Tools for making decisions

The result of a "brainstorming" session is a list of ideas. If this list is too long, the team can boil it down using one of the decision-making tools.

How to select a tool for making decisions

If you need to...

- Find the important items in a list
- Prioritize the items in a list (for group use)
- Prioritize items in a short list (For group or individual use)

Then try this tool:

- Multi-Voting
- Nominal Group Technique
- Pairwise Ranking

- Measure your process against another
- Identify significant influences

- Benchmarking
- Force Field Analysis

Nominal Group Technique

What it is:

Nominal group technique is a structured method that a group can use to prioritize items in a list. This method uses priorities of each group member to discover the overall priorities of the group. Nominal group technique helps you:

- Prioritize a list of ideas.
- Make decisions using inputs from all participants.

How to do it:

Assign a letter to each idea. For example, for eight ideas, you would assign the letters A through H.

List the letters. Have each person in the group write the assigned letters on a piece of paper.

Prioritize the lists. Have each person prioritize their list by writing a number beside each letter. If there are eight ideas, then "8" is written beside the letter corresponding to the most important idea. This is repeated for each number until "1" is written beside the letter corresponding to the least important idea. Each number (1 through 8) is used only once by each group member.

Compute the group total for each letter. The letter with the highest score is the idea with the highest priority, and the letter with the lowest score has the lowest priority.

Nominal Group Technique Example

The following office problems were identified in a brainstorming session:

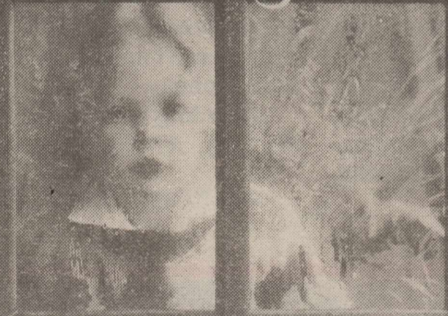
- A. Ineffective organizational structure
- B. Poor communications outside the office.
- C. Lack of training.
- D. Poor communications within the office.
- E. Unclear mission and objectives.
- F. Poor distribution of office mail.
- G. Lack of feedback on reports on management.

Each group member then wrote the letters A through G on a piece of paper and prioritized each problem from 1 to 7 (lowest to highest), using each number only once. The results were summarized as follows:

