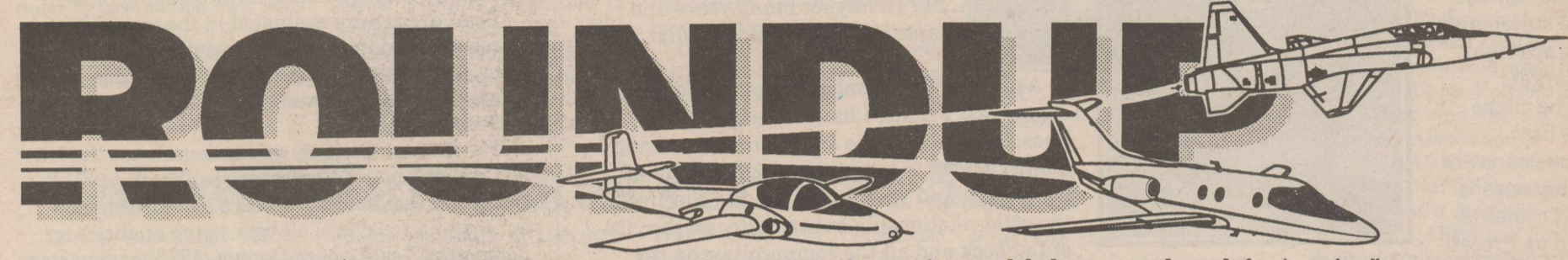

Native Texan takes over

Bleachers were filled with Lubbock community leaders and base personnel as Col. David R. Love assumed command of the 64th FTW during a May 29 ceremony in front of Base Operations.

A native Texan, Colonel Love replaced Col. William C. Henny, who retired after more than 25 years of Air Force service. The ceremony was presided over by Lt. Gen. Joseph Ashy, ATC commander. The general said Colonel Love would be "another superb commander" for the wing.

During his remarks, Colonel Love said, "I've been waiting all my life for this day. What's especially nice about coming to this job is that I am returning to Lubbock. The day is here now, and I'm ready to get to work."

The flightline ceremony featured the ATC band and a formation of about 500 wing members. The ceremony was concluded with a pass in review including the 50-state flag formation, the Reese Color Guard and seven masses made up from Reese squadrons.

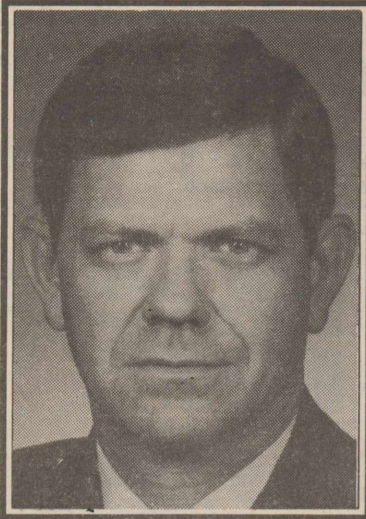
Old clichés have more than a simple basis in truth; they are more often than not wise statements that are right on target.

Sheppard wins QAF award

Sheppard Training Center, Texas, won the first ATC Commander's Quality Award, recognizing the quality of ATC production and services. Maj. Gen. Dale Tabor, STC commander, accepted the award at the May 6 ATC Commanders' Conference.

The ATC Quality Council evaluated programs from across the command and picked Sheppard as the initial winner of this award, said Maj. Ed Billman of the ATC headquarters quality office.

Eight areas were evaluated in the competition. These included improvement results, customer focus, quality assurance, top leadership support, strategic planning, training, employee involvement and analysis.

The first competition was announced at the fall ATC Commanders' Conference in October 1991. "Although the quality initiative is relatively new, our installations have all been doing quality Air Force work," said Laura Gentry, ATC headquarters quality analyst.

Bases are incorporating the seven-step ATC Quality Air Force model to enhance their programs. The steps are: identifying customers and products, determining customer expectations, analyzing the process, installing quality measurements, identifying actions, implementing actions, and evaluating actions.

