
### Commander's Perspective

I spoke to the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce **Armed Services Commit**tee this week about Reese and I thought you might be interested in what I said about the base—and you, the people who make it work.

First of all, I talked about the critical impor-

viability of our pilot force.



Then I told them why Reese is so well-suited to perform this important mission. We talked about airspace, and the easy access to training areas we have here. ## Drugs: dealing an illegal deck

In the game of chance, there is one sure way of losing: dealing with illegal drugs. Sooner or later your ace is going to come up and it's up to you if you're going to win or lose.

If you've been in the Air Force for more than a few years, you've probably already had your chance for participation in the urinalysis testing program at

At Reese and the other bases throughout Air Training Command a preselected number of people are chosen monthly to be tested.

The number of participants for each test may differ from month to month. During some months, only a few may be tested, while other months, entire squadrons are required to provide a

"The key to successful testing is keeping it at random," said Capt. Bill Kraus, area defense council.

Something to keep in mind about random urinalysis testing is that it is another form of inspection, just like dormitory and random automobile

There are some common ways an individual can be selected for urinalysis testing, including probable cause consent and command-directed.

"If someone shows positive in a random or probable-cause test, at minimal, that person will be subject to a court-martial. For a positive, non-probable-clause test that person will receive an administrative discharge," said Captain Kraus.

Air Force illegal substance tests are very extensive. If a sample comes up positive, it is re-tested, under a more specific test to ensure an accurate reading. Air Force substance abuse levels

are set higher than test requirements to minimize the possibility of error.

"Cocaine, marijuana and a drug of the month (chosen by Brooks AFB, Texas where the samples are tested) are checked for in each urinalysis sample," the captain commented.

The Military Rules of Evidence recognize that a commander may use inspections to maintain morale and discipline throughout the unit. However, the commander cannot use an inspection to focus on one particular person. Therefore, if a person is suspected of use, the commander cannot add that person's name to the random list.

Captain Kraus reminds everyone that when providing a sample, report all recent uses of drugs, whether it's prescription medication, over-the-counter diet pills or just plain aspirin.

"It's easier for everyone to get the facts out beforehand, than to try and prove your innocence after the fact," he cautioned.

The Fourth Amendment to the Constitution protects military members and civilians against unreasonable search and seizure. A probable-cause urinalysis complies with the Fourth Amendment because it is based upon someone's (usually the commander's) reasonable belief that a crime has been committed and is therefore not unreasonable. Just as in a random urinalysis tests, evidence obtained from a probable-cause urinalysis can be used against a person in court or administrative proceedings. If an administrative proceeding results in discharge, the urinalysis may also be used to characterize the member's discharge.

Often a commander will ask an individual for consent when he suspects the person has been using drugs, but lacks

enough information to establish probable cause. Those results can also be used against a person in court or administrative proceedings.

If you are being asked to consent to a urinalysis test, you have the right to refuse to provide a sample. However, your right to withhold your consent does not apply to random, probable-cause or command directed testing.

"No one should give consent to a urinalysis test prior to talking to myself," said Captain Kraus. "Guilty or innocent, everyone should be made aware of their rights and possible consequences."

If a person refuses to consent, the commander has the option of ordering the person to provide a sample. This is known as a command-directed test Positive results may be used to adminis tratively discharge an individual. But, results cannot be used to characterize the individual's service because a command-directed urinalysis is based soley on suspicion, not probable cause. However, because of the military's unique responsibility for providing national defense, the law allows a commander to use these tests to ensure that members in the unit are fit for duty.

"Any no shows, without a justified reason, will be hunted down and by command-direct given either a letter of reprimand or an Article 15," the captain said.

If you're unsure of the reason for being selected for urinalysis testing, you have the right to ask.

"Also, if you feel you are being singled out, I can help you verify whether you are or not," he concluded.

# National security must be preserved

Granting of a security clearance is based upon a favorably completed background check, by the Defense Investigative Service or the Office of Personnel Management, in an effort to assess an individuals trustworthiness toward preserving national security.

Once a security clearance has been granted by the Air Force Security Clearance Office, an individual may be granted access to classified information by his commander, based on a need for access/need to know basis.

Individuals, themselves, must recognize and avoid the kind of personal behavior that would make their loyalty, reliability or trustworthiness unjustifiable within the interest of national security.

Supervisors are then responsible for ensuring that those individuals receive recurring security training, in accordance with Air Force Regulation 205-1, chapter

The continuing evaluation of security eligibility begins with the granting of a security clearance and concludes once the clearance is withdrawn. This is performed by commanders, supervisors and coworkers to assess an employee's

reliability and suitability for continued access to classified informa-

Personal behavior including information about financial, alcohol, drug, marital or emotional problems, as well as job performance, must be monitored.

