Early voting for general election starts Monday

With just under three weeks until the November 4 general election, campaigning is in full swing.

Last week, U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzalez Ramos of Corpus Christi ruled that the state cannot enforce the voter identification law,

which was passed by the Texas Legislature in 2011 as Senate Bill 14. While that point is being sorted out through the courts, the election is expected to be held as scheduled.

There will be several contested state and federal races. Vying to become the next Governor of Texas is

Republican Greg Abbott, Democrat Wendy Davis, Libertarian Kathie Glass and Green Party candidate Brandon Parmer. Lieutenant Governor candidates from the two major parties are Dan Patrick, Republican and Leticia Van de Putte, Democrat.

The Attorney General's position is also on the ballot, with Ken Paxton, Sam Houston, Jamie Balagia and Jamar Osborne hoping to win the office. Our state representative for District 68, Drew Springer, is unopposed.

Other contested races are Comptroller of Public Accounts, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Commissioner of Agriculture and Railroad Commissioner.

In addition, voters will decide on Justices for the Supreme Court, Judges for Court of Criminal Appeals, and members of State Board of Education.

On the federal level, we will be electing a U.S. Representative for District 19, with Republican incumbent Randy Neugebauer, Democrat Neal Marchbanks and Libertarian Richard Peterson seeking the job.

On the ballot for U.S. Senator is incumbent John Cornyn, David Alameel and Rebecca Paddock.

There are no contested county races. Haskell County incumbents who have filed for re-election include Democrats Shane Hadaway, 39th Judicial District Judge;

David Davis, County Judge; Belia Abila, County Clerk; Penny Anderson, District Clerk; Tiffen Mayfield, County Commissioner Prec. 2; Neal Kreger, County Commissioner Prec. 4; Lynn Dodson, Justice of the Peace; and Pamela Norton, Party Chairman. Locally on the Republican ticket is Janis McDaniel, County Treasurer and Brian Burgess, Party Chairman.

Early voting will be held October 20 through October 31 at the Haskell County courthouse. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is October 24.

As Americans, it is not only our right, but also our responsibility to be informed and then vote for the candidates of our choice.

Trueblood spent 35 years in Los Angeles as an animator for popular children's television shows. He and Carol moved to Haskell County in 2000 to be closer to family.

The Rule Bobcats continue a three game winning streak as they prepare to begin district play.

The Bobcats were on the road to Northside Friday night, where they defeated the Indians in front of a homecoming crowd, by a score of 67-14.

Coach Mark Weaver told his Bobcats, "We are going to have to bring our own excitement and intensity." The Bobcats delivered on both counts, outscoring the Indians 46-14 in the first quarter. In the second quarter Rule's momentum continued as they scored another 21 unanswered points. The game was called at halftime because of the 45 point rule.

Outstanding performances by the Bobcats included Colton Rogers with 188 yards rushing on four carries, with three touchdowns, four tackles, an interception for a touchdown, two forced fumbles and three recovered fumbles.

Jonah Caddell had 100 yards rushing on two carries with two touchdowns, along with four tackles. Chase Potter had two carries for 45 yards and one touchdown. He also had four tackles,

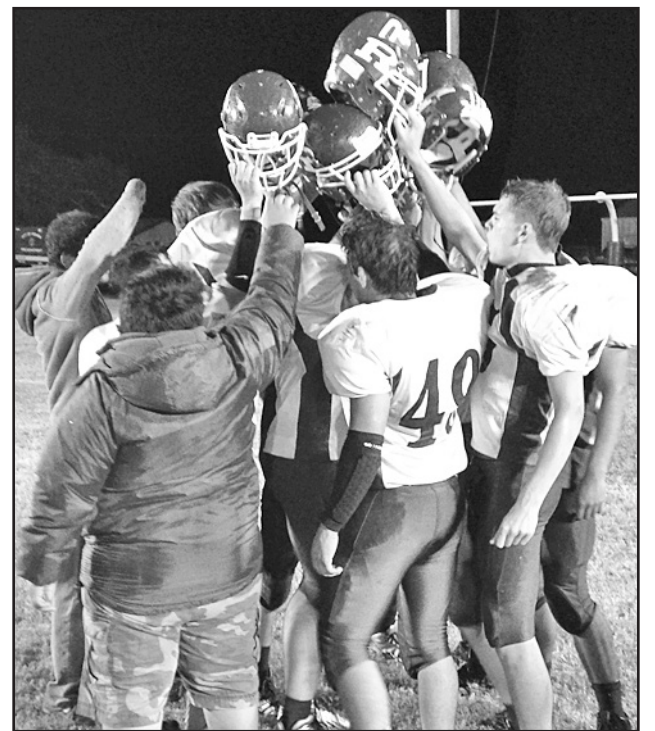
one forced fumble and one interception for a touchdown.

