



# A Trip to the Lower Rio Grande Valley

Words can not be found to fully express the beauty, wealth and grandeur of the great irrigated district known as the Lower Rio Grande Valley which lies in the southern extremity of Texas. This section is comparatively new and its resources undeveloped, but there is no doubt, but this valley, when properly developed will become the greatest in production of all other irrigated districts, because of its excellent soil, climate and abundance of water. There are 350,000 acres including ditches, homes and townships in this valley under irrigation, but only about 280,000 are put into actual production. Twelve big pumping plants are furnishing water from the lower Rio Grande River and the system is minutely managed giving to the producers of the valley irrigation at cost. There is an enormous production annually from the valley of cabbage, beans, peas, potatoes, tomatoes, onions, melons, spinach, carrots, table beets, citrus fruits. The total investments in irrigation is more than \$20,000,000 and this territory now rivals California and Florida in the early markets of the world. The climate is semi-tropical and light frosts are rare. Crops are grown the year round and the heavy shipping season is during the winter months. The citrus fruit industry is receiving much attention and many thousand trees are being planted annually. Grape fruit and orange trees are the most popular among the citrus fruit producers. Special attention is being given to grape fruit culture as the soil of this district produces the best flavor of any country known today. The Lower Rio Grande Valley attracts many tourists during the winter and they have a highway system second to none in the state. They have excellent schools, churches and clubs at the principal towns and the hunting and fishing along the Gulf coast is unequalled.

Sunday morning March 22, at 8:50 o'clock we began our trip from Haskell, others joining us at the towns along the Wichita Valley until twenty six people from Haskell were enroute to the Lower Rio Grande Valley on the excursion given by the J. B. Lamoree Land Company. H. R. Ryan Agent for the company and Loflar and Brown realtors of this city made up the excursion from Haskell and the following ladies and gentlemen with the writer were given passage. Virgil Brown, Chas. M. Conner, W. E. Welsh, M. O. Field, T. D. Strickland, A. K. Lebkowsky, C. D. Grissom, Mrs. Virgil Hudson, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Grissom, S. H. Huckabee of Haskell, H. A. Rieks, Henry Hutcheson and J. F. Jourdan of Munday, W. A. Short, D. E. Hanson and H. B. Turner of Rochester, A. S. Bristow, J. W. Faulkner, W. D. Norman, Alvin Norman, J. T. May and John Baugh of Rule. We arrived in Fort Worth late in the afternoon where a special train awaited us with men and women from other sections on board making a total on this excursion of about sixty-five persons. The special train carried several pullmans and a dining car which was operated by the J. B. Lamoree Land Company. Our train left Fort Worth about 8 p. m. over the Katy line south and arrived at Houston at 6 o'clock Monday morning, where we were given breakfast from the dining car and we had not long to wait until we boarded special Urban cars for Galveston where we spent the day. On arriving at Galveston we were given a ride on the Gulf on an excursion boat which carried us along the dock with a man to explain the presence of many vessels loading their cargoes for all countries on the globe.

After the boat ride we were given a sea food dinner at a pavilion and bathing house where we could enjoy our

In the valley. His trees were something like 14 years old. He had a large apiary and his bees thrive among the flowers. He planted 108 trees to the acre which modern experience proves to be too close together for citrus fruit trees after they have several years growth.

We lunched at the home of Charles Volz who had lived in the valley for 25 years. He has a wonderful orchard of citrus fruit trees which we were permitted to go through, and examine closely. The oranges, lemons and grape fruit were still hanging on many of the trees and Mrs. Volz said that grape fruit would remain on the trees for 18 months without injury to the fruit or the tree and not interfere in the least with the young crop which is now on the trees. She further states that grape fruit would hang on the trees for several years if not pulled off but would not be of any value after 18 months for market. They have 80 acres in trees of different ages and the 6 year old trees were picking \$1,500.00 per acre in grape fruit. Some of the older orchards were reported by the growers to pick \$2,000 per acre this year.

That sounds almost ridiculous but they have the goods to show.

We next visited the orchard of R. H. Come who recently moved from Oklahoma and bought some production there and some six year old trees averaged \$24.00 per tree and with 100 trees to the acre you can see money piled up to \$2,400.00 per acre. This was said to be a very fine grade of grape fruit and sold for a fancy price.

We called on Dr. M. E. Bronkus who was with us at Galveston. He is a Baptist minister of many years and is one of the greatest preachers in the United States having been active president of some of the greatest institutions of learning in the south and east and has pastored some of the largest churches in Virginia and other states. He owns one acre with his home and yard on it and he grows the Temple orange which he says is the greatest orange in all the world. He treated the party to grape fruit punch made us an other good talk in which he told and retold the wonders of the Valley as he saw it after many years residing there.

We stopped at the home of Joe Heidt and found him busy in his small packing plant packing his grape fruit and oranges for the market. He settled his tract of land from the brush nine years ago. He came to the valley from the north for his health 11 years ago and he is now enjoying the best of health and we believe he was the happiest human, experienced in the valley during our trip. He owns 35 acres and has it well into production.

