Sales Taxes Rebated To Texas Cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks for local sales tax payments to the 988 local-tax cities. Bullock said the city checks totaled \$52 million.

"So far this year, we've sent these cities a little over \$400 million, which is more than 13 percent better than what they had gotten by this time last year," Bullock said.

Houston's check was the largest-\$8.9 million-for a total of \$72.7 million, up five percent over last year. Dallas received \$5.8 million to push its total payment to \$48.3 million, a 15% increase.

San Antonio's payment of \$3 million brought its 1984 total to \$23.8 million, up 16%. Austin received \$2.4 million for a yearly total of \$17.1 million, a 26% increase.

Fort Worth's check for \$1.9 million increased total payments to \$14.7 million, up 9%. El Paso received \$1.1 million, bringing 1984 payments to \$8.9 million, 17% over last year.

June payments reflect taxes on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by

Silverton's rebate for this period was \$759.56, bringing the 1984 total to \$10,083.51. This is 7.11% more than the \$9,413.88 received to date in 1983.

Quitaque's payment was \$655.80, bringing the 1984 total to \$6,282.26. This is 72.68% more than the \$3,638.00 that had been received at this time last year.

Briscoe County's 1984 total of \$16,365.77 exceeds the \$13,-051.88 received in 1983 by 25.39%.





FAMILY MATTERS

The last verse in the last chapter of the last book of the Old Testament says of "Elijah" (John, the Baptist, Mt. 17:11-13; Lk. 1:13-17) that "he shall turn the heart of the fathers to the children, and the heart of the children to their fathers" lest the Lord "come and smite the earth with a curse (Malachi 4:6).

It is interesting that this very "last verse" closes the Old Testament with such strong family-reference.

Although it seems that Malachi 4:6 may relate to turning the hearts of the Jews to the ancestral religion of their "fathers," there's no question about the need in every age to restore a right relationship between parents and children.

Prophets of doom affirm the demise of the family in America. But when the hearts of fathers and children turn wisely (through Christ) to each other, there is hope!

Some fathers (parents) are concerned only about a child's physical beauty, athletic prowess, acceptance and notoriety in society, and economic success.

COMPARE COST PER SERVING FOR BEST BEEF BUYS

When making your beef selections at the meat counter, think in terms of cost per serving rather than cost per pound. This way you will be able to compare cuts to determine which are the best buys.

Some boneless cuts, although priced higher than bone-in cuts, may be better buys because there is less waste. To determine approximate cost per serving, simply divide the price per pound by the number of servings per pound the cut will yield.







Marinated Blade Steaks Keep **Budget In Line**

Comptroller Sends Lawmakers A Research Report

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent state lawmakers a research report showing Texas exempts more items from its sales tax base than nearly any other state.

"Right now we're exempting from the sales tax about twice as much as we're collecting," Bullock said. "We collect about \$4 billion a year and exempt about another \$7.6 billion more."

Bullock said the Texas Limited Sales, Excise and Use Tax now exempts all services, such as remodeling and dry cleaning; almost everything that is taxed under other statutes, such as cigarettes and gasoline; materials used in manufacturing and supplies and machinery used in farming and ranching.

"The Legislature has been adding to the list of exempt items nearly every time they have met since we adopted the sales tax in 1961," Bullock said. "This year, they're liable to be headed in the other direction, cancelling some

of these exemptions to raise more revenue. Together with the revenue alternatives document I have sent them, this study comparing our state sales tax policy with policies in other states is the best set of tools I can give them for making decisions about our state tax structure."

Bullock cautioned Legislators about wholesale cancellation of the exemptions, however.

"When you look at exemptions, you've got to ask yourself why some things are taxed and some things are not. For instance, we don't tax necessities like groceries or prescription medicines so that we won't put too much of our state tax load on the poor people who are the least able to pay. And that's as it should be."

Governor's shopping list was just as long as expected. Over the next 30 days the

House and Senate will concentrate on the educational needs of the State and strive to find a source of funds for our battered and declining highways.

First things first; the various committees in the two bodies will begin deliberations on public education reform before setting sights on legislation of a tax nature to pay for the increased spending levels being called for in teacher salaries and money to fix the roads.

Unfortunately, given the current estimates of available revenue for Texas, it has become apparent that some sort of revenue increase will be necessary if we are to reach our goal of providing a quality education. At this point it would be a fairly accurate assumption, I think, to see a 1-cent increase in the State's 4-cent general sales and motor vehicle sales and rental

taxes, a 5-cent a gallon hike in the gasoline tax, a 5-cent per pack boost in the cigarette tax and a 20 percent increase in levies on liquor beer, wine and mixed drinks. You can be sure that in selecting the appropriate form of revenue raising legislation, I will only support those increases which will prove the least burdensome to the citizens of Texas.

These combined taxes would produce revenue in the neighborhood of \$4.8 billion over the next three years. Given these revenue limitations with which to work, the total cost of any educational reform and highway repair authorized by the Legislature must fall within this range.

My concerns during this important Session of the Legislature will be to ensure that the Panhandle receives an equitable portion of the funding, that our educational needs are met without sacrifice of existing programs and that the State as a whole benefits from what is done.

