Direct Deposit required

All persons coming on active duty July 1 or later will be required to have their net pay sent to a financial organization of their choice.

Beginning Sept. 1, persons re-enlisting or accepting a regular commission will be required to sign an agreement that their pay will be sent to a financial organization through Direct Deposit or Electronic Funds Transfer.

This policy applies to retirees, as well as the Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard.

Officials at Air Force headquarters feel the single most important reason for having Direct Deposit has direct ties to the readiness and high mobility of the service.

"You don't want to have to figure out how your family is going to get money when you're out on deployment," said Dick Webb, a systems accountant with the deputy comptroller for financial policy and banking.

"If you have Direct Deposit in a checking or savings account, then they'll have access to the money," he said.

Last year, about 96 percent of active duty and 87 percent of civilian employees had direct deposit.

People entering the Air Force July 1 or later will not be required to participate in the program while in basic training, Officer Training School or during technical training. Only when they reach their first permanent duty station will they have to sign up for the program.

Also starting Sept. 1, new Air Force civilian employees, including those transferring from other DOD or federal agencies or individuals who were former employees of the Air Force, will be advised that direct deposit is the standard method of payment in the Air Force. Civilian participation is subject to fulfillment of local union bargaining obligations.

While everyone will be required to participate in the program, unit or installation commanders may issue a waiver in certain cases. Waivers may be granted upon individual request or can be commander-directed.

Under some circumstances where the individual determines it would be beneficial to disenroll from Direct Deposit and have his pay held while moving, commander approval is not necessary.

Those people, however, must re-enroll in the program within 60 days after arrival at the new duty station.

People who submit their retirement application Sept. 1 or later will be briefed on the new requirement in order to receive their retired pay.

Waivers for retirees can be obtained within 60 days prior to their retirement from the director of retired pay operations at Air Force Accounting and Finance Center.

Summer Day Camp seeking volunteers

The campers will visit base June 19-23, as

"About 50 campers from the Lubbock area are expected, ranging in ages from six to 30," said 1st Lt. Doug White. "Half the people needed to act as counselors come from downtown, and we try to supply the other 25."

The lieutenant explained he's hoping to get enough people to provide a one-to-one camper-to-counselor ratio, since some of the

campers require extra assistance getting around because of their handicaps.

Some activities planned are an opening ceremony featuring the Reese Honor Guard, a security police demonstration and trips to the swimming pool, bowling center and flightline.

The lieutenant said that there's a great deal of excitement and anticipation on the part of people who are returning as counselors from previous camps. "What we need (now) is to get to people who haven't done this before," he said. "We're looking to get people who may be new to the base or who

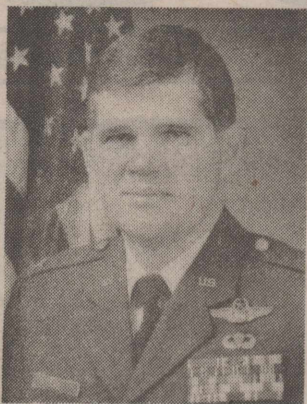
have always wanted to do something like this."

"Working in the camp is very educational," he continued. "It's also really rewarding emotionally to see the campers do things that they may not have been able to do a few years ago, but can do now because of the camp."

Since the camp will be conducted on duty days, Lieutenant White said that people who want to participate can get permissive temporary duty orders. Interested volunteers should consult their supervisors and contact Lieutenant White at 3636.

Well, I'm smiling. I hope you are too. I couldn't have been prouder of the wing and the entire Reese community than I was after the IG's UEI/ORI out-briefing. We said all along that if we worked together as a team, we'd pull off a good inspection. And that's exactly what we did!

The ATC/IG doesn't give cursory inspections. They looked into every nook and cranny for two intense weeks and called it as they saw it. They liked what they saw. They were impressed with our operation - across the board. More than that, they were impressed with our people. Over and over, inspectors would tell me what a great team we have at Reese. That wasn't news to me. I already knew what great people we have - skilled and dedicated to our mission. It's the secret of our success!

Our success in mission accomplishment was well documented by the team. Even though we were the first pilot training wing to receive the dual format, we showed substantial improvement in both the UEI and ORI portions over our last IG inspections. It took a lot of effort on your part to prepare for two inspections at once, but you took the extra step. You should be proud of the results.