After leaving the home of Mr. Heidt

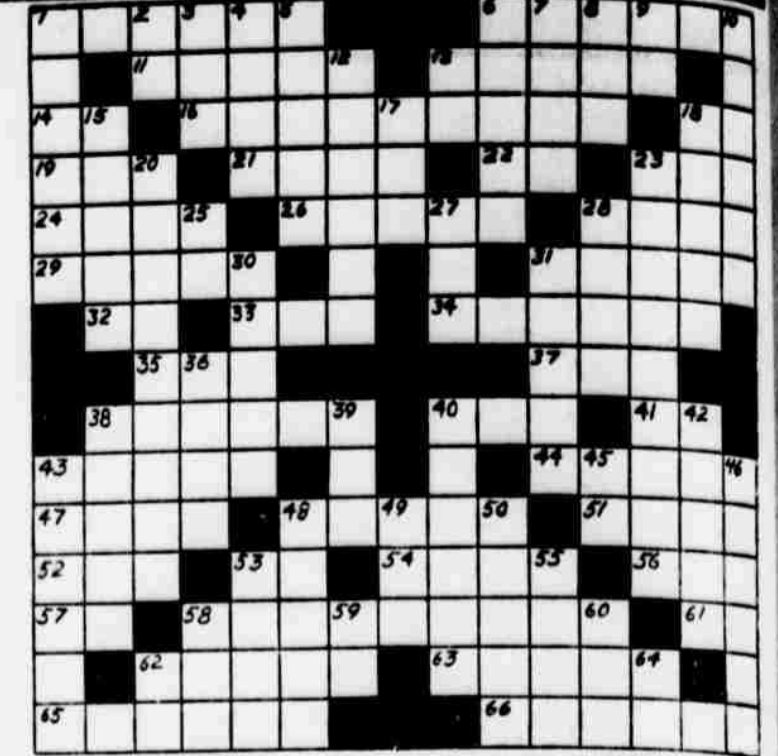
we landed into the cars for Old Mexico going by the way of San Bernito and crossing the river at Brownsville into Matamoros where we were given a dinner in one of Mexico's Sunkin Gardens commonly called a plaza which has been used for this purpose more than 150 years. Wild orange trees were growing in this garden that were reported to be more than 200 years old. The brick upon which we walked were put down about 100 years ago. The streets of Matamoros are narrow and dark and those of our party did not venture very far, but remain with the gang and all were on hand when we received the word to return. They have saloons in Matamoros but the Bow President recently elected has closed up the dancing halls and gambling dives and they were no gambling or dancing to see while we were there. The buildings seemed to be old and all windows to dwellings and business houses were securely barred. We felt

relieved when we had crossed the bridge back into Texas and good old U. S. A.

The custom officers gave us a slight inspection and passed us over and

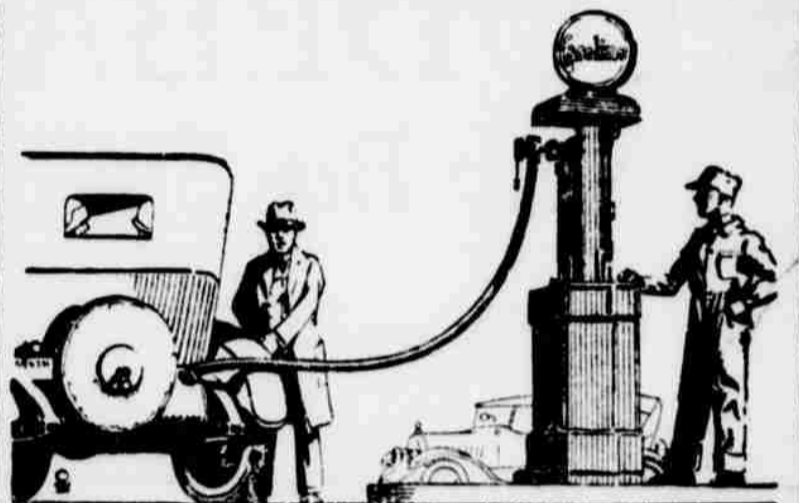

**HASKELL CITIZEN DIES AT TEMPLE**

M. H. Gilliam of Haskell died at a Temple sanitarium Sunday March 29 at 11:45 a. m. after a brief illness of only nine days from double pneumonia. He left Haskell Thursday March 27th for a visit to his old home at Temple and expected to make a tour of south Texas before his return. He has lived in Haskell 19 years and was well known and loved by all. He was one Haskell's best citizens, a Christian gentleman and a man who loved his home and took a great pride in making his home beautiful and comfortable. He will be keenly missed by loved ones and friends and his going brings sadness to the hearts of many.

