Wing sergeant takes STEP up

ATC commander presents NCO with new stripes

A member of the 64th Flying Training Wing Operations Complex was recently promoted through the Stripes for Exceptional

Performers Program.

MSgt. Richard Miller, noncommissioned officer in charge of the aircrew life support branch, was commended for his duty performance and accomplishments. He has been in the service for more than 12 years and at Reese 14 months.

"Promotions under the STEP program are very limited and competition is extremely keen," said Lt. Gen. Robert C. Oaks, Air

Training Command commander, who presented Sergeant Miller with the promotion stripes. "ATC appreciates the work the sergeant has done that made this promotion possible."

Under Sergeant Miller's supervision, his branch was cited for their mission support by the 1989 ATC Unit Effectiveness Inspection Team. The sergeant was individually recognized by the UEI and ATC Staff Assistance

Visit teams for his duties as a technical task evaluator.

His development of the hands-on aircrew survival training program was also noted during the UEI. His technician "smart sheets," which are used to increase overall equipment knowledge, were cited as command models in the ATC life support newsletter.

New guidelines aim to protect civil servants

Contrary to popular belief, the federal government does fire people—about 15,000 each year.

And the Office of Personnel Management has issued new rules telling managers how to handle cases of workers who face dismissal or demotion because of poor performance.

Romeo Garcia, chief of the Reese Civilian Personnel Office, chief of the Reese Civilian Personnel Office, emphasized the positive aspects of the new rules. "The rules ensure that employees performing at unacceptable levels are given a fair chance to improve," he said.

The new rules went into effect July 21. According to Tim Dirks, chief of the em-

ployee relations division with the Office of Personnel Management, they clarify "for federal managers and employees the rights and responsibilities of those who are performing at unacceptable levels."

One rule change addresses the issue of "sprinters." Dirks said these are employees typically given 60 - 90 days to improve performance or become subject to adverse actions. Some "sprint" for this period and then fall back into their old patterns. The new policy, said Dirks, gives agencies greater latitude to address these situations by requiring that the employee perform acceptably for a longer period of time.

The rules also require that supervisors:

- Must notify an employee of unacceptable performance immediately and not wait until a rating period;

- Must explain to the employee which areas and job elements are not satisfactory and what level they need to improve to;

- Must give the employee a reasonable opportunity to improve, including on-the-job assistance and clear work assignments.

The new rules also state that, in most cases, employees have only one chance to improve before adverse action such as demotion or removal can begin.

Mr. Garcia also offered guidance to managers and employees on addressing poor performance.

"The biggest problem managers make is not addressing the issue of poor performance early enough," he said. "They let a problem fester too long. When they do begin to counsel, it becomes a win/lose situation. If the problem had been addressed earlier, it would probably be resolved on better terms."

"For the employee with unacceptable performance, the problem is usually one of vigilance. The employee who has been given a chance to improve must be dedicated to sustaining acceptable performance," said Mr. Garcia.

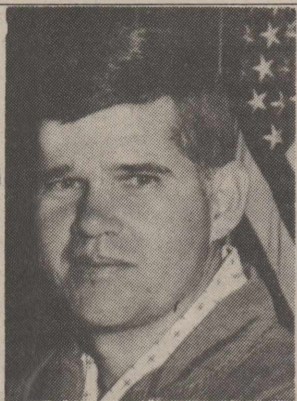

Legal office offers advice for people leaving Reese

Assignments have recently been announced for almost one-third of Reese's military population. If you are among those scheduled to leave, take heed of this article. There are many things which require your immediate attention. Follow these suggestions and you can save some money and unnecessary stress.

If you own your house and have a Veterans Administration loan, you must obtain a release of liability from the VA before or at the time of closing. Your failure to obtain a release of liability from someone assuming your loan means you are liable if the buyer, or any subsequent buyer, defaults on the loan.

A notice from the VA in two, three, or even ten years from now that says you owe them thousands of dollars is not a pleasant experience.

