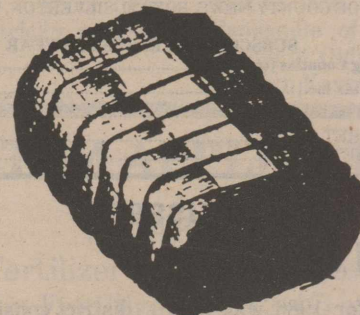

FFA Members In Regional Competition

Stephen Stephens, David Schott and Dick Cogdell, members of the Silverton Future Farmers of America, have accepted checks for \$100 for winning the State FFA Diversified Livestock Production Proficiency Award at the State FFA Convention. Now they have submitted application forms to compete against other state winners to be named one of the four National

finalists. Only one winner will be selected from each of the four FFA administrative regions. The four National finalists in Diversified Livestock Production will receive a plaque, a \$250 check and partially paid travel expenses to the National FFA Convention in November.

The National FFA Convention will be held in Kansas City, Missouri where one of the four National finalists will be chosen as the National winner. The National winner will be awarded a plaque and a check for \$500.

The Diversified Livestock Production Proficiency Award Program helps FFA members develop the skills and competencies necessary for the efficient production and marketing of a combination of two or more specific livestock enterprises. Enterprises may include beef, swine, dairy, horses or sheep.

There are 29 National FFA Proficiency Award program areas recognizing FFA members for achievement in activities leading to careers in agriculture. The awards for Diversified Livestock Production Proficiency Award program are sponsored by A. O. Smith Harvestore Products, Inc., Arlington Heights, Illinois and Wayne Feeds Division/Continental Grain Company, Chicago, Illinois as a Special Project of the National FFA Foundation.

Stephens is participating in Cereal Grain Production; Schott is in Diversified Livestock Production, and Cogdell is competing in Horse Proficiency. Cal Brannon received second-place recognition in Feed Grain Production.

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Reappraisal Discussed At Board Meeting

Reappraisal for 1986 was discussed at length at the regular meeting of the board of directors of the Briscoe County Appraisal District Thursday, July 11.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman L. B. Garvin, jr. Other directors present were Ray Teeple and Joe Mercer, along with Chief Appraiser Carlye Hill. Directors absent were Paul Ramsey and Robert McPherson.

Mrs. Hill reported that Charles Sorelle of Donley County had already committed himself on another job, and probably would not be available to help very much. There was unanimous agreement among all members and the chief appraiser that there should not be a big unnecessary expense involved with the 1986 project.

Teeple moved that the tax office maintain the 1986 reappraisal with its employees, with extra help if necessary, and that no appraisal firm be employed for this purpose. The motion carried.

After a thorough item-by-item discussion of the proposed 1986 budget, which was tabled at the June 13 meeting, members decided on a \$65,000 budget—down \$5,000 from 1985. Only \$50,000 will be requested from the taxing entities, which will lower their 1986 payments to the appraisal

district considerably.

Motion carried to set the budget hearing with the taxing entities at 8:30 a.m. Friday, July 19, in the county courtroom.

Mrs. Hill gave the financial report. Current collections through the month of June included Briscoe County, 95.9%; Silverton ISD, 96.8%; City of Silverton, 91.4%, and Mackenzie Water Authority, 91.4%.

Board members examined the delinquent taxpayer roll. Mrs. Hill reported that the 1984 delinquent rolls have been delivered to Perdue, Brandon, Blair and Fielder of Amarillo, delinquent tax attorneys. Delinquent taxpayers will be receiving notices from this firm within a few days.

Mrs. Hill reported that the appraisal review board conducted the taxpayer protest hearings on June 17. Eight taxpayers appeared before the board to protest their values.

Effective tax rate calculations have been figured by Mrs. Hill for all five entities, and are ready for publication.

The appraisal roll has been delivered to the computer company for corrections. This is one of the final steps in preparing the 1985 tax roll.

Following examination of the June bills, motion carried to pay all bills presented.

Lockney To Have Women's Softball Tourney July 27-28

Lockney Women's Softball Association will have a tournament at the Women's Softball Field July 27-28.

Each team must turn in a roster prior to the first game, and the roster will be frozen for the remainder of the tournament. Individuals may play for one team only, and each roster is limited to fifteen players.

Each team must furnish one playable Blut Dot ball for each game.