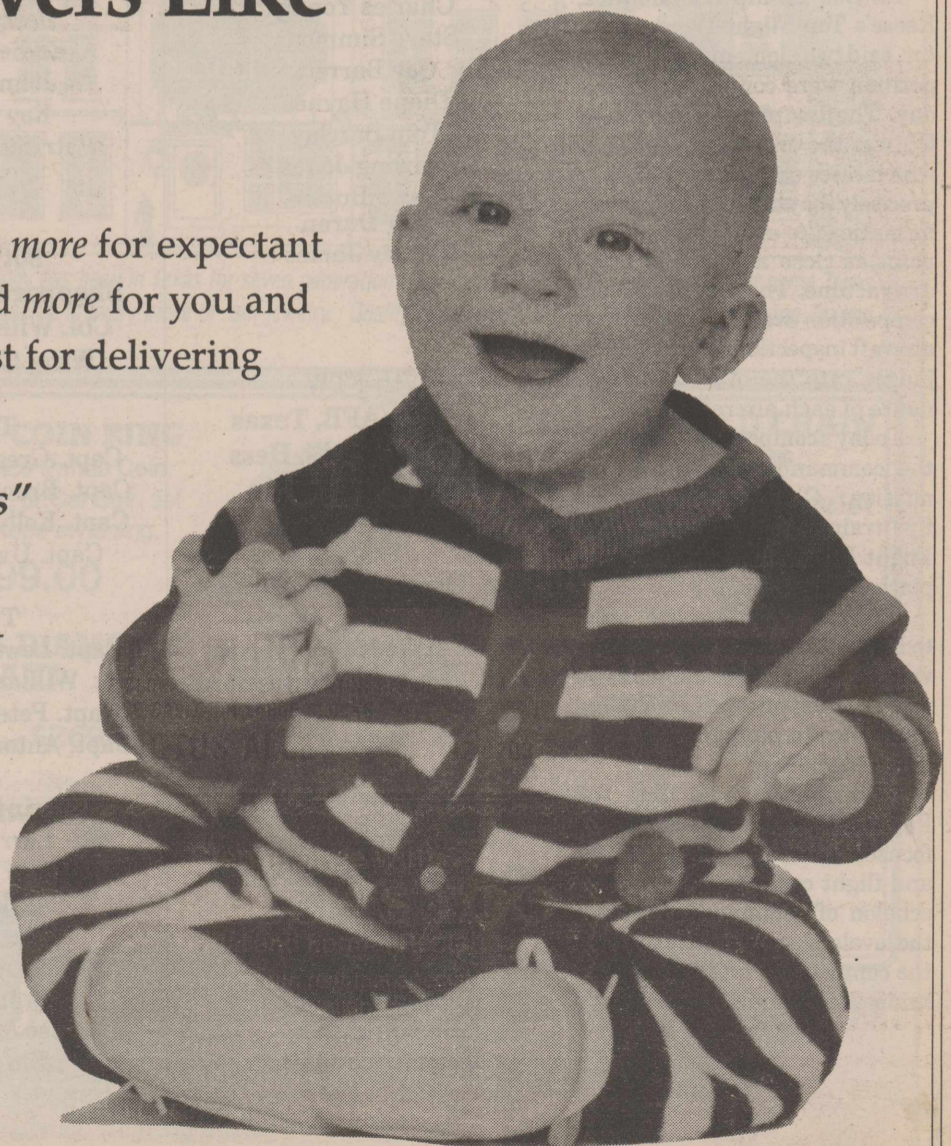

Reese hosts Top Flight IV

random selection of flight commanders and pilots "truly tests how our people operate day to day."

Maj. Gen. Jay D. Blume Jr., commander, Lowry Training Center, will be the senior judge for Top Flight IV. General Blume is a command pilot with more than 4,200 flying hours in E-3As, F-4s, F-16s, F-100s, T-33s, T-37s, T-38s, F-15s, and F-111s. More than 450 of those hours were in combat. Other judges for the competition will be from Headquarters ATC and the 12th Flying Training Wing, Randolph AFB, Texas.

Teams from seven of ATC's flying wings are participating in Top Flight IV. Participating bases include Reese; Columbus AFB, Miss.; Mather AFB, Calif.; Williams AFB, Ariz.; Vance AFB, Okla.; Laughlin AFB, Texas, and Sheppard AFB, Texas.

T-43 and T-41 Top Flight teams are not participating at Reese. Evaluators have already judged the T-43s at Mather and the 1st Flight Screening Squadron's T-41 aircraft at Hondo Airport, Texas, and the winners are scheduled to come here.

Lt. Col. Phillip Romanowicz, Reese's Top Flight IV coordinator, said two elements of the competition were conducted Thursday. The first phase of Top Flight IV was the arrival competition, which rates each aircrew on how precisely they can maneuver their formations to arrive at a specific point as close as possible to an arrival time. The second phase of competition was the individual aircraft inspection. In this phase judges rate the overall maintenance of each aircraft.

Today's competition focuses on the command's flying training mission. Competing pilots will fly "training" sorties with Top Flight IV evaluators taking the place of students.

On the maintenance side, today's competition will rate how well the crew chiefs launch and recover their aircraft, including adherence to preflight and post-flight checklists.

ATC officials note that Top Flight has three objectives. It focuses attention on the flight and flight commander, the first echelon of command. It raises the levels of performance through the competition and incentive it brings, and it promotes pride and

spirit.

