R. V. Robertson, of the Contest Committee, of the Haskell County Fair, states this committee completed arrangements under a band contest will be held during the Second Annual Haskell County October 1, 2 and 3rd, and that

18 bands have been invited to enter. The contest will be held Friday morning on the court house lawn. Judges have been secured from three of the colleges at Abilene, Simmons, McMurray and Christian.

There will be two classes only; bands under 18 months of age and bands over 18 months old.

Bands under eighteen months old will compete for three prizes: First Prize \$100.00; Second Prize \$50.00 and Third Prize \$25.00.

Bands over 18 months old. First Prize \$100.00; Second Prize \$75.00.

Bands entering the contest have been invited to attend the fair the opening day and join in the street parade. A place will be found for them at the head of their home town boosters or decorated vehicle entries, as the case may be. Also plans are in the making to broadcast a massed band concert from the big grandstand in the race track section, Saturday afternoon Oct. 3rd, about 5 o'clock, over the Dallas or Ft Worth broadcasting stations. Bands attending the fair and entering the contest will be advised as to this in due time.

Bands entering contest and spending the day here and wishing to offer programs will report to the Chairman of the Band Contest Committee and secure assignments or permission so no confusions might arise in connection with other programs to be followed during these periods in the three days entertainment as now scheduled.

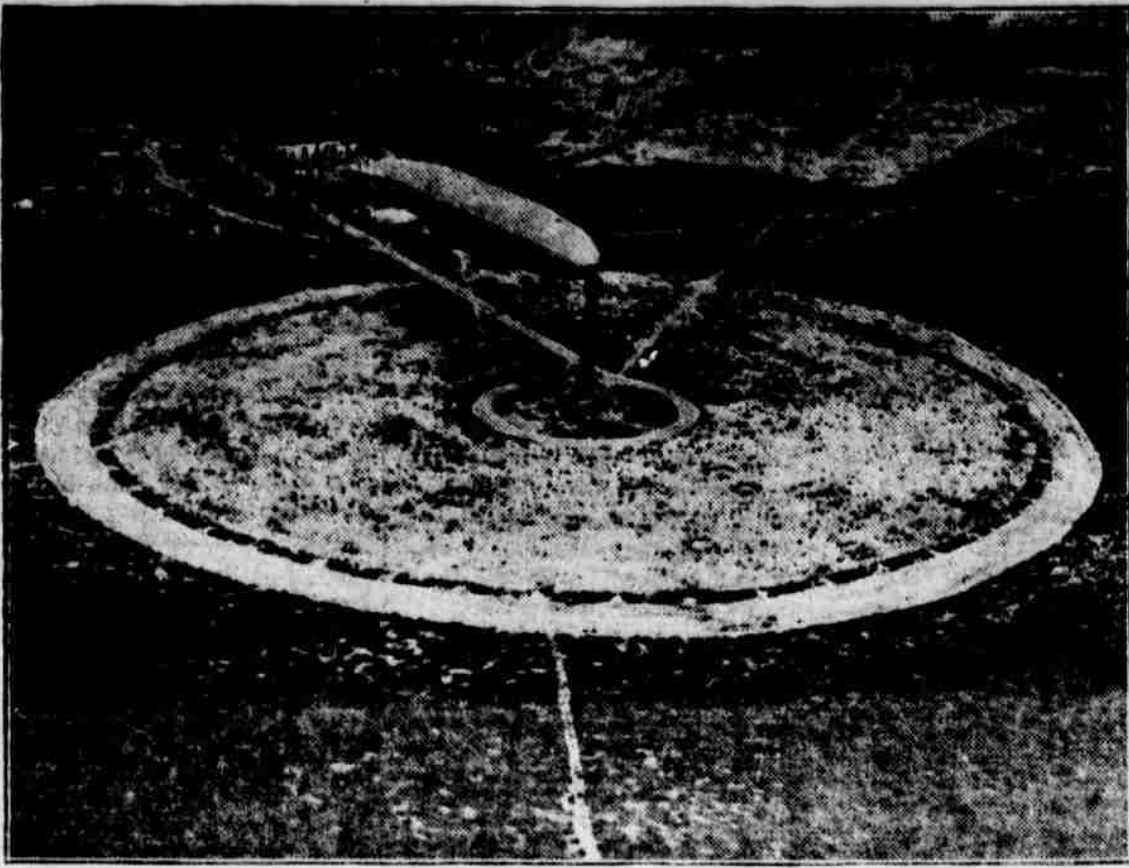

THOUSAND GINS CLOSED IN THE DROUGHT AREA

There are approximately 1000 cotton gins in 50 counties in Texas that are not running this season, due to the drouth and shortage of cotton in their immediate vicinities. This was disclosed by Geo. B. Terrell, Commissioner of Agriculture, who said the owners of these gins had not applied to the State. There are a large number of gins in Texas located in the north and south plains district of the State. These gins were constructed in anticipation of the heavy cotton yield due to increased cotton acreage. Mr. Terrell said he would advocate the increase in license fee from \$1 to \$2. He said this would be necessary if the gin inspection work conducted by the department of agriculture was to be made self supporting.