Five minutes after game time is forfeit time, with lineups due to the scorekeeper five minutes prior to regularly scheduled game time. Failure to have a minimum of nine players present at game time will result in a game forfeit. Forfeits eliminate a team from further competition and/or awards.

There is a fifty-five minute time limit on all games, excluding the championship game. Fifteen runs after four innings constitutes the run rule, excluding the championship game.

The home team is decided by a coin flip at home plate.

Team awards go to the winners of first through third places. Individual awards go to players on the first and second place teams.

The Statler Brothers, one of the most popular attractions ever booked at the Panhandle-South Plains Fair, will be making a fifth appearance there in Lubbock this fall, general manager Steve L. Lewis has announced.

The group, which has won more than 500 awards, will be on stage in Fair Park Coliseum at 3:00 and 7:00 p.m. on September 22, Lewis said. Tickets are \$10 and all seats are reserved.

It is the eighth and last stage show announced for the 1985 exposition.

International Country awards, five truck drivers' country music honors, three American Music awards and two Academy of Country Music awards. They also had the top-rated syndicated television special for 1982.

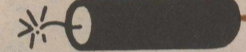

The Statlers have recorded for more than a decade for Mercury/Polygram Records, cutting 23 albums, releasing more than three dozen singles and selling more than 11 million records.

They have written more than 200 of the songs they have recorded. One, "The Best of the Statler Brothers," broke a record when it stayed on the charts of Record World for five years.




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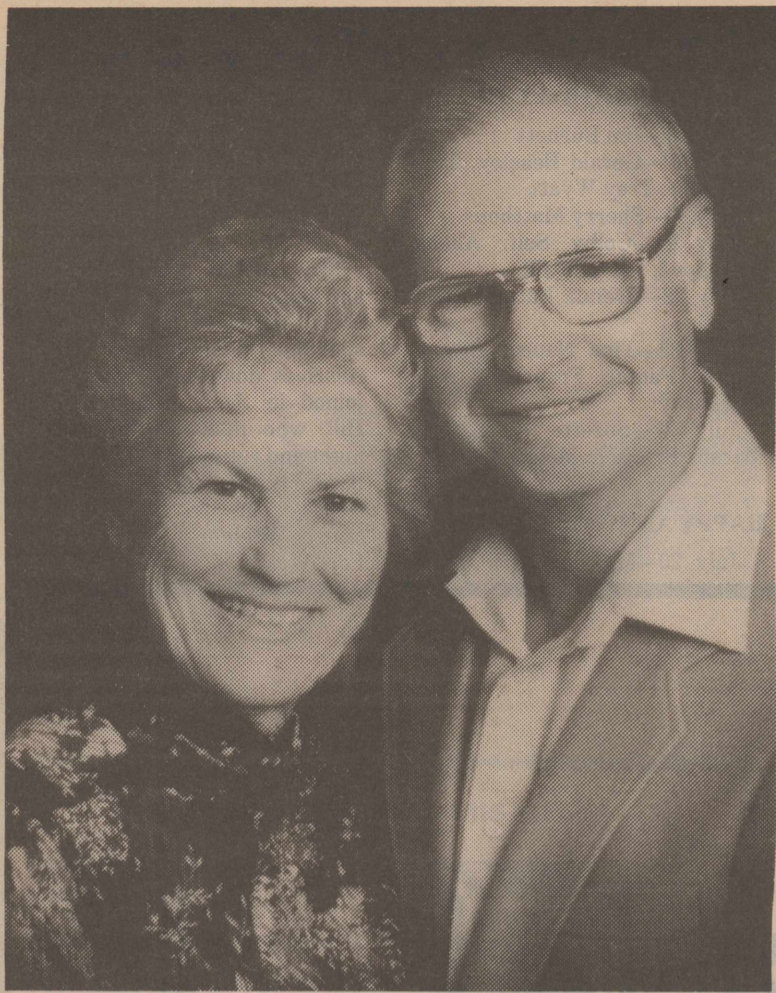

1984 County Payroll Made Public

The Briscoe County News was recently given a list of the salaries and wages paid to Briscoe County officers and employees for the calendar year ended December 31, 1984. Payments totaled \$169,193.12.