If you rent your property and it has a "military clause" which terminates the lease upon receipt of orders, you have no problem. However, if your lease term on the original lease extends beyond your anticipated departure date and you do not have a military clause, you may have a problem and should contact the legal office for assistance.

The time to think about protecting your household goods is before you move. Take pictures of your furniture, valuable possessions and things which can break (which can include about everything). You may even want to rent or borrow a video camera and do a "walk through" of your house. Save those old receipts that prove the purchase price and date you purchased your household items and put them in a safe place.

Make your own inventory of your possessions so you can remember something if it turns up missing. Make sure your inventory accurately reflects the contents of boxes. The inventory must list any high-value items contained in the box.

You have two years after delivery of your property to file a claim, but only 70 days to notify the legal office at your new destination of damage or loss incurred in the move. Failure to notify the legal office within 70 days (by turning in a Defense Department Form 1840) will result in either a denial of your claim or a significant reduction in the amount you receive.

One important part of many moves is a power of attorney. A power of attorney allows you to authorize someone to act on your behalf. It can be used for many purposes, such as to authorize someone to sell your house, buy a house, rent an apartment, ship your household goods or vehicle, or file a claim on your behalf.

Power of attorney forms are available every day at the Reese Legal Office from 7:30 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. A notary is available to witness your signature from 10 a.m. to noon and 2 - 4 p.m. every day.

Departing people interested in making Texas their legal residence should come by legal, since this may be their last chance. Discover more about the pros and cons of changing your residence.

For further details, call the legal office at 3505. Remember, there are going to be many people trying to do these things in a short period of time, so act now.

1958th CS notes need for COMSEC

It's common knowledge that classified information may not be transmitted by insecure means. Still communications security violations occur and the majority of these happen when people discuss classified or sensitive information on office telephones or intrabase radios.

The 1958th Communications Squadron has a continuing education program designed to keep everyone aware of how vulnerable our communications are to interception.

In addition, each organization is responsible for developing Essential Elements of Friendly Information. These EEFIs are intended to make people aware of information they may come into contact with which should not be transmitted by an insecure means.

Examples of EEFIs are:

- Disclosure of defense readiness posture (or "DEFCON"), or changes thereto.
- Wartime mission and deployment locations of aircraft.

- Specific details on the Base Mobility Plan, Confrontation Management Plan, Resource Management Plan, Disaster Preparedness Plan, or any other classified or "For Official Use Only" plans.

- The number, strength, and readiness of mobility teams.
- Dispersal locations for aircraft, resources and personnel.

Everyone is responsible for being aware of the EEFIs that pertain to their particular job. In some instances, one piece of information by itself does not fall into the category of classified or sensitive. However, when put together with other pieces of information, unauthorized persons can easily form a very clear picture of a classified or sensitive operation.

The solution to this problem should be clear. Know what is sensitive or classified about any project you are working on. Read the Defense Department Form 2056 affixed to your telephone. Use of your phone constitutes consent to official COMSEC monitoring. Stay COMSEC aware by always using only approved methods for transmitting classified or sensitive information.

Careline

The Careline is your direct link to me, Col. Monroe S. Sams Jr., 64th Flying Training Wing commander. All calls will be held in strict confidence.

I urge you to leave your name and number when you call so that you can get a direct response; however, you may remain anonymous if you wish.

Before calling the Careline, consider using your chain of command to solve your problem. While you can contact the Careline directly, your immediate supervisor and/or first sergeant/commander are usually in the best position to resolve your problem.

The Careline can be reached 24 hours a day at 3273.

Vandals cause concern

I've received several calls recently from Reese Village residents who are concerned over acts of vandalism that have occurred in the housing area.

To date, all these cases have either been resolved or are under investigation. The individuals responsible will be dealt with, and, of course, future acts of vandalism against government or private property will not be tolerated.

