## UPT Class 89-10 pins on wings

Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 89-10 graduates today at the Officers' Open Mess.

Guest speaker for the graduation is Col. John C. "Clark" Griffith, director of assignments, Headquarters Air Force Military Personnel Center, Randolph AFB, Texas.

Colonel Griffith completed pilot training at Craig AFB, Ala.

Colonel Griffith served as commander of the 64th Air Base Group at Reese from 1985 to July 1986.

A parents' social starts at 5:15 p.m., followed by the graduation ceremony at 5:50 p.m. Cocktails begin at 7 p.m. followed by the dinner dance at 7:45 p.m.

During the graduation ceremony, several members of the class will receive awards for performance during the year of pilot training.

The awards are: Commander's Trophy (top graduate), Distinguished Graduate, Leadership Award, Outstanding Second Lieutenant, Flying Training (Top Stick) and Academic Training. Also, awards will be presented to the outstanding academic instructor and instructor pilots in T-37 and T-38.

Two crew chiefs will also be presented awards, as best T-37 and T-38 crew chief.

Five students have been given follow-on assignments here. Returning instructor pilots from the class are: 2nd Lts. Andrew Gogan, Charles Greenwald, Kevin Lyons, Joseph Murff and Steven Stater.

## Promotion boards change to once a year

According to MSgt. Abe Williams, noncommissioned officer in charge of promotions and testing, revisions are being made to the captain and major promotion programs beginning with the next captain board.

Full year groups will meet each captain promotion board starting with the calendar year 1989B board convening Sept. 25. First lieutenants with a date of

rank in 1988 will meet this board.

Also effective with this board, officers promoted to captain are obligated to one year of active-duty service when pinned. This commitment will run concurrently with any other active-duty commitment.

This policy has no impact on officers who have a five-year commitment for undergraduate navigator training or an

eight-year commitment for undergraduate pilot training.

Starting in 1990, there will be only one captain board each year. This change will not affect pin-on time to captain. First lieutenants will still pin on captain after two years' time in grade.

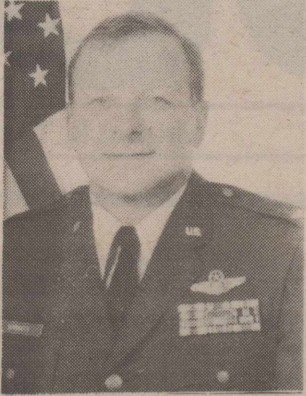
For the major promotion board, below-the-zone eligibility for promotion from captain to major changes from

three considerations to two beginning with the calendar year 1989 board convening Dec. 4. This change makes below zone consideration for major, lieutenant colonel and colonel the same.

## From the Ramp

"When the going gets tough, the tough..." It seems like we just keep asking and asking from the mission support team. After a couple of busy months preparing for a successful inspector general visit, we ought to be able to relax; however, the weather had a severe impact on flying operations during that same IG preparation period. We tend to think of weather effects in day-to-day terms. What we are now faced with is an accumulation of the loss of many partial days of flying...the deficit in missions flown caused by crosswinds, low ceilings, high density altitudes (hot temps) is now well over 500 T-38 sorties...sorties we are all going to have to help make up.

The crystal ball also tells me the center runway is due to close for repairs. The work is to start June 17 and last about six weeks. As maintainers, that really has little to do with our business. It does mean that operations can't surge, probably will fly fewer T-38 aircraft at one time (i.e. a moderate cap)...to keep from saturating the T-38 runway. To catch up with this cap, we will probably need to fly more days...weekends. As we approach this challenge, we will try to work smarter, not just harder.

We did a lot of things right while the IG was on base. They certainly were impressed with the overall maintenance operation. Many of our units really smoked 'em. But we got off to a rocky start the first couple of nights — the tornado forecasts forced us into hangaring of T-38s and we had some problems with our basic postflights.

