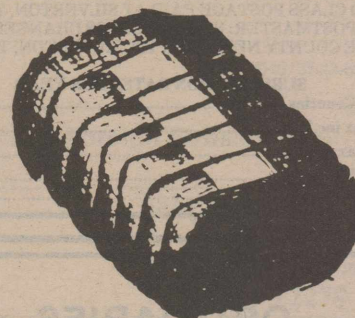

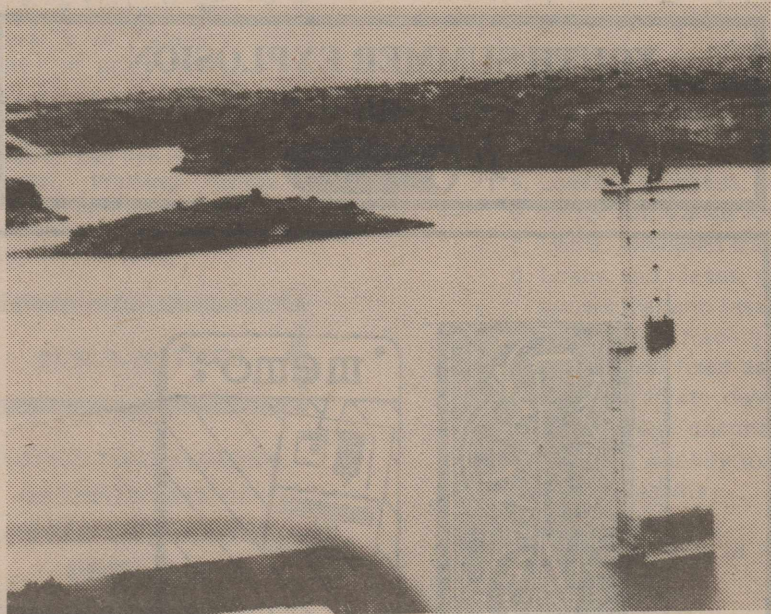

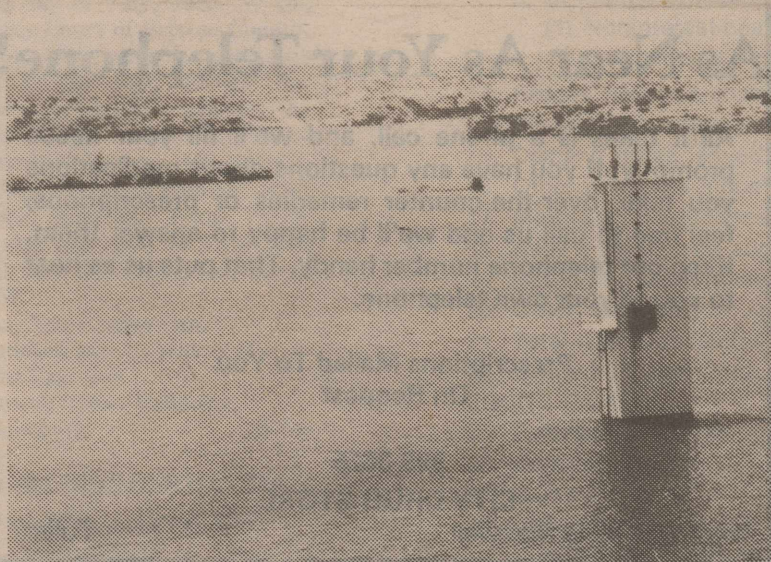

Heavy Rains Swell Lake To Record Depth

Heavy rains during the past week have raised the level of Lake Mackenzie approximately seven to eight feet, and water now covers the first "falls" on Tule Creek. Coupled with the fifteen-foot rise in June, this places the lake depth at the dam near 117 feet—an all-time high.

Maximum depth at the dam will be 150 feet.

Rainfall at the lake amounted to 6.10 inches last Thursday and Friday. Six-inch measurements were also reported in the area northwest of the lake.

Elsewhere rainfall also was heavy, with 6.05 inches recorded at the Dock Peugh place; 6.00

inches at Bruce McFall's; 3.00 inches at Calvin Shelton's; 2.65 inches at Tobe Riddell's; 2.00 inches at Wayne Stephens', and 3.68 inches as the official measurement for Silverton.

Fred Strange, who keeps the official record for Silverton, shows 3.70 inches as the July rainfall. This brings the 1985 rainfall to date to 17.72 inches, which is nearing the annual normal figure of 20.50 inches.

