Keeping in touch

Families of deployed members have several ways to communicate

Reese and local-area businesses have joined efforts to help bridge the communication gap between wing families and those members deployed for Operation Desert Shield.

At present, lines of communication available to military and family members include telefax service, videotapes and commercial and military telephone lines, some of which are provided for free.

Since Sept. 21, the American Telephone & Telegraph Company has been offering a "Desert Fax" service to family and friends of members deployed for Desert Shield. This service allows people to send a one-way fax for free to the military members. Single photos, drawings or letters in blue or black ink can be sent.

Reese members wanting to fax something to a deployed member can stop by the AT&T Phone Center in the South Plains Mall from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from 1-6 p.m. Sunday. They can also call 795-1648 during those hours and the center staff will take the message over the phone and fax it out.

To send a fax, the following information on the deployed member must be provided: full name, rank, social security number, unit and APO of individual in the Persian Gulf.

Videotaped messages can also be sent to troops in the Gulf. The Reese Family Support Center and Montgomery Ward stores are offering family members a chance to privately tape a message for their deployed loved one," according to Phil Thierry, Reese FSC director. Members can use the FSC from 7:30 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. Monday through Friday and must bring their

Montgomery Ward, located at 50th and Boston Streets, is offering one free videotape to deployed members' families possessing a valid military identification and proof that their family member is overseas. Taping can be done in privacy at the store during normal operating hours. So far, Montgomery Ward stores have donated more than \$2 million worth of camcorders, video cassette recorders, televisions and tapes for members deployed to the Gulf so they can view their families' messages.

Commercial and military telephone lines are also available to the members and their families. The U.S. Central Command established a policy allowing deployed members morale calls to the United States using Defense Switched Network lines. Reese members can make two five-minute calls per month. Members should try to keep to the five-minute limit, but under special circumstances the time limit can be waived, according to (see "In touch," page 13)

First CMSAF to speak at enlisted banquet

The 1990 Reese Enlisted Awards Banquet geants Council — and Chief Airey. is Nov. 17 at the Officers' Open Mess, guest speaker for the event will be retired CMSAF Paul W. Airey.

Tickets for the evening event can be purchased from unit first sergeants. On April 3, 1967, Chief Airey was appointed as the first chief master sergeant of the Air Force. In this appointment, the chief became the first enlisted member to serve as personal advisor on enlisted issues, such as the welfare and progress of all enlisted members, to the Air Force Chief of Staff and Secretary of the Air Force.

Following his enlistment in November 1942, Chief Airey was assigned duties as a radio operator in World War II, and shortly afterwards completed aerial gunnery train-

In March 1944, he received orders to North Africa, then went on to the 485th Bomb Group as part of the 15th Air Force in Italy in

May. There he served as an operator-aerial gunner on a B-24 Liberator Bomber, until he was shot down while on a mission over Vienna, Austria in July. Soon after safely landing in his parachute, he was taken as a prisoner of war and incarcerated in Stalagluft 4, near the Baltic Sea. A few months later, Chief Airey and his fellow prisoners were force-marched over hundreds of

miles to Stalag 257, near Berlin. One year after his assignment to Italy, Chief Airey was released from prison. Weighing two-thirds his normal weight, he was immediately returned to the United States and placed on a three-month recuperation leave.

Children, parents should be on guard

Halloween is a time of make-believe and adventure for children, and parents often put a lot of time and creativity into planning the perfect costume. But 64th Security Police Squadron officials hope they'll also take some time to plan for

Here are some tips from the experts:

☐ Costumes should be made of flame-retardant materials and be short enough so little "goblins" won't trip on them. If the costume involves a prop like a sword or magic wand, make sure it is not sharp or heavy enough to hurt anyone. Toy guns should not look too real. Plastic or cardboard props are safer than metal or wood.

☐ Children should avoid oversize shoes that they can trip over. Make-up is better than a mask for vision and breathing. If a mask is worn, it should have openings for the eyes and room to breathe. It's a good idea to have a dress rehearsal to make sure kids can move and see well in their costumes.

☐ Put reflective tape on children's costumes to make sure drivers can see them if the costumes aren't bright enough. With a little creativity, the tape can add to the costume's

see and be seen. (Glow-tubes come in fun and "scary" shapes.) slowly than usual and watch for children everywhere!

☐ If your young children go trick-or-treating, go with them or send a responsible teenager along. Older children not accompanied by adults should travel in groups. Go over basic traffic safety rules with them, such as crossing only at intersections after looking both ways. Tell your children to stay on the sidewalk, and if there is none, to stay as close as possible to the curb, facing traffic.

