Commanders praise new system

The new undergraduate pilot training assignment process is receiving high marks from both students and commanders at Reese and several other Air Training Command bases.

Nearly 300 flyers have been affected by the change, which gives wing commanders a greater say in final aircraft assignments.

Commanders at flying training wings operating at Reese and Laughlin AFBs, Texas; Vance AFB, Okla.; Columbus AFB, Miss.; and Williams AFB, Ariz., have already made assignments for three classes of UPT students and are currently working a

Col. Monroe S. Sams, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, said student pilots are positive about the new assignment system. "They like the idea of having the people who know them best making the assignment decision," he said.

Under the change, the responsibility for putting the right person in the right aircraft during UPT has been shifted to the people who are more in tune with the potential and desires of new pilots. Now, flying training wing commanders match aircraft assignments with UPT students' skills, officership qualities and desires.

Previously, pilot training graduates were classified by advanced training recommendation boards as fighter-attack-reconnaissance or tanker-transport-bomber match has become an important aspect in qualified. Assignments were then deter- the success of the assignment change.

mined by the Air Force Military Personnel Center at Randolph AFB.

ATC operations officials explained the original intent of the change was to get away from labeling students. Graduates are considered universally qualified pilots, and ATC wanted to do away with the fighter qualified or non-fighter qualified designa-

The sets of skills for an OV-10 pilot, a B-52 pilot, an F-15 pilot or a T-37 instructor pilot and the missions associated with them are different, said ATC officials. The change allows wing commanders to match those skills with the requirements of the

While the final decision on "who gets what" belongs to wing commanders, they rely heavily on input from their operational staffs who work with the students on a regular basis.

The new process allows wing commanders to put more experienced judgment into the UPT assignment formula. No longer are the decisions made by AFMPC officials. Individual attributes of the pilots are considered at the local level.

Indications from wing commanders on down to UPT students reveal a strong consensus that the decision-making process is now at the right level. The personal involvement in making the officer-to-cockpit

Colonel Lloyd "Fig" Newton, 71st Flying Training Wing commander at Vance AFB, Okla., has found the majority of students at Vance AFB seem to like the new assignment process.

"Students enjoy the personalized attention to their particular desires for assignment," he said. "They also understand the needs of the Air Force better."

That's the view from the top. But what about the pilots who are affected by the new

Second Lt. Allen Tupy, who graduated June 9 from Class 89-10 here, was a member of one of the first classes to receive assignments under the new change. He admitted he was skeptical at first about its effectiveness. "But I found this new system benefits the Air Force by matching our abilities to the aircraft, while also being sensitive to our requests," he said.


First Lt. William Bumpus graduated from Class 89-10 at Columbus AFB. He received orders as a T-38 instructor pilot under the new program.

"Being a recent graduate, it's hard to say if this is a better system," he said. "However, I think it's good in that it's more personal. It allows guys who may not have looked good on paper to still get a fighter aircraft or one of their first choices because the people making the assignments know a lot more about the person's abilities."

ADCM looks at future for wing complex

August is just around the corner and there are many significant events coming up that will affect the wing and maintenance folks in particular.

On Aug. 9th, the long-awaited decision on the Reese maintenance conversion will be made. The command will announce whether a contractor or civil service has been selected to take over our maintenance outfit. (Implementation is set for Dec. 1, 1989.) Once the decision is announced, we can implement the Reese Maintenance Conversion Plan.

We will require the best efforts of all wing agencies and members to make the changeover process a smooth one.

The Air Training Command and Air Force Military Personnel Center personnel assignment team is tentatively scheduled to arrive Aug. 24 to brief and work assignments for maintenance personnel. The wing is making every effort to ensure this process works smoothly. (Details are being worked and more information will be provided through the maintenance squadron sections.)

☐ The Lear Siegler Contract Field Team arrived recently and started work on identifying and repairing cracks on the T-38 fleet. This 30-person team will be operating three docks in

Hangar 70. All aircraft will be X-rayed for cracks.

The type of repair will be dictated by the length of cracks and where they are found. Aircraft will be tested by functional check flight pilots before returning to the operational fleet. Up to five aircraft at a time may be tied up in the repair process and therefore unavailable for the daily flying schedule.

☐ The wing's preparations for the 1989 Torchlight competition are on track. Structural repair and corrosion control personnel worked hard to complete sheet metal repairs and paint selected aircraft.