Of great concern to me is being asked as your State Senator to go to Austin and vote for all of these tax bills, and then to tell the people by doing this we will improve the quality of education in this state. At the same time, they are eliminating many of the valuable programs and are telling the school districts if they want to keep those programs they will have to pay for them on the local level. This means I will have to come back to the Texas Panhandle and tell our schools they, too, will be in the position of having to raise property taxes as well. I find this difficult to accept.

BUY TEXAS-GROWN PRODUCE THIS YEAR

The "fresh approach" is the in-thing again this year. Fresh vegetables are plentiful in Texas now, so make sure you get your share, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Texas supplies broccoli, cabbage, carrots, spinach, lettuce and potatoes in early spring followed by cantaloupes, cucumbers, honeydews, squash, peppers and tomatoes.

Blackberries, plums and early peaches will be available in late May and June along with watermelons, blackeyed peas and okra.

Not only is this produce fresher than that usually found in supermarkets, but it is likely to be cheaper due to reduced costs in transportation, packaging and refrigeration.

Number of Briscoe County Farms Is Decreasing

Preliminary reports of the 1982 Census of Agriculture show that the number of farms in Briscoe County decreased from 287 to 251 since the 1978 census. All land in farms totaled 397,057 acres in 1982, an average of 1,582 acres per farm. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would have been sold.

Land from which crops were harvested decreased to 83,014 acres since 1978.

The county's farmers sold \$12.4 million in agricultural products according to preliminary

reports from the 1982 Census of Agriculture. The 1982 sales figure represents an average of \$49,597 for each of the county's farms.

The census reports that \$7.8 million or 63% of total sales were for crops, while \$4.7 million or 37% of the total came from the sale of livestock, poultry, and their products.

Preliminary data indicate that expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry were \$578,000; total farm energy costs were \$2.8 million; fertilizer costs were \$731,000, and seed costs were \$512,000.

Of the total farms in the

county, 96 had gross sales of \$40,000 or more; 82 reported sales of less than \$10,000. Farms operated as sole proprietorships represented 82% of the total. In 1982, the average age of farm operators was 51.6 years. The proportion of operators reporting farming as their principal occupation decreased from 82 to 76% over the four-year period.

Data in the report for 1978 and 1982 are directly comparable for acreages and inventories. Dollar values have not been adjusted for changes in price levels.

CENSUS REPORT SHOWS **TEXAS HAD GAIN IN FARMS**

Texas farms gained in numbers and decreased in size between 1978 and 1982, according to the Commerce Department's Census Bureau.

Preliminary reports just released for the 1982 Census of Agriculture show 185,026 farms, compared with 175,395 in 1978. Land in farms totaled 130.8 million acres, an average per farm of 707 acres, compared with 773 in 1978. Total sales of agricultural products amounted to \$8.9 billion in 1982.

The average value of land and buildings per farm was \$388,198, with a per acre value of \$549.

Land from which crops were harvested was reported at 20.8 million acres, and acres irrigated fell from 6.9 million to 5.6 million in 1982.

The Bureau defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were, or normally would have been, sold in the census year.

The preliminary data include expenditures for livestock and poultry feed were \$1.5 billion; total costs for farm energy, \$730 million; for fertilizer, \$368.1 million; and for hired labor, \$477.9 million.

The sales of livestock, poultry and their products were \$5.9 billion, 66% of total agricultural sales. Dairy products amounting to \$472.9 million were sold from 3,118 farms. The number of milk cows was up from 307,297 in the previous census to 322,198 in 1982.

The total cattle and calves inventory of 12.5 million head on 143,473 farms was down from 12.7 million in 1978. The 10.5 million sold were down from 12.1 million four years earlier.

Some 8,125 farms reported 2.3 million head of sheep and lambs, with 2.2 million shorn yielding 15.2 million pounds of wool; 1.8 million head were sold.

An inventory of 559,590 hogs and pigs including 76,195 for breeding purposes was reported on 9,484 farms of which 194 farms had inventories of 500 or more and accounted for 56 percent of the state's total inventory. A total of 925,303 hogs and pigs were reported sold, of which 118,076 were feeder pigs.

Sales of poultry and their products were \$451.7 million. Some 16,873 farms reported an inventory of 15.1 million chickens three months old or older; 16,653 farms reported 12.8 million hens and pullets; and 1,024 farms, 176.6 million broilers sold. In addition 347 farms sold five million turkeys compared with 7.2 million sold in 1978.

The sale of crops amounted to \$3 billion. By harvested acreage, among the leading crops were wheat, with 123 million bushels from 5.1 million acres; sorghum, with 256 million bushels from 4.8 million acres; and cotton, with 2.7 million bales from 4.5 million acres. Other crops included corn, 1.1 million acres; soybeans, 718,-668 acres, and rice, 520,227 acres.





TIPS FOR COOKING A **ROTISSERIE ROAST**

What could be more impressive than a tantalizing beef roast cooked to perfection on the outdoor rotisserie! Fortunately for the grillside chef, cooking a boneless beef tip, top round, rump or ribeye roast to a turn on the spit is as easy as it is delicious.

For even turning the roast should be balanced on the rod before cooking begins. A roast meat thermometer should be used to determine exact degree of doneness. Be sure that the thermometer does not rest in fat or on the rod and check to see that it will clear the grill as the roast turns.

It may be necessary, however, to add coals as the roast cooks to maintain a constant moderate temperature. If desired, the roast can be brushed with your favorite barbecue sauce during the last 20 to 30 minutes of cooking.