Seven areas of the wing were absolutely superior: inspection and complaints system, historian, life support, learning center/audiovisual services, CE financial management, furnishings management and communications squadron personnel programs.

Many other functions were tagged "best seen" by the team. So many were honored there isn't room to mention them all!

But the real news was the substantial improvement in all three major areas: primary mission, logistics support and base support. We doubled the number of ratings exceeding the command standard since our September 1987 UEI. That's progress!

Did the team leave us any room for improvement? You bet! They identified many findings which must be answered, and in some isolated areas we didn't quite meet the standard. The secret is to fix these areas fast, while they're still fresh on our minds. Thus, we can build on the solid foundation we've established to guarantee an even better inspection when the team returns 18 months from now.

Until then, it's back to work doing what we do best - training great military pilots. We have some catching up to do, because nature wasn't kind to us this month. With thunderclouds that constantly threatened - but never delivered any rain - to gusty winds from everywhere except down the runway to the unbelievable (for springtime) heat, we didn't have a single unrestricted flying day in May. But we can concentrate now on the primary mission knowing we've proved our mettle to the IG under some extremely challenging conditions. I'm proud of you. Thanks!

Professionalism and an unwavering regard for safety were perpetual themes in all training aspects.

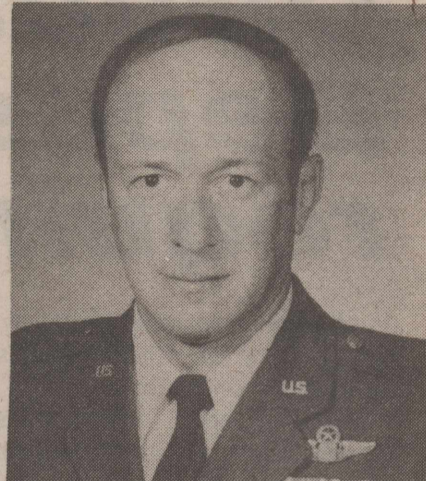

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FMS changes command

The people in the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron got a new commander Wednesday as Maj. David M. McIntosh Jr. took the reins from Maj. Erwin C. Treat Jr., who is retiring.

Major Treat has been the FMS commander since March 1987. Prior to this assignment, he worked for Strategic Air Command headquarters as chief of the data systems management branch, and as a maintenance officer at Kirtland AFB, N.M.

The major, a 21-year service veteran, is relocating to Seattle where he'll be working for Boeing, a job he said he's looking forward to. Major Treat will be the program manager for advanced system de-

velopment on the space station, in the aerospace plant.

Looking back, the major said he considered the development of the squadron booster club as the biggest, single achievement the squadron has had during his tenure as commander. "Instead of having a unit advisory council, we had a booster club," the major explained. "Everyone has a membership card. It is a way to raise money and to get people involved in the squadron."

Some of the benefits generated by the club include squadron parties and a beautification project in the unit orderly room.

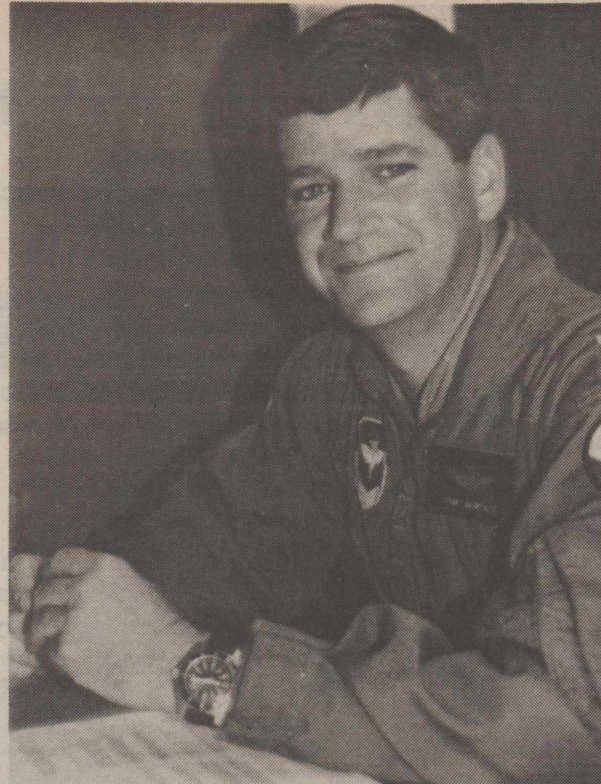
Major Treat said the club was especially helpful in bringing together such a diverse unit — the

squadron has 23 separate shops.

