower "voted with Jim Wright and the Democratic leadership 22 times, or 81%". Whereas, Charles Stenholm "voted with Wright only five times, or 18%", Boulter claimed. In 13 of these 22 appropriation votes that Hightower voted with Wright, "Hightower helped to appropriate almost \$40 billion more than Reagan wanted" Boul-

Boulter also attacked Hightower for voting for the "Democratic budget bill", which Boulter says called for "\$32 billion above what the Reagan Administration requested" for "two dozen domestic programs" and would have "undercut everything Ronald Reagan has achieved since taking office".

Boulter said, "It is the values which Hightower offers us in the Democrat budget bill" which are "most distressing" to him. Boulter claimed the bill "would have accelerated the welfare state", which he went on to say "destroys the incentive of the working man and small businessman to produce and earn more".

Burial followed in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements directed by Wallace Funeral Home of Tulia.

Mr. Shives died at 1:40 p.m. Wednesday at Swisher Memorial Hospital where he was admitted December 28.

Mr. Shives was born March 1, 1903 in Bonham and moved from there to Tulia in 1924. He and the former Teresa Bomar were married in Silverton October 7, 1933.

SEWING SUEDE

Are you afraid of sewing synthetic suedes? If you have good sewing skills on other fabrics, you should be able to "tackle" suede.

After the initial shock of paying for the fabric, remember how much you save by making the garment. I can make a skirt for under \$45 compared to a similar ready-made skirt for \$200.

You also save on care cost. This beautiful fabric (Ultra-suede®) is machine washable and dryable. It gets softer when washed. However, if your ready-made synthetic suede garment recommends "dry clean only," that is the care method you should use. Only when you construct your own garment and know what type of lining, interfacing, and shoulder pads you use would you be safe in machine washing the garment.

Select a pattern with simple lines and construction details, especially if this is your first project with suede. Be absolutely certain that the pattern fits properly. When in doubt, make a trial garment from a fabric with a similar stiffness.

Remember, synthetic suede, like real suede, has a nap. Cut each piece with the nap running in the same direction. I prefer the nap running upward on the body since this makes the color look richer.

You may want to use transparent tape to hold the pattern on the fabric when cutting since pins are difficult to place in the fabric.

Machine stitches should be relatively long to avoid puckering. Good pressing techniques are crucial. Avoid touching the iron directly on the suede. Always use a press cloth and press from the wrong side of the garment. Use strips of paper between the seam allowance and the garment when pressing to avoid imprints on the right side. Do not over press.

Several have asked for information on sewing with synthetic suede. If you are interested in attending a workshop where you could work on your garment and receive help with problems, call my office, 823-2343. If there is enough interest, I would be glad to schedule a workshop on two or three days that would be convenient for the majority of those interested. There will be no cost.

Let me know if I can help you with questions on working with this fabric or any other.

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"Super Mom" Program To Begin With Orientation Meeting

"Super Mom," a support-training group for mothers of young children, will begin with an orientation meeting Thursday, January 26, at 7:00 p.m. The group will meet weekly for two hours at Silverton's Methodist Church with the first session beginning Friday, February 10.

The orientation is for anyone in the community interested in exercise, Bible study, and sharing. This will be a get-acquainted session to learn more about "Super Mom."

The goal of "Super Mom" is toning body, mind and spirit and is based on I Thessalonians 5:23, "May the God of peace sanctify you wholly and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the



coming of the Lord Jesus Christ."

"Super Mom" was born out of the need of young mothers for emotional and spiritual support. Included in the program are daily Bible studies for the 12-week session, an exercise tape, Bible study tapes, encouragement and edification tapes, all in a packet which will be ordered at the orientation session.

The exercise program teaches the principles of fitness. The five components of fitness are strength, endurance, flexibility, cardiovascular and fat percentage.

An important part of the encouragement and edification is "Roots & Wings," a program designed to help a mother teach her young child a basic understanding of how to worship God.

Other subjects include "How To Have A Quiet Time When It's

Never Quiet At Your House," "Developing Your Child's Self-Concept," "Food For My Family," "Discipline," and "Making Memories."

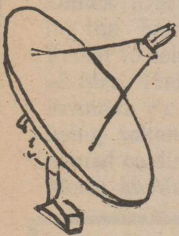

Members of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service met at the City Hall Tuesday night of last week with President Anthony Kingery conducting the business meeting.

Kingery announced that the continuing education schedule

has been approved, and will be implemented soon. He said that new legislation requires a student examination fee of \$20.00, but that volunteers who receive no salary are exempted from the fee.

Bids received on the purchase

of a walkie-talkie, repeater unit were reviewed, and the group voted to purchase a demonstrator unit. It was also voted to buy a VHF unit for the other ambulance.

A new trauma box has been received and was inspected. Four

new batteries have been purchased for the Life Pack at a cost of \$100.00 each. The old batteries are to be sent in for reconditioning.

Grass Production Of Concern To Ranchers

Grass production should always be a concern to local ranchers. Ranchers and range-related people need to know what kind of grass production they have from different types of country or range sites. This information and knowledge will tell them what their livestock carrying capacity is, population of wildlife potential, and if the rangeland is doing what it is capable of producing.

The Soil Conservation Service office in Silverton is working with area ranchers on different range sites on a 10-year range

study. SCS will learn more about the expected production of various grasses. This will allow SCS personnel to gain a more thorough knowledge of area rangelands.

Briscoe County has about 390,000 acres of rangeland with various types of management problems and conditions. Anyone that has a need for assistance on rangeland should call the SCS office, 823-2320.

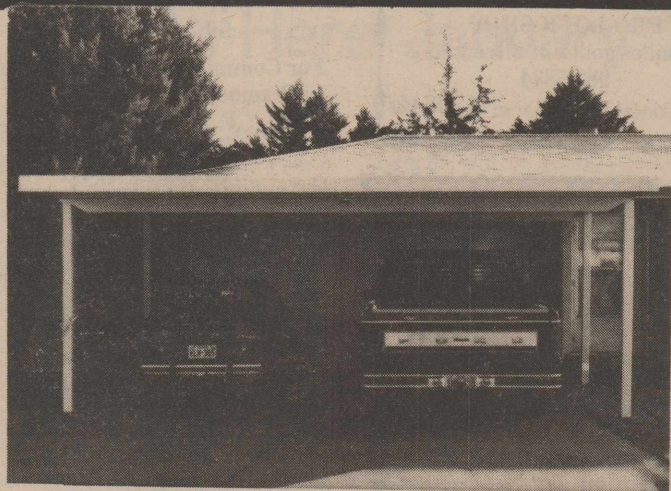

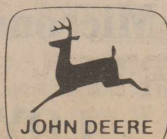