One caller asked about the possibility of a curfew for

minors. Although none currently exists, we are looking at implementing one that would be in line with the curfew employed by Lubbock.

Security police will continue to approach suspicious individuals in the housing area, particularly at night. Housing residents can help the SPs prevent future incidents by reporting any suspicious activity to the law enforcement desk at 3333 or, in an emergency, 911.

Employee courtesy a problem?

I've ordered lunch several times at Mamma Reesione's recently, and the staff there has been very rude on the phone. Something needs to be done about this.

Each employee in Mamma's and in the Enlisted Open Mess dining room has been briefed on telephone courtesy and customer service. The Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division regret any rudeness toward their customers, and they will continue to emphasize courtesy toward customers.

Thanks for bringing this to our attention — this behavior is something that will not be tolerated by EOM management.

Defense cuts

Money-saving efforts should begin at organization level

The Air Force, working with a budget that has declined 12 percent since fiscal 1985, should not expect future increases but rather organizational streamlining to save money, the service's top civilian said.

Secretary of the Air Force Donald B. Rice made his comments Sept. 6 in opening remarks at the annual worldwide personnel conference being held through Saturday at the Air Force Military Personnel Center.

"Fiscal year 1990 will be the fifth consecutive year of real cuts in the Defense Department budget," Secretary Rice said, describing the result as a "budget threat" that had raised mixed feelings within the nation's defense establishment.

"DOD's mixed feelings center on the fact that although there's been talk among Soviet leaders of a 14 percent cut in their defense budget, the fact is that since 1985 Soviet defense expenditures have increased in real terms — perhaps as much

as three percent a year. In the strategic picture, there's been no shift to a defensive posture on the part of the Soviets."

In contrast, he said, the U.S. Armed Forces were facing continued paring in an era of budget belt-tightening that likely could cause further reductions in the next decade.

"So far we've met our end strengths, but we are still left with what some consider too rich a force," Secretary Rice told the gathering of senior Air Force personnel officials. "Clearly, some rethinking is in order."

Central to that rethinking is the Defense Management Review, an inward search for ways to streamline the services with a goal of saving \$30 billion over five years. The study affects all services, with a requirement to activate plans by October for implementing those ideas adopted under DMR.

"The DMR is a blueprint for change in the defense business," Secretary Rice said, "ranging from the way decisions are made to the way we acquire weapons systems." Several in-house panels are taking hard looks at the current organizational structure of the Air Force, the secretary said.

The secretary mentioned the potential for a merger between the Air Force Systems Command and Air Force Logistics Command, perhaps the most well-known of the changes proposed under the DMR umbrella. "That too may or may not happen, depending on cost and benefit tradeoffs," he said.

A panel is also examining pilot training, with the possibility of decentralizing it to individual bases within Air Training Command.

"The issue is whether we take on these efforts at streamlining and consolidation, and identifying and eliminating nice-to-have but not absolutely essential activities, in order to be able to sustain the maximum amount of our budget dollar."

Although the results of the study could shake up the organizational structure of the Air Force, the secretary told the personnel managers, the Air Force would emerge from the review a more dynamic force. "We can adapt from a corporate standpoint to the changes that are required of us for the future," Secretary Rice said. "The Air Force will emerge from this as viable and as energized as the day it was created."

Bush in favor of pursuing strategic defenses

The president has taken a long, hard look at the Strategic Defense Initiative and has determined that the changing nature of threats and the emergence of promising technical concepts argue strongly in favor of continuing to pursue an aggressive SDI, according to Undersecretary of Defense for Policy Paul D. Wolfowitz.

Mr. Wolfowitz testified on policy issues concerning ballistic missile defense.

The decision to initiate SDI was based on a "sober, realistic assessment" of the threat faced by the country. President Bush called for a comprehensive review of the entire national security strategy and objectives, including SDI.

Mr. Wolfowitz said the review, with respect to the SDI program, determined that:

□ The goals of SDI remain sound. "In pursuing SDI we do not seek superiority, but to maintain the strategic balance and place deterrence on a more stable basis," he said.

