TIMELY DISHES

WHEN the chicken left from dinner is not enough to serve again, a few suggestions for such leftovers are helpful.

Chicken Custard.

Cut off every scrap of meat from the bones and put them through the meat grinder. Mix the meat with an equal measure of cooked rice, season with salt, pepper and press in a round form in the center of a baking dish. Chicken Scrapple.

Into a quart of chicken stock, bolling hot, stir a pint of cornmeal. Season to taste and cook slowly for a half hour, then add any bits of cooked chicken and pour into a mold. When cold cut in neat slices and fry.

Fish Croquettes.

Take two cupfuls of cold boiled fish, two cupfuls of mashed potatoes, one tablespoonful of butter, one-half cupful of hot milk, salt, pepper and parsley and a teaspoonful of minced onion. Form into balls, dip in beaten egg, roll in crumbs and fry in hot fat. Drain on brown paper.