☐ Tell children to stay in your neighborhood, agreeing on a specific boundary and a time for them to be home. Enforce these limits.

Remind children to keep themselves and their treat bags away from candlelit jack-o-lanterns. Tell them not to go to unlit houses.

☐ Have them stay away from dogs. The American Academy of Family Physicians warns that a costume can frighten even a family pet into a possible attack.

☐ Tell children not to eat treats until they have been inspected. Throw away any unwrapped candy and wash and cut up fruit into little pieces. Report any tamperings immediately to the military or local police so others can be warned. The SPS Law Enforcement Desk can be reached at 3332; for emergencies, call 911.

☐ If you're at home, remember to turn home lights on and keep your sidewalk and steps clear. Don't put candlelit jacko-lanterns where costumes or curtains can catch fire. To be extra safe, substitute a small flashlight for the candle.

Early retirement boards convene Dec. 3, AFMPC says

The Air Force Selective Early Retirement for early retirement. boards will convene at the Air Force Military Personnel Center Dec. 3.

"The Air Force has done everything possible this year to avoid Selective Early Retirement boards, including reducing accessions and encouraging voluntary separations and retirements," said Col. Duane L. Conques, chief of the retirements and separations division at the Military Personnel Center.

All four military services, however, have found SERBs still necessary to lower the number of field grade officers who can legally be on active duty as total end strength decreases, Colonel Conques said.

Officers considered by the 1988 boards are exempt and will not meet the 1990

"The Air Force SERBs will ensure the Air Force continues to take a balanced approach to force reduction while protecting the future of officers who are not yet retirement-eli-, the seventh month after secretarial approval gible," Colonel Conques said.

The numbers being considered by the December boards were not available at press time. However, no more than 30 percent of those considered by a board may be selected 3420. (Air Force News Service)






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Suggestion program benefits from changes

Recent moves implemented throughout command

Changes designed to improve benefits received through the Air Training Command Suggestion Program took effect this month.

In fiscal year 1990, Reese suggesters saved the Air Force more than \$45,000 in tangible savings and earned almost \$6,000 in awards; ATC overall produced more than \$4.4 million in money saving suggestions, resulting in personal earnings of nearly

\$181,000. So far in fiscal 1991, two faster should provide people whose suggestions have been submitted by Reese members, according to local suggestion officials.

Three significant changes were made to the program. They are:

☐ The evaluation time limit has now been cut from 30 to 10 calendar days at base and command lev-

The decrease in time between the submission and evaluation of ideas is designed to give people a more positive impression of the

ideas are adopted with awards and recognition much sooner."

☐ Disapproval authority is limited to colonels or their civilian equivalent. If the disapproval authority has questions about the evaluation, it maybe returned for further action.

☐ The third change requires base and command program managers to become central control points for all submitted suggestions. Additionally, the procedure program. Evaluating suggestions requires command-level managers to track suggestion and evaluation data through a microcomputer system and adds quality control and consistency to the entire suggestion

As a result of the recent changes, training sessions are being prepared for monitors and evaluators to ensure they are familiar with the changes.

The level to which suggestions will go to is based on each level's evaluator. If the suggestion is for a local program that will not benefit other bases, approval or disapproval will stop at base level.

If the suggestion could be implemented at other ATC bases, but would not really apply to the Air Force overall, it's approval will top at command level.

Members who have a suggestion pending when they change stations, separate or retire from the military should notify the Reese Suggestion Office of a forwarding address. This also applies to civilians who move or retire. For more information, call the suggestion office at 3148.

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

At 10 a.m. Sept. 5, SrA. Julie Gifford joined other wing members awaiting possible deployment for Desert Shield in a meeting at the Simler Theater. "Bring your bags," she was told — as usual.

Figuring it was just another meeting where people would get the latest updates from overseas and random bag inspections would be done, she went about her job

Two hours after the meeting started, Airman Gifford was airborne on the first leg of the trip to Southwest Asia. "I figured if I was selected to go I wouldn't have a lot of time, and as it was I had to make time to call my mom," she said.

Airman Gifford and other selectees flew commercially to their designated port, then boarded a C-5 enroute to Saudi Arabia. "While we were airborne, many of us went from nervous to calm to not knowing what to expect. All anyone had to go by was what we heard on the news or during briefings," explained the

The plane arrived in Southwest Asia during the evening. Unable to get transportation to their final destinations until morning, the passengers spent the night in a hangar. The next day Airman Gifford caught an aircraft mission flight to her final desitination - an American contractor's compound in Saudi Arabia.

The compound was made up of work facilities and numerous small houses. Airman Gifford resided in one house with seven other women.