Major McIntosh comes to FMS from the 35th Flying Training Squadron. Some of his past assignments include the Pentagon, Air Command and Staff College and Headquarters Air Training Command. He has been at Reese since July.

Major McIntosh said that he doesn't plan any sweeping changes upon taking command. "Radical change has never worked in maintenance," he said.

"I've worked around maintenance before, but this is the first time I'll actually be in a maintenance unit. I expect this to be my most challenging assignment," he concluded.

Aeromedical award

Nurse makes significant contributions to profession

Lt. Col. Sharon L. McConnell, chief of nursing services here, was recently awarded the Mary T. Klinker Award for her significant contributions to flight nursing and aeromedical evacuation while as-

signed to the systems programs office, Brooks AFB, Texas.

The annual award, established in memory of an Air Force flight nurse who died while helping to airlift Vietnamese orphans and U.S. civilians from Saigon in 1975, was publicized at the Aerospace Medi-

cal Association's Honors Night Banquet May 11, in Washington, D.C. Colonel McConnell was then cited for her contributions to nursing education and for superior leadership, outstanding management and innovative thinking in the development of urgently needed

equipment for aeromedical evacuation.

As a flight nurse, she has played vital roles in both education and research in environmental health nursing and aeromedical evacuation.

Within the past three years the colonel has assisted in improving the design of equipment used for aeromedical evacuation such as the chemically-protective litter patient wrap, the ambulatory casualty suit, the chemically-protective i.v. cover and the transportable airborne therapeutic station.

Colonel McConnell was the sole Air Force Systems Command flight nurse on the development team for the portable therapeutic liquid oxygen system for the C-130 and the therapeutic oxygen manifold system for the C-141. Both systems are designed to provide therapeutic oxygen to patients without the need for bulky high-pressure oxygen cylinders.

While at Brooks, she became

the second nurse to assist in the testing and development of the C-17's new aeromedical evacuation equipment.

Colonel McConnell received her bachelor of science degree in nursing from the Medical College of Virginia in 1971 and her master of science degree in nursing from Loma Linda University, Calif., in 1972.

A native of Millville, N.J., she entered the Air Force in 1972. Colonel McConnell has served at Luke AFB, Ariz.; USAF Regional Medical Center Wiesbaden, the Federal Republic of Germany; Scott AFB, Ill.; Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio and at Brooks AFB, before arriving at Reese in June 1988. Colonel McConnell took over as chief of nursing services here May 6.

"It's nice to be flexible, being involved in all that I have been. But now it's time to work with people. After all, that's what nursing is all about—people," the colonel said.

Civilian drug testing to begin

Air Force civilian employees having jobs associated with law enforcement, national security, and public health and safety will soon be subject to random drug testing.

A 60-day general notice was sent to all major commands May 11 stating the Air Force's intent to comply with a presidential order calling for a drug-free workplace.

The notice will be distributed to all civilian employees, although only about 9 percent of them will be affected by random testing. Employees who occupy positions subject to random testing will receive a specific notice at least 30 days before

random selection which will provide a detailed explanation of the program as it relates to them.

The program is aimed at identifying illegal drug users on the basis of observation, criminal conviction, self-admission or a verified positive urinalysis.

Once the program begins, an employee found to be using illegal drugs may be subject to disciplinary action, to include possible dismissal from federal service. Some exceptions exist for those who voluntarily identify themselves during the notice period as having an illegal drug problem.

The Repair Evaluation Proposal And Identification of Repairability program is designed to increase unit repair cycle self-sufficiency, improve readiness and decrease pipeline time and cost.

If you know of an aircraft, communication, electronics or support equipment part or component for which an economical repair exists at unit level, yet the repair is not authorized, complete an Air Force Technical Order Form 135 or an Air Force Form 1000.

