
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


Commander praises Reese's jets

Noting that Reese's T-37s look better today than when he flew his first T-37 UPT sortie here 30 years ago, Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Ashy, Air Training Command commander, presented Reese the Top Flight award for best T-37 appearance Nov. 13.

The award was one of several presented by General Ashy at the conclusion of the Top Flight IV competition. The 47th Flying Training Wing from Laughlin AFB, Texas, flew home with the ATC Top Wing award.

Top Flight IV gathered instructor •pilots and crew chiefs from across the

command. Trophies were awarded to winners in both team and individual categories.

The event has three objectives: to focus attention on the flight and flight commander, the first echelon of command; to raise levels of performance through competition and the incentive it brings; and to foster pride and spirit.

Teams from ATC's undergraduate pilot training bases — Columbus AFB, Miss.; Williams AFB, Ariz.; Vance AFB, Okla.; Laughlin; and Sheppard AFB, Texas, met at Reese for the event.

Participants from two other locations also competed — Hondo, Texas, and Mather AFB, Calif., - but their aircraft were not flown to Reese. The 1st Flight Screening Squadron's T-41 aircraft and personnel were evaluated at Hondo Airport by local judges. Evaluators judged Mather's T-43s and maintenance personnel at their home base, but the T-37 pilots from Mather competed at Reese.

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
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ffers advice to make moves smoo

If you've had a recent permanentchange-of-station move that didn't go as well as you expected, we want to help. Did you know everything the movers were required to do? Did you know everything you were required to do? Were you aware of all your entitlements and options? We've prepared a list of answers to common questions and problems that frequently occur on PCS moves

Q: Why can't TMO tell me about my entitlements or schedule my move until I get orders?

A: Your orders contain all your entitlements. Since all moves are different, we can't really tell you what you're entitled to until we see your orders. Such things as TDYs enroute, or TDY out and back, with dependent accompanied tour, command-sponsored tour, unaccompanied tour, unaccompanied more than 20 weeks, unaccompanied less than 20 weeks, are just a few of the details contained in your orders.

We need these details before we advise you on what you can expect. Your orders also contain the funding citation for your move. When we schedule your move, we book it through a local carrier. This requires the commitment of funds from the funds cite listed on the orders. We can't obligate a carrier to make a move until we have the funding to issue the various types of transportation documents.

Q: Why can't my wife sign for the release of my property?

A: She can, provided you've identified her as a releasing agent when you received your briefing move or if you've given her a power of attorney authorizing her to release your property.

Q: Why do I have to have a briefing for my move, especially if I just did a move recently?

A: Moving briefings are required by the Joint Federal Travel Regulation for each move. The JFTR is written by Congress and is public law. Additionally, the JFTR changes very frequently and it's our responsibility to make sure you get all the right information for your move.

Q: What do I need to do to fill out a claim?

A: You'll need your copy of the Department of Defense Form 1840 (it's the pink one), a copy of your inventory, and a copy of the government bill of lading (it will probably be blue). If you need copies of any of these documents TMO can help you get them.

Q: What if the movers or packers are rude, or what if they're packing things poorly?

A: Call TMO. We'll get an inspector out to your residence and we'll stay there until you're satisfied. We'll also get you another packing crew if that's what it takes for you to feel like you're getting a quality move.

Q: The movers left and they won't

come back and pick up the boxes and packing materials. What do I do?

A: If you signed the 1840 releasing the movers from picking up the boxes and materials, then they won't come back. The best alternative is to make sure they've unpacked all items you want unpacked before you sign the form, then they're required to remove all packing materials.

Q: My piano, given to me by my grandmother, is an antique, over 150 years old. Now it's broken and a claim will never cover what it's really worth. What am I supposed to do?

A: In a perfect world, this would never happen. We at TMO do sympathize with you and we do penalize the carrier for excessive damages to your household goods. A future option is to pay the extra money for increased valuation insurance.

