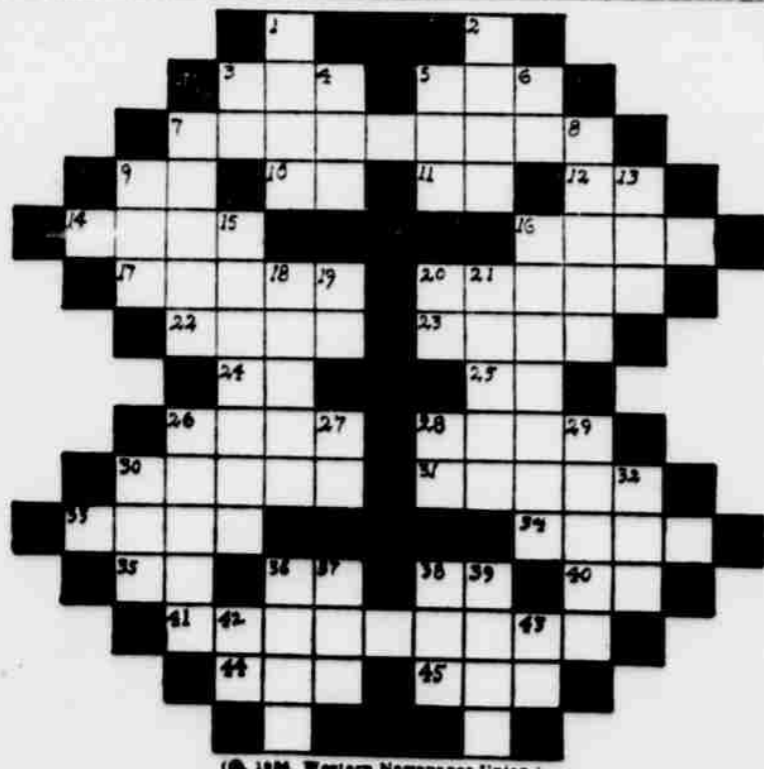

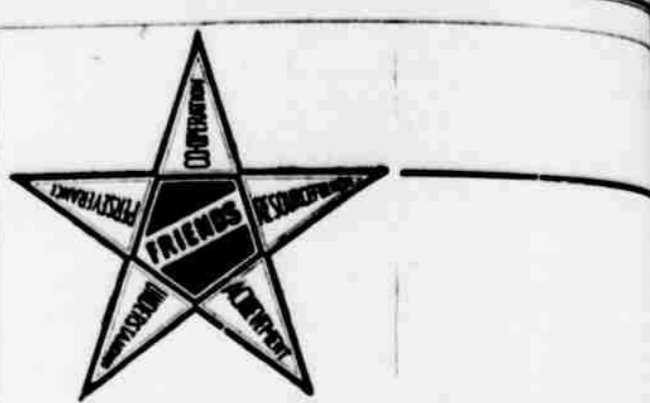

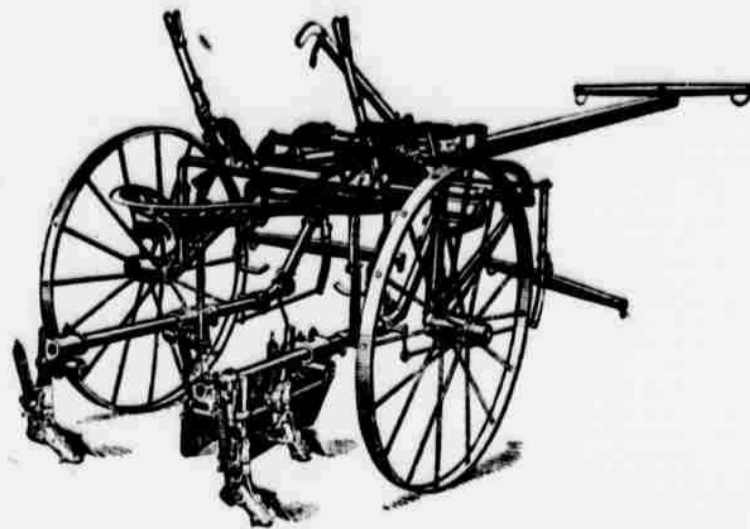
Infant Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Fletcher Dies