**Hangaring** — the way you folks jumped to the task to protect our aircraft was impressive. Word trickles back to Lubbock about the weather damage the Army helicopters suffered at Fort Hood (south of Dallas) — over 100 helicopters damaged, repair costs tabulated in the hundreds of millions of dollars. That catastrophe reinforces our understanding of the need to hangar — it is important. What was not as impressive was our failure to maintain stringent safety practices throughout the hangaring process. In our enthusiasm to protect our birds we sometimes moved tugs too fast, forgot to wear reflective belts, failed to properly ground aircraft, etc. While I really appreciated your "can do" attitude, we need to slow down a bit and do those things right — and we will. That is easy.

**Basic Postflights** — a harder issue to tackle. Basic postflights are the "meat and potatoes" of swing shift. After the flying is over, swing shift guys and gals go over the aircraft with a fine tooth comb. That is our chance — maintenance's — to look at and fix the birds after they have flown a number of strenuous sorties. We must ensure that our aircraft meet command standards and are ready to go for another day's rigorous flying. Integrity demands that we perform that duty to the best of our ability.

As maintainers we know what the standards are. We are well trained and have a good handle on the required job knowledge — so said our quality assurance and the IG. Our facilities are excellent and we have the tools to do the job. Now we just have to have the discipline during those late nights to do the basic postflights right.

Your T-37 and T-38 branch chiefs, Quality Assurance, Organizational Maintenance Squadron supervision and I have agreed upon basic postflight pass rate standards which will assist us in bringing the basic postflight program up to par. These standards are:

T-37 — 80 percent

T-38 — 75 percent

The ball is in your court — take your best shot!

## To move or not to move

That is the question nearly 800 Reese maintainers are facing, and have been for some time. The uncertainties involved in any major mission change which creates personnel moves cause some severe anxieties and frustrations.

Be assured that the personnel community here at Reese, Headquarters Air Training Command and Air Force Military Personnel Center are working very hard to prevent any type of family or individual hardships in connection with this transition.

Twenty-three people already have received overseas assignments during March and April. Most of these were volunteers. ATC has advised us that we can expect another drop of overseas assignments in July.

Any of you out there who want to go overseas next spring need to doublecheck your dreamsheets at CBPO customer service. Ask them to call up the data from the system, don't just check the form. We want to make absolutely certain what we have is what the Military Personnel Center has.

Another question has arisen concerning our personnel who are assigned permanent change of station to the ACE detachments. Since the aircraft maintenance functions at the bases where they are will still have military assigned, they

are not considered to be in must move status. They will be absorbed within the parent wing unless, of course, they get picked up during the normal assignment cycle.

What happens to the folks who won't have retainability for a PCS move next spring? We have 24 first term airmen in the field maintenance squadron and 53 in the organizational maintenance squadron who have normal dates of separation between January and June of next year.

These people still have all the same options they would have if we were not converting; such as CAREERS Retraining, PALACE CHASE, Special Duty Assignments, and the like.

The only option not open is staying at Reese without retraining or separating. Further discussion with AFMPC on these programs indicate that all CAREERS quotes will be calendar year 90 and the optimum time to apply for PALACE CHASE IS AFTER Dec. 1, 1989.

Most of the vacancies in the National Guard units come open in the spring and getting the applications in before the first of the year will allow them to plug you into one of those vacancies with separation in March or April.

Finally, concerning people with special children (Children Have A Potential) or those with Join Spouse needs,

individuals with special children need to let us (personnel) know that now, so we can let ATC and AFMPC know through the CHAP application process.

Customer service will make you an appointment for counseling. Those of you with military spouses, take heart. The success rate for keeping the spouses together during the previous conversions is nearly 100 percent.

You, however, also need to visit customer service. Doublecheck your join spouse intent code in our data system and once again, don't just check what is on the form, have them call it up from the computer.

In summary, the overseas assignments we get in July will be the last prior to the arrival of the team from ATC and AFMPC to make the CONUS assignments. That visit is still on track for the middle to the end of August. Please help us to help you and make these moves as smooth as possible.

Don't listen to or pass on rumors. If it concerns anything at all to do with personnel actions, give us a call. The new base career advisor, SSgt. Jim Leonard, came here from Laughlin and is very familiar with the conversion process. Call his at 3802.

If you are happy with the service you receive in the CBPO tell somebody out there. If you are not happy, then let us know (Chief Greenwell, 3445).

## Tips add to bike safety

For pure relaxation and enjoyment, riding a bike is hard to beat. Millions have found that not only is it economical and healthy, it's a great way for the entire family to participate in wholesome recreation.