Crew chiefs are "detailing" their aircraft into prize-winning shape with cockpit rehabilitation well underway. First Lt. Christopher Cook, CMSgt. Arthur Lowery, MSgt. John Verburgt and MSgt. Jimmy Jones are providing the dynamic maintenance leadership that will produce a winning team for the wing!

☐ August is also a time when many of our personnel are choosing to move on to other careers. MSgt. Leroy Hobbs from aerospace repair and MSgt. John Robertson from quality assurance recently retired. Jack Bittle from the egress shop moved on to Dallas.

CMSgt. Thomas McKnight will formally retire Aug. 1. The loss of these folks reminds us that the maintenance conversion is fast approaching.

Serving in the military has always called for ideals not in everyone

I'm going to share with you some views on the loss of trust in our country and, more importantly, touch on military values that seem to endure regardless of the year on the calendar.

Traveling around the country over the last few years, I have heard story after story of actual or alleged betrayal and cheating at most every level in our society. From the Central Intelligence Agency to Wall Street, the Congress, and yes, the military, it seemed no one could keep a secret —especially if there was something to be gained in telling it.

Dennis Levine, a New York investment broker earning more than \$1 million a year, was caught cheating so he could make even more. Ivan Boesky was fined \$100 million for his criminal activities. And, with each discovery came the desperate feeling that we were seeing only the tip of the iceberg, a feeling recently supported when two major defense contractors were investigated for procurement fraud. Of 14 people found guilty, two were Pentagon employees; one admitted to taking more than \$40,000 in bribes.

In the business world, cheating and betrayal costs only money. The other examples of betrayal are far more serious and reveal a change, perhaps, in the moral attitude in our country.

Former FBI agent Richard Miller was found guilty of passing secrets. In San Francisco, Jerry Whitworth, part of the Walker spy ring, was found guilty of selling sensitive Navy communications secrets to the KGB. Ronald Pelton was convicted of selling the Soviets highly sensitive information regarding the National Security Agency. And, in May, Petty Officer Craig Kunkle pleaded guilty to charges of attempting to sell anti-submarine secrets to foreign agents.

All this was more than enough to make one despair and hurt for America. Until one remembers that betrayal and mendacity aren't the only stories in America today.

A few days after learning of Pelton's conviction, we visited the Vietnam Memorial in Washington. On it are etched the names of more than 58,000 Americans — I knew some personally — who gave their country all the loyalty they had, with no hope for personal gain.

Now, among the many notes and items left beside the names on the wall are those that would touch the hardest of hearts. I offer but three:

"Johnny, your name is here as I knew it was. I made a rubbing of your name. I rubbed as hard as I could, because I hope if I could rub your name off the wall, you would come back. I just wanted you to know I'm now a middle-aged teacher in Roanoke; but even after all these years, I still love

and miss you terribly. Love, Sue."

The second, a weathered dog collar with a brass name tag neatly engraved with the following: "To my master, Frankie. Every day I waited for your return, until I could wait no longer."

And the last — more simple, perhaps, but no less poignant: "Ed, since your eyes have closed, mine have never ceased to cry. Love, Dad."

What a different story Johnny, Frankie or Ed would make about a far different sort of America, from the Dennis Levines and Robert Peltons that give us reason to curse.

And I suspect they were from people and places where your word still means something, and a friend isn't just a floating noun, quickly discarded, and just as easily forgotten—but a comrade, someone of value.

Unfortunately, the gift of loyalty these young men gave their country is not always carefully treated. And once given, the gift is too often easily forgotten and seldom, if ever, makes the news. As sadly underscored by the USS Stark and the recent explosion on the battleship Iowa, the currency or payment for combat and readiness is always death and casualties.

The values that characterize military service are no different today than when I enlisted in 1958 or when I was commissioned in 1966. Patriotism, commitment, self-discipline and personal courage are the quintessence of service and have stood the test of time and a changing world.

To paraphrase the words of Gen. Sir John Hackett: "A man or woman can be false, fleeting, shallow, a liar or a coward—in every way corrupt—and still be an outstanding engineer, a great artist or a computer wizard. But there's one thing they cannot be, and that's a good NCO or officer." It's this fundamental requirement and our unlimited liability which must set us apart from society and bond us together.