Several examples of why Sheppard won the award — applying the seven steps — include improved training effectiveness, establishment of a Caesarean-section childbirth delivery operating room, improved customer service in civil engineering and enhanced technical training graduate satisfaction. 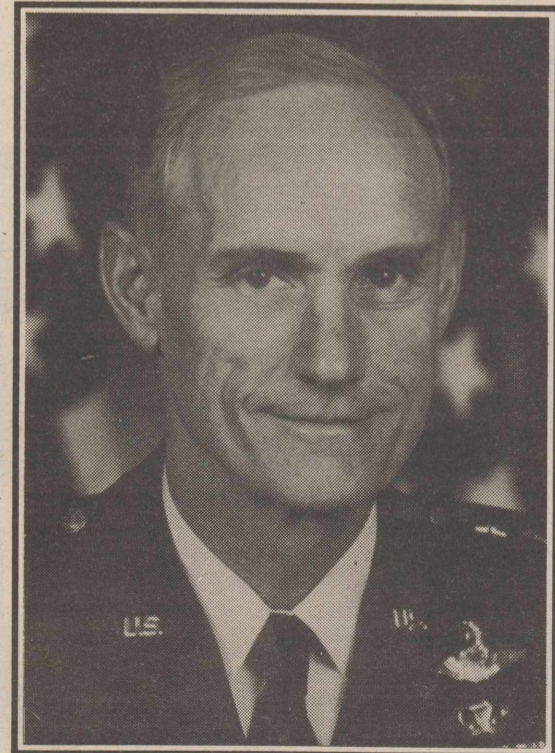
Chief of staff calls activations start of 'new era'