The majority of the time you ride, you'll be sharing the road with vehicles of all shapes and sizes. Since bicycles are the most vulnerable participant in the highway system, it is in your own best interest to observe the rules and protect yourself against the carelessness of others.

### RIDING THE BIKE:

#### See What's There —

The first step in riding safely is knowing what traffic around you is likely to do.

Frequently looking over your left and right shoulder will keep you informed of changing traffic conditions. Most people tend to steer where they look. Practice the skill of steering straight ahead while checking for traf-

fic.

#### Be Seen —

Step two in safe bike riding is making sure that the moving traffic sees you.

For day riding, a fluorescent-colored flag on a flexible six-foot pole is excellent for drawing attention to yourself. Wearing bright-colored clothing or a reflective jacket can also help motorists notice you. This gives them more time to adjust their driving and leave you plenty of room.

When riding after dark, you must have a front lamp that gives a white light visible for at least 500 feet. A clear white reflector must also be visible from the front. A red rear reflector or tail light must be visible for at least 300 feet. Wear light colored clothes and, if possible, wear a reflective jacket. For both day and night riding, it pays to keep your reflectors clean.

#### Listen To Traffic —

Your exposure to the elements allows you to hear traffic sounds indicat-

ing approaching vehicles. Be sensitive to these early signs of potential hazards.

#### Moving In Traffic —

Because you're the operator of a moving vehicle, you must obey traffic laws. Most important to bike riders are:

- Stay on the right side of the street, near the curb. Move with traffic and watch for parked cars turning into traffic or car doors opening suddenly.

- Ride in single file when you are with others.

- Obey all traffic signs, signals, and road markings.

- Use hand signals to indicate a turn, lane change or stop.

- Walk your bike across all busy intersections.

- Do not carry packages that interfere with vision or control.

- Never weave from lane to lane or hitch a ride on moving vehicles.

- Yield to motorized vehicles about to cross in front of you. Do this even when you have the right-of-way if there is any indication the other person is not going to yield.

#### Road Hazards —

Bikes are the most susceptible vehicle to changing road conditions. A hard fall can put a quick end to an enjoyable bike trip.

Be on the lookout for sewer gratings and manhole covers with openings large enough to trap your tires. Avoid loose gravel, pot-holes, and broken glass. They can cause you to lose control. Avoid wet weather if possible; moisture on the brakes may result in a longer stopping distance.

# Services held for Reese pilot

Memorial services were held Thursday for Capt. David M. Brandt, the pilot who died Monday after his T-38 crashed approximately two miles south of Cannon AFB, N.M.

Captain Brandt, who was in the 54th Flying Training Squadron's Pilot Instructor Program, was on a training mission when the accident occurred.

Also on board was Capt. Kevin L. Carrara, an instructor pilot with the 54th FTS. Captain Carrara received minor injuries and was ad-

mitted to the Cannon hospital for observation.

Captain Brandt, 26, was single. He was a native of Nashville, Tenn., and he earned his pilot wings at Vance AFB, Okla. His first flying assignment took him to Eaker AFB, Ark., where he flew the B-52 Stratofortress.

He arrived at Reese in April and began training for an assignment as an instructor pilot with the 54th FTS.

The accident is under investigation by a board of qualified officers.

# Hospital participates in joint exercise

Everyone familiar with the military knows that readiness is vital to mission accomplishment, particularly where medical units are concerned.

In an effort to maintain the highest level of readiness possible, personnel from USAF Hospital Reese and the Army Reserve's 829th Station Hospital took part in a joint-service exercise June 2 through Sunday.

Approximately 100 Air Force and 125 Army personnel took part in the training.

According to Sgt. Kathryn Johnson, non-commissioned officer-in-charge of medical readiness at the Reese hospital, the exercise involved all aspects of medical care associated with a wartime environment.

"We spent two days training in the base theater, and that led up to a mass casualty exercise in front of the (Reese) hospital," Sergeant Johnson said.

According to the sergeant, some of the more important aspects of the training included wartime stress, patient transportation, chemical warfare defense training, triage and

patient decontamination.