We all know the weapons, technology and environment of the military have changed; however, today's officers and NCOs must demonstrate the same personal leadership and characteristics, must take essentially the same kinds of action in combat, and must establish the same close bonds with their people as did the officers and NCOs of 100 years ago.

Throughout Civil War cemeteries in the South, an epitaph attributed to Gen. Robert E. Lee is found on the graves of unidentified soldiers: "None know who they are, but all know what they were." Gen. William T. Sherman, of Northern fame, when asked how he would like to be remembered, answered, "It's enough to know that I was a soldier."

That was good enough for him, it's good enough for me, and I know it's good enough for my comrades. We hope it's good enough for you. (ATC News Service)

Roundup

One on One

Lt. Col. John DiPiero 64th STURON commander



Editor's note: "One-on-One" is designed to give Roundup readers an insight on 64th Flying Training Wing/Reese officials. In addition, One-on-One will periodically profile visiting dignitaries and leaders in the local community. This week's interview is with Lt. Col. John DiPiero, 64th Student Squadron commander, and was conducted by Sgt. Kimberly Nelson, Roundup staff writer.

Q: As STURON commander, what are your duties?

A: My main responsibility is for the welfare and administration of the wing's undergraduate pilot training students. I am the squadron commander for all UPTs. In order to maintain my responsibilities, I rely heavily on class commanders, who are the liaison between the students and myself.

I am responsible for the academic training branch and maintaining its standards of academic professionalism. My duties also include the audio/visual branch and its learning center. This branch is very important for our assignment and graduation nights.

Last of all, and just as important, I'm also squadron commander of all enlisted people assigned to operations, which brings my personnel accountability to approximately 600 personnel.

Q: Having recently come from the Pentagon, how does your work philosophy in this environment differ from your Air Staff experiences?

A: At the Pentagon, I was fundamentally removed from the wing. I dealt mainly with Air Force policies, philosophical aspects of the military and warfare, current issues and management from the top.

While there, I worked among some of the higher-ranked individuals and therefore I acquired a more mature philosophy toward management and the Air Force as a whole. It was a great experience, one that I wouldn't trade for anything; although I'm glad to be back at wing level, working with the people in day-to-day flying operations.

Q: As the STURON commander, what challenges have you encountered regarding mission accomplishment?

A: The major challenge here is the amount of personnel

issues we're (STURON) required to work. Our responsibility is to support and academically train the students assigned to us. At the same time, when I make decisions to help, counsel, request awards or provide recommendations, not only do I have to make these decisions in the most positive interest of the students, but also in the best interest of the Air Force.

The STURON people are outstanding; therefore, my job is easy. But occasionally, when we encounter a problem, we must then initiate actions to protect everyone and at the same time keep the Air Force strong.

Q: Within the scope of the profession of arms, how do you balance officership versus airmanship among your students?

A: Officership is first, last and always the most important. Although, with the wing's mission, airmanship ranks a very

individual challenges. With approximately 300 students passing through Reese each year, we must separate the person from the class and respond personally to each individual. Everyone is different, therefore everyone has different problems. Some may be easy to handle with a simple counseling, while others may require additional training, more one-on-one involvement, and some may eventually require the hardest decision — explaining, "This just isn't for you."

Q: What is the programming schedule for UPTs?

A: There are three phases to UPT. In the first phase, ground training, we cover the academics and physiological training necessary to prepare the students for the aircraft. Phase two is T-37 training and phase three involves the T-38. In phases two and three, the students are taught basically the same flying fundamentals. In the T-37, students are introduced to jets and are allowed to grasp the fundamentals while in a slower aircraft with a pilot at their side. In the T-38 with the pilot seated behind, a student learns to assume control of the aircraft on their own. They also learn formation flying and how to pilot a high-performance aircraft.

Training lasts for 52 weeks, during which time students gain approximately 175 flying hours. Upon graduation, students are awarded with their Air Force wings.

Q: What are the factors in determining disqualification for UPT?

A: The major reason for disqualification is the inability to grasp flying. They are unable to make a landing or they have difficulty applying procedures learned to the actual applications in the air. Another reason for disqualification is a student's inability to overcome air sickness. Most students experience air sickness; I went through it. I just learned eventually how to tolerate it until I got over it.

Occasionally, students disqualify themselves through self-initiated elimination — most of the time this is because of personal reasons. When a student is disqualified, through flying deficiencies or SIE, we always counsel him to ensure the decision is in his best interest.