Awards banquets for the operations and maintenance teams are scheduled for this evening at the Officers' Open Mess and Enlisted Open Mess respectively. General Ashy is scheduled to present the top awards at each award ceremony.

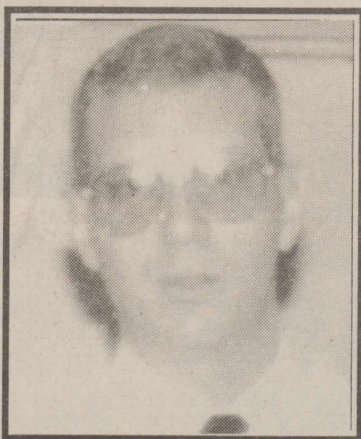

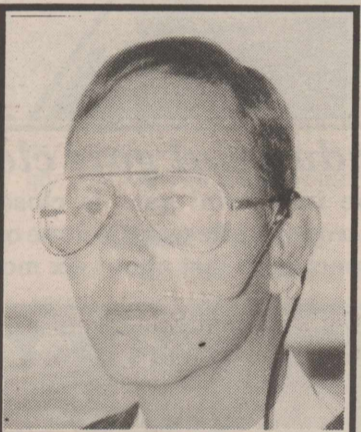

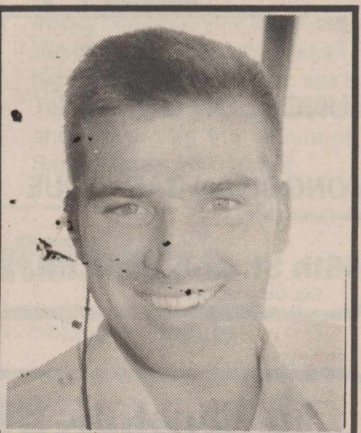

Pair review experience at Senior NCO Academy

Two wing senior NCOs recently graduated from the Senior NCO Academy at Gunter AFB, Ala.

SMSgt. Mike Braskett, first sergeant, 64th Logistics Squadron, and SMSgt. Curtis Trull, first sergeant and chief of maintenance, 64th Communications Squadron, completed the seven-week course Oct 21.

"The course and instructors were first class," said Sergeant-Braskett. "It was an eye-open-

ing experience I wouldn't have missed."

Sergeant Trull noted the exchange of experiences with other senior NCOs as a high point of the course.

"Anytime you have 300 senior NCOs around, there are a lot of experiences to share," said Sergeant Trull. "It helped me gain perspective on the different situations used in different jobs."

Sergeant Braskett noted the intent of the course was to

share or expose the students to as much new material as possible to make them better leaders when they returned to their bases. He said the objectives were met.

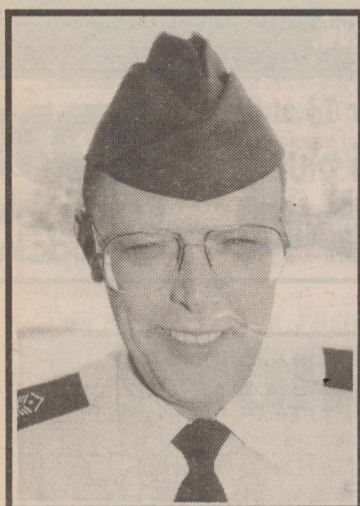
"I strongly recommend the course," he said. "The people they bring in have insights they pass along that you wouldn't get anywhere else."

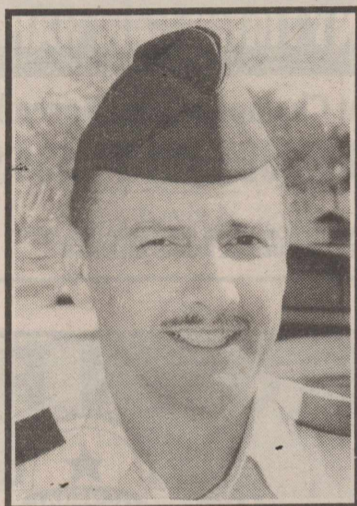
"Regardless of whether you pin on chief or not, the course is very beneficial," said the chief. "It's by far the best course I have ever attended."