The experience of working under wartime conditions wasn't the only benefit of the joint exercise. "If the 829th were working in the same area as an Air Force hospital and we were both overrun (with casualties), it's not out of the question that we'd merge and pool our resources," said 1st Lt. Mike Keller, officer-in-charge of the 829th's Reese contingent. "This exercise gives us a chance to test that."

About 75 "casualties" were treated during

the exercise. Medical personnel had to deal with injuries that were complicated, in some cases, by chemical contamination.

The training is an annual requirement for Air Force medical personnel.

The Reese hospital will take part in another joint medical exercise June 22, this time with several local hospitals. Sergeant Johnson said that volunteers are needed to play the part of casualties during that exercise. Anyone interested can contact her at 6110.

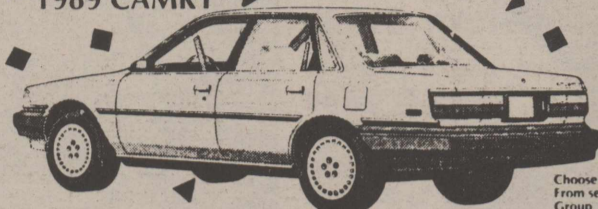

**DoD approves VHA increases**

The assistant secretary of defense for force management and personnel has approved a mid-year increase in the fiscal year 1989 variable housing allowance rates. It went into effect June 1.

Members residing off base in certain locations who do not already receive VHA may receive a small payment beginning June 1.

The table below reflects the monthly increase for members currently receiving VHA.

This increase is made possible due to unobligated FY1989 VHA funds. The rate increase is intended to reduce members' out-of-pocket absorption from the current level of 21.5 percent.

Since actual amounts are computed using multipliers, slight rounding may occur. Increases will be reflected in June's mid-month payroll.