Deadline nears

People who entered the military between July 1, 1985 and June 30, 1988, and did not have a break in service during that period have a deadline of June 30 to enroll in the Montgomery GI Bill.

In order to be eligible, members must elect to take a \$1,200 reduction in pay or make a \$1,200 cash payment while still on active duty. Payments can be made by a minimum monthly allotment of \$100 for 12 months. In return, the enrollees receive a basic payment of \$300 per month for 36 months or

\$10,800 in total benefits.

GI bill

Active duty and veterans eligible for benefits under Chapter 34 (Vietnam-era GI Bill) may attain conversion rights for benefits under the Chapter 30 (Montgomery GI Bill). Vietnam-era eligibles are basically entitled to educational assistance for a period of one and one-half months for each month of service on active duty after Jan. 31, 1955, up to 45 months. Chapter 34 and benefits accumulated with it expire Dec. 31. Conversion eli-

gibles may transfer any remaining Vietnam-era GI Bill benefits, up to 36 months, to the new GI Bill.

Converted benefits under the new program will be slightly greater than under the Vietnam-era program.

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
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Mission Enhancement Day meets its goals

Prior to the May 26 observance of Mission Enhancement Day '89, local organizers said the two main goals of the day were a good cross-flow of information and that people learn something. According to Maj. Turner R. Clark, project officer, both of those goals were achieved.

"It was a chance for people in the maintenance and operations complexes to see how their work affects each other," said Major Clark. "For example, instructor pilots gave simulator demonstrations for maintenance people to show them how the aircraft performs when certain systems have problems, such as brake failure, tire failure or some other malfunction.

"Being able to sit in the simulator and see these things firsthand means something to the person who's 'behind the scenes,'" the major continued. "He's just as important as the person pushing the throttle."

Maintenance personnel also gave pilots a chance to get a better understanding of their side of the mission. Several areas, such as the communications/navigation shop, propulsion branch, hydraulics shop, aerospace systems and the T-38 phase dock, were open to pilots who wanted to get a better understanding of the maintenance complex.

"One of the things I got the most feedback on, particularly from the student pilots, was the non destructive inspection lab, although that's not meant to slight the other shops," Major Clark said. "I was very impressed with all of them."

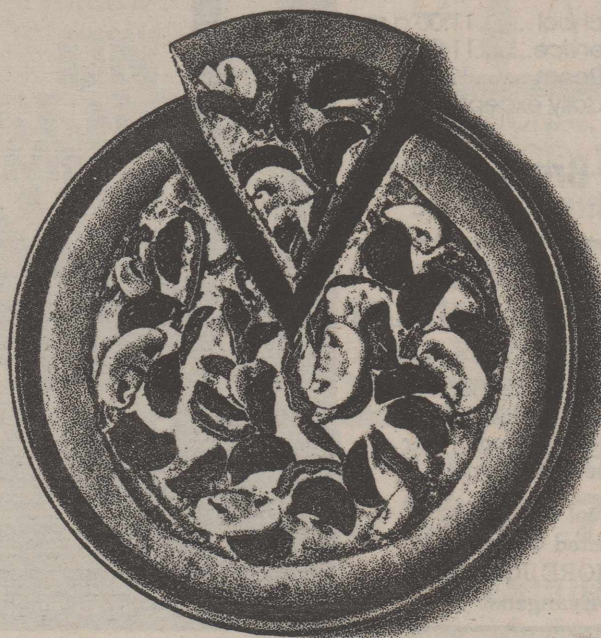
Another highlight of the day was a pair of lectures by Maj. Tim Strongin, a consultant to the surgeon general on aviation psychology. In his first lecture, Major Strongin spoke to wives of instructor and student pilots about the rigors of being married to a flyer. The next briefing dealt with how to handle pressures that pilots can encounter on and off duty.

"I think we all learned something (during the day)," Major Clark said. "The time Major Strongin spent lecturing was very valuable to the operators, and the simulator demonstrations for maintenance personnel were well worth our time." The major also added words of praise for the maintenance personnel and instructor pilots who took time out of their schedules to put together the various demonstrations that made the day a success.