□ Pursuit of a robust SDI program provides a hedge against any near-term Soviet decision to rapidly expand its anti-ballistic missile capability beyond that allowed by the Anti-ballistic Missile Treaty.

□ Department of Defense will continue to aggressively pursue options for layered defenses composed of both space- and ground-based elements.

□ DOD will place emphasis on program flexibility and continue toward deployment of a system that will meet the requirements of a Phase I Strategic Defense System as defined by the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

□ The SDI program will be conducted in full compliance with all U.S. international obligations, including the Anti-ballistic Missile Treaty.

□ In view of fiscal constraints, DOD has reduced its SDI

budget request for fiscal 1990 and later years.

Mr. Wolfowitz also noted that the president's decision recognizes that the national debate over the SDI program has tended to focus on the long-term prospect of a fundamental shift in defense dominance.

"In point of fact," said Mr. Wolfowitz, "the deployment of active defenses need not be viewed as a radical departure from current U.S. deterrence strategy."

The decision to pursue options for layered defenses indicates that such defenses would greatly contribute to deterrence and defense that could be afforded by purely ground-based defenses, he said.

In conclusion, Mr. Wolfowitz stated that the United States "must not succumb to Soviet pressure to constrain our research endeavors and allow them to maintain an edge in such a capability."

"The United States continues to have solid strategic and geopolitical interest in aggressively pursuing SDI."

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Accounting office merger benefits wing

The military pay and travel pay sections in the Reese Accounting and Finance Office merged Sept. 1 in an effort to maintain the sections' output in the face of maintenance conversion-related manning cuts.

According to MSgt. Roy Threadgill, the maintenance conversion will likely cut the manning in military pay in half, while travel is also likely to lose at least one person.

"The manning is based strictly on the number of personnel we serve," Sergeant Threadgill said. "With base manning decreasing by nearly one-third, the sections were facing a significant cut."

The combination mirrors similar moves at other Air Training Command bases. These bases include Mather AFB, Calif., and Laughlin AFB, Texas.

The move came at the right time, according to Sergeant Threadgill. "We decided that we simply could not afford to wait [to make

the move]," he said. "Regarding the conversion, there's a lot of work the AFO has to do. There are approximately 800 people planning to depart here and we have to help them prepare to leave."

The merger of the two pay sections will provide several benefits for both the people in the sections and the base population in general. "The move is designed to ensure that we can take care of the customers as efficiently as possible," he said.

"Customer service will ultimately im-

prove," he continued. "When clients visit the new section, they won't have to work with two separate sections when they need both military and travel pay assistance."

Newcomers will also benefit from the change. "In the past when we had to do in-processing briefings, we had to send out two people [one from travel, one from military]. Now, by combining the two sections, one person can handle this task. Consequently, customers can be processed quicker with fewer man hours lost."

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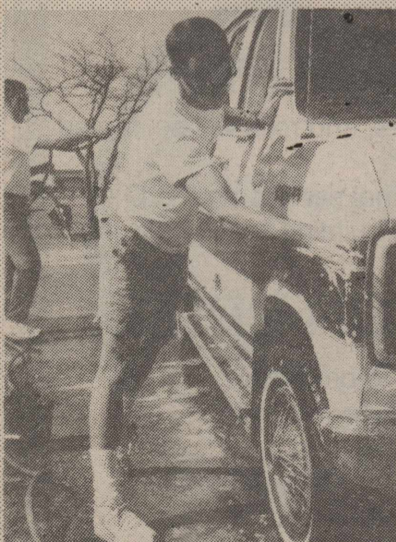

Squadron raised \$420 Tuesday by "jailing" a variety of supervisors, first sergeants and commanders.