We also face administrative and medical reasons for disqualification, over which we have no control.

But not only must we graduate good pilots, we must also graduate a matured professional. Therefore, we place emphasis on officer skills and career development as well. Q: What are the greatest challenges/hurdles you encounter with UPT students?

A: There are no real problems as a whole, but we do face

Who could forget showing up at 64th Student Squadron on July 21, 1988, only to meet a bunch of second lieutenants from the Air Force Academy, all of whom you've never even seen before?

Of course, that only applies to those of us who read our orders correctly and bothered to show up on time. As for the rest of the class — how did it feel to be late on your very first day of undergraduate pilot training?

Lots of settling in needed to be done, including getting in line to live off base, trying to find our pay statements and learning how to pass a quarters inspection.

It seemed a long time before we got into bags and even longer before we were festooned with "Roll With It Baby" patches, courtesy of 2nd Lt. Mike Hebert. Parasailing and the altitude chamber came and went, along with rumors of how unfriendly "Crusaders" flight would be.

We began to fear the words, "Are there any remarks or questions?" at the end of the brief.

We became real Crusaders, however, when we paid our twenty dollars and received our official C-Flight mug and T-shirt. Now got caught crossing the 1st Lt. Ray Crownhart "red line of death" in which case we were reduced to C-Flight poster child

Our first stumbling block was initial solo - and stumbling it was. It was pretty bloody for a while, but most of us made it through. It was at this point Lieutenant Ramirez made Crusader history by allowing 1st Lt. Mike Schulenberg's helmet to get sucked into a T-37 intake while giving pointers to another student on his initial solo. Yes, the Ramrod helmet over in C-Flight has a story to tell.

We all had our chance to be shot down by the emergency procedure of the day sooner or later — even 2nd Lt. Jacqueline O. van Ovost caught shrapnel over her less-than-perfect recital of the spin boldface.

Near-death experiences were common among us all. (Especially those brave instructor pilots who were forced to fly with those of us who were a little unstable on their wing.)

The weather proved to be a worse "hammer" than our own IPs. As one person put it, "Send the Hawgs home so the weather will clear up and the rest of us can fly!" We must have set a Reese record for taking three weeks to complete night flying. Navigation and cross-country sorties took their toll on our class as we struggled to overcome a staggering twelve-day timeline deficiency.

Before departing Reese, we would like to we KNEW we were bad; unless of course we pay tribute to the real heroes — all of the IPs who took the time (and risked their lives!) to teach us how to fly. And to the Italian brothers who not only had to endure this pain, but had to endure it in English. We salute you.

Twenty-one receive **Article 15 actions**

New system

Having student assignments decided at the local level is a definite improvement, according to Capt. Gary Backes, a former instructor pilot at Laughlin. He was given his original assignment from AFMPC.

"I think the decision-making is at the right level. It gives the wing commander an opportunity to reward the hard workers and the people with good attitudes by taking into account the student's officership and preferences along with a realistic appraisal of his abilities," he said.

Seeing the "complete picture" of a pilot's abilities is an obvious advantage to the new selection system. There are many factors to consider that might dictate why an individual isn't suited for the aircraft he or she desires.

That's the real key, according to Colonel Newton. "If we just went by the test scores and evaluations, then we may as well toss the information into a computer and let it hand out assignments."

"But that way, no judgment would be involved. With the new process, we put experienced judgment into the UPT assignment for-



Reserve role will grow, says NSC official

Success in negotiating conventional arms Treaty Organization. reductions with the Soviets will place greater reliance on reserve forces, according to the National Security Council's senior director for defense and arms control.

Speaking at the national convention of the Reserve Officers Association in Houston, June 24, Dr. Arnold Kanter said successful negotiations will substantially reduce "the capacity of the Soviet Union and the Warsaw Pact to launch a surprise or short warning attack against the North Atlantic

"Because of the massive reductions this agreement would force them to make, they would need a relatively long period of mobilization and training in order to mount a successful attack," he said. "Such an agreement would play to NATO's strength but it would also increase our reliance on and the value of our reserve forces. We would have the time necessary to mobilize these forces. and we would need them more than ever if the Soviets nevertheless decided never to take

the route of military aggression."

Reserves have another advantage, he added. "As we look ahead over the next several years, the defense budget simply will not keep up with the need. Our forces will have to become leaner and meaner and our reliance on the reserves to perform many of the functions now done by more expensive active forces is likely to grow."