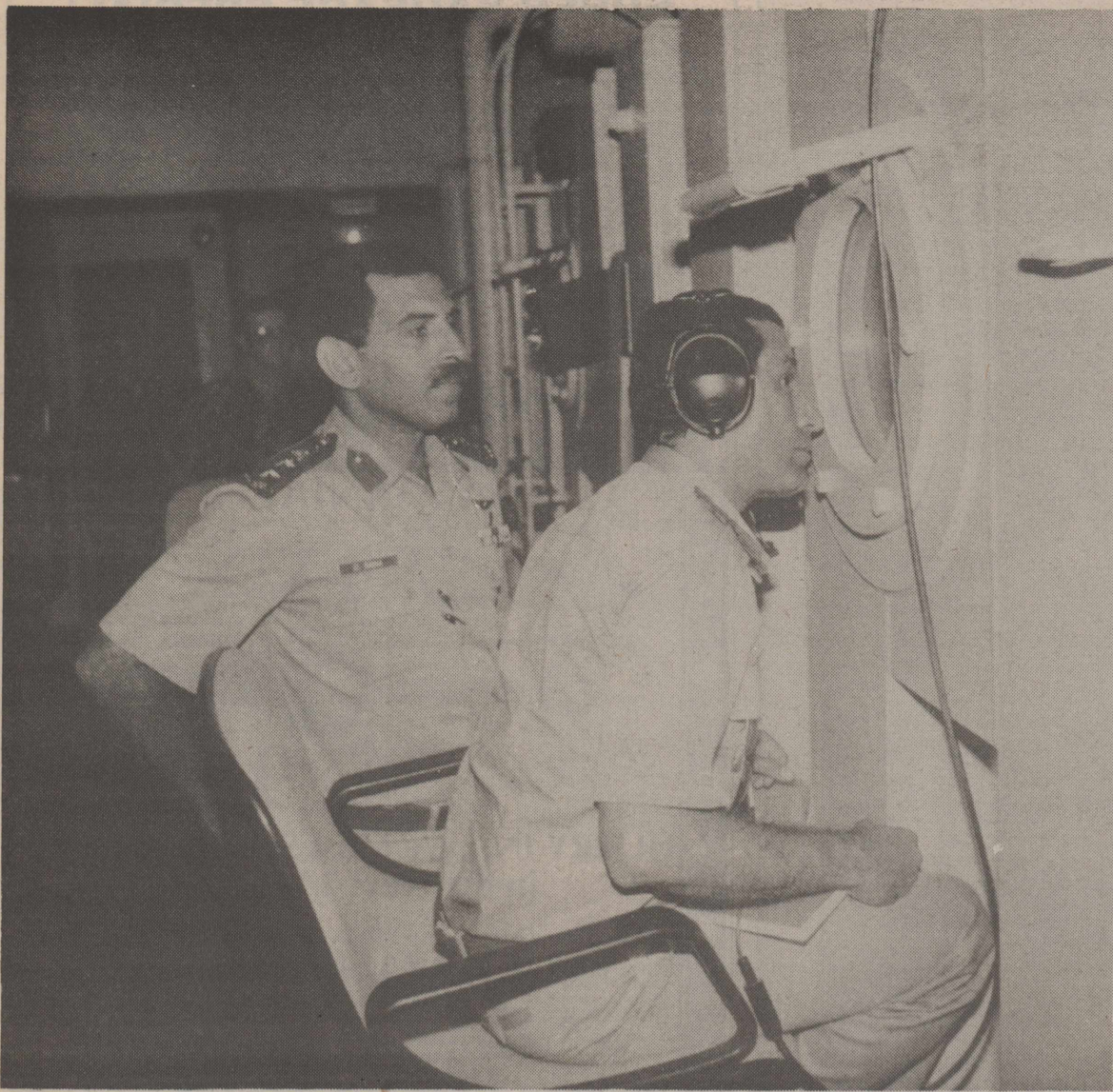

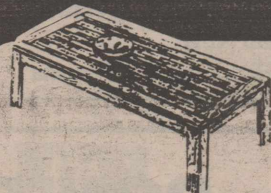

## Deadline nears

People who entered the military between July 1, 1985 and June 30, 1988, and did not have a break in service during that period have a deadline of June 30 to enroll in the Montgomery GI Bill. In order to be eligible, members must elect to take a \$1,200 reduction in pay or make a \$1,200 cash payment while still on active duty. Payments can be made by a minimum monthly allotment of \$100 for 12 months. In return, the

enrollees receive a basic payment of \$300 per month for 36 months or \$10,800 in total benefits. For more information, contact the education center, 3469.

## GI Bill

Active duty and veterans who are eligible for benefits under Chapter 34 (Vietnam-era GI Bill) may attain conversion rights for benefits under the Chapter 30 (Montgomery GI Bill). Vietnam-era eligibles are basically entitled to educational assistance for a period of one and one half months for each month of service on active duty after Jan. 31, 1955, up to 45 months. Chapter 34 and benefits accumulated with it expire Dec. 31. Conversion eligibles may transfer any remaining Vietnam-era GI Bill benefits, up to 36 months, to the new GI Bill. Converted benefits under the new program will be slightly greater than under the Vietnam-era program. For more information, contact the education center, 3469.

## Who pays surcharges?

The following is a policy for payment of the surcharge and who can and cannot eat at the Caprock Cafe.

\*Permanent party enlisted members may eat any meal in the dining facility without being charged a surcharge. Those wanting to eat the midnight meal must be in uniform.

\*Temporary duty enlisted members receiving per-diem must pay the surcharge.

\*Temporary duty and permanent party officers not designated as representatives of the base commander's evaluation team, may only eat breakfast in the dining facility or when no other adequate dining facility is available.

\*Permanent change of station personnel (coming and going) and their dependents, while residing in billeting, may eat any meal excluding the midnight meal at the Caprock Cafe. Members must present a copy of their orders and their billeting key to the cashier. Officers, officers' dependents and dependents of E-5's and up must pay the applicable surcharge.

\*Contract food service employees may purchase meals during

working hours in the Caprock Cafe and will only be charged the meal rate.

\*Participants in special events, such as sports groups, ROTC and Boy/Girl Scouts, must have approval from the 3500th Services Squadron commander to eat in the Caprock Cafe and the method of payment will be determined at the time of coordination. Coordination must be accomplished at least three weeks prior to the special event to ensure availability.

\*Dependents of military and civilian employees may eat in the Caprock Cafe under certain adverse conditions if authorized by the installation commander, based on emergency conditions, financial hardships experienced during a PCS while awaiting housing or "special holidays" decided upon by the Secretary of Defense.