"The course had significant amounts of personal skills you can use throughout your life," said Sergeant Trull. "What you learn is not just related to the military."

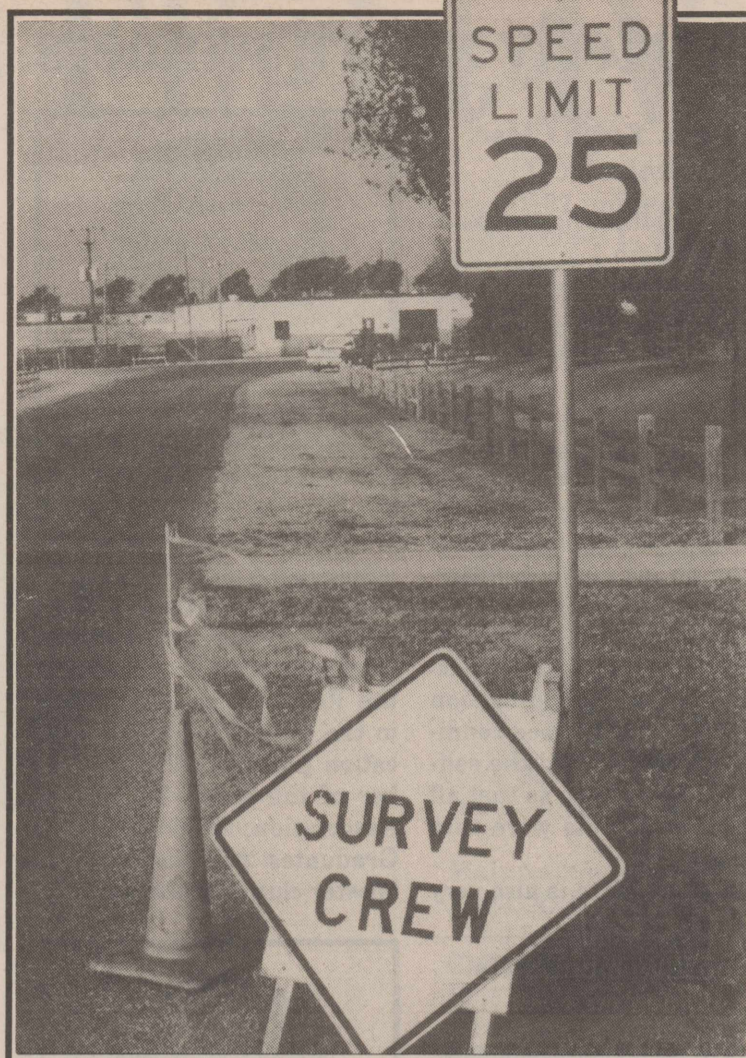
The course graduates about 1,800 senior NCOs annually.