Everything that hadn't been watered was getting quite dry, with large cracks seen in the earth in many places. For most all the crops and range grass, the rains came at a very good time.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted By FmHA

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Floydada, FmHA county supervisor Becky D. Via said today.

Briscoe County is one of four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Ms. Via said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5%; interest rate is 8% on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75%.

SPS To Seek "Minimal-Change" Rate Adjustment

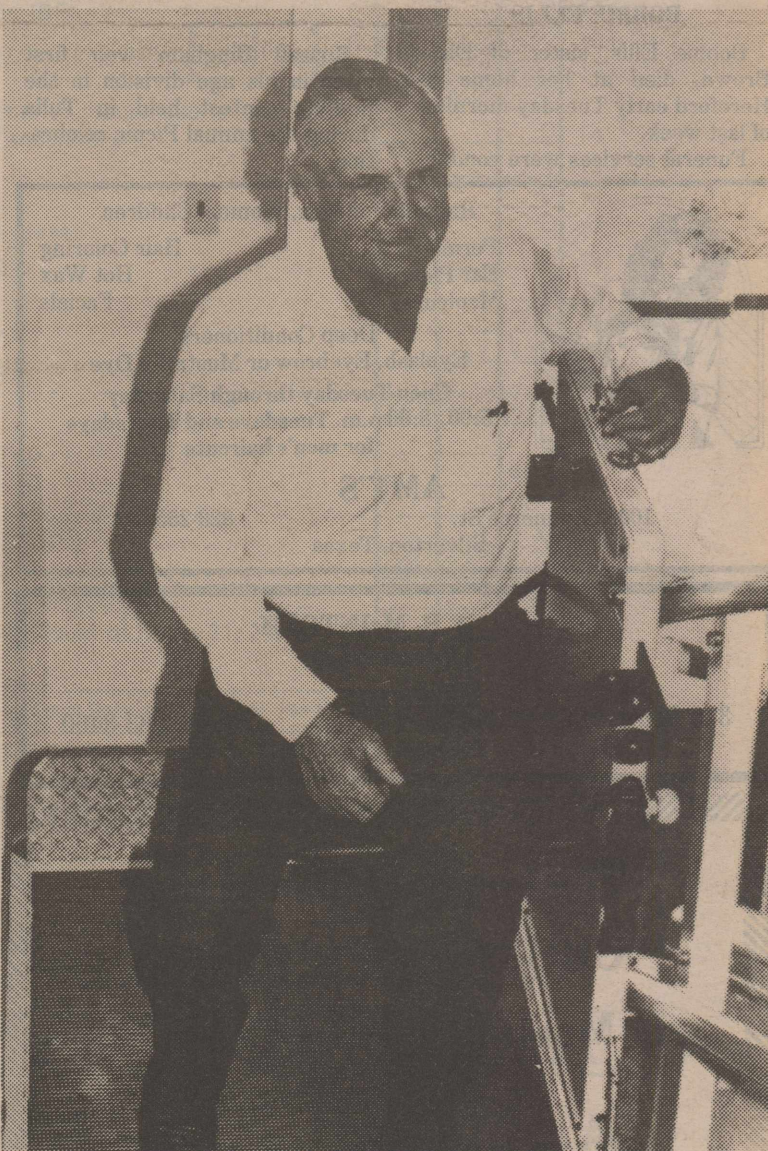
Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) recently filed informational packets giving advance notice of a request to restructure rates for retail electric service in the Texas communities the utility serves.

Runners-up in each category were Stuart Scarborough, 16, of Montgomery County, active sportswear; Lisa Long, 16, of Wise County, tailored daywear; Kendra Cook, 16, of Tom Green County, nontailored daywear, and Lisa Lewis, 17, of Caldwell County, evening and specialty wear.

Each first place winner received a \$300 scholarship from Cloth World, Inc., and a set of scissors from the White Sewing Machine Company. Runners-up each received a \$225 scholarship from the Mary Kay Foundation.

Five special awards went to contestants whose garments were made from natural fibers. In the cotton division, Kendra Cook, a former Silvertown resident and daughter of Ken and Brenda Cook of San Angelo, won top honors. She received \$100 from the Texas Cottonseed Crusher's Association and cotton fabric from Cone Mills. Second prize went to Becky Valenta, 16,