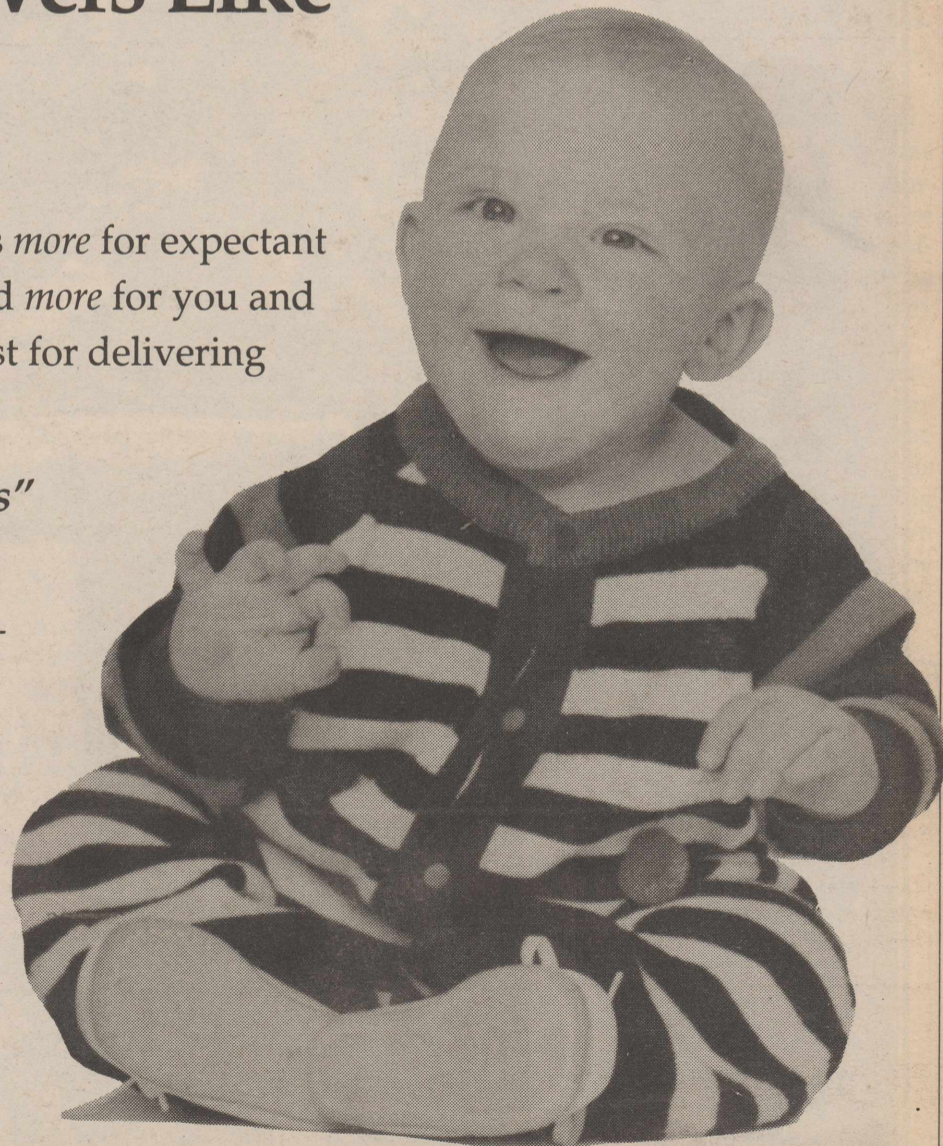

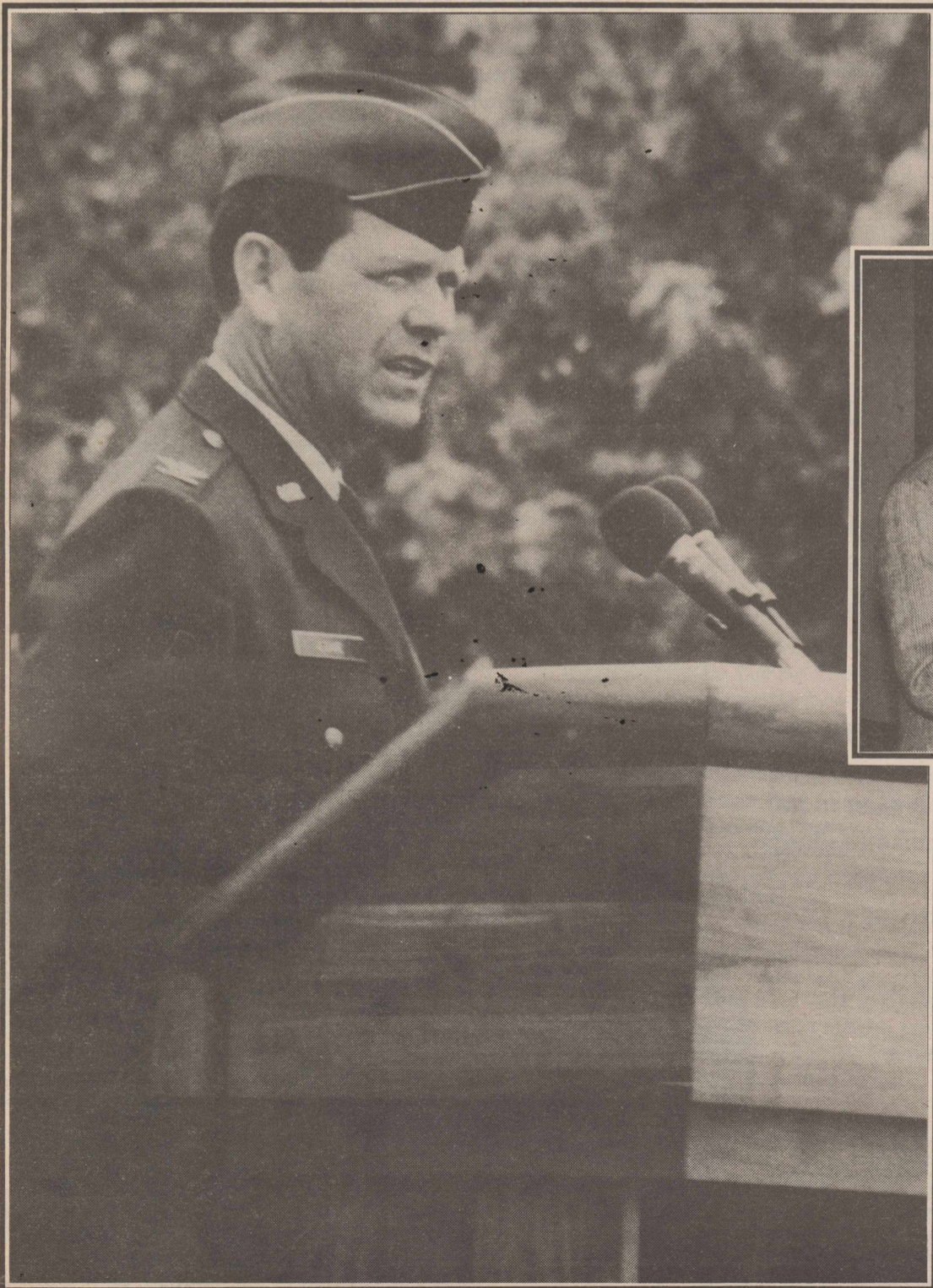

Wing voting officer gives tips

As we approach the November presidential election, many people are beginning to take an interest in registering and voting. Your unit voting representatives can help you do that.