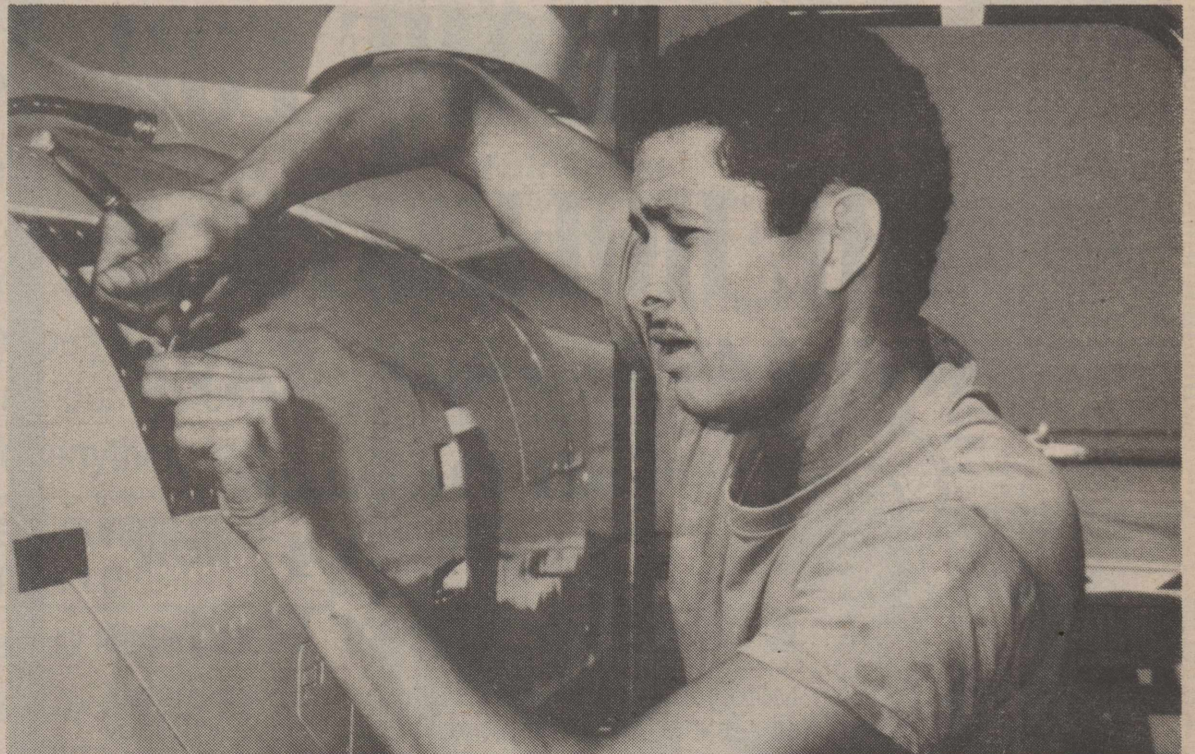
People were able to get the bosses put in the "slammer" for \$20.

Reese holds special retreat recognizing former POWs

Three local residents were awarded with the Prisoner of War Medal during the POW/Missing in Action Retreat Sept. 15 on Reese.

□ Jane Dean accepted the medal for her late husband, Hill Edmond Dean. Mr. Dean, formerly with the U.S. Army Air Corps, was captured during the Bataan (Philippines) "death march" in April 1942. He was taken to Prison Camp Three in Sukuoka, Japan.

In September 1945, Mr. Dean was released from prison and returned to the U.S.

□ Nolan Harlan became the first raw recruit to be trained as a paratrooper in the 506th Regiment in Normandy. During a battle in June 1942, Mr. Harlan was gunned down by mortar fire and, due to his ini-

uries, was left behind by his group. Shortly afterward, he was captured by the Germans.

As a POW, Mr. Harlan was held captive in three German prisons: Stalag 13A; Stalag 4B (where he tried to escape but was caught and court-martialed); and Stalag 13B. While in Stalag 13B, he worked in coal mines until he successfully escaped in February 1945.

