
Other awards will go to the outstanding academic and flightline instructor pilots, maintainers and mission maker.

From my perspective

There once was a time when we could easily throw dollars and manpower at an MWR problem until it was fixed — but, no more. Today, MWR has become a business and is being held accountable to sound business practices.

Congress divided the MWR system into three basic groups of activities. The distinction between them is the amount of revenue they generate. Category A activities aren't revenue producers; Category B activities produce some; and those in Category C are expected by the Air Force to at least break even. In addition, the category an activity falls under determines the amount of appropriated fund support that can be used to underwrite its programs and services: Category A, 85 percent, Category B,



45 percent and Category C, zero. In other words, the Category C activities have to make it on their own financially, and the A and B activities need to provide sound, well-supported service.

A point of order — there is a tendency to view each activity as a separate and distinct entity, but they aren't. They are all linked in a very important way that each wing member should know — they all need non-appropriated fund dollars to provide a continuum of services designed to meet your needs. The connection takes place, for accounting purposes, through the MWR fund or bank account.

Simply put, the revenue from each activity goes into one account, and the fund pays all the bills for each activity. However, since last August, revenue generated in MWR hasn't covered the expenses. The fund isn't bankrupt by a long shot, but the trend needs to be reversed in order to maintain our standard of service.

How can you help? A lot of excellent people are working extremely hard to ensure the services provided at Reese meet the needs of our customers — you. We need your good ideas on how to improve our service and your support for the MWR program. A simple thing like joining your club can yield tremendous benefits to the MWR system. While on this subject, let's quickly review some excellent reasons to be a club card holder.

With your card you can:

- ☐ Enjoy check cashing privileges.
- ☐ Charge fees/services at any MWR activity, including the child development center.
- ☐ Take advantage of our lay-away plan to purchase equipment such as golf clubs, bowling balls, and the like interest free!
 - ☐ Bowl at a discount.
 - ☐ Use the interest-free payment plan at the auto hobby shop.

What is the system doing? We are working very diligently to transition to the new era and run your program efficiently, and be good stewards of your MWR dollars. We are currently undergoing a manpower review to see where we can combine similar services and share labor expenses. This review is not designed to cut services you currently enjoy, but the level of support an activity or program receives is an important indicator. Lastly, we've developed an MWR financial briefing to explain where the dollars go and we intend to give this briefing at Commander's Calls or wherever else we are asked.

The bottom line is, and will continue to be, that if we want a viable MWR program that provides the services you want, then MWR needs your support.






tion about the formation of the moon's ancient crust. Apollo 13 and 17 missions.

Apollo 16 was the next-to-last Apollo mission and set records for: largest payload placed in lunar orbit, contact the chapel staff at 3237.

Retired Brig. Gen. Charles M. Duke Jr., one of only first deployment of a cosmic ray detector on the lunar

mand module and largest amount of material retrieved from the moon. The Apollo 16 crew collected 213 pounds of moonrocks during their 20-plus hours and 14 minutes of exploration on the moon's Descartes crater.

Graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy, General Duke was commissioned in the Air Force and graduated from pilottraining in 1959. The general was among 19 candidates selected as astronauts in 1966. He served as a capsule communicator on several of the Apollo missions before logging nearly 266 hours in space on the Apollo 16 mission. He


The following are commonly asked questions regarding



Reese IP presented Air Medal Thursda

A member of the 35th Flying Training Squadron received the Air Medal during a Thursday retreat on

Capt. Keith Kaiser of E flight earned the award for his efforts flying C-130 transports during Operation Desert Shield/Storm. Then assigned to 50th Tactical Airlift Squadron, Little Rock AFB, Ark., the captain and his unit were among the first to "hit the sand" when President Bush ordered American troops into action.

"I was over there the whole time; we left Aug. 12," the 32-year-old instructor pilot said. "We didn't get back until March 19."

The captain was stationed in the United Arab Emirates. Throughout the course of the operation, the captain's unit carried 10 million pounds of cargo and 6,000 troops. Captain Kaiser logged 270 hours in

In addition, his experience led to his working as a tactics planner, helping plan missions, manage air space and eliminate scheduling conflicts. That responsibility carried a heavy challenge, given the nature of the operation.

