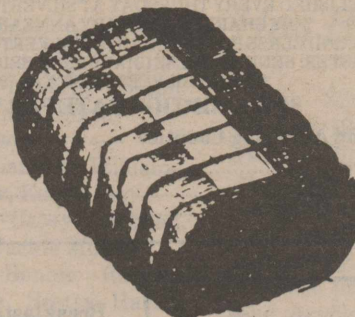

Large Crowd Attends Silverton School Homecoming

A large crowd of present and former students and teachers of the Silverton Schools gathered "under the big top" on the courthouse lawn Saturday for the biennial homecoming activities.

Members of the planning committee for the "Coming Home Weekend" were Stan and Lynda Fogerson, Wayne and Tina (Weaver) Nance and Lynn and Kathy (Self) Frizzell.

The invocation was given by Jimmy Burson, after which a flag ceremony was conducted by Kristi Bean, Kami Martin, Kayla Ramsey and Michelle Whitfill, members of the Silverton Brownie Girl Scouts.

Those present were welcomed by Cal Brannon, a member of the SHS Class of 1985.

Speakers were Bonnie Watters, an SHS graduate who now teaches in Yuma, Arizona, and Bill Verden, a former teacher who now teaches in the Springlake-Earth School System.

The singing of the alma mater was led by the 1984-85 cheerleaders, Alesha Patton, Carey Blackerby, Kori Baird, Necole Whitfill, Jeannita Stephens and Stacie Chappell.

Jealeta (Eddleman) Baird, a member of the graduating class of 1964, was presented as homecoming queen. The selection of the queen was done by a special committee, and her identity was a closely-guarded secret until she was escorted to the speakers' platform by her son, Kerry

Baird, also a graduate of SHS.

Announcements included the naming of Lily B. (Brooks) Whitney of Yakima, Washington, who had traveled farthest (1675 miles) to attend, and Bertha Rhoderick and Ruby Elliston, members of the class of 1913, as the eldest graduates present.

Graduates were also present from the classes of 1916, 1918, 1922, 1923, 1924, 1926, 1928, 1929, 1931, 1932, 1933 and 1935, among others. Classes honored this year were those of 1934, 1944, 1954, 1964 and 1974.

John and LaQuetta (Chitty) Schott, Gordon and Carolyn (Garrison) Lowrey and Fred and Pat (Cagle) Edwards were nominated and selected as the planning committee for the 1986 homecoming, and the rodeo weekend was the unanimous choice of those attending as the time for the next homecoming.

The benediction was pronounced by Barry Francis, after which entertainment was presented by Maxine (Watters) Morris, Carrie Dell (Watters) Dickerson, Lina (Watters) Whittington, Eudean (Watters) Crow, Sybil (Watters) Martin, Bonnie Watters and Aaron Younger. Silverton Rodeo Postponed Due To Rain Last Week

The annual Silverton Young Farmers Rodeo was postponed due to the wonderful rains which fell on Briscoe County last week. It was the first time all three performances had had to be postponed in the history of the rodeo. The rodeo was rescheduled for August 23-24-25, with dances to be held on each of these nights. The bands will be West Wind from Lockney on Thursday night, Silverton's own Caprock Country on Friday night, and the Rough Riders from Nazareth on Saturday night. Drawings for items to be given away by several clubs and presentation of the Rodeo Queen were delayed until the Saturday night performance of the rodeo.

Dances were held at the Briscoe County show barn Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, with a benefit square dance and supper on Saturday from 4:00 until 7:00 p.m. Good crowds were reported at each of the dances.

Winners of the kids bicycle parade were Stacy Hill, first place, \$10.00 and three children's tickets to the rodeo; Bryan Brummett, second place, \$5.00 and two children's tickets to the rodeo, and Jeffrey Mercer, third place, \$3.00 and one children's ticket to the rodeo.

In the floats division, winners were L. O. A. Junior Study Club, first; Progressive Extension Homemakers, second, and Our Lady of Loreto Catholic Church, third.

Honorable mention went to the entry of Kirk, Braden and Todd Towe in the bicycles division, and the 4-H Club entry in the floats division.

More bicycles and floats than usual were entered this year.

The annual barbecue was also held without interruption by the rain, and a large crowd attended this event. The meal was said to have been especially good this year.

