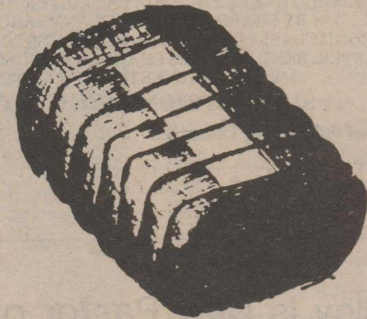



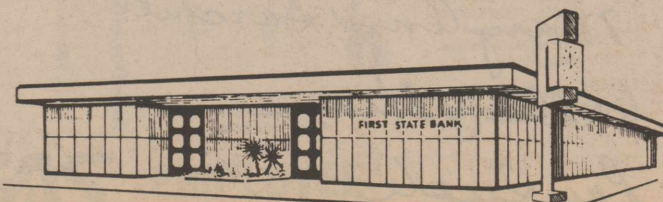

Appraisal District Hears Financial Annual Report

Directors of the Briscoe County Tax Appraisal District heard the 1983 annual financial report given by Rita Moseley, CPA with Denzil McMillan & Company, at their regular meeting on Thursday, May 10.

Present were directors L. B. Garvin, jr., Paul Ramsey, Ray Teeple and Joe Mercer, along with Carlye Hill, chief appraiser, Rita Moseley, Kevin Moseley, and County Judge Fred Mercer. Director Robert McPherson was absent.

Chairman Garvin called the meeting to order, and Secretary Teeple read the minutes of the previous meeting. Following examination of the financial report, it was accepted as presented.

Mrs. Hill gave the current financial report. Second quarter payments from Briscoe County, Silverton ISD, City of Quitaque, City of Silverton and Mackenzie Water Authority have been deposited.

Total 1984 current tax collections through the month of April

are Briscoe County, 94.5%; Silverton ISD, 94.3%; City of Silverton, 93.7%; Mackenzie Water Authority, 94.0%.

Following examination of the current month's bills, it was voted to pay all bills presented.

A letter of resignation was

read from Murry Wayne Morrison, who stated that he was resigning from the 1984 Board of Review because he is moving to Lubbock to work. The resignation was accepted, and Elgin Conner was chosen to serve on the 1984 Board of Review.

EPITAPH

The prefix "epi" can mean "upon." "Taphos" is a Greek word for "tomb." Hence, we come up with the English word epitaph ("upon a tomb").

Consider a 1579 epitaph: "That I spent, that I had; that I gave, that I have; that I left, that I lost."

On tombstones we may read, "Our beloved husband and father," or, "His generosity will live on."

Some are cynical about epitaphs because of overglorifying the deceased.

Suppose you die and your family seeks a truthful epitaph. What would it be? "He loved money." Maybe, "He gave his life to sports." "She only thought of self." "Pleasure mad."

How would you "epitaph" some of God's servants? "He cared truly" (Philip. 2:19-22). "She clothed widows" (Acts 9). "Encourager of men" (Acts 4:36-37; 11:23-24). "Helper of men" (Rom. 16:1-2). "Spirit-refresher" (1 Cor. 16:15-18). "Fellow-worker in Christ" (Rom. 16:3). "He walked with God" (Gen. 5:24).

MOTORISTS URGED TO DRIVE SAFELY WHILE ON VACATION

Now that school is out and vacation time is here, motorists are heading for the road in droves, increasing their chances of having unfamiliar driving conditions.

Major V. J. Cawthon, Department of Public Safety Commander of Region 5, said, "When driving in the rural area, slow down before, not after entering a curve. If you wait until it seems urgent to slow down, it is too late. Your engine should be pulling your vehicle through the curve. This pulling force aids in directional control, when you use a safe speed in a curve."

The Major reminds the Texas motorist to be alert to the fact that many people lose their lives within 25 miles of departure and/or destination. This fatal fact of the road is due in great part to abusing the speed laws.