Out-of-state registration

The actual process of registering is quite simple. If you (or your spouse or dependents) live in Texas but are residents of another state, all you need to do is contact your unit representative. He or she has all the information necessary to register you; the whole appli-

cation form takes less than five minutes to fill out.

Once sent in, your home state will usually respond in writing in 30 to 60 days, confirming that you are registered and stating when they'll mail out the absentee ballots.

In the rare case they need more information, they'll also tell you what it is they need and where to send it.

Texas residents

If your Texas county residency is outside Lubbock, the registration process is exactly like living out of state. For those who are military depen-

dents living within the confines of Lubbock County, there is a slightly different application form to fill out. You can obtain this form from me or 2nd Lt. Diane Higginbotham.

This form allows you to register by mail, but you'll have to vote in person for the precinct you live in. A voter's registration card will be sent to you about 30 days after mailing the application; the precinct will be identified on that card.

Advice can prevent summer 'trip slips'

A vacation is supposed to be an enjoyable experience. If you're planning a vacation trip, ask yourself the following questions to ensure you're adequately prepared.

□ When to start — Start out fresh and rested for your trip. Go early enough in the day to avoid heavy traffic, but late enough that you can get a full night's sleep before you turn the key in the ignition.

□ What to take — Packing wisely means packing light. Less baggage creates less weight for the car to haul and also creates more room and comfort for the passengers.

□ How to prepare — A hassle you don't need is a poorly running car. Before you back out of the driveway for your summer voyage, make certain your car is up to the challenge of the trip.

□ How to plan — The first item in your plan is to decide where you're going. Pick a reasonable destination — one that won't require

that you spend three-quarters of your vacation in the car.

Avoid fatigue. Decide where you want to be at the end of each day's drive, and don't try to go too far each day. Limiting your road time to ten hours and a total of 500 miles per day is a good general rule. Auto clubs can help you plan a good trip — make use of them.

Don't forget your hotel or motel reservations.

□ How to stay alert — If you are driving by yourself, don't drive any longer than two hours at a time without stopping and stretching. This will get your circulation going and help you to be more alert as you drive. It's always better to travel with another person because the two can share the driving. Keep fresh air moving through the car and use the radio to help you stay alert.

Remember, you're taking this trip for fun, so, think ahead. If you expect a problem, you can prevent it from happening with good trip planning.

'Food for thought'

Summer brings need for greater safety

It's that time again. Time to get out and enjoy the sun, go swimming, and gather with friends and family at picnics. Don't let the fun time turn into a nightmare; plan for food safety. Here are some tips to help keep food safe:

□ When shopping for perishable items such as meats and dairy products, get them last.

□ Check the "date of pack" or expiration dates on products to ensure they are good.

□ Go directly home from the store and place perishable items in the refrigerator to prevent food from spoiling.

□ Don't leave meat on the counter to thaw. The product may reach the "danger zone" (40 to 140 degrees) long before you intend to use it.

□ Always wash your hands before cooking and after preparing different foods to ensure there is no possibility of cross-contamination. For serving, don't

reuse utensils or dishes that have touched raw meat.

□ Keep perishable foods in a cooler as long as possible. Pack with plenty of ice and keep it in the shade.

□ Cook meats thoroughly, especially pork and poultry have no red or pink meat left when serving.

□ Keep food covered to avoid exposing it to flies and common bacteria.

□ Discard perishable food if it has been at room temperature for more than four hours. After four hours, the level of toxin produced by bacteria may be enough to cause illness.

Follow these safety tips and you'll ensure a good time for all. If you have any questions or comments concerning food safety feel free to contact military public health at 3534. Also, squadrons desiring to purchase food from a source downtown should call me at 3534 to ensure the source has been inspected by the local health department.