The result of voting in Briscoe County revealed 564 votes cast for W. P. Hobby and 196 for Jas. E. Ferguson for governor; 594 for L. B. Richards and 156 for J. E. Daniel for County Judge; 609 for T. L. Anderson and 167 for I. G. W. Buck for Clerk; 402 for R. F. Stevenson, 125 for P. P. Bowman, 157 for Joe Edd Burleson, 103 for E. H. Clary and 6 for Will Ward for Sheriff; 561 for M. C. Potter and 237 for J. W. Ewing for Assessor; 390 for Miss Ada Douglas, 246 for A. C. Bomar and 152 for C. B. Shrewsbury for Treasurer . . . The law

requires that the trustees in each school district erect a flag-pole on the grounds bearing a flag not less than 3x5 feet in size, so arranged that the flag can be raised and lowered each day . . . J. Wood Parker has announced that a revival meeting will begin August 4 at the Presbyterian Church with Rev. Gordon Lang doing the preaching . . . Rev. H. M. Uncle Tom Morrison died at the Plainview Sanitarium and was buried here last Saturday. He was one of the old timers in this part of the country having been here since 1891. He was a member of the Church of Christ and was well and favorably known to a large number of our

people. Rev. Z. B. Pirtle conducted the funeral services at which there was a large gathering. The deceased leaves a wife and 10 children to mourn his departure . . . Quitting Business Sale going on at the Fred Biffle store in Silverton . . . J. Lee Gilmore came up from Turkey Tuesday and he and his wife and baby returned today . . . Bertha May Meacham, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Meacham of Turkey, was so badly burned yesterday by a gasoline iron exploding that she died this morning . . . Neva Welch, who was severely hurt some time ago is getting so she can walk, and much hopes are entertained that she will completely recover . . . J. S. Fort,

father of G. R. and John Fort of this place, died at the home of his daughter near Endee, New Mexico Wednesday and was buried here Thursday afternoon. He formerly lived here and was known to many of our people . . . Attorney Kenneth Bain and family were up from Floydada the first of the week . . . Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Weast were in town the first of the week and marketed a nice lot of cured meat they had put up . . . Clyde Hutsell and his sister, Mrs. O. J. Huggins, received word a few days ago that their brother who is in France had a leg and an arm torn off by a shell and was hardly expected to live . . . Don't be a slacker—eat to the limit on election day. The ladies will wait on you. Their Chicken Dinner will be worth it . . . T. J. Crass and Frank Anderson were in town the first of the week and say they had fine rains and crop prospects are flattering. Mr. Crass says the large lake near him is fuller than he ever saw it before . . . Considerable damage has been done in this part of the country by lightning during the recent rain storms. The residence occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Dave Alexander on A. P. Donnell's farm was struck Tuesday morning at 1:30 o'clock tearing quite a hole in the wall within two feet of where it was struck two years ago. 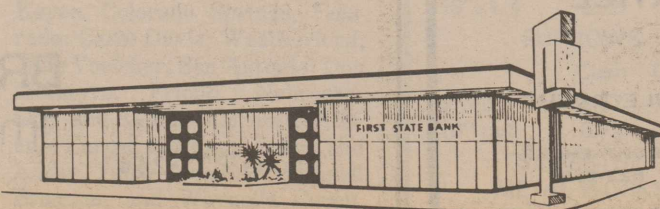