Funeral services for W. R. (Bill) Hardin, 80, a 57-year resident of Briscoe County, were conducted at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, May 24, at the First Baptist Church in Silverton. Officiating was the pastor, Rev. Jerry Miller. Special violin music was played by Jimmy Burson.

Interment was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors of Silverton.

Mr. Hardin died Tuesday, May 22, at Central Plains Hospital in Plainview.

Born in Scurry County on July 9, 1903, he married the former Axie Goodwin in Anson September 20, 1926. They moved to Briscoe County in 1927 from Scurry County and settled on a place on the Caprock east of Silverton. In 1928 they moved to what was then called the Schied place near Quitaque. In 1930 they moved to a farm just south of Silverton, living there until 1948, when they moved to their place just west of the Silverton city limits.

Mr. Hardin was a farmer-stockman. He once ran the mail route out of Quitaque, was driver of one of the first school buses for the Silverton School District, and had served on the school board in addition to other local responsibilities.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Silverton, and was preceded in death by a son, Jim, in December 1955.

Survivors are his wife, Axie (Jack); one daughter, Mrs. Arlas (Joyce) Cavett of Andrews; two sons, Gene Hardin of Dallas and Buck Hardin of Silverton; five grandsons; three granddaughters; nine great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Lucille Puryear and Mrs. Daisy Roberson, both of Rotan, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Mrs. Rowell died Sunday, May 20.

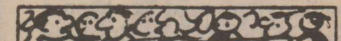
Survivors include a son, two daughters, two brothers, including O. E. (Gene) Vaughan of Silverton, and a sister.

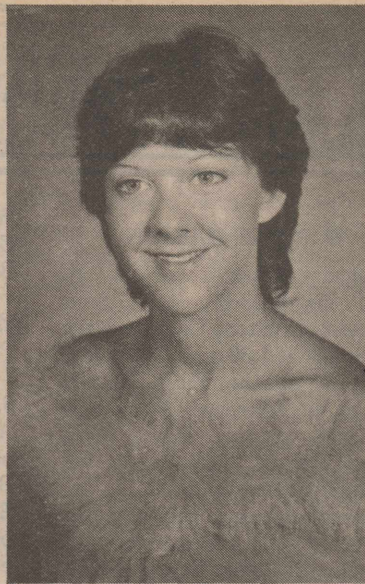
MAX LEE DAVIS

**SAFE AT HOME**

Have you prepared your children to stay home alone? Millions of American children take care of themselves after school each day. Many also stay home alone during summer vacation and holidays.

The increase in the numbers of employed mothers, the difficulty and expense in finding adequate day care, and the increase in single parent families all contribute to the extraordinarily high number of so-called "latchkey children."

This is not just a problem of the metropolitan areas. Many families in Briscoe County, including my own, have young children who are by themselves at some time during the day. Even mothers who do not work outside the home may leave children home at sometime while they visit friends, attend meetings, go to the doctor, or run errands.

Do your children know what to do in case of fire or accidents? Do they have certain household chores to do while home? Are there rules about TV watching and having company? Do they know how to handle phone calls when alone? How about strangers who come to the door? Are they afraid when by themselves?

We all hope our children are able to handle all situations. But remember, they are children and can't be expected to act with adult decision-making ability without training. I believe children can develop confidence and independence by being allowed to accept some responsibilities in self-care as long as the amount of responsibility is appropriate for the age and maturity of the child.

Many cities and organizations are aware of the needs of parents and children in preparing a child for responsible self-care when home alone. Parent-child programs in home safety, emergency procedures, snack preparation and recreation are being taught in cities and schools to help children learn skills for staying home alone.

If you want your child to be better prepared for being home alone, call my office, 823-2343, and enroll him/her in the SAFE AT HOME CLUB, a program I will conduct in July for 9-12 year olds if there is enough interest. There will be no cost.

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## Bagworms Must Be Controlled Now

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in mid-May in the Lubbock area this year and is now almost complete. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says County Extension Agent Travis Harney.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then

overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest. But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion, dylox and orthene. The biological insecticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.