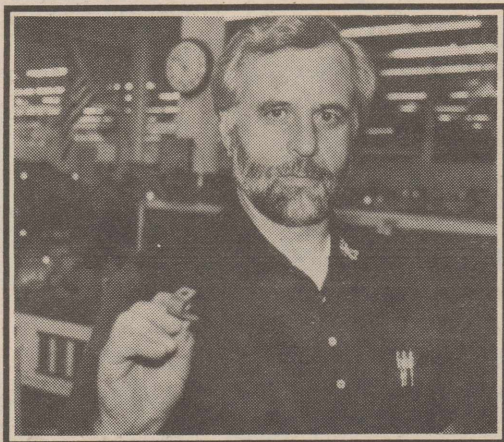

Civilian wins \$4,194 for suggestions

Nearly every day, you can think of a better way of doing business. Alan Sancibrian, wing safety office, proved that point and received \$4,194 in the process.

The cash award resulted from two ideas filed with the Air Force Suggestion Program. His first idea saved the Air Force \$148,726 when he suggested a technical order change to allow home base welding of cracked C-spring brackets on J-69 aircraft engines. His second idea proposed replacement of brass hooks on T-38 tail covers with velcro straps.

Since the beginning of fiscal 1992, 23 suggestions have been approved — with suggesters receiving \$17,883 in cash awards, and tangible benefits amounting

to \$1,139,038. Cash awards are based upon first-year savings and until those are documented, no payment can be made.

"When calculating the amount of savings, we are able to consider the benefits derived throughout the command as well as Reese savings," said Ruede Turner, suggestion program manager. "This is an important aspect of the Suggestion Program."

In addition to suggestions already approved, seven recent ideas were locally approved and await higher headquarters evaluation. Another dozen suggestions have received final approval and are awaiting implementation.

SP's clarify pass policy

Air Force Form 75 is the official pass a visitor must obtain to visit Reese (excluding Reese Village).

These passes are issued to people having a valid reason for being on the installation, according to security police. One example could be an individual wishing to come on base to meet an appointment with an office such as contracting, Lockheed, or civil engineers. In this case, the gate guard would call the office to be visited and, after verifying the visit, would issue a pass.

Another example could be a Reese member wishing to sponsor a guest on base accompanying them to the officers' or enlisted open mess. If the Reese member is not with their guest at the time, the gate guard would again have to verify the visit by having the member come to the gate. Wing guests and large parties should coordinate with security police in advance by calling the law enforcement superintendent at 3949.

SP officials said it is their goal to assist every visitor to their utmost in getting them on base as quickly as possible. Wing members can assist in this process by telling guests the procedures they will be expected to follow upon requesting entry to the base. Wing members should provide guests with a telephone number where they can be contacted by the gate guard to verify the visit, or call the main gate at 3694 in advance with information about guests. All guests will be asked to show proof of automobile insurance and a valid driver's license.

If you elect not to come to the main gate to meet a guest, they will be directed to your location. You must keep in mind that at the time they depart the gate for your location, you assume responsibility for them.

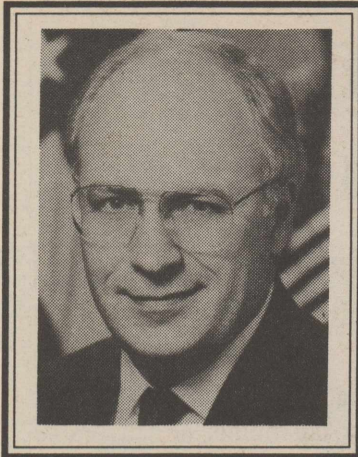

Secretary Cheney warns against cuts

WASHINGTON — In the latest round of military budget debates, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney again warned Congress against new defense cuts being discussed.

"There are those in Congress and elsewhere who now propose reductions in the defense budget that are simply too steep and too dangerous," Secretary Cheney told the Senate Appropriations Defense Subcommittee May 21.

"Their proposals would end up destroying the finest military force this nation has ever fielded."

On the same day that Secretary Cheney appeared before the subcommittee, both the House and the Senate passed a budget resolution that drops defense spending by \$3.6 billion. The president had requested \$281 billion in defense budget authority for fiscal 1993, but at this point in its budget deliberations Congress approved only \$277.4 billion.

Secretary Cheney said he would not recommend a veto of the resolution, and that the Defense Department could live with it.