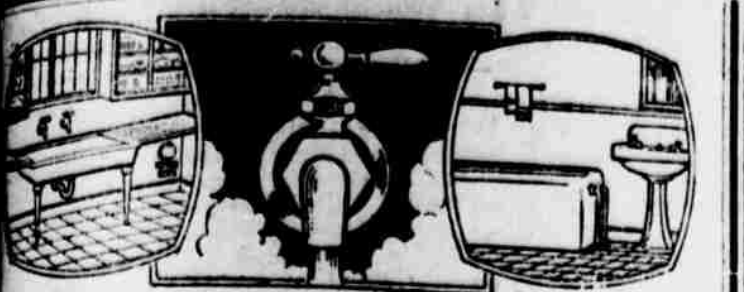

It's the same old story, you have heard it, time and again—"We ought to have a Chamber of Commerce, no question about that at all, but darn it all, the thing ain't run right, when we do have one." You've been through it. You know what it means to try to keep a Chamber of Commerce alive numerically and financially. You will know that as soon as the "drive" is over, just as soon as the bunting is taken down and folded up and put away, the flags all furled and stored, just as soon as the band quits playing and the musicians have gone to their respective abodes, and the voices of the orators are stilled, you know we say, that when these things come about, as they always do, in many cases, that your Chamber of Commerce, or what might be the name or brand of your local commercial organization, commences to gasp and turn pale around the gills and were it not for a FEW of the "Faithful" who have a large share of civic pride, the old thing would flop over on its back and give up the ghost. Sure, it ain't run right. You bet it!

isn't, and it never will be until the men who have some idea how it should function give a little bit of their time, effort and ability in an honest endeavor to have it run right. If you, know it isn't run right, why not be one of the faithful few and see it properly conducted, instead of standing on the side lines and finding fault with it, and with those of your home-town community who are doing their level best and without any encouragement, morally or financially, for you? We are not inclined, in the least, to quarrel with the business or professional man who refuses to support a Chamber of Commerce, or his local Commercial organization in his home town. We may think he is wrong in the position he takes, but very few men are ever truly converted by forcibly yanking them up to a revival meeting. The man who does not put his heart where he puts his money and his time, might better keep both so far as the good that will come to him from the giving, although the money may help along the cause a trifle. Our notion is that a Chamber of Commerce membership numbering 200 men who are heartily and enthusiastically interested, will bring about better results than a membership of 1,000 where 800 of the group are standing on the side lines throwing snowballs (or bricks) at the 200 real workers. HIGH POWERED MOTOR CARS EXPORTED BY STUDEBAKER

More high-powered motor cars were exported by Studebaker during the first six months of 1923 than by any other automobile maker in America. In most countries this achievement was won against the penalty of a horse power tax, which makes ownership of cars more costly in proportion to their rated power. In England, for example, the buyer must pay a yearly tax of one pound per rated horsepower, or about \$171 on a Studebaker Big Six, on which the power rating is 36.4. The smallest of the Studebaker cars, the Standard Six carries a tax of \$129. On the other hand, the tax on cars which compete with the Standard Six runs from \$81 to \$100 each, ratings being from 17.3 to 23.4 horsepower. In spite of this handicap, the demand for Studebaker cars grew during the first half of the year to such an extent that exportations exceeded those of any other American maker of high powered cars. Many high-powered cars which enjoy significance is the American field obtained almost no foothold in the foreign market. In much of this territory, the Studebaker Big Six enjoys a reputation similar to that which a \$12,000 English-made car enjoys in America among the well to do. To such an extent has this developed that export of Big Sixes during the period mentioned almost equalled the sum of all other American cars with an S. A. E. rating of 30 horse power or more.