□ Niles Thompson was assigned to the 60th Coast Artillery Division in the Philippines. He was captured on Corregidor in 1942 and taken to Bilibia Prison.

In 1945, Mr. Thompson was released from a prisoner of war camp located in Japan. He was part of the first group of POWs to be returned to the states.

The POW medal is awarded to U.S. servicemen and women who were taken prisoner and held cap-

tive during an armed conflict that took place after April 5, 1917. The POW medal was designated by Congress as the military's highest decoration for service.

The medal consists of a golden eagle surrounded by barbed wire and bayonet points. Although symbolically imprisoned, the American eagle is alert to regain freedom — the hope that upholds a prisoner's spirit.

The inscription on the medal reads, "For honorable service while a prisoner of war."

During World War II, more than 30,000 Americans became prisoners of war; during the Korean War, more than 10,000; and in Vietnam, 7,500 Americans were held captive.

To this day, many of them were never released and are still considered missing in action.

Computer time bomb set to go off

Columbus Day this year might be a bigger event than just celebrating the discovery of America. Computer users are being told there may be a computer time bomb working its way around the Air Force set to go off Oct. 12.

Computer security experts at Air Force Communications Command have alerted Air Force computer users and suggested some precautions. Targeted for the possible at-

tack are microsoft disk operating system-based computers.

"The Air Force is not the only possible target. Anybody that has a computer with MS-DOS could be susceptible — banks, personal computers and stores, for instance," said John Brofka, AFCC computer security operations chief.

"The timebomb is allegedly being spread by a computer virus and current anti-viral programs are

said to be ineffective in detecting the virus," said Mr. Brofka.

As a precaution, Mr. Brofka said computer users should:

□ Make routine and frequent backups of critical hard disk or cartridge data files.

□ Make sure original programming disks are not used for processing and are available for reloading.

□ Not use or load public domain or "shakeware" programs.

□ Not share program disks or software between systems, and use only authorized software backups made from the original program disks.

□ Not download files or software from non-government bulletin board systems.

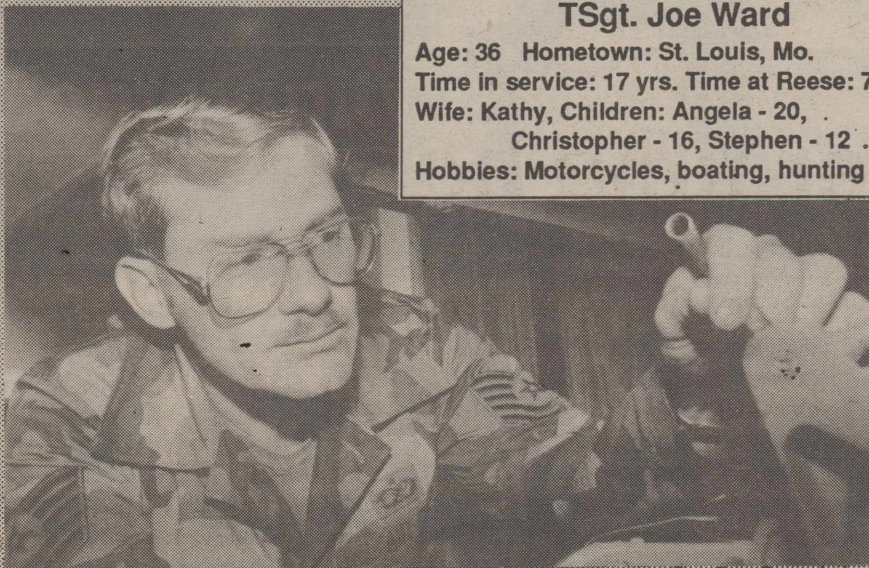

Development center offers varied programs

The Reese Child Development Center offers a variety of programs and improved facilities for wing members and their children.

"There are approximately 80 full-time children attending the center with an average of 20 youth brought in daily on a drop-in basis," said Jim Hernandez, center director. "These children are monitored by the 26 care providers employed at the center."