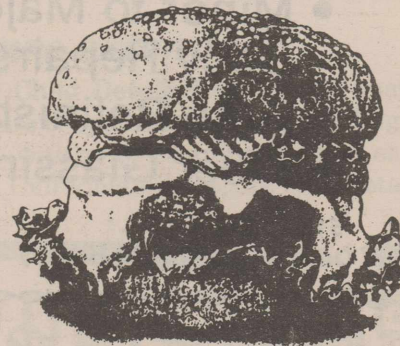

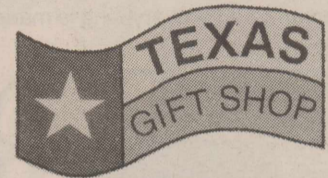

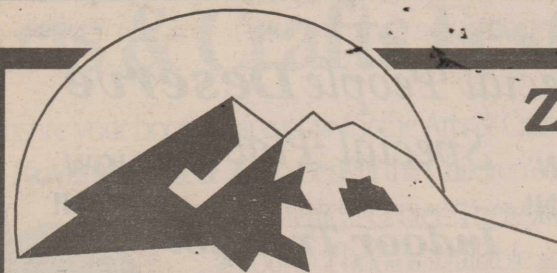

Portable heaters require caution

At times during the cold season our central heating units may not provide adequate heating to suit our comfort level and we may think of adding a portable heating source such as kerosene, electric, liquid propane gas, diesel-fired furnaces or a fireplace. It should be remembered, however, that while portable space heaters can provide warmth and comfort, they can also bring injury, destruction and death if used carelessly.

To prevent or reduce potential fire and safety hazards with space heaters, Reese members are advised to consider the following safety guidelines and precautions:

□ Make sure the heater is in good operating condition. Follow all written safety instructions provided with the unit.

□ Electric heaters should be Underwriters Laboratories approved, and equipped with a tip-over safety switch to automatically shut the heater off if it turns over.

□ Heaters should be placed where there is sufficient circulation and at least 36 inches away from furnishings, curtains and clothing.

□ Portable heaters should never be left unattended; provide adequate supervision for children when heaters are in use. Thousands of children and senior citizens receive contact burns each winter season from coming too close to space heaters.

Central heating systems that use natural gas, portable heaters using kerosene or liquid propane gas, and all wood-burning stoves produce carbon monoxide. Even though you can't see it, smell it, taste it or hear it, carbon monoxide can kill you nevertheless. Proper ventilation to exhaust the deadly fumes to the outside is an absolute must to reduce the chances of carbon monoxide poisoning. Frequent visual inspection of any heating unit is

necessary and any damage to ventilation piping must be corrected. Change furnace filters every two weeks. Never store flammable or combustible material in the area of the central heating unit.

Even though there are no fireplaces or chimneys on Reese, off-base personnel may have them and these people are reminded to keep fireplaces and chimneys clean. The fireplace should be inspected annually to ensure the flue is working properly and checked for defective masonry. When removing hot ashes use metal containers with a tight-fitting lid. Do not place ashes in a dumpster until they are cold. A non-combustible screen should be placed in front of the fireplace to keep hot cinders and ashes from escaping. Never use flammable liquid to start a fire or burn anything other than wood or paper as a starter.

Automobiles in enclosed areas are yet another source of carbon monoxide poisoning.

If you are feeling dizzy or weak or if your head hurts when you're around a particular appliance or in a specific part of your house, you may be experiencing the first symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning. Call the housing maintenance office at 3047 for urgent repairs.

In situations where members of your family are unconscious or can't be awakened and have a deep cherry-red skin color, they may be suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning. Immediately call 911. Then open doors and windows and evacuate the house. If it is carbon monoxide poisoning, you and family members need fresh air.

The fire department has sent each organization on base an information pamphlet entitled "Portable Heaters Can Be Dangerous." If your organization needs additional copies, call the fire prevention office at 3686 or 6339.