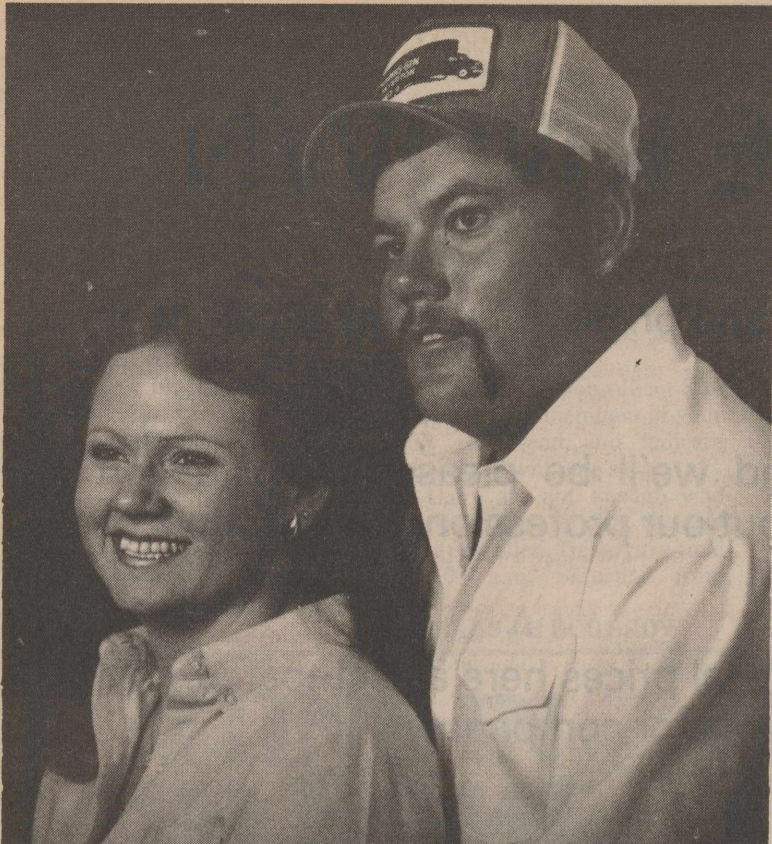

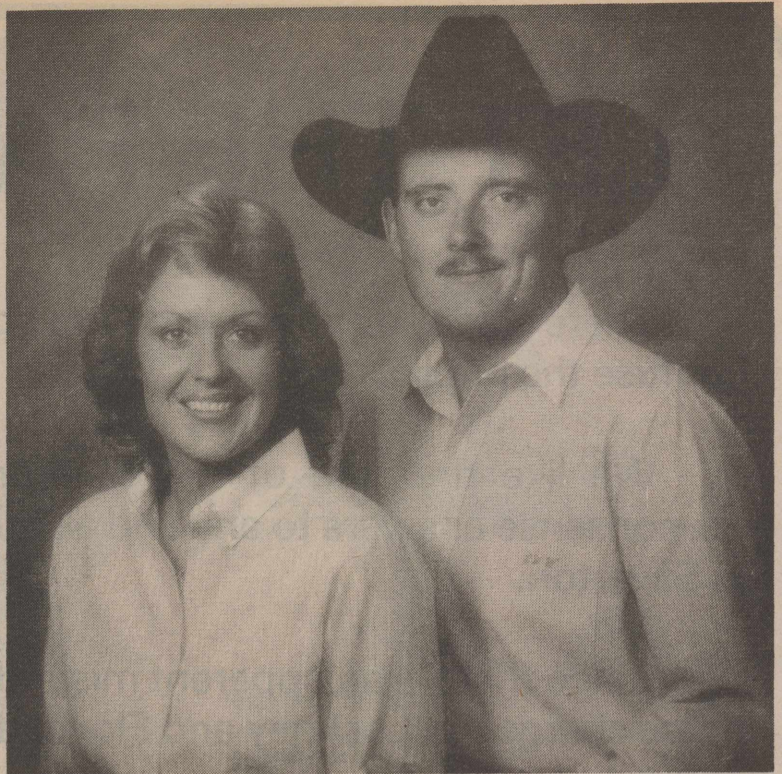
The Hazels have a unique blend of music that consists of country gospel, southern gospel, contemporary and traditional hymns. They have recorded four albums, two of which are still available to the public.