This schedule reflects that the highest paid elected officers of the county were the Clerk and Sheriff, each of whom received \$12,630.00 last year. The Tax Assessor-Collector received \$11,832.00 and the Attorney earned \$11,040.00.

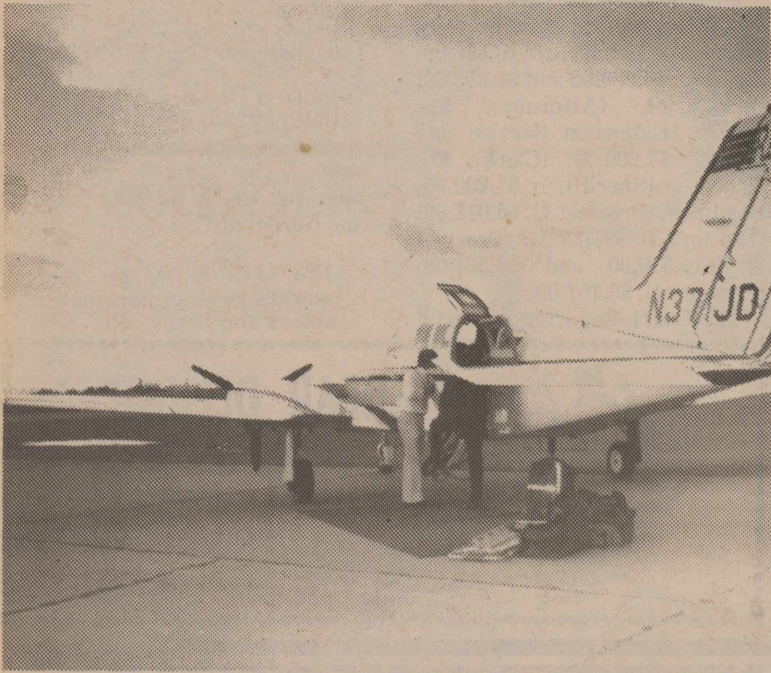

Lubbock General Hospital inaugurated the first formal air ambulance service based in West Texas that includes a comprehensive flight team—REACT [Regional Emergency Air Care Transport]. The formal ribbon cutting ceremony will be held at the Texas Air Center, Lubbock, 12:45 p.m. July 26.

First Formal Air ambulance Service Is Inaugurated

In response to the growing medical needs of the South Plains, Lubbock General Hospital recently inaugurated the first formal air ambulance service based in West Texas that includes a comprehensive flight team.

"To such a vast area, fixed-wing is the most efficient and time-saving mode of transportation," said Jim Courtney, Associate Director of Lubbock General Hospital.

The twin-engine Cessna 402B bears the name REACT (Regional Emergency Air Care Transport).

REACT provides safe and rapid transport for patients requiring emergency or urgent specialty medical care. REACT is also available for the transport of patients to and from other area hospitals.

REACT is equipped to function as an advanced life support air unit including cardiac monitoring and defibrillation equipment, oxygen, suction, endotracheal intubation and ventilation supplies, complete emergency medications and splinting equipment.

REACT is staffed with a minimum of two medical persons from the following categories for emergency transports: physician, paramedic, registered nurse, respiratory therapist or paramedic.

Emergency Medical Services paramedics attending each flight are required to complete an in-service training course in flight physiology, including plane safety.

Courtney expects that the routine operations will be in the area of 125-175 miles.

"It is a great addition to the health care of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico," said Don McInturff, chairman of the board, Lubbock County Hospital District.

The primary flight pilot of REACT, Mike Spradling, was licensed in 1966 and was later certified as a flight, instrument and multi-engine instructor.

The Cessna 402B cruises at approximately 200 miles per hour, depending on the weight of the cargo.

"Fresh" Chicken Has Never Been Frozen

Some Texas consumers are expressing concern about buying poultry labeled as "fresh," only to discover at home that it seems partially frozen, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt.

According to United States Department of Agriculture rules,

a poultry product may be labeled as fresh as long as it is not completely frozen, even though there may be a slight frozen crust on the surface, she says.

Most poultry plants now pack poultry in ice and hold it at 28 degrees F., or chill the birds with nitrogen. The results of these quick-chilling processes is a slight crusting of ice crystals on

the surface of the birds.

"The surface feels frozen, but the inside is not, therefore the bird is still basically fresh," Dr. Hunt explains. Since it's not frozen, you can cook it using the same temperature and cooking time you use for unfrozen poultry, or you can freeze it for later use, she says.