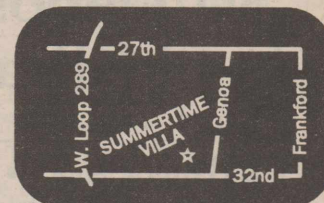

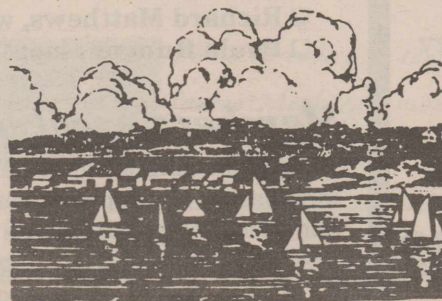

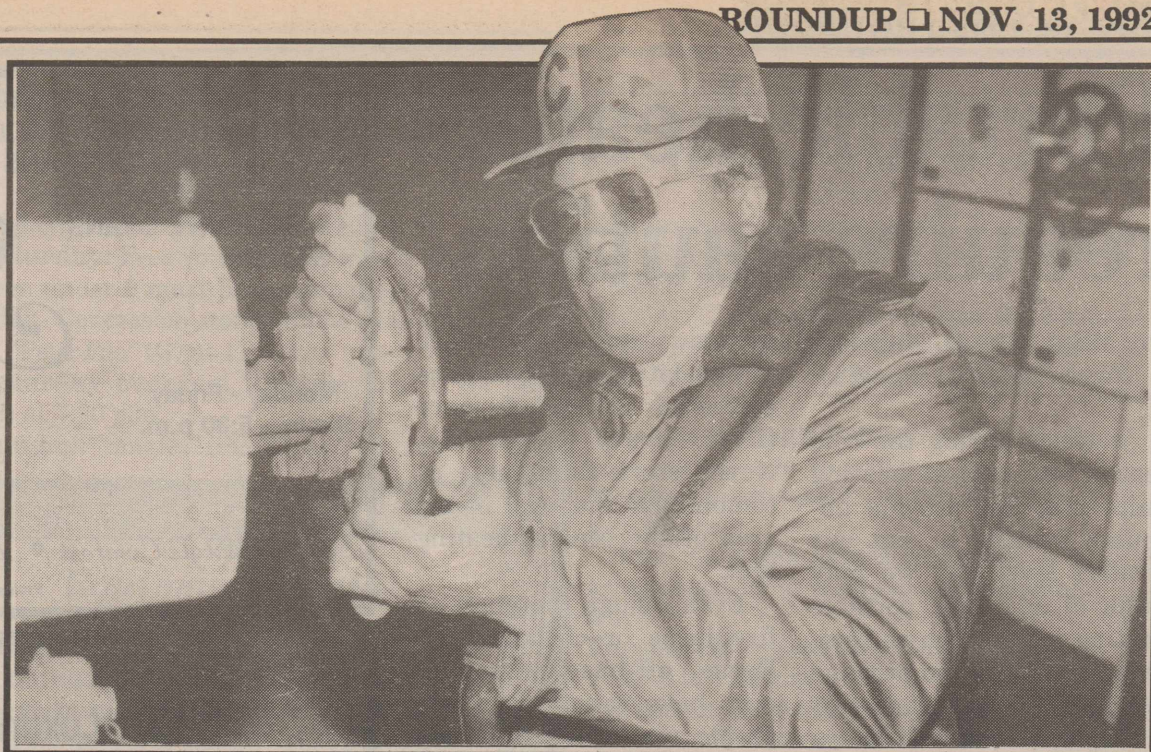

The 54th FTS scored in the third quarter of the game when 54th FTS "A" quarterback Capt. Kirk Willburger ran it in from 6 yards out.

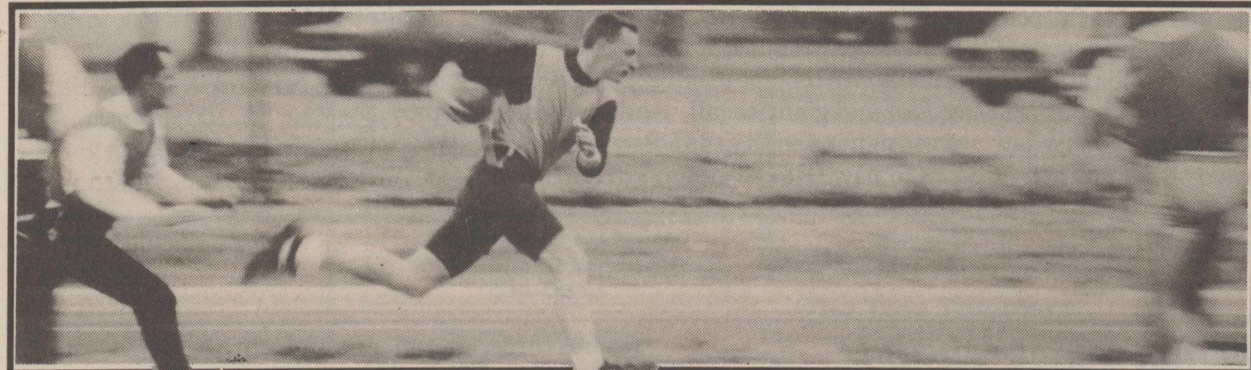
Capt. Scott Wardle, 54th FTS "A" team captain, said there was no set game plan against the 35th.