However, he cautioned against more cuts, saying if Congress fails to fund training and a high quality force, the services will "outwardly look like a military, but simply will not function."

In line with the new U.S. defense strategy to cut the armed forces by 25 percent, Air Force manpower will shrink to 430,000 by 1997, 177,000 below 1987 when the Air Force had 607,000 on active duty.

The only way to get savings of the magnitude proposed by Congress is to cut manpower, because 46 percent of everything the Pentagon spends goes to personnel, he said.

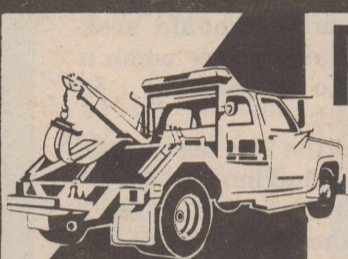

West Texas weather can turn severe literally without warning, pounding the area with high winds, rain, hail and deadly

TORNADOS

Understanding the various severe weather classifications and being prepared to take appropriate action could be the best insurance Reese people can obtain for their families' safety.

For Reese and Lubbock residents, the severe weather conditions to be most concerned with are: thunderstorm watch, thunderstorm warning, tornado watch and tornado warning. The most dangerous of these conditions are thunderstorm warning and tornado warning.

Each of these conditions represents a different level and threat of severe weather. As conditions change, so do the precautions people should take.

SMSgt. Barry Rex, Reese Weather flight chief, says Reese people can stay abreast of regional weather conditions by monitoring local radio and television stations.

All of the local broadcast stations provide extensive severe weather coverage, frequently breaking into scheduled programming to provide up-to-the-minute reports on area weather.

In addition to these updates, each television station displays a thunderstorm or tornado symbol on the screen to indicate a specific weather watch or warning within the viewing area.

A watch means that conditions are favorable for a specific severe weather activity. A warning is issued when that activity is actually taking place or considered imminent.

An outlined thundercloud signals a thunderstorm watch. A filled thundercloud means the condition has been upgraded to a warning. As with thunderstorms, an outlined tornado indicates a watch and a filled tornado is a warning. Most of the stations will supplement the watch and warning symbols with the names of the counties affected.

Sergeant Rex suggested that Reese

people may want to invest in a weather radio. He said the radios are readily available in Lubbock stores and cost about \$20.

"This is an excellent item to have as part of your emergency weather kit,"



said Sergeant Rex.

On base, the Reese weather service continuously provides severe weather updates to the command staff and command post. When there is a significant threat of severe weather affecting the base, the command post will issue Emergency Broadcast System audio updates simultaneously on all Mission Cable channels.

Reese residents who are not connected to Mission Cable will not receive these EBS updates.

When to take shelter

When the threat of a tornado striking Reese is imminent, the command post will activate the base siren. Once activated, the siren will sound a steady tone until the threat of a tornado has ended.

Capt. Melinda Edwards, wing inspections chief, stressed that base people and families should seek immediate shelter when a tornado warning is sounded.

"Get the the best cover you can find immediately," said the captain. "Don't leave the shelter until the siren stops."

Captain Edwards added that once the siren stops, the command post will issue additional guidance on the EBS system. The EBS system will be supplemented as necessary by base law enforcement and disaster response officials.

A test of the EBS audio override system will be conducted Monday at 7 p.m. Any Reese residents on Mission Cable who do not hear the test on their televisions should report the failure to the 64th Communications Squadron. Reports should be called in to Ext. 6888 on Tuesday from 7:30 a.m. to noon.

A five-to-10 second test of the base warning siren is conducted each Friday at noon unless there is inclement weather in the area.

Soliciting the cooperation of all base residents, Captain Edwards asks that people refrain from calling agencies such as the security police, weather service, command post or 911, to get weather information. "People should stay tuned to their televisions and radios," she said. "Only bonafide emergency calls should be made to these agencies. In all cases people should use common sense."

"West Texas is part of 'Tornado Alley,'" said Sergeant Rex. "Reese people living on base and in the local communities should be aware that weather conditions can become severe literally without warning."

What to do during a ...

Tornado watch



A tornado watch indicates that weather conditions are favorable for the formation of tornados. Tornado activity is possible.