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Store front program applications accepted

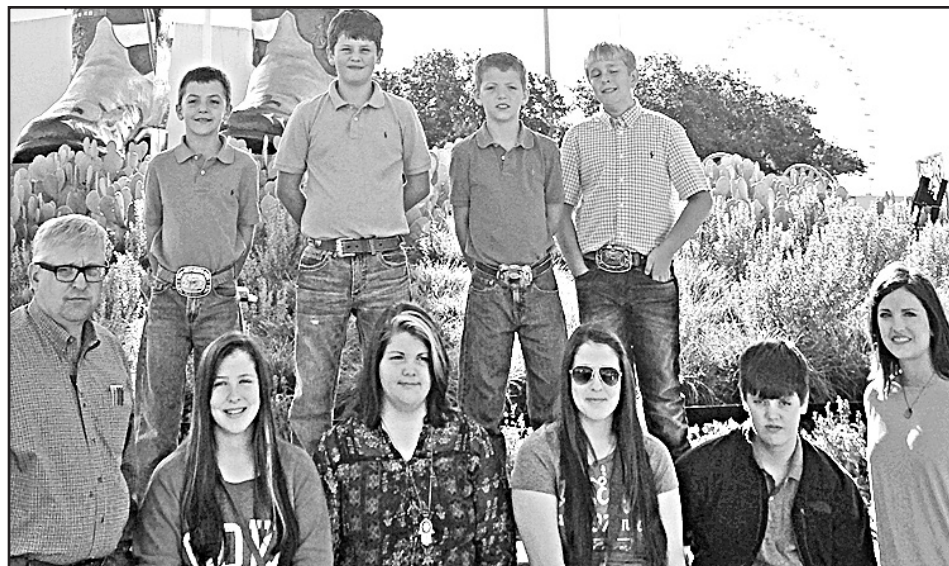
The Development Corporation of Haskell (DCOH) and Haskell Downtown Revitalization Committee (DRC) now are accepting applications for the 2014-2015 Store Front Development Program (SFDP).

The SFDP, which is in its second year, is open to all of Haskell's commercial building owners within the Haskell city limits. Approved recipients are eligible to receive up to \$2,500 in grant funds for agreed to façade improvements on their building. Items approved for SFDP funding grants include paint, signage, lighting, windows, doors, awnings and contract labor.

"The ten projects that already have been completed through last year's Store Front Development Program have changed the appearance of Haskell's downtown square. The DCOH board of directors sees tremendous value with continuing this program for a second year and hopes building owners will take advantage of the \$25,000 in grant funds that will be available for these types of improvements," said Mary Drury, Executive Director of the DCOH.

To participate in the SFDP, building owners must first submit an application detailing the improvements they intend for their building's façade. Each application will be reviewed by the Haskell DRC and must be within the scope of the approved color palate and best practices outlined by the committee. The committee will meet twice to review applications and make final decisions on which projects will be funded through the program.