Below we give a clipping from the Temple Telegraph of Monday morning following the death of Mr. Gilliam. M. H. Gilliam, Bell county resident for many years, died at 11:45 a. m. yesterday morning after an illness of about a week at the age of 60 years, six months and 17 days. Mr. Gilliam came to Bell county from Tennessee in January, 1872 with his mother and step-father, John Anderson, and settled on Little Elm Creek east of here, where in later years he met Miss Corolla Lancaster. They were united in marriage and to the union one daughter was born, Miss 18th Gilliam, who was married to T. S. Cahill of Troy, Texas. Mr. Gilliam lived in this country from 1872 until 1898 when he moved to Sutton county and engaged in the ranching business until 1905 when he returned to Temple. In 1906 he moved to Haskell and resided there the remainder of his life. He was taken seriously ill while here on a visit with relatives on March 21. Mr. Gilliam is survived by one brother, A. J. Gilliam of Temple; a half-sister, Mrs. J. C. Minkoff; two half-brothers, W. A. Anderson and F. E. Anderson of New Mexico; two grand-daughters, Mrs. Ruby Long of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Eva Campbell of Reno, Texas; one grandson, T. G. Cahill of Haskell; a great-grandson, Thomas Long of Wichita Falls; and his son-in-law, T. C. Cahill of Haskell. He was possessed to the grave by his daughter and his wife several years ago. Burial will be by the side of his wife and daughter in the Lancaster cemetery. The funeral cortege will leave the Arthur Hester Chapel Monday morning at 10 o'clock and services will be held in the Lancaster cemetery at 11 o'clock. Rev. J. Frank Holmes of Belton officiating. The pall-bearers will be R. L. McKnight, Nat Daniels, Oscar Clark, Joe Hill, H. Furr and Flou Brewster.

**RECORD TIME MADE ON TRIP FROM EL PASO TO SANTA FE**

Blinding, swirling sand storms, broken, little-crested desert "mounds" and sharp ridges of seemingly impassable hills were not enough to prevent establishment of a new record on the country automobile road record between El Paso and Santa Fe, N. M. Sealed in high gear, a Studebaker six duplex phantom has just cut an hour and 21 minutes off the former record, established a little less than a year ago by a Dodge. Its 10 hours, 25 minutes is a mark that bids fair to stand some time. The distance is 302 miles. But there is a source ten miles of roadway that may be called paved. Broken stretches of rough desert highway between these cities and Labajarda Hill, on the road, has been for years considered traversable only in low gear. Daniel Vaughan, field representative of Southwestern Motors, Inc., of El Paso, made the drive. He caused the gears to be sealed in high by representatives of the El Paso Herald. It rumbled away at 5:04 a. m. headed up a road never before traversed in high gear by any automobile. At 3:30 that same afternoon, the car pulled up before the Western Union Office in Santa Fe. The seal on the gearshift was still unbroken. In the interval the car had made spurts of 60 miles an hour over the desert, which in this instance means not only shifting sand, but hummocks, rocks and brush-grown, rough raw land. Other record runs, the time of which has not been approached by any other car, have been made by the Studebaker, including El Paso to Los Angeles, Cal. and particularly El Paso to Phoenix and over Organ Pass in high gear.

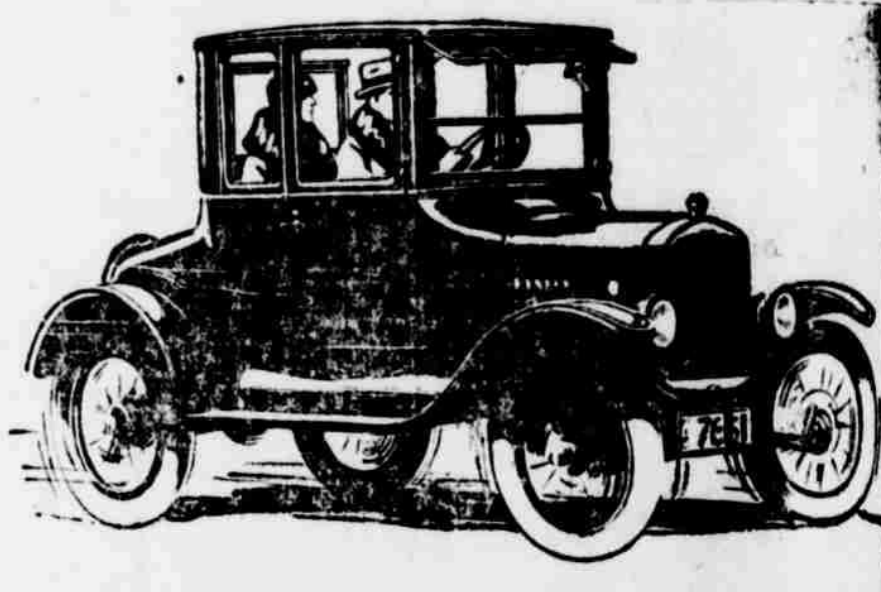