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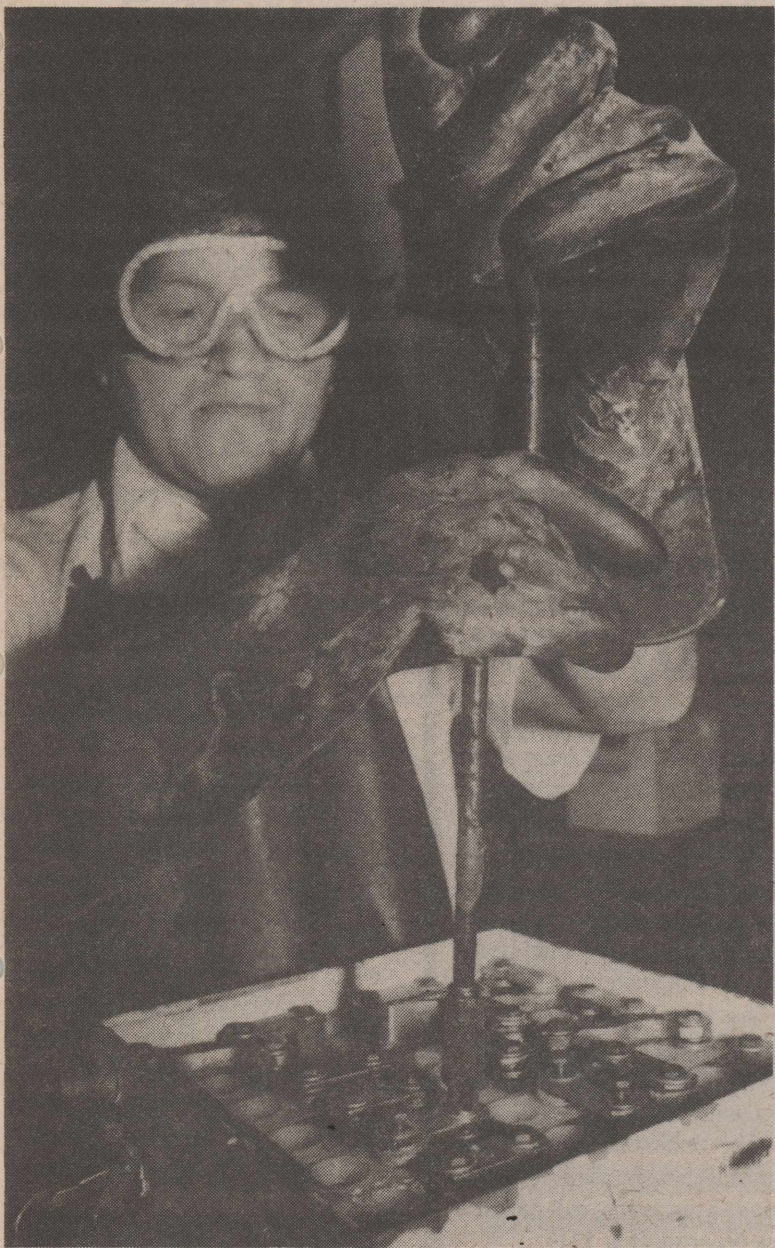
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Maintainers spark wing's mission

There are few people who don't recognize the vital role that maintenance plays in accomplishing the wing's mission of training the best pilots in the Air Force.

All the different shops and sections are important links in the maintenance chain, and the electric shop is no exception.

Assigned to the 64th Field Maintenance Squadron, the 25 people in the electric shop are responsible for a wide variety of tasks.

They handle an average of 40-45

jobs per day on the flightline, and work on approximately 275 aircraft parts in the shop. In addition to in-shop and flightline work, their taskings also take them to the T-37 and T-38 phase docks.