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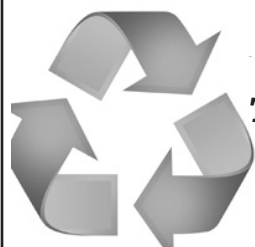

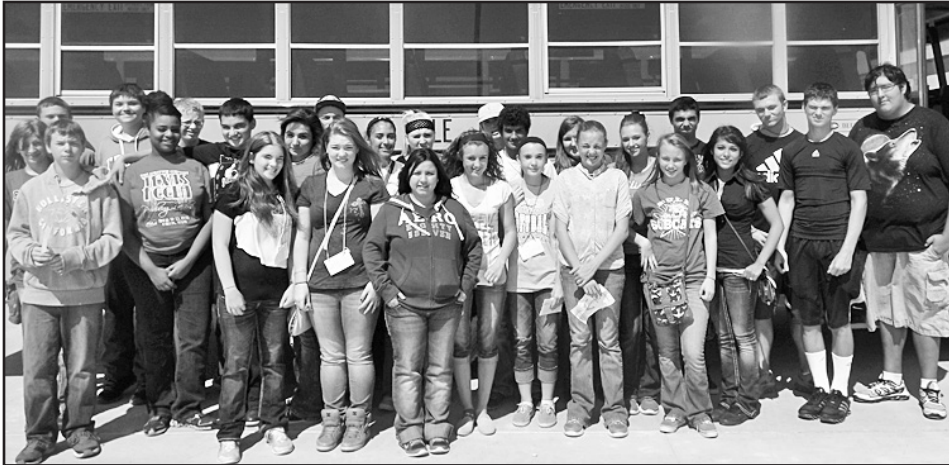



Ruling prevents state from enforcing voter ID law

AUSTIN—An Oct. 9 ruling by U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzalez Ramos of Corpus Christi prevents the state from enforcing the voter identification law passed by the Texas Legislature in 2011 as Senate Bill 14.

In the case, *Marc Veasey et al. v. Rick Perry et al.*, Ramos ruled the law was enacted with a discriminatory purpose and an impermissible discriminatory effect against Hispanics and African-Americans. Ramos said the law places an unconstitutional burden on the right to vote that is, in effect, a poll tax. “Plaintiffs,” she wrote, “have thus demonstrated that every form of SB 14-qualified ID available to the general public is issued at a cost.”

Supporters of the law said the law, which requires each voter to present an official photo ID card, is needed to combat voter impersonation fraud, to build public confidence in election results, and to increase participation in elections.

State Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, who fought against the passage of SB 14 and testified in the district court proceedings, commented: “As the court ruled, the voter ID law is essentially a modern day poll tax and has the same effect as other laws used in decades past to keep scores of lawful, legal Americans from voting. It was wrong then, it is wrong now, and I’m pleased the court stood up to protect the right to vote for all Texans.”

Ramos further ordered, “Any remedial enactment by the Texas Legislature, as well as any remedial changes by Texas’s administrative agencies, must come to the Court for approval.”

Lauren Bean of the Office of the Texas Attorney General on Oct. 9 said, “The State of Texas will immediately appeal and will urge the Fifth Circuit (Court of Appeals in New Orleans) to resolve this matter quickly to avoid voter confusion in the upcoming election. The U.S. Supreme Court has already ruled that voter ID laws are constitutional so we are confident the Texas law will be upheld on appeal.”

Election day is Nov. 4, with early voting to be conducted Oct. 21-31. The last day for Texans to register to vote was Oct. 6.

Texas prepares for Ebola

Thomas Eric Duncan, the first individual diagnosed with Ebola virus in the United States, died in the isolation unit of a Dallas hospital on Oct. 8. And now, a hospital worker who had contact with Duncan has been diagnosed with the disease.

According to the Department of State Health Services, Ebola is not

contagious until symptoms appear, which can occur two to 21 days after exposure. Early symptoms include fever, headache, abdominal pain and weakness.

Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 6 announced the creation of the Texas Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response, to “assess and enhance the state’s existing capabilities to prepare for and respond to pandemic disease, such as the Ebola virus.” He publicized a list of state agency heads, medical researchers and other prominent people to serve on the task force. The task force is to issue its first report by Dec. 1 and a second report by Feb. 1, 2015.

Perry, who called on the federal government to increase screening efforts at all points of entry to help prevent the disease from entering the country, toured the Galveston National Laboratory at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston on Oct. 7. One of two national biocontainment laboratories in the U.S., the facility’s personnel study infectious diseases such as Ebola. There are 13 regional biocontainment laboratories in the U.S.

Perry visited Fort Hood on Oct. 9 to encourage a brigade of soldiers being deployed to Liberia to build Ebola treatment units.