Individuals, themselves, must recognize and avoid the kind of personal behavior that would make their loyalty, reliability or trustworthiness unjustifiable within the interest of national secu-

In addition to the problems mentioned above, individuals must report promptly to their security manager, commander or the Air Force Office of Special Investiga-

\* Any form of contact, intentional or otherwise, with any citizen of a country with interests hostile to those of the United States, unless such contact occurs as directed functions of an individual's official duties.

\* Any attempts by anyone to: cultivate a friendship or offer money payments or bribery to obtain information of intelligence value; obtain classified or unclassified information through observation, collection of documents, personal contact, blackmail or by threats or promised os assistance to relatives or friends.

\* Personnel with secret security clearances must report personal foreign travel to designated countries, outlined in Air force regulation 205-32, paragraph 7-0.

Those holding top secret clearances must report all foreign travel. Spur-of-the moment travel by top secret clearance holders may be reported the first duty day following return.

We are all responsible for understanding the standards of conduct required of persons holding positions of trust.

Through recurring security education, increased awareness and continuing evaluation, we will be able to preclude compromise of classified information and re-

### reservist program versus un

The individual mobilization augmentee program consists of men and women who previously served on active duty in a wide variety of career fields.

An IMA is a ready reserve member assigned to a regular Air Force unit against an individual manpower authorization established to support the period immediately following a declaration of war or natural emergency or to respond to any situation that national security requires in accordance with Air Force Manual 26-1.

Most of these people serve in the Air Force Reserves in jobs related to their active duty experiences. Although, unlike reservists in the unit program who train with their own group one weekend a month, IMA's work side by side with active duty members in their own military

The concept behind the IMA program is that if called to active duty, the IMA would augment the

active duty organization with which he or she trains.

Training in the IMA program is truly unique. The active duty supervisor and the IMA decide upon a schedule of training. Therefore, training is scheduled at a time when the Air Force can provide meaningful training.

The IMA also has the same flexibility in scheduling the annual twoweek active-duty tour, which can be taken any any time during the

Another unique characteristic of program with the same rank they

the IMA program is that the IMA does not have to live in the same geographic area in which they are assigned. It is not unusual, for instance, for an IMA to live in Texas and have an assignment in California. In this case, arrangements can be made for the IMA to be attached at a base closer to home. Regardless of where the monthly training is conducted, the annual active duty tour is usually spent at the unit of assignment.

Generally, an IMA enters the

held in active duty. All previous active duty time counts toward pay and retirement.

Each year you have previously spent on active duty counts as one good year. The balance you will need to complete the 20 years of retirement pay and privileges comes with each year you successfully meet minimum training requirements in the IMA program.



### Lawnmower safety tips

More than 62,000 people are injured in lawnmower accidents annually.

Some accidents are caused from carelessness such as fueling a hot lawnmower, smoking while fueling or mowing lawns in bare feet or shower

Before using or cleaning your lawnmower follow these safety tips:

• Do not smoke while fueling your mower. Gasoline is explosive.

· Wait for your mower to cool before refueling. Five minutes should be sufficient.

· Store and pour gasoline carefully, and above all, keep it in an approved metal container.

· If you do your own cleaning and tune-ups, disconnect the spark plug or remove it before you start maintenance. If a blade is turned by hand, the mower might start if the plug is still connected.

· Always turn your mower off. In the few seconds it takes to run inside the house the mower

could run over someone and cause a serious acci-

· Check electric mowers for frayed or damaged cords. Frayed insulation added to a metal mower and damp or wet grass can cause lethal shocks or severe electrical burns.

• The last tip concerns footwear. Half or more of the 62,000 injuries could be prevented if shoes were worn. Remember to protect your feet from sharp objects or thrown rocks.





## Bush proposes conventional arms reductions

American Forces Information Service

During the NATO summit May 29, President George Bush asked the allies to join in a four-point proposal to bring the Conventional Forces in Europe negotiations to a speedy conclusion.

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney said Bush's proposals, if implemented, "would alter the military balance in Europe, ending the overwhelming Soviet conventional superiority, which has existed since the 1940s."

He added, "It (the proposal) would also lead to a situation of far

By Tom Joyce reduced prospects for conflict."

The president's proposal includes that:

· The alliance lock in Eastern acceptance of the proposed Western limits on key portions of their ground forces.

This includes ceilings on number of tanks (20,000 for each side). armored troop carriers (28,000 for each side), and artillery pieces (from 16,500 to 24,000 for each side, depending on questions of definition).

Equipment reduced would be destroyed.

Under these provisions, the greater stability, with significantly Warsaw Pact would have to destroy

tens of thousands of weapon systems.

 NATO expand its proposal to extend, for the first time, the concept of conventional arms control to all land-based combat aircraft and helicopters in the Atlantic-tothe-Urals area. Each side would be required to reduce its holdings to a level of 15 percent below the current NATO level. Again, all reduced equipment would be destroyed.

