Appraisal Board Sets Date For Public Hearing On 1985 Budget

Mrs. Hill reported that the 1984 current collections through the month of May amounted to: Briscoe County, 95.2%; Silverton ISD, 95.9%; City of Silverton, 95.2%; Mackenzie Water Authority, 94.9%.

There was extensive discussion on certification of the chief appraiser. Members feel it is in the best interest of taxpayers that the appraisal district have a certified chief appraiser before the next required reappraisal. This would help keep costs of reappraisal down as the chief appraiser could perform many of the duties that required a professional appraisal firm during the 1981 reappraisal.

The motion carried to pay Mrs. Hill's tuition and travel expenses to remaining schools required for her certification, and set the requirement that she must complete her certification by June

Following examination of the current month's bills, the motion carried to pay all bills presented at the meeting.

Funeral services for Marta Inglis Schwede were conducted at 10:30 a.m. Friday at the First Baptist Church in Tulia. Officiating were the Rev. Charles Davenport, pastor, and Rev. P. Marc Clayton, pastor of Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tulia. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery at Tulia with arrangements directed by Wallace Funeral Home.

Mrs. Schwede was found shot to death Tuesday afternoon, June 12, at her home in Nederland, according to Nederland police. Charges of murder were filed against her husband about 5:00 p.m. Wednesday and bond set at \$150,000 by Judge Wallace McCasland, a Jefferson County justice of the peace. Schwede is currently in Jefferson County Jail in Beaumont.

Mrs. Schwede had two gunshot wounds in her head from a small caliber firearm, said Detective Charlie Myers of Nederland. He said Justice of the Peace Johnny Knowles pronounced Mrs. Schwede dead at 2:48 p.m. Tuesday.

The woman was found fully clothed on the floor of her bedroom. She was found by a neighbor who went to investigate at the request of Schwede who called the neighbor, saying he had become concerned when his wife did not call him at work as arranged, Myers stated. The neighbor called police.

The former Marta Dee Inglis was born August 26, 1957 in Tulia. She and Charles R. Schwede were married April 24, 1976 in Tulia.

The Schwedes moved to Nederland in 1983 from Anderson. She was a Lutheran.

Survivors are her husband; two daughters, Amanda RaDee and Lyndsey Ann, both of the home; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Inglis, who live 11 miles west of Silverton on Highway 86; two sisters, Melody Finkner and

Police reports state that both vehicles were traveling southbound on Interstate 27 about 11:15 a.m., and the collision occurred as Garrison was attempting to make a turn. He was taken by a Plainview EMS unit to Central Plains Regional Hospital.

He was placed in intensive care for observation due to his having a heart condition. He is improving well, and expected to return home the first of this week.





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Summer Means Swimming To Most Children

Summer means swimming to most children, but clean, shallow water and warm weather don't guarantee their safety, warns a Baylor College of Medicine spe-

Near-drowning, swimmer's ear and chilling are common dangers for swimmers, said Dr. Harold Reuter, who specializes in ear, nose and throat disorders.

However, Reuter said, close supervision, rinsing the ears, and shortened swim periods will help prevent these problems

Near-drowning, or shallow water blackout, can occur when children compete to see who can stay underwater the longest, said Reuter, a clinical professor at Baylor.

A swimmer taking many deep breaths before going underwater exhales carbon dioxide from his lungs, Reuter explained. Carbon dioxide normally stimulates breathing and prevents a person from holding his breath too long. But if there is not enough carbon dioxide in the lungs, the oxygen level can drop low enough to cause a blackout.

"There are more than 8,000 deaths a year in the United States caused by drowning," said Reuter. "Many have occurred

from shallow water blackout. And many near-drownings are not reported at all.'

If someone blacks out underwater, Reuter advises giving artificial respiration immediately. The simple prevention for near drowning is not to breathe heavily and then try to stay underwater for a long time.

Swimmer's ear, or external otitis, occurs when the ear is exposed to water for long periods of time or when wax traps water in the ear. The skin in the ear becomes wrinkled and itchy, and if scratching breaks the skin, a bacterial or fungal infection may

"The big difference between a skin infection any place else and in the ear is that the skin in the ear canal is closely applied to the bone, so the slightest bit of swelling causes a great deal of pain," Reuter said.

People who repeatedly suffer

from swimmer's ear should rinse the ears after swimming with a solution of one tablespoon of white vinegar to five ounces of rubbing alcohol, Reuter said.

Chilling, which may make a child less resistant to colds, occurs even in the hottest weather, because water temperature is always lower than outside air. Staying in the water too long periods lowers a child's body temperature below normal, causing shivering and blue lips.

Reuter advises that children should come out of the water every half hour to warm up.

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

Adequate Drinking Water Must Be **Maintained For Grazing Animals**

Stocking rates cannot be evaluated only in terms of forage since it must be accompanied by adequate drinking water for the grazing animal. Maximum livestock gains can be obtained only when both the forage and the water supply are adequate.

Plans for developing adequate water for drought years cannot

be postponed until drought begins. During drought periods, water shortages are often as severe as forage shortages or even more severe. More common is a heavy concentration of animals at remaining water sources after the less dependable springs and reservoirs dry out.

On the other hand, care must be taken that additional water development is not used to crowd more livestock onto a fully-stocked range. There must be adequate forage to go with the new development.

The location of water developments on rangeland is important in controlling the movement, distribution, and concentration of livestock. More watering places are required on rough than on level or rolling terrain. Cattle should not have to travel more than one-quarter to one-half mile

Daily water requirements on frequency of watering of range livestock should be considered. Normally, eight to ten gallons per day is ample for mature cows, three-quarters to one gallon per day for range sheep and goats, and ten to twelve gallons per day for horses. High temperatures, low humidity, high salt or protein content in the diet, dry feeds, and increased feed intake, all increase water consumption.

There are various types of water developments. These include lakes, ponds, streams, springs and wells. A combination of two or more types of water developments is often more advantageous than one type

For assistance with the design of livestock watering facilities, local ranchers should contact the Soil Conservation Service at 823-2320.





BUILD A LIVING TERRACE OR PATIO

A living terrace or patio can do a lot for a home landscape, notes a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

It can enhance the property value, provide space for recreation and entertainment, and bring indoor and outdoor environments-together.

A terrace or patio should be no less than eight to ten feet wide and should repeat the lines of the adjacent building. The surface should be firm and relatively smooth and should slope gently away from the house for proper drainage. Design a patio to provide privacy, which can be provided by plants, constructed screen or orientation.