"Every day we'd get a 300-page computer printout of the mission for that day," said the Illinois native. "There were up to 2,000 missions each day."

Some of the memorable points of his flying time included seeing Scud missiles in flight being taken out by Patriots. Also, although he didn't go all the way to the front lines on his missions, he was close enough to see some memorable scenes of Iraq's devastation of Kuwait.

"On clear nights, you could see the glow of the oil fires to the north,"

he explained." After they had been burning a couple of weeks, it got so bad that the smoke covered up a lot of the fields we wanted to land at. The planes would come back covered with soot and black oil from flying up

When the war ended, the captain spent another month in the Mideast before returning home to his wife, Linda, and their children - Maurice,

He was assigned to the 35th FTS

Additionally, three wing members received a Meritorious Service Medal at the ceremony. They are: Maj. Gregory Dawson, Det. 2, 3307th TES; Capt. Gerard Jolivette, 64th Security Police Squadron; and Maj. Joseph Macklin, 52nd Flying Training Squadron.



Rank options offered on new uniform

when the wear test program begins in May.

The most noticeable change to recent photographs of the new uniform will be the officer rank insignia. Until now, all photographs of the new officer uniform coat showed the sleeve rank option - what many called the navy rank.

When the wear test begins, however, two versions of officer rank will be worn. One will feature the previously pictured sleeve braid insignia. The other version will have traditional officer rank - bars, oak leafs, and stars - stitched on an epaulet attached to the

All officers participating in the wear test will test both versions.

The Air Force is expanding the wear test to

Air Force members will see several new an additional six locations to gather more rank insignia options on the new uniform feedback from a greater sampling of people. More than 30 bases will now participate in the

> Decisions about the final uniform design, fabric and rank insignia will be made following an evaluation of the wear test results. About 800 participants will submit comments after the six-month test is complete.

"Reaction to pictures of the sleeve rank option among Air Force personnel has been mixed," said Maj. Mary Wood, Air Force Uniform Board Secretariat Chief. "Most people who actually see the uniform, rather than just seeing it in pictures, have liked it.

"Several months ago the chief of staff asked us to pursue other options for officer rank based on more traditional lines," Wood said. "The officer shoulder rank epaulet to be tested is an outgrowth of that."

Changes to the enlisted rank chevron have also been approved for testing.

Most NCOs who have seen the new uniform in person favor the chevron redesign, which takes one stripe off the bottom and places it at the top starting with master sergeant. Others have expressed concern with the size of the new chevron.

In response to that concern, men will wear 4-inch chevrons on the service dress coat, the same size they currently wear, during the

Women will wear-test a slightly larger chevron than currently authorized; however, a decision on the final size of all chevrons will not be made until after the test.

"The perception seems to be that what you see in the various news publications is what you will get," Wood said. "That's not the

"This is not a package deal. Each component in the test, such as design, fabric, and rank insignia will be considered separately based on evaluations from the participants and other Air Force members.

"We'll continue to make adjustments as necessary to get a quality product," she said. "When all the testing is done, you're going to see a uniform that's far more durable than the current one," she said.

"Our principal concern has been to produce a high-quality uniform that Air Force members will be proud to wear."

Design and development is scheduled for completion in December with new specifications headed to the procuring agencies by March 1993.





Air Force accepts first T-1A

Air Force officials accepted the first production T-1A Jayhawk trainer aircraft in a ceremony at Beech Aircraft Corporation's Beechjet manufacturing facility in Wichita, Kan., Jan. 17.


Used to train student pilots to fly tanker and transport aircraft, the T-1A is the first of 77 ordered by the Air Force. The total T-1A fleet eventually will reach 180 aircraft for a total program cost of approximately \$750 million. Reese is scheduled to receive 41 of the aircraft. An official arrival ceremony is expected here in mid-February.