The daily temperatures ranged from 100-105 degrees and dropped to 80 degrees at night, remaining humid throughout. "Other than the endless sand, it wasn't half as bad as I expected it to be," noted Airman Gifford. "I

later found out I was in the best location there."

"Compared to most of the places I visited, I was stationed at a resort. Where I was wasn't really the 'desert.' But, the further I got from the compound (during

trips abroad), the worse conditions got."

Temporarily assigned to the transportation squadron from another base, the packing specialist worked on setting up a freight shop, through which all incoming supplies and equipment would be received. She also downloaded arriving aircraft, and processed the shipping paperwork. "Where I worked and lived was similar to a 'miniature' stateside base," she explained. "All around were American military and civilians (working for the contractor), and local Arabs, who worked most of the construction jobs."

"The hardest part about being over there for most people, especially those in the desert, was not knowing for sure when they'd go home," added the airman.

While off duty, explained Airman Gifford, there wasn't really much to do. People at the compound could take busses into town, watch television to catch the latest coming from Air Force News out of Italy, or take part in physical activites. Karate and scuba lessons were available and intramural sports were getting under way. She chose to spend her time jogging the boundaries of the compound with a co-worker. One night, however, her jogging took her a lot farther than planned.

On that night, she tripped over a piece of debris and felt a sharp pain rush through her foot. Hobbling back home, she thought it was only twisted and she'd be fine in the morning. When she awoke and saw her foot swollen to about three-times its normal size, she realized it was more than a sprain.

Shortly after the hospital (operating out of Tyndall AFB, Fla.) confirmed it to be a break, her orders were cut - she was on her way home.

"I wanted to stay, but policy stated that persons who were injured and who would be disabled for 15 or more days were not allowed to remain," she said.

On Sept. 30, Airman Gifford returned home. "I really didn't want to leave. The people were nice, the workload was basically the same as at home, and conditions were much like a typical temporary-duty assignment. I was comfortable there.

"If they offer me the chance - I'm going back," she concluded.

a radio school instructor at Scott Field. Ill. From there, he moved to Naha AB, Japan, and became the NCO in charge of wing communications. In this position he devised a corrosion control assembly line for aircraft radio and radar equipment. He then trained personnel in the proper use and maintenance of this equipment, and placed

his idea in full operation on a production line basis. Through his effort, tremendous monetary savings were realized in prolonging the life of communications equipment, which earned him the Legion of Merit Award.

After spending two years in Japan, Chief Airey returned to the states as a first sergeant at Scott AFB. In January 1959, he moved to Keesler AFB, Miss., and became the first sergeant of the 3407th School Squadron,

where he spent less than a year before returning overseas to the 611th Aircraft Control Warning Site in Japan.

He spent 10 months at the remote site, then received an assignment to the 478th Fighter Group at Grand Forks, N.D. There he served as NCOIC of the Airmen Section, directorate of personnel, and later as the personnel sergeant major. Remaining at Grand Forks until 1964, he served as a first sergeant.

The last first sergeant position of his 25year career assigned him to the 4756th Civil Engineering Squadron at Tyndall AFB, Fla. From here he was appointed the position as chief master sergeant of the Air Force, where he seved for a little over two years before retiring.

Following his retirement in July 1969, Chief Airey spent ten years as the regional director of the AFSA.

Mr. Thierry. "There is no limit on emergency calls," he added.

Mr. Thierry pointed out that the two 'morale' calls per month don't just apply to members in the Gulf. "They are for families of military members who are deployed, on a temporary-duty assignment or stationed without family members anywhere overseas."

International commercial calls can also be placed to Saudi Arabia. According to ATC communications computer systems officials, a three-minute call to Saudi costs about \$5; while a call coming from Saudi to the United States will cost about

People can continue communication with their family and friends through the mail. Letters and packages sent to deployed members cannot contain any pornography, alcohol or weaponry. Postage will be charged from here to New York, and the military will pick up the cost from there. For more information on shipping weights and sizes, contact a local post office or call the Reese Post-Office at 3351.

Other local businesses are continuing the effort to support deployed members by sponsoring various community programs. Combined efforts between KKIK-FM, Coca-Cola and 7-11 stores enable people to buy a 12pack of the soft drink for \$2.50 (below cost) from any 7-11 store and have it sent overseas with an attached note, through the "send a Coke and a note" program. These soft drinks will be shipped out the end of this month.

Another community effort is the "no cost financial counseling" provided to deployed members' families by the Local Chapter of Texas Certified Public Accountants. For a list of services, call the Family Support Center at 3305.