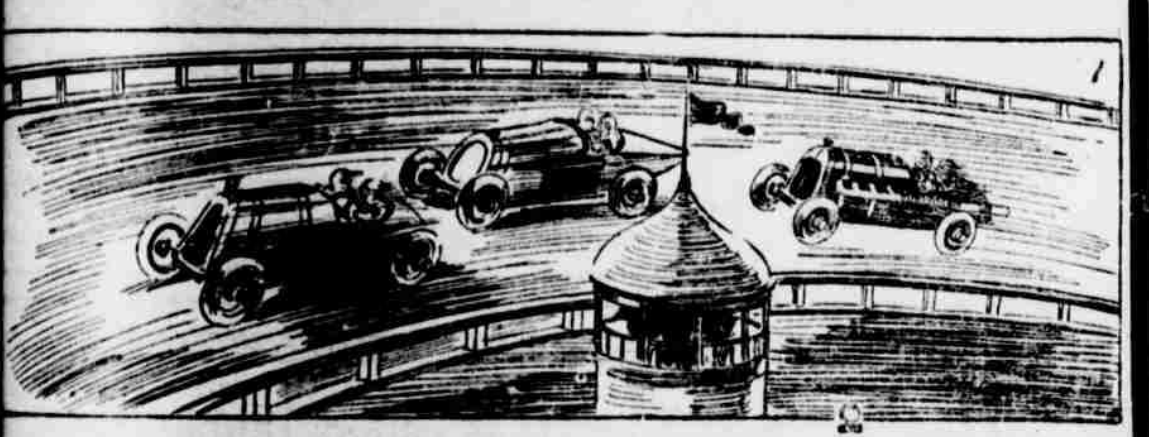

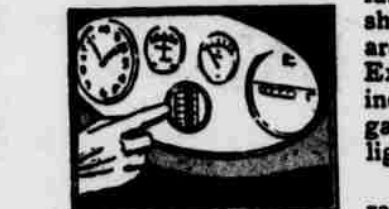

THERE IS NO AGE TO A STOUT HEART

The fourth annual "Reserve mileage economy run" for Studebaker motor cars with more than 50,000 miles on their speedometers brought to the starting line in Los Angeles 20 entrants, the largest number of one make of car ever assembled for such a run.

Every car completed the 172 mile course from Los Angeles to Lake Arrowhead and return without a single mechanical mishap and without being late at a single control. Yet the average "age" of the twenty was 93,657 miles at the start.

The "youngster" of the lot had gone only 59,358 miles; the oldest car had gone 266,153.

Even the winner in the Big Six class had 186,815 miles behind it at the start. Yet it made the 172 miles, rising a mile in altitude to beautiful Arrowhead Inn, with an average of 18.1 miles to the gallon.

The winner in the Special Six class was a 61.231-mile which averaged 16.5 miles to the gallon. First among the Standard or Light Six class had gone 75,895 miles, yet made the remarkable record of 60.5 miles to the gallon with no coasting.

The entire run was made strictly within legal limits, 35 miles an hour in cities, 35 miles an hour in the country; full stops at all stop crossings and all the heaviest mountain climbing in second gear from specified limits. The test was for economy in operation and freedom from mechanical troubles.

All the cars were privately owned, entered by Southern California dealers. The 1,873,156 miles aggregate showing on the twenty cars speedometers at the start was a striking evidence of the reserve mileage built into these widely advertised one-profit cars.

The oldest cars entered were the 1919 models. Every Big Six entered made more than 15 miles to the gallon of gasoline; every Special Six exceeded 15.5 miles and the lowest attainment of the Standard Six class was 18.2 miles. Motors were not shut off during the trip going or returning.

The Gilmore Company checked gas and oil; Cliff Mulick of the Lovejoy Pacific company refereed the run; J. B. Van Nuys of Arrowhead Inn checked the arriving and leaving time at the Inn. Start and finish was at the Studebaker Corporation's branch office in Los Angeles, with A. W. Maxwell manager, in charge of the run. In each car was a checker supplied by a competing driver.

Curt Anderson, branch manager for Harry D. Riley of Anaheim, drove the winning Big Six; E. G. Seelye piloted the winning Special Six entered by the Alhambra Garage; Jack Adams drove the best Standard Six for Keller Brothers of Pasadena.

The run over, each of the twenty cars was returned to its owner, to keep on its regular service, for all are in daily use and give every evidence of continuing it for years to come. Each owner insists his car is not "old". As one remarked in a poetic mood, "There is no age, to a stout heart."

SHOOTING GAME FROM AUTO PROHIBITED IN TEXAS

If a person wishes to shoot at a game bird or animal even during the open season, he must step from his automobile to do the shooting. He must leave his car to shoot even though he be in his own pasture. This announce-

ment was made Friday evening by T. E. Hobbins, zone, fish and water commissioner, in answer to a number of inquiries received at the department as to his construction of the new game law which became effective Sept. 1st.

"The act of shooting from a car by a proper locality is not in itself a violation of the law," Hobbins continued. "If the hunter shoots only at a rabbit, or some other bird or animal that is not protected by state law, he violates no statute, unless of course he be shooting on a public road. The latter offense, however, is covered by the general statute, and our department is not charged with its enforcement.

"It has always been the case, one may not hunt outside of the county of his residence unless he had with him a hunting license. He may not hunt anything—rabbits or other non-game animals—in season. The fact that he is out in the woods and carrying a gun has long been considered prima facie evidence that he is engaged in hunting."

The section of the law to which Hobbins refers declares that it is unlawful for any person at any time and in any manner to hunt, take, capture or kill or attempt to hunt, take, capture or kill any of the wild game, fowl or wild

game animal protected by the law of this state, from an automobile, an airplane, a power boat, a sail boat, any boat under sail or any floating device towed by power boat or sail boat.

QUINTERS REPORT FOR HASKELL AND OTHER CO.

The cotton crop of Haskell county is not as early this year as it was last year and the amount of cotton ginned in Haskell county this season to Sept.

1st was only 45 bales against 113 last year. Jones County had only ginned 78 bales 426 last year. Knox County had ginned 31 bales against 1 last year. North East Texas Lamar, Kaufman and in that section of the state the receipts are heavier at this time than

they were last year, but Williamson and that section of the state there has been but very little cotton ginned. Williamson County has ginned 574 this year and last year on the first of September it had ginned 18,760. And according to reports most of the cotton is picked in that section. The gins are running in full blast the past week and good report is expected for Haskell county October 1st.