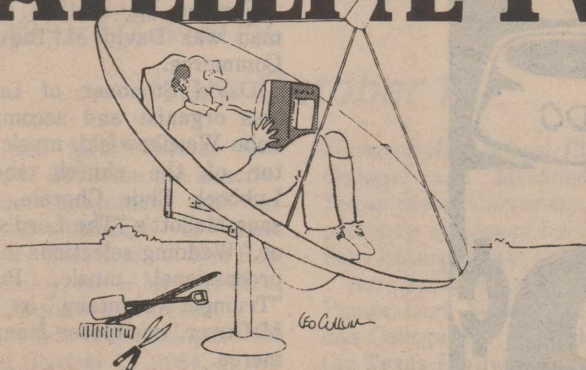

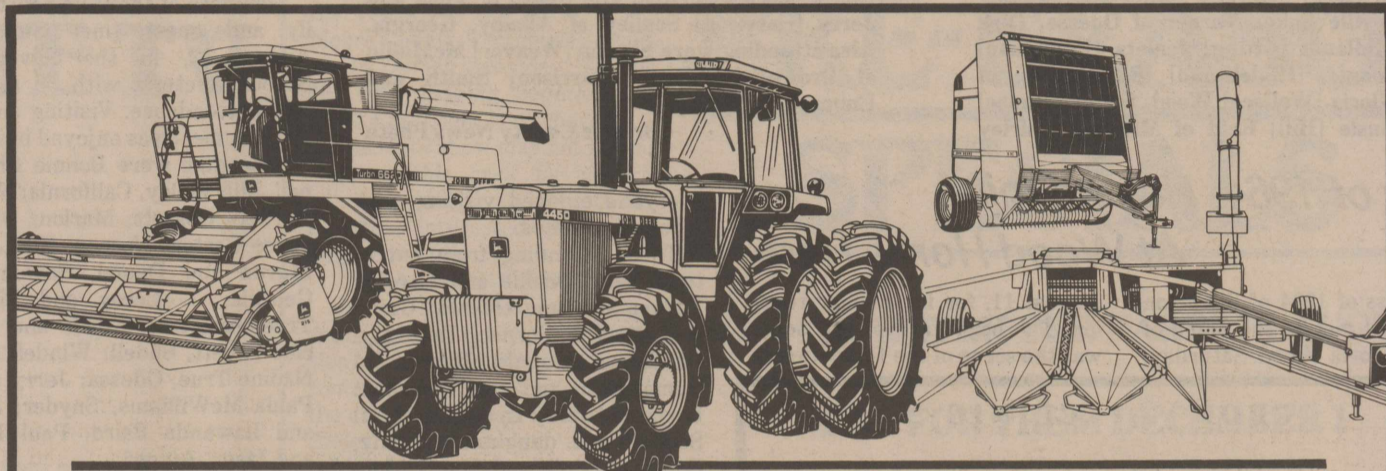

**TEXAS POTATOES
ARE SPUDTACULAR**

The homely tuber is not only American's most popular vegetable, it is also one of the most misunderstood and misrepresented vegetables. For years the potato has been considered a

high fat, high calorie, starchy food, sure to increase the pounds around our waist. However, a person would have to consume 11 pounds of potatoes to put on one pound of weight. This vegetable that comes in the plain brown (or red) wrapper is an excellent source of complex carbohydrates, which provides the body with long lasting energy. Potatoes are fat free and they are a good source of Vitamin C, Vitamin B-6, iron, iodine and copper. A medium potato has only 100 calories and for every ten percent of 100 calories they contain good quality protein. Nutrition research has shown that when starch is substituted

for sugar in the diet, the appetite is lessened.

Texas potato harvesting begins in April in the Rio Grande Valley and Winter Garden area, followed by the harvest in Munday, Seminole and Van Horn in June and the High Plains in July and August. In 1983 the harvesting acreage in the state reached 15,200. The Texas potato crop contributes 23 million dollars to the state's economy. Farmers receive 16% of the retail price of fresh market potatoes and 6% profit from the processed product. Norgold Russet and Red La Soda are the main varieties of potatoes grown on the High Plains.

DINNER IN A DISH

Layer in a buttered casserole dish the following:

- 1 can Green Beans, drained
- 1 layer of Texas Red Potatoes, Sliced Thin and Unpeeled
- 1 1/2 lb. Hamburger, browned and drained
- 1 small can mushrooms
- 1 cup chopped Onion
- Salt and Pepper

Mix together and pour over casserole:

- 1 can Mushroom Soup
- 1 T. Prepared Mustard
- 1/4 cup Mayonnaise
- 1/2 can Water

Top casserole with a layer of:

- 2 cups Grated Cheese
- 3/4 cup Bread Crumbs
- 2 T. Butter cut into Chunks

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until potatoes are tender.

RO-TEL POTATOES

- 8 med. Red Potatoes
- 1 10-oz. can Ro-tel Tomatoes
- 1 can Cream of Mushroom Soup
- 1 can Cheddar Cheese Soup
- 1/2 stick Margarine
- 1 T. Onion Flakes

Slice potatoes with skin on about 1/4" thin. Place in buttered dish. Mix Ro-tel tomatoes and both soups. Pour mixture over potatoes. Dot the top with margarine and onion flakes. Bake