In an effort to upgrade the facilities, members of the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron are repairing and replacing light fixtures, while contractors paint the walls, lay new carpet and install floor tile throughout the building.

"We expect the renovation project to be completed by mid-October. An open house will be held to introduce the 'new look' to wing members," said Mr. Hernandez.

Beginning Saturday, the center will offer evening child care from 6 p.m. to midnight.

This coincides with the beginning of Saturday night movies at 8 p.m. in the Simler theater. This week's feature is "Romancing the Stone," rated PG. Prices are \$2 for adults and \$1 for children under 12.

"This gives families the opportunity to attend Saturday night dining at the Officers' Open Mess (open to all) and then attend a movie at the theater with or without their children," said Hugh Beam, Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division chief.

"Parents who bring their children to the center Saturday evening and use a MWR facility will be authorized the MWR-use discount," added Mr. Hernandez. "This is also offered on Friday evenings."

The regular hourly prices at the center are \$1.40 per hour for the first child; \$1.20 for the second child; and \$1 for the third or subsequent children. The MWR discount is 20 cents per hour. Children must be from the same family for the multiple-child rates.

A newborn program is available for children 6 weeks to 6 month old at a cost of \$50 per week for the first child and \$40 per week for

each additional child. For children 6 months to 10 years old, the weekly rates are \$40 for the first child, \$35 for the second and \$30 for each child thereafter.

The center also offers a before-and-after-school program for children attending Reese Elementary School. Parents may bring their children to the center in the morning. The center will then take the children to school and pick them up and return to the center. Cost for this program is \$30 per week for the third.

"Openings are still available in the newborn and before-and-after-school programs," said Mr. Hernandez.

The center recently launched its 1989-90 preschool year for children 3-5 years old. There are 23 3-year old children attending the preschool classes from 8:30-11 a.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and 17 4 and 5-year old children who attend class from 8:30-11 a.m. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Monthly prices are \$48 for 3-year olds and \$60 for the 4 and 5-year olds.

According to the center director, children

attending the center who also attend preschool will receive a half-price preschool discount.

"With the recent opening of the WEE Care program at the base hospital, parents have been concerned with the expense involved should their child become sick and needs to be admitted into the hospital," commented Mr. Hernandez. "If a child attends the center three or more days in any one week, they will be charged the full week's price. If a child only attends one or two days, the price will be prorated and the parent will be charged one-half the normal price."

"This should help to off-set the cost of the hospital," he concluded.

The center also progressed recently when it received the \$8,000 worth of child developmental toys on order for the preschool.

For more information about the center or preschool, call the center at 3541 or preschool at 3952. Center hours are 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 7 a.m. to midnight Fridays and 6 p.m. to midnight Saturdays.