Kanter predicted two choices for the future: "Active forces will be increasingly hollowed out by progressive budget cuts or

we will rely increasingly on reserve and cadre forces."

"In brief, the world is evolving in many ways that are full of promises.

"But [they are] promises that will not be achieved without a strong America playing an active role.

" It is also evolving in ways in which the reserves will play a growing and increasingly valuable part," the council director concluded. (Reserve Officers Association News release)

In addition, even at the 2.3-ppm level, the risk of fluorosis is low. One study showed that at fluoride levels in the 2.3 ppm range, only about 1 of 10 children develop

moderate fluorosis.

However, with such levels, you probably still will want to take precautions to avoid staining of your children's teeth. The Reese Dental Clinic recommends two ways to accomplish this.

First, you can have your children drink only bottled or purified water. Since this water will not have fluoride, you can add fluoride

drops to bring it to an optimum level. The dental clinic writes prescriptions for these fluoride drops.

The second way is to have your kids drink both tap and bottled water, thus mixing their water sources. Either method will work.





Stress

Any change in our lives, positive or negative, can cause stress. Even a beneficial change can be stressful. Receiving a promotion increases our salary, but it may cause increased responsibility at work.

Researchers Thomas Holmes and Richard Rahe developed a rating scale to study the relationship of common life changes to the onset of serious illness. Stressful life events and changes such as marital separation, retirement, and financial problems were assigned a point value on a scale from 11 to 100.

After administering the scale to 5,000 patients, Holmes and Rahe found that the scores could predict a stress-induced health problem.

Some of these events clearly were stressors, but it was surprising to find that certain events generally considered positive, such as marriage and pregnancy, also caused a stress reaction.

You may want to complete the following scale to see where you possibly stand. Circle the score opposite the life events you've experienced within the past two years, or expect to experience within the next six months. After rating all stressors, add the numbers. The higher the total, the more likely you are to feel stressed.

Remember, this test may not be accurate for everyone and may not be of help to any one individual. Everyone is different, and so is the way they handle everyday situations.

If your score is over 300, you may find yourself as a candidate for a stress-induced health problem within the next year. Scores of 150 - 300 could indicate a 50 - 50 chance of illness, and scores below 150 indicate low-risk stress.

These categories serve as guides because of varying individual reaction to the same life event. For example, retirement may be extremely stressful to one person, while another may adapt very well. This shows how our perceptions affect what we view as stressful.

Proper lawn watering, conservation go hand in hand

Contrary to popular belief, it is possible to conserve water and take good care of a lawn.

Excessive and improper watering can be the cause of many grass problems. Some examples are:

☐ A common mistake is to water lawns lightly and frequently, rather than waiting until it's really needed and then saturating it. Holding back on water until it's really needed causes the development of deep grass roots, which help grass maintain its appearance better and longer than shallow roots.

☐ The amount of water needed to keep

soil moist will vary. During the growing season, two inches of water should be applied in hot, dry weather.

Since most home sprinklers water at a rate of one-half inch per hour, watering for four hours should be enough during the hottest weather. However, most soil won't absorb one-half inch of water per hour, so it will probably be necessary to move your sprinkler around. This will allow each area to absorb all the water it gets.

The time of day when water is applied affects how much water is needed to replenish the moisture in the soil. The best time to water is early in the morning, before temperatures begin to rise. This will cut down on

water wasted through evaporation.

It will also cut down on foliage disease, since water applied early in the day will evaporate as the day heats up, rather than remaining on the ground to provide a fertile host for disease-causing organisms.

When grass starts turning yellow, people tend to water it more. In fact, there are many reasons why grass turns yellow. One common reason for this occurrence is a shortage of nutrients in the soil — particularly nitrogen. Well-nurtured grass uses far less moisture than poorly fed grass.

Maintaining the level of nutrients in the soil through fertilizing is a good way to keep lawns looking good without wasting water in

the process.


☐ The height of your lawn mower is also important. If you set your mower at one-and-a-half inches in the early spring and slowly raise it so that it reaches one-and-a-half to three inches in midsummer, soil evaporation will be reduced.

The height that the mower should end up at depends on the type of grass.

With the need to be cost-conscious nowadays, it's imperative that everyone use as little water as possible to maintain their lawns.

Proper watering techniques can keep your lawn healthy, while keeping water usage down.