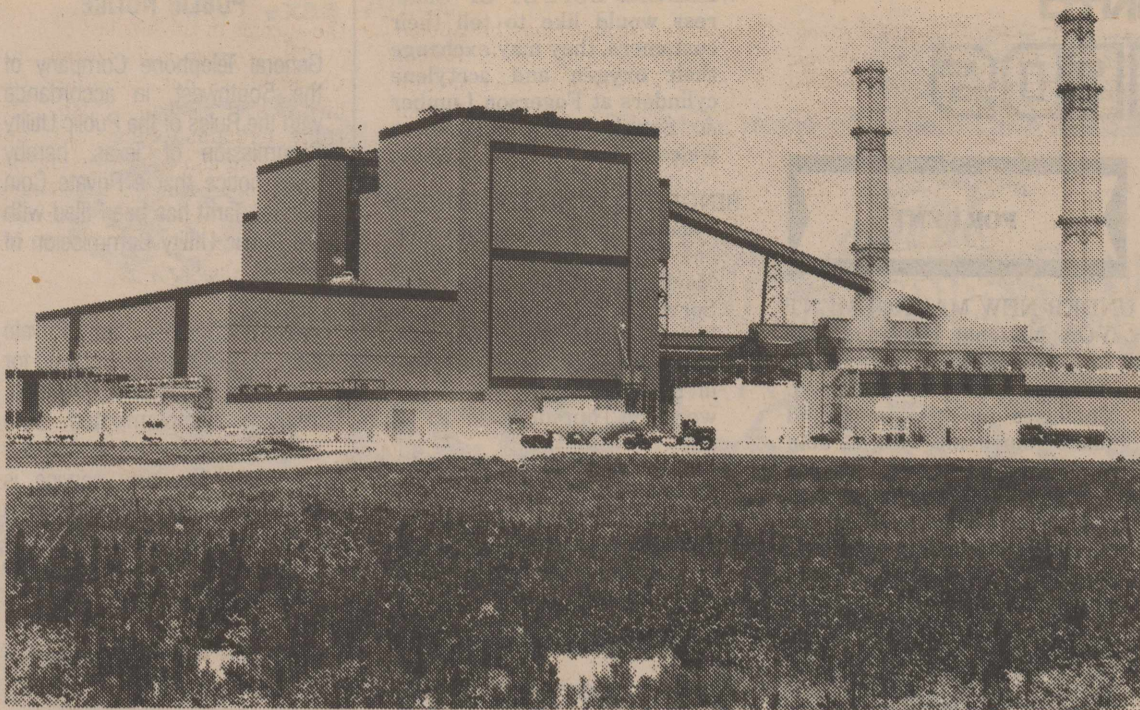

'Tolk 2' Serving Electricity Needs Of 225,000 People

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) recently put into commercial service a power plant generation unit that can meet the electricity needs of 225,000 people.

The coal-fueled, 561,000-kilowatt unit, located at SPS' Tolk Station near Muleshoe, was brought into service June 30, 1985, for about \$287 million, on schedule and under budget.

It is the second unit at the Muleshoe site. The first unit was put into commercial service in August 1982.

"Tolk No. 2" is Southwestern's fifth coal-fueled unit. The steam generating boilers of all five

units burn low-sulfur, Western coal from Wyoming mines.

"We are particularly proud that we can build and finance plants at far less eventual cost to customers than can most electric utilities," said Bert Ballengee, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service. "We strive to keep electricity affordable, and our efficient, lower-cost plants help us achieve that goal."

Tolk No. 2 was constructed for \$512 per kilowatt of installed capacity—significantly below the \$1,086 projected national average cost per kilowatt of comparable coal-fueled units coming into

service this year, Balengee said.

"The use of more coal and less natural gas as boiler fuel in the plants also saves our customers money," the utility president added. "Coal is the least-expensive boiler fuel practical for Southwestern. We estimate that using coal in our fuel mix will save our customers \$215 million this year alone."

The relative fuel-cost savings will continue to increase, Balengee said, because Tolk Unit No. 2 in fiscal 1986 will increase generation by coal to about 76% of SPS' total electricity production.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of one million in eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Panhandle of Oklahoma, and Southwestern Kansas.