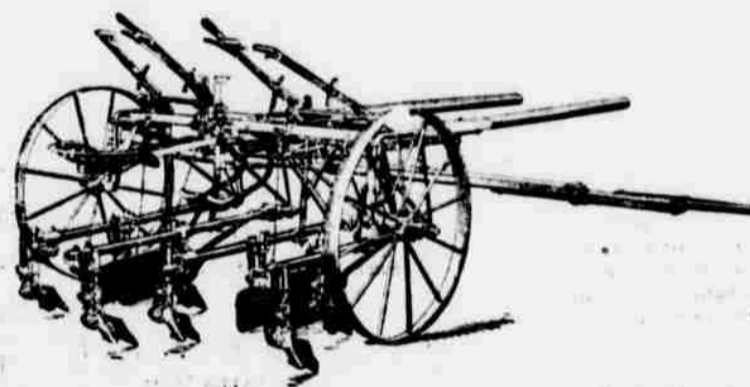

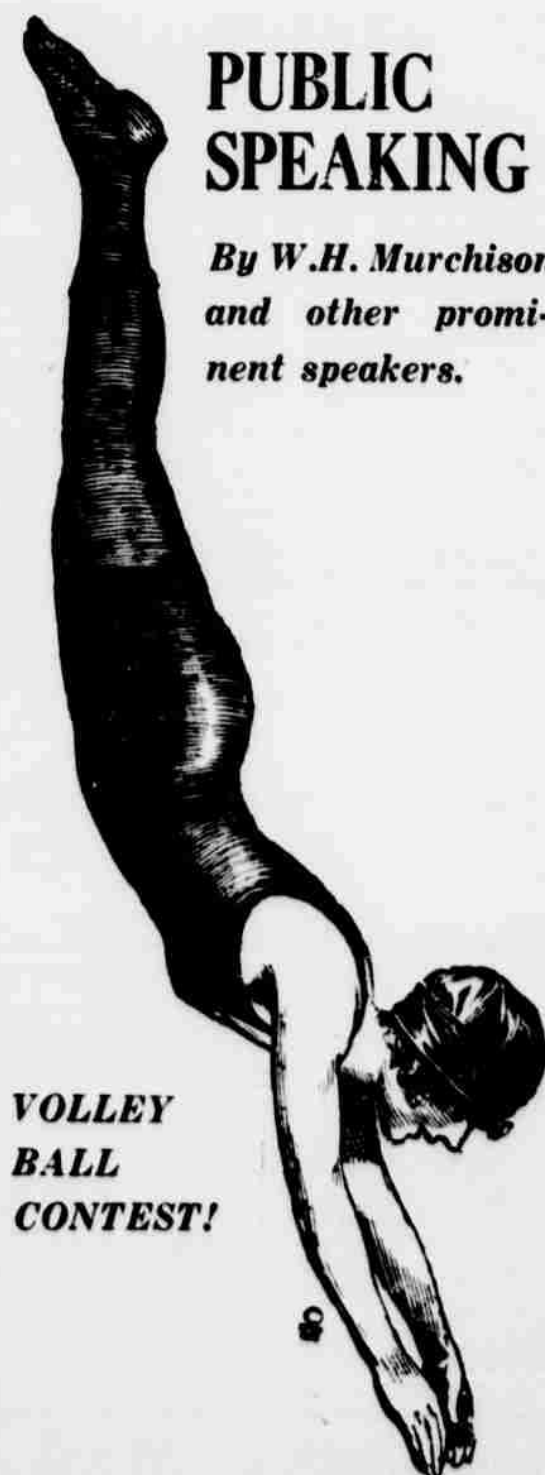