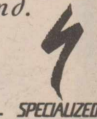

Athleticism not worth steroid abuse

Drug abuse has many faces.

Most of us visualize a thin, glassy-eyed derelict with hypodermic needle in one hand and a vial of crack cocaine in the other when we hear the term "drug abuser." However, there are some drug abusers and addicts among us who don't meet such common stereotypes.

In fact, some drug abusers often appear healthy. Healthy looking drug abusers work out daily, sometimes many times a day, to achieve superior muscular size, strength and definition and would never consider taking a mind altering drug. And yet, these drug abusers continue to risk their physical health, well-being and careers by taking anabolic steroids.

There are currently a number of scientific and medical studies indicating that steroid abuse can have severe and detrimental effects on an individual's health, up to and including liver damage, heart disease and even death. This evidence has been so convincing that the Air Force now lists steroids as prohibited substances and

steroid abuse is now a reason for discharge or separation. An airman can be discharged for misconduct and issued a discharge under other than honorable conditions of a general discharge for the illegal, wrongful, or improper use or possession of anabolic and androgenic steroids.

This fact was recently and forcefully brought to the attention of an enlisted member and local bodybuilder who was discharged from the Air Force with a general discharge for steroid abuse. Similar steroid abuse provisions exist for the involuntary separation of officers for misconduct or moral or professional dereliction.

As the scientific and medical evidence of the dangers of steroid abuse continues to increase, many state legislatures have added steroids to their lists of controlled substances. The intentional, knowing and unlawful possession of human growth hormones or any of the prohibited anabolic steroids is now a crime in Texas that is punishable by confinement in the county jail for up to 180 days and a fine not to

exceed \$1,000 (for possession of 200 grams or less) or confinement in prison for not less than five years nor more than 99 years or life and a fine not to exceed \$50,000 (for possession of 200 grams or more).

The Air Force can now adopt Texas law and court martial or impose nonjudicial punishment on an Air Force member who intentionally or knowingly uses or possesses human growth hormone or any anabolic steroid. To help assist in the detection of steroid abuse the Air Force has recently started a "pilot" urinalysis program which is expected to be introduced to the entire Air Force in the near future.

In 1988 Canadian sprinter Ben Johnson was stripped of an Olympic Gold Medal because of steroid abuse. No one thought of Ben Johnson as a drug abuser, but he was.

Steroid abuse is not only dangerous to your health but it may result in the individual Air Force member being prosecuted and going to jail. And that's an even higher penalty than Ben Johnson had to pay. (Reese Legal Office)

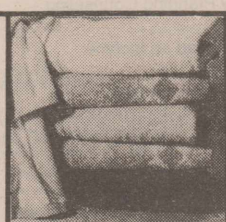

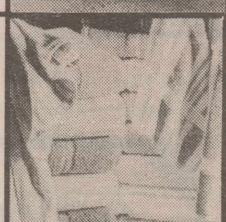

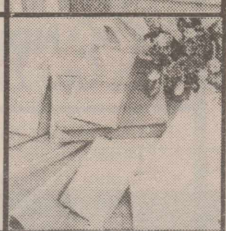