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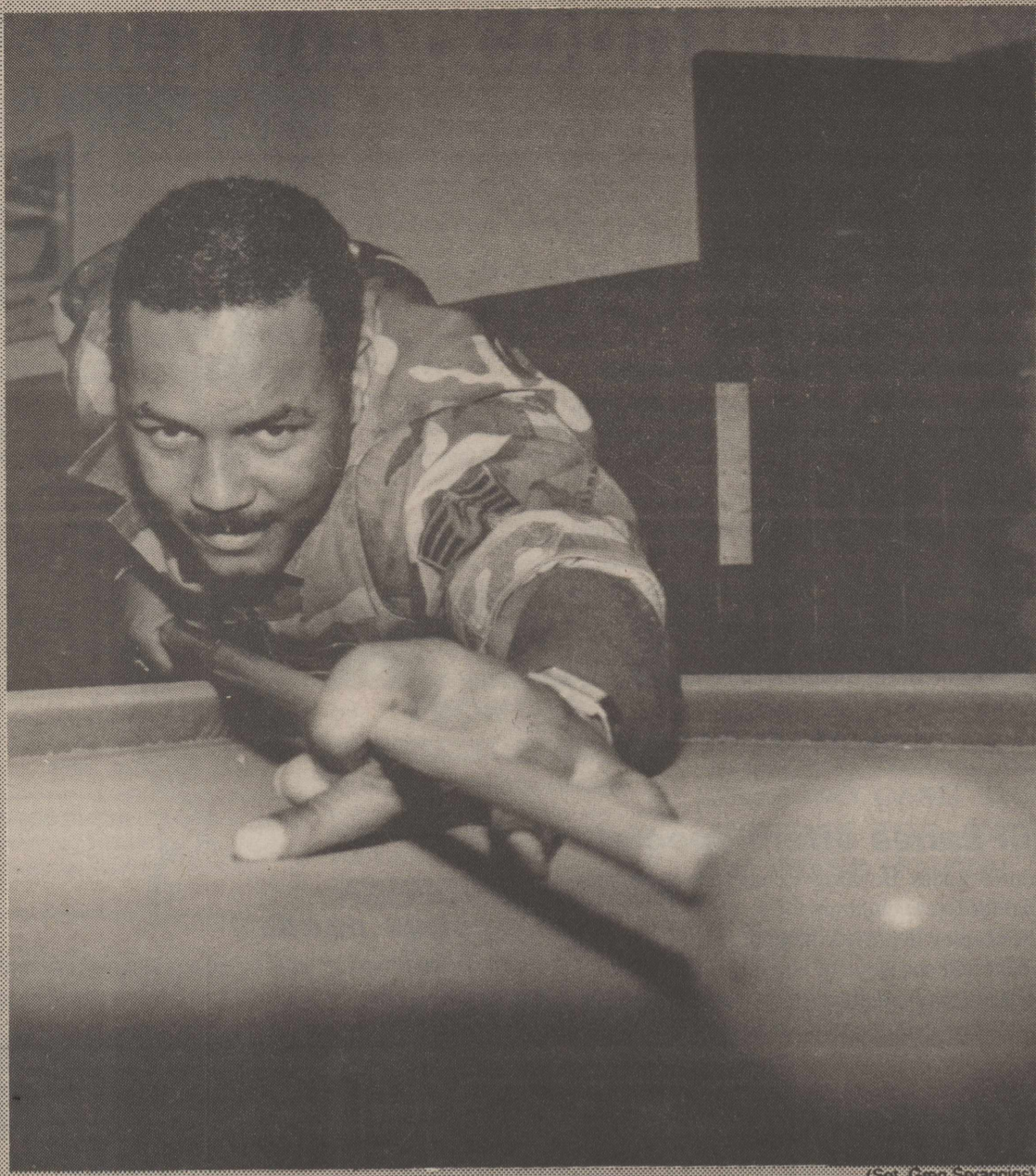
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STURON sergeant takes tournament

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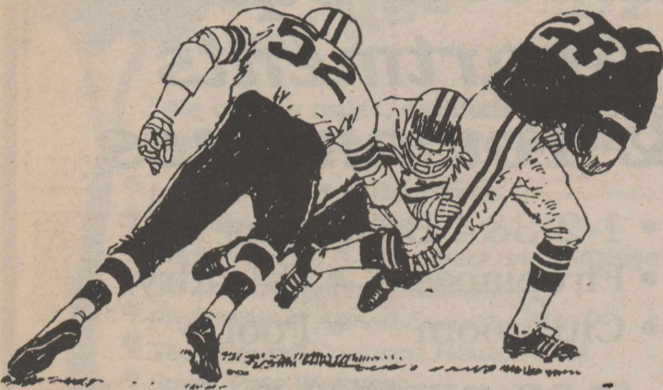
Over-35 softball action at ATC

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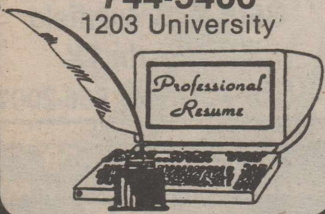
