Incumbents Re-Elected In Democratic Primary

All incumbents were re-elected during the Democratic Primary held in Briscoe County last Saturday. A total of 968 voters, out of the almost-1500 voting strength of the county, went to the polls.

Those re-elected included the County Chairman, J. C. Fowler, and Precinct Chairmen O. C. Rampley, one; B. K. Blankenship, two; Jack Sutton, three, and John Wyatt, four, who were re-elected by write-in.

In the race for sheriff, incumbent Dick Roehr polled 586 votes to win nomination for re-election over his opponents, Bruce Tiffin of Silverton, who polled 172 votes, and Jack Chandler of Quitaque, who polled 208

Fairy McWilliams was nominated as county tax assessor-collector with 592 votes over her opponent, Polly Jarrett, who polled 352 votes.

County Commissioner of Precinct 1 Shafe Weaver received 84 votes for nomination for re-election, over his opponents, Jimmy Myers, who received 48 votes, and T. V. McClure, who captured 17

Commissioner of Precinct 3 Beryl Long polled 239 votes as compared with 114 for his opponent, Flute Hutsell, to gain nomination for re-election to his seat in the court.

Briscoe County voters backed

area candidate Kent Hance in the six-way race for United States Senator nominee. Hance received 655 Briscoe votes, as compared with 138 for Krueger, and 48 for Doggett, whom Hance will face in a runoff the first Saturday in June.

Several other statewide runoffs are in the picture for the second primary.