- Secure loose items outside home or workplace.
- Restrict the movements of children to immediate vicinity.
- Have your storm kit standing by.
- Monitor weather broadcasts on local broadcast television and radio stations.

Tornado warning



A tornado warning means that a tornado has actually been sighted or identified on radar. If Reese is in the expected path, the command post will sound the base siren, directing base people and Reese Village residents to seek immediate shelter.

- Take shelter immediately and stay there until the siren stops (on base) or notified via the Emergency Broadcast System that it is clear to leave (off base).
- Don't wait for the siren if you see or hear a tornado approaching. Seek shelter immediately.
- Do not needlessly tie up emergency phone lines. Monitor radio and television broadcasts for updates.

Where to go

- If driving in open country, move away from funnel at a right angle.
- Greatest safety is in the center of the basement.
- Lacking a basement, go to small central rooms such as closets, storerooms or bathrooms.
- Take cover under heavy furniture.
- Stay away from windows.
- Do not stay above ground floor of any building.
- Do not stay in a mobile home. Even a drainage ditch is more protection.

Planning is key to safety

Planning for a tornado can greatly enhance the chances of surviving one. Make sure everyone in your work area or home knows where to go if a tornado strikes. Maintain an emergency kit. It should include: flashlights, portable radio with extra batteries, drinking water, first-aid kit and other emergency items. Monitor local broadcast television and radio stations for severe weather information. KFYO AM-790, is the designated emergency information station in the Lubbock area.

911

Officials stress discretion in using emergency number

"Reese 911. What is your emergency?"

This is what you will hear when you dial 911 on Reese or in base housing. Your response should be: "Yes, I need the police, fire department, or an ambulance." At that time the 911 operator will connect you with the agency you requested.

Recently, Reese 911 received calls that were not bona fide emergencies. For example, an individual called 911 because they needed a plumber to fix a leak or a call is patched into the police because a stray dog is loose in the neighborhood.

If you need a plumber, call civil engineering at 3647; if

you want to report a stray dog in base housing, call the security police at 3332. Do not call 911.

We live in a fairly safe environment at Reese — very few fires in base housing, no bank robberies, no injured people needing an ambulance. However, the day may come when a true emergency arises and someone has tied up 911 with a problem that is not an emergency.

Here are a few tips when calling 911:

□ Be calm.

□ Tell the 911 operator who you want to talk to — for example, police, fire department or hospital (ambulance).

□ Stay on the line until the agency you are calling has all the necessary information.

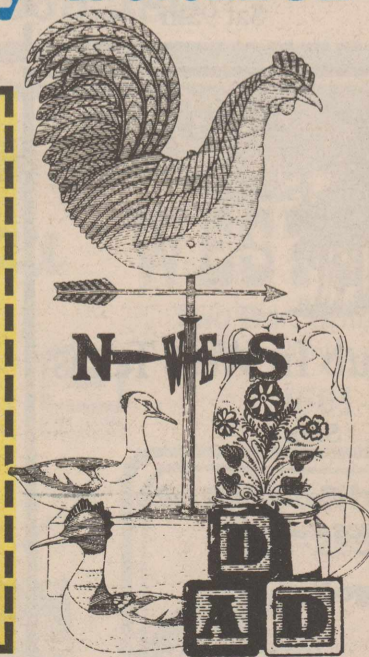

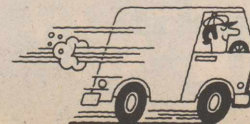

How many credit cards do you have?

The average American has seven credit cards totaling an average debt of somewhere between three to five thousand dollars. Sound scary? It should.

A quick way to check your credit health is by dividing

your monthly take home pay into your monthly credit debt excluding mortgage payment. Ten percent or less is ideal, 20 is okay, 30 should be the limit, 40 means danger. Fifty percent or more, you're in big trouble.

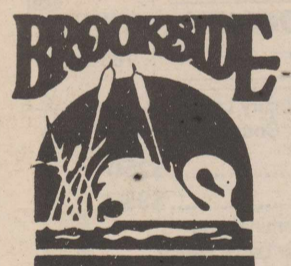

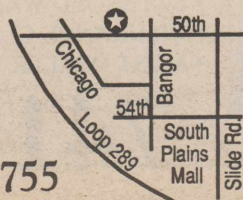