Sales tax revenue increases

State Comptroller Susan Combs on Oct. 8 announced state sales tax revenue in September was \$2.17 billion, up 7.9 percent compared to September 2013.

“Significant growth in sales tax revenues occurred across all major economic sectors, reflecting strength in both business and consumer spending. The gains were led by remittances from the oil and natural gas-related and manufacturing sectors, as well as from restaurants and retail trade,” she explained.

Combs said cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts will receive October local sales tax allocations totaling \$621.7 million, up 7.2 percent compared to October 2013.

Holiday arrest total comes in

Texas Department of Public Safety troopers made 1,175 driving-while-intoxicated arrests during a special enforcement period from Aug. 15 through Sept. 2, which included the Labor Day holiday.

The enforcement effort, abetted by a Texas Department of Transportation grant, also resulted in 18,615 speeding citations, 2,840 seat belt/child safety seat citations, 838 fugitive arrests and 665 felony arrests, DPS Executive Director Steven McCraw said.

Sat., Oct. 18 from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. is the one day show of the highly prized artistic work by Adolph Bayers, the celebrated bit and spur maker from Gilliland.

Frances Hamm, daughter of Adolph Bayers will speak at 10:30 a.m. and at 2:00 p.m. Collectors and cowboys, who wear their spurs every day, will be here to show their prized possessions. There are many interesting stories to be told about when they ordered their spurs from Adolph in his workshop at his home in Gilliland and how he kept a record of his orders.

Cancer claimed this talented Texan in 1978 at the age of 65. At the time of his death, he was seven years behind in filling orders for spurs. Each order had an attached check or cash. He would never spend the money until he had delivered the finished items.

He was a veteran of World War II. Soon after the war began, he enlisted in the Navy. While on the USS Kitty Hawk aircraft carrier, he crafted several knives from spare parts of helicopters as he had used spare parts of a model T car axle to make spurs in his dirt floor workshop in Gilliland.

USDA credit to help new farm families

Agriculture Deputy Secretary Krysta Harden announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will improve farm loans by expanding eligibility and increasing lending limits to help more beginning and family farmers. As part of this effort, USDA is raising the borrowing limit for the microloan program from \$35,000 to \$50,000; simplify the lending processes; updating required “farming experience” to include other valuable experiences; and expanding eligible business entities to reflect changes in the way family farms are owned and operated. The changes become effective Nov. 7.

“USDA is continuing its commitment to new and existing family farmers and ranchers by expanding access to credit,” said Harden. “These new flexibilities, created by the 2014 Farm Bill, will help more people who are

considering farming and ranching, or who want to strengthen their existing family operation.”

The microloan changes will allow beginning, small and mid-sized farmers to access an additional \$15,000 in loans using a simplified application process with up to seven years to repay. Microloans are part of USDA’s continued commitment to small and mid-sized farming operations.

In addition to farm related experience, other types of skills may be considered to meet the direct farming experience required for farm loan eligibility such as operation or management of a non-farm business, leadership positions while serving in the military, or advanced education in an agricultural field. Also, individuals who own farmland under a different legal entity operating the farm now may be eligible for loans

administered by USDA’s Farm Service Agency (FSA). Producers will have an opportunity to share suggestions on the microloan process, and the definitions of farming experience and business structures through Dec. 8, 2014, the public open comment period.

FSA is also publishing a Federal Register notice to solicit ideas from the public for pilot projects to help increase the efficiency and effectiveness of farm loan programs. Comments and ideas regarding potential pilot projects will be accepted through Nov. 7, 2014.

Since 2010, USDA has made a record amount of farm loans through FSA—more than 165,000 loans totaling nearly \$23 billion. More than 50 percent of USDA’s farm loans now go to beginning farmers. In addition, USDA has increased its lending to socially-disadvantaged

producers by nearly 50 percent since 2010.