\*Retired military personnel are authorized to eat at the Caprock Cafe when no other adequate feeding facilities are available or on special occasions as the guest of an active duty enlisted member who will pay the surcharge.

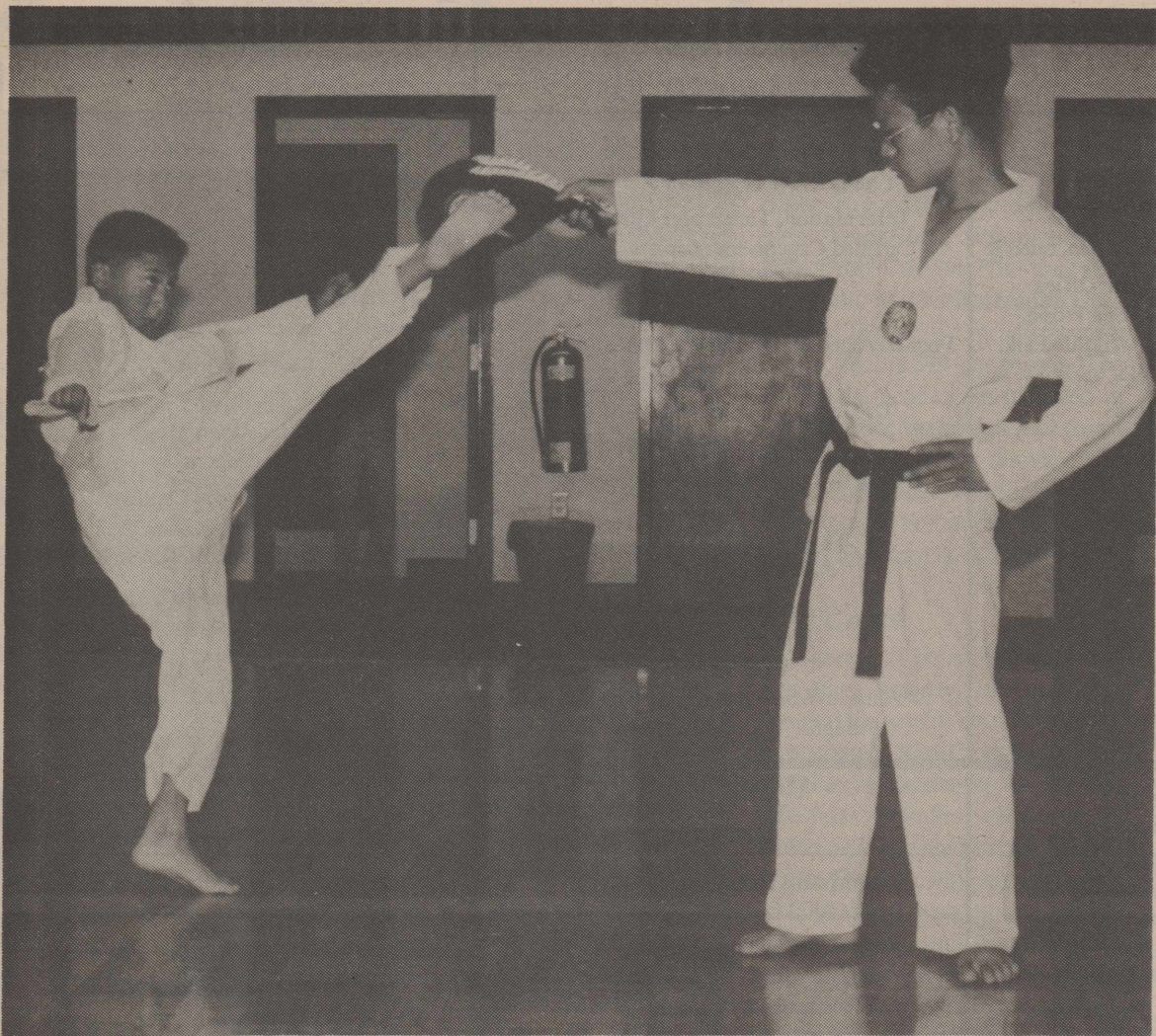