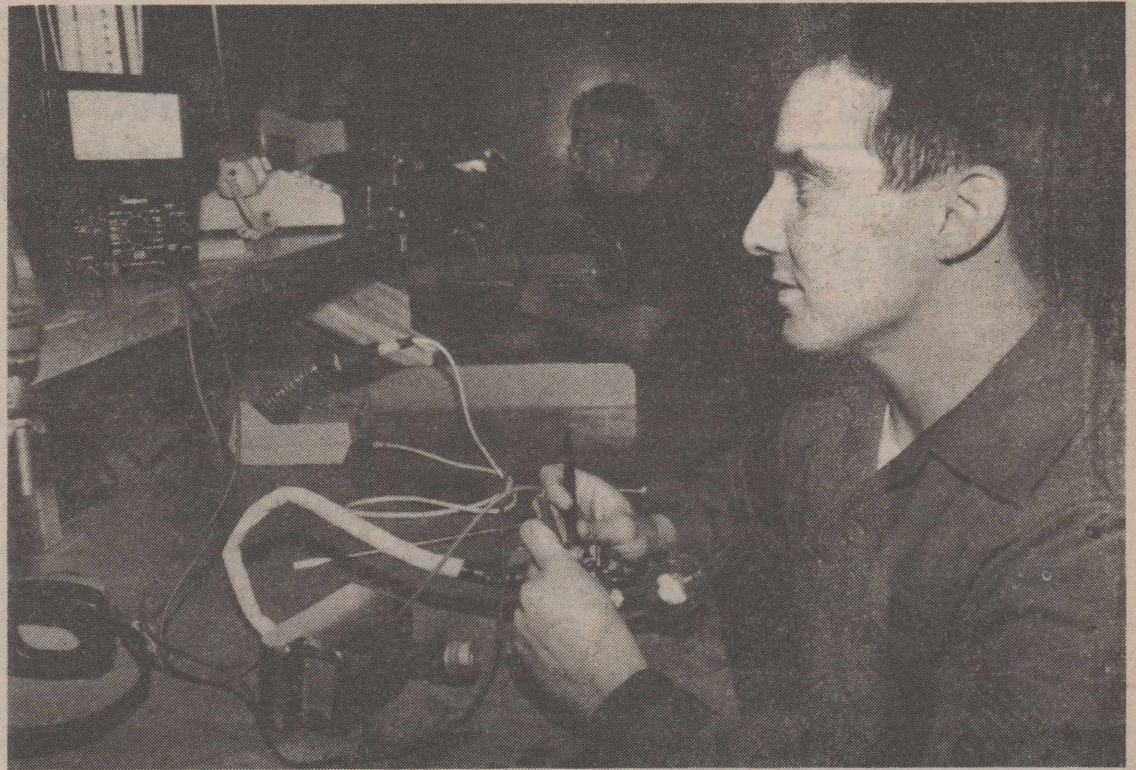
Some of the systems that electric shop personnel work on include flight control, fuel systems, landing gear, lighting systems, engine start and ignition, nose wheel steering and the warning system.

The electric shop also oversees the one-man battery shop. It services approximately 165 aircraft bat-

teries per month -- with an average turnaround time of three days, depending on the condition the battery.

The lead acid batteries used for the aerospace ground equipment are also serviced here.

With change is on the horizon for the electric shop, they'll soon be combining with the environmental systems shop under the RIVET Work Force program. This Air Force-wide program is designed to consolidate maintenance functions..

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Fire prevention is everyone's responsibility

During the past five months, Air Training Command has experienced five fires within family housing.

All of these fires have occurred in or around the kitchen area, and most were a result of ignorance or negligent disregard of fire prevention responsibility.

One of the most frequent causes of fire in the housing area resulted

from over-heated grease on the stove bursting into flames. This is an easily preventable fire by not leaving hot grease on your stove unattended. However, in the event you do have a grease fire, observe the following guidelines:

Small pan fires

- Turn off heat immediately.
- Attempt to smother the flames by covering fire with a pan lid.

Watch out for your self and clothes, and approach fire holding the lid like a shield.

If no cover is available, throw baking soda onto the fire (do not use baking powder or flour).

Never risk carrying a burning pan outside. The hot grease may splatter on you, and your hair or clothing could catch fire.

Never put water on grease fires, it will splatter and spread the fire.

Oven fires

Turn off heat immediately. Keep oven door closed, this will help smother the fire.

If the fire does not go out, open door slightly and toss baking soda onto the flames.

Be extremely careful around your stove when wearing loose or flimsy, highly combustible clothing. Keep pot holders, dish towels and plastic materials away from burners. If a fire starts in your home call 911 immediately. At the same time, get everyone out of the house and don't go back inside until help arrives and takes care of the fire.