Q: The movers took apart my waterbed at origin. What's supposed to happen at destination?

A: If the movers took it apart, they're required to put it back together. Call TMO for an inspector if you have a problem in this area.

Q: My shipment was due in here two weeks ago. Where is it?

A: The carrier is penalized for missing the required delivery date (RDD) at a rate of four points per day. If the carrier continues to have this type of trend, they'll be suspended from any

military moves. Additionally, if the carrier misses your RDD, then you may file an inconvenience claim. This goes directly from you to the carrier and has no Air Force involvement. Although the carrier does not have to honor your claim, most will honor at least part of your expenses. Make sure you keep receipts for all items you had to rent or buy as a result of not having your household goods shipment on the RDD. TMO has a handout to assist you in filing your claim.

Q: I did a Do-It-Yourself move from Colorado Springs to Reese and I lost money. Why is this?

A: DITY moves are based on the amount of money it would cost the government to make the same size shipment. Sometimes the line-haul rates negotiated by the government are very competitive with what it costs to rent a truck and do it yourself. If you'll come by TMO before you make your DITY, we'll tell you how much you'll be paid based on your weight estimate. Another factor in DITY, moves is that people often overestimate their weight. Contact TMO for help in estimating your weight and prevent overpayment.



ters deputy chief of staff for operations. The flight commanders then chose three additional IPs from their flights to compete. Teams flew to Reese Nov. 12 for the competition.

"By randomly selecting flight commanders we get a much better snapshot of how well our people fly their training missions day to day," explained Brig. Gen. J. O. McFalls. deputy chief of staff for operations, ATC headquarters. "Top Flight's short-notice format underlines the task faced by flight commanders and their instructor pilots - training pilots to fly the best aircraft in the world's best Air Force."

In the operations competition, T-37 and T-38 pilots from each wing vied for the highest combined flying and instructing score while performing instructional sorties. A flight examiner from the standardization and evaluation directorate at ATC headquarters flew with the instructor pilots and scored the sortie.

Each pilot received a score that was a percentage of the maximum number of points available for that instructional sortie. Winners in the top wing, flight and IP categories were selected based on individual and combined scores.

The 47th FTW, Laughlin AFB,

piled up the highest combined score at the command's flying competition and won the ATC Top Wing award. The score was based on the points earned by its T-37 and T-38 flights.

Other operational winners were: The top overall flight award went to the T-38 flight from the 47th FTW at Laughlin AFB. Team members included Capt. Kenneth R. Hubbard, Capt. Brent P. Markowski, Capt. Jeffrey G. Olesen and 1st Lt. Gregory L. Rutherford. They also took the top T-38 flight award

The top T-37 flight award went to the team from the 14th FTW, Columbus AFB, Miss. Team members included Capt. Al J. Konkel, 1st Lt. Brian L. Welch, 1st Lt. Kevin M. Zeller and 1st Lt. David P. Nardozzi.

Top T-43 crew honors went to the team from the 323rd FTW at Mather AFB, Calif. They were Capt. Valerie Moore, aircraft commander, Capt. Todd Beer, first pilot; and Navy Lt. David Hill, instructor navigator.

The top T-37 IP award went to Capt. Kenneth A. Arcoleo from the 323rd FTW, Mather AFB, Calif. Top T-38 IP honors went to Captain Hubbard. The top T-41 IP was Joseph F. East Jr. of the 1st Flight

Ms. Haynes, from Columbus, was the top T-37 crew chief, while Steve Butler of Columbus was tops in the T-38 category.


The T-38 aircraft appearance honors went to Laughlin.


Permanent party awards will go to the outstanding academic and flightline instructor pilots, maintainers and mission makers.





Water to change for base people

* The base has been notified by the city of Lubbock that, beginning in December, base water will be supplied from a new source.

Until now, base water has come from wells. The water line from these wells is aging and must be taken out of service for repair. While the repair is being completed, a new tie-in with the principle city water system will be used.