 The United States and Soviet ground and air forces be reduced in the Atlantic-to-Urals zone to about

275,000 each. To meet this ceiling, the Soviets would have to reduce their forces in Eastern Europe by about 325,000. Withdrawn forces from each side would be demobi-

· Both sides accelerate their timetable for reaching a Conventional Forces in Europe agreement. Noting that the Soviet Union has referred to a target date of 1997, Bush's proposal calls for agreement within six months to a year and accomplishment of the reduction by 1992 or 1993.

Bush's proposal was strongly supported by the civilian and mili-

tary leadership of the Department of Defense, which had a major role in its preparation.

A statement issued by the White House noted that the United States has asked its allies to join in preparing this proposal for presentation in Vienna at the earliest possible date.

"As the Soviet Union and its allies indicate their readiness to change their national priorities and reduce their enormous military establishments, the United States and its allies are prepared to help realize their long-standing hope for a secure and less militarized Europe," the statement concluded.





## Reserve move rules change

ROBINS AFB, Ga. (AFNS) — Reservists may now move from one commuting area to another and join another Air Force Reserve unit even when a unit vacancy does

"Ideally, these reservists will be assigned to shortage positions," said MSgt. Stu Sims, chief of AFRES assignments control. "If necessary, they will be assigned as an overage so experienced personnel are not lost when they move."

If assigned as an overage, the reservist has two years to locate a unit vacancy, retrain or otherwise find a job.

Recent changes to the policy have af-

fected the grades which fall under the program and imposed certain limitations on unit reservists.

Senior master sergeants, chief master sergeants and lieutenant colonels and above are not eligible for the program. Also, reservists relocating within a commuting area or wishing an assignment within a commuting area are ineligible.

For example, if the member is currently living in the San Antonio and assigned to Travis AFB, Calif., this policy may not be used as authority for an assignment to Kelly AFB in San Antonio.

Several other limitations may affect re-

servists taking advantage of the program. Higher-grade reservists are ineligible if their assignment would create problems in the command and supervisory structure. Aircrew members are ineligible if the commander determines that the people required maintain the unit's wartime readiness.

Reservists being assigned as overages may not be overgraded but may, if desired, take a rank reduction to join the new unit. In addition, the losing commander must certify, in writing, the person meets all quality force standards and should be kept in the reserve.







### Dental clinic gives Reese happy faces

With summer upon us, many people are breaking out their barbecue grills and cooking up some summer favorites. Whether it's hamburgers, steaks, ribs or corn on the cob, most everyone has a favorite summer food.

Unfortunately, many people take for granted one of the things essential to enjoyment of any good meal — their teeth.

One organization that doesn't take this for granted is the dental clinic at USAF Hospital - Reese. The five dentists and nine enlisted people in the clinic strive to provide the best care possible for the approximately 1,000 people they see each month.

According to Lt. Col. (Dr.) Edward F. Wright, chief of the clinic, while none of the dentists specializes in a particular area of dentistry, three of them have had training beyond general dentistry.

"Our policies on the care we provide fluctuate, based on manning and workload, but we want to provide as much care as we possibly can for the base," said Dr. Wright.

The doctor explained that while they handle all care for active-duty members, there are some restrictions on care given to dependents and retirees.


Dependents of active-duty members and personnel who died on active duty can receive the following space-available care: oral exams with X-rays, cleanings, pit and fissure sealants, consultation, removal of wisdom teeth and fillings.

However, care for people in the above category is limited for people who are covered under the Dependent Dental Insurance Program. People who have DDIP can only receive space-available care for emergencies and for treatment not covered under the program.


Retirees and their families can receive the following spaceavailable care: oral examination with X-rays, consultation, cleanings and fillings.

If someone is scheduled for an appointment and fails to show up, their time will be used to provide care for other eligible people. People eligible for treatment are welcome to sit in the clinic waiting room to wait for stand-by care.

Clinic officials said that 7:30 a.m. is the most often missed appointment time. They added that patients are given a five-minute grace period before their time slot is given to someone else.

Taking care of those quality people and their families are what FSCs are all about, according to Lt. Col. Joan Blankenbeker, ATC's family support center project offi-

ATC currently has 10 family support centers in various stages of operation designed to coordinate and link families with existing base and community resources such as employment consultation and Air Force Aid Society, or services such as lending closets. "Our goal is to provide a one-stop point of referral or service," she said. "Everything you need can be found under one roof."

Full service centers are located at Chanute AFB, Ill., Lowry AFB, Colo., Mather AFB, Calif., and Sheppard AFB, Texas. Limited service FSCs are located here and at Goodfellow, Lackland, Laughlin AFBs, Texas, along with Keesler AFB, Miss., and Williams AFB,

Randolph AFB, Texas will be the 11th to come on line when it opens this fall, said the colonel. Vance AFB, Okla., and Columbus AFB, Miss., centers will open sometime in 1990.

Minnis, deputy director, Reese Family Support Center, "We have good referral services right now, and can assess on a case by case status what we can do to help. We want to help," he said.