If you extinguish the fire, and you live in base housing, you still must contact the base fire department.

Remember, the best way to stop a fire is to prevent it before it starts. Everyone should make fire prevention a daily habit in their homes.

Smoke detectors are required by law

According to Arnold Miranda, fire inspector, "It is now a federal law for everyone to have operative smoke detectors in their homes and business establishments."

For a three or less bedroom home, at least one smoke detector should be installed and for a four or more bedroom home, there should be at least two installed, suggested Mr. Miranda.

The best areas to install them is in the hallways and dining or living area. "Do not install them in the kitchen, or they may never stop going off," he commented.

Smoke detectors should be tested routinely, at least every month. The life expectancy for batteries in battery operated detectors is approximately one year, therefore batteries should be changed within a timely manner. Faulty alarms should be replaced immediately. If you live in base housing and you detect a fault in your detector, contact the housing office at 3047, for replacement.

Smoke alarm saves child's life

When polled, Americans say their worst fear is either drowning or burning in a fire. Recently, a Goodfellow family had to confront one of those fears. Fortunately, fast action on the part of the family members and a little help from modern technology, lessened the tragedy.

After a day of playing in the sun outside her family's home, Darla Hyche, 5, daughter of SSgt. Philip and Lisa Hyche, lay down in her bed with her doll, Peter, for a nap like she did every afternoon.

This nap turned out to be much more eventful than others. Faulty wiring in an electrical outlet started a fire in her room. As she lay sleeping, flames were crawling up the side of her bed.

According to Mrs. Hyche, "I was at the other end of the house when I heard the fire alarm near the kids' rooms go off. From where I was, I couldn't see any smoke or fire and I didn't smell anything burning."

She went through the house and didn't see anything until she got to her daughter's room. "My mouth dropped open. Darla's bed was on fire as she lay in it," said Mrs. Hyche.

"The fire alarm woke me up," said the unharmed little girl. "When my mom came into the room, I asked her why it was going off."

"After I pulled her out of her room, she just stood and stared at

her bed. I tried throwing water on the flames, but it didn't help, so I got my boys and took them outside with Darla," said Mrs. Hyche. She then called 911 for help.

"It seemed like forever before the fire department got here. I guess it was really only three or four minutes."

But that was enough time for the fire to burn or scorch everything within the little girl's room. "All my dolls and clothes got burned. I don't even have a pillow anymore," said Darla.

"It's the smoke alarm that saved her," said Sergeant Hyche. "If the alarm didn't smell out the fire as soon as it did, we might not have gotten her out in time. It saved my family and my house. I'll never live in a house unless it has several alarms in it. We always test the alarms every couple of weeks, and the kids know what to do if they go off."

"To think the bed was burning while she was sleeping in it scares me to death! The alarm definitely saved her," said Mrs. Hyche.

F-82: almost gone, forgotten

The unique F-82 twin Mustang was developed near the end of World War II in an attempt to improve on the legendary P-51 Mustang and to provide long-range fighter escorts for B-29s in their raids on the Japanese home island.

The F-82 was not really two Mustang fuselages mounted on a single wing, although it appeared so at first glance. Actually, it was an entirely new aircraft.

One fuselage held the pilot, and a full set of flight controls and instruments. The other was for a radar observer, and contained primary flight controls and limited instruments.

The twin Mustang far exceeded the flight performance of any piston-engine fighter of its time. It could reach a speed of 465 miles per hour and had a range of 2,500 miles. Aerobatics were totally unrestricted, and even the later addition of a huge radar pod didn't slow the F-82 or hinder its maneuverability.

Single-engine performance, always a critical factor for twin-engine aircraft, was outstanding. Due to the relationship of the propeller rotation, the F-82, unlike many aircraft, required no trim changes. It flew almost as well on one engine as two.

With the massive scrapping of surplus aircraft at the end of the war, the F-82 was nearly forgotten. Col. Robert Thacker's record breaking 15 hour, 5,000-mile flight from Hawaii to New York in a twin Mustang nicknamed "Betty Jo" was largely responsible for keeping these aircraft out of the graveyard.

During this period, home base for the F-82 was the 4th Night Fighter Squadron in Japan. The squadron was plagued with operational problems due to the aircraft being dismantled in the United States, shipped halfway around the world, reassembled and modified.