Unfortunately, the principle city water system does not have the aesthetic qualities we have enjoyed. Although it meets all Texas water safety standards, it does not meet all Texas recommended aesthetic standards — the level of chlorides is about 30 percent higher than the Texas recommended aesthetic standard of 300 milligrams per liter, while the level of dissolved solids is about 20 percent over the Texas recommended aesthetic standard of 1000 milligrams per liter.

The type of disinfectant used by the city may be harmful to tropical fish, but local pet stores can provide a treatment to remove this chemical. The city water is slightly harder than normal ground water, and has a somewhat higher level of sodium. People who are concerned about sodium in their diet should consult their physicians.

The water is the same as is used in the city of Lubbock. It is safe, but will not have the taste Reese has enjoyed in the past. The repair of the old water line will take more than a year, but when completed will allow the well water to be used-once again.

Five wing officers have been chosen for service schools and two others have been selected as alternates.



Betty Donaldson, Frenship Intermediate School principal, said the program has been a positive influence on her students, and she hopes to continue the program at the school.

"I think we're going to get a real long-term pay back for the efforts that have been put out," said Principal Donaldson. "This is an excellent program, and Reese has put out a good effort and commitment to make it happen."

Other topics the DARE curriculum includes are: eight ways to say no to drugs, peer pressure, self-esteem, assertiveness, social influences contributing to the use of drugs and positive alternatives to drug use.

President-elect talks about military issues Plans to lift homosexual ban

WASHINGTON - Presiedent-elect Bill Clinton says his top priority is keeping a strong military, and will move forward on his proposal to allow gays in the military.

"The pillars of our national security and foreign policy ought to be a different, but still very strong defense," said President-elect Clinton during his first televised press conference Nov. 12.

"My top priority will be settling on a multi-year plan for a defense budget that I think keeps the defense of this country the strongest in the world, and deals with the necessity to down-scale."

President-elect Clinton also reiterated his position on homosexuals in the military saying, "I'm going to move forward on that."

"My concern here is to do Tit in a way that's most appropriate for the management of the whole national security, and military interests of the country."

The president-elect also said he will lift the ban on homosexuals in the military after he consults with "a lot of people about what our options are, including people who may disagree with me about the ultimate merits."

During Veterans Day activities at Little Rock, Ark., President-elect Clinton said he does not want in any way to condone any improper behavior, but the question of homosexuals in the military, is "simply status." -

"Should people who have served their country with distinction, many of them with battlefield ribbons, and who have never had any kind of question about their conduct raised be booted out of the military?" President-elect Clinton asked.

"We don't have a person to time worrying about how to tion." lift each other up."

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Also on Veterans Day, President-elect Clinton said the United States needs to invest more in airlift and sealift "because in this uncertain world, we never know where we might be needed."

While President-elect Clinton is proposing a more high-tech military, he's also backed more troop cuts in Europe and in future defense budgets.

Nevertheless, the Pentagon is saying the fiscal 1992 drawdown will not only be the largest for the Department of Defense since 1972, it will also be the largest for each military department.

"In other words, it's not merely some sort of anomaly for one department, it's the largest for all the departments — Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marines," said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams Nov. 10.

In the fiscal 1993 defense budget, the Bush administration asked Congress for a base force of 1,644,200 by fiscal 1997. At the end of fiscal 1992, the base force was at 1,807,000, or 160,000 activeduty troops to be cut over three fiscal years, Mr. Williams said.


However, there's still a risk in breaking the force, depending if Congress wants a lot of money quickly out of the defense budget, he said.

President-elect Clinton has stressed the "necessity of a down-scaled" military in the defense budgets he is proposing.

"The only way to do that is to take it out of the personnel account," Williams said. "The other danger, of course, in terms of breaking the force, is if we're forced to rapidly draw down the number of people who are deployed overseas. If we're forced to pull a bunch of people out of Europe faster than we can do so in a manner that is easy on those waste in America.