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Merrill A. McPeak attended the event. Representing the Aeronautical Systems Division, Brig. Gen. Stewart E. Cranston was joined at the ceremony by a contingent of Beech employees, members of the Kansas congressional delegation, state and local officials, as well as civic leaders.

During the ceremony, Beech employee Ernest C. Hall, a sheet metal assembler on the Jayhawk assembly line, presented the aircraft keys to Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Ashy, commander, Air Training Command. ATC assumes operational control of the aircraft after delivery. The first aircraft will be assigned to Reese, and ultimately, the Jayhawk will be flown by training units at Randolph and Laughlin AFBs, Texas, Columbus AFB, Miss. and Vance AFB, Okla.

A modified Beechjet 400A corporate aircraft, the Jayhawk differs from its commercial counterpart with cabin mounted avionics, increased air conditioning capability, a single-point refueling system with greater capacity and increased bird strike protection in the windshield and leading edges for sustained low level operation.

The production schedule calls for delivery of approximately three aircraft per month through 1997.

This week's mission maker is Scott Cawthern of Lockheed Support System, Inc. Mr. Cawthern is assistant dock chief of the J-85 engine shop.





'SOFs up'

Base efforts make new program in tower a resounding success

Reese's air traffic control tower underwent major changes near the end of 1991 as the result of a command directive.

ATC directed that the front-line flying supervisor have the best tools and the best view available on the base. For this reason, a program was begun to add a new duty position to the control tower crew - the tower supervisor of flying. For 40 days, offices throughout the base worked together to make the program a success.

Since the tower didn't have much room for an additional crew member, the first step was to make space in the tower cab. This entailed building a raised platform in the rear of the control tower so the tower SOF could have a superior view of the

airfield without interfering with other tower people.

The carpenter shop began the work by building the subfloor for the platform. The electrical shop wired the power for the SOF console, while

the plumbing shop relocated a water fountain that blocked the proposed installation site.

In addition, the self-help store set up a special account so that the carpenters would not have a problem with supply delays.

The civil engineering shops and the SOF console carpenters started construction on the goal day in September. The two individuals who deserve most of the credit are TSgt. Cecil Kinion and SSgt. Phil Schwalbach. These air traffic controllers put in more than 200 hours each, building the tower SOF desk.

The well-organized equipment layout gives the tower SOF a particular advantage in handling his or her new role. Col. Bill Henny, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, said "Everyone should see this outstanding self-help project. It's a great example of the Reese team in action getting the mission done."

The equipment presented an even greater challenge since high-demand

\$20,000 radios were needed. Originally the plan called for installation of a T-37 radio, but the ground maintenance folks found a better way.

They freed up a radio by combining the pilot-to-metro and pilot-to-dispatch functions. Next, they "begged and borrowed" enough parts to convert a bench test radio into a temporary working solution. What they finally came up with was an innovative way for the tower SOF to monitor both the T-37 and T-38 runway supervisory units while still transmitting and receiving on other required frequencies. Though it may sound easy, TSgt. Gary Chase, TSgt. Pilo Castillo and A1C Gerald Tyndall had to spend as much time on their task as their woodworking partners.

The GTE customer equipment technician, Mark Landers, ensured that the tower SOF's phone could directly contact all key

offices on base.
Work was also done to relocate navigational equipment and install a color weather radar.

During all this construction, Lt. Col. Roger Cude, then chief of the tower SOF program, and Maj.

Donald Hall, chief of standardization/ evaluation, worked with T-37 and T-38 SOFs to integrate the new tower program.

A view from the highest "office" on base

The new position, known as "watchman," would require extensive retraining for SOFs to enable them to oversee the operations of both types of aircraft.

Behind these efforts was plenty of support. From accounting and finance to transportation, every office buzzed with tower SOF support activity. Especially noteworthy was the communications squadron plans and programs office. They were the key players in obtaining the color weather radar by the required date.

The program finally went into effect Nov. 1. Was it completed just in time? "Not really," said Capt. James Williams, 64th Communications Squadron commander. "The equipment in place is only a temporary fix. Down the road, an engineering and installation team will install the permanent radio equipment."

This means the watchman program is just beginning!