These programs were made possible by the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past five years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for taxpayers. Since enactment, USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America. 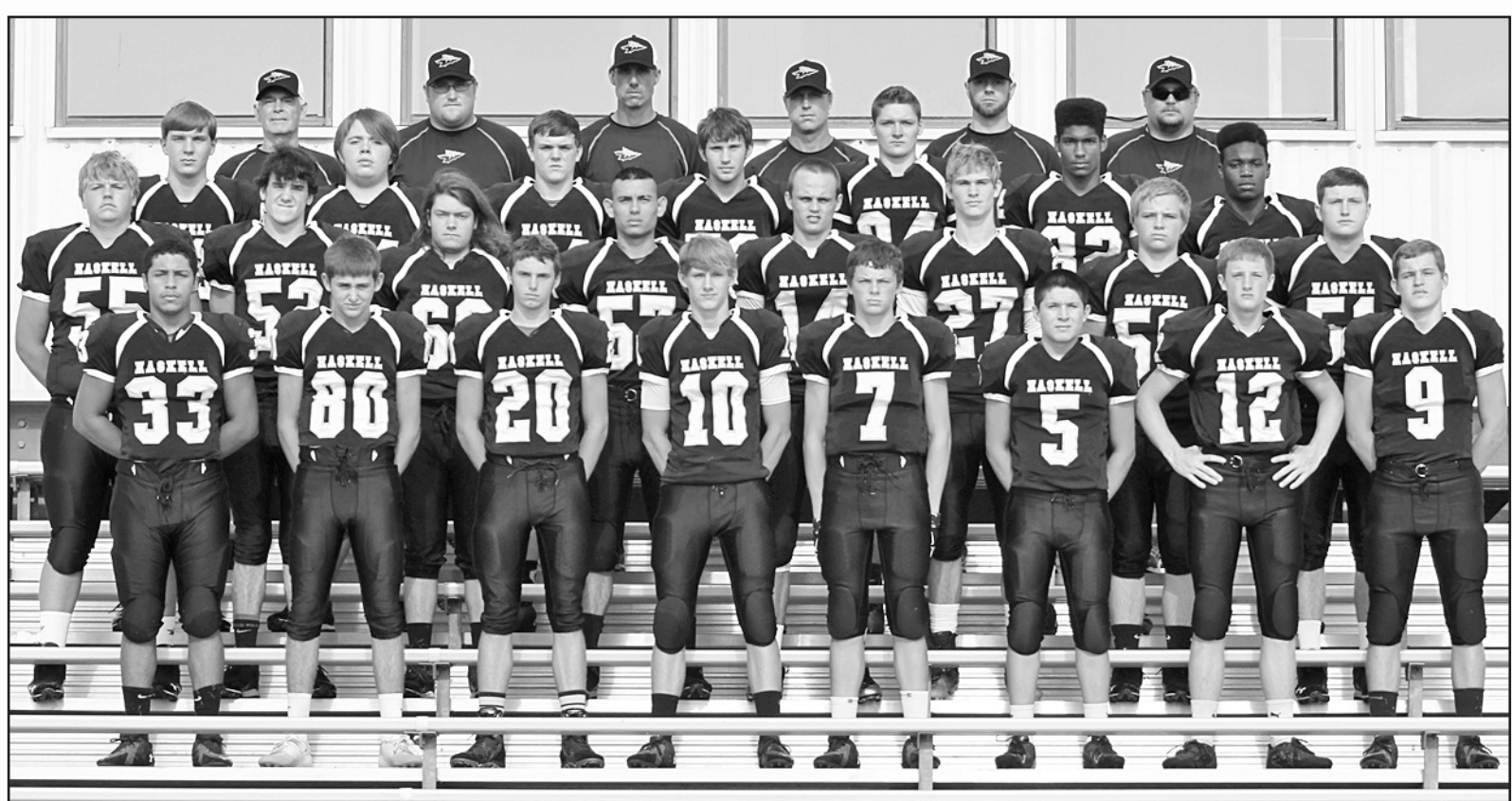

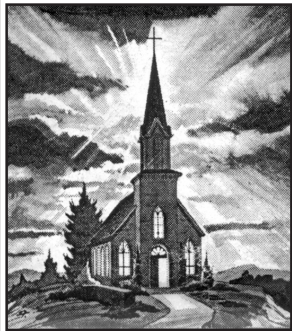