Maintenance crews worked night and day to achieve an encompassing rate of only 30 percent. Herculean efforts by the crew gradually improved this record, but it seemed that as soon as one problem was solved another cropped up—such as drop tanks that would not drop.

With the outbreak of the Korean War in 1950, three squadrons of F-

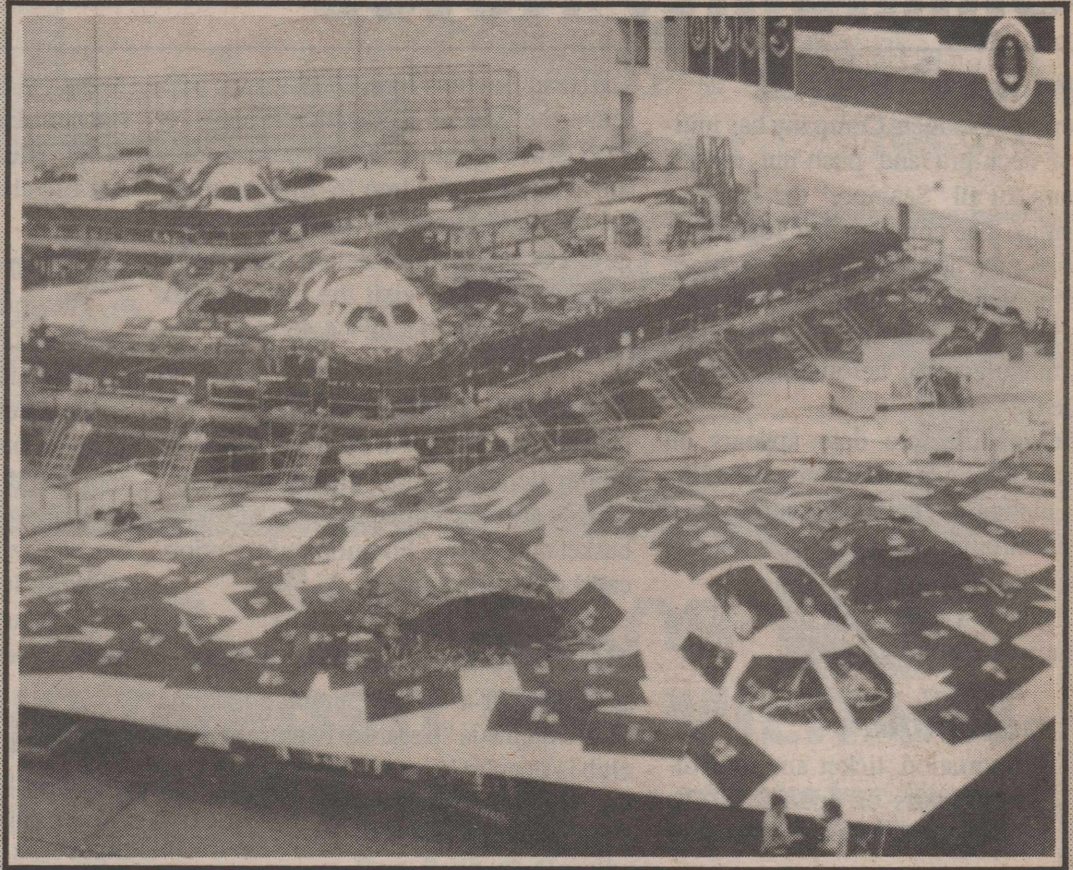
82s — the 4th, 68th and 339th — were assembled in northern Japan and began flying combat patrols over Seoul, the South Korean capital.

On June 27, a flight of twin Mustangs from the 68th was attacked by Russian-built YAK-II fighters flown by North Koreans. Lt. William Hudson shot down one of the YAKs, scoring the first American aerial combat victory of the conflict.

Aerial combat was turned over to jet fighters as the Korean War progressed. The F-82 was reassigned to attacking ground targets, a role at which it also excelled.

By the end of the Korean War, the appearance of more new aircraft and a critical shortage of spare parts had put the twin Mustang out of business.

So rare is the F-82 today, that only one flying model exists — property of the Confederate Air Force in Texas — and a mere handful may be found on display in air museums.
