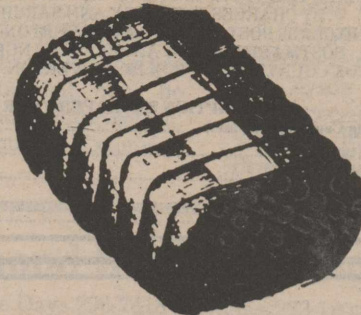

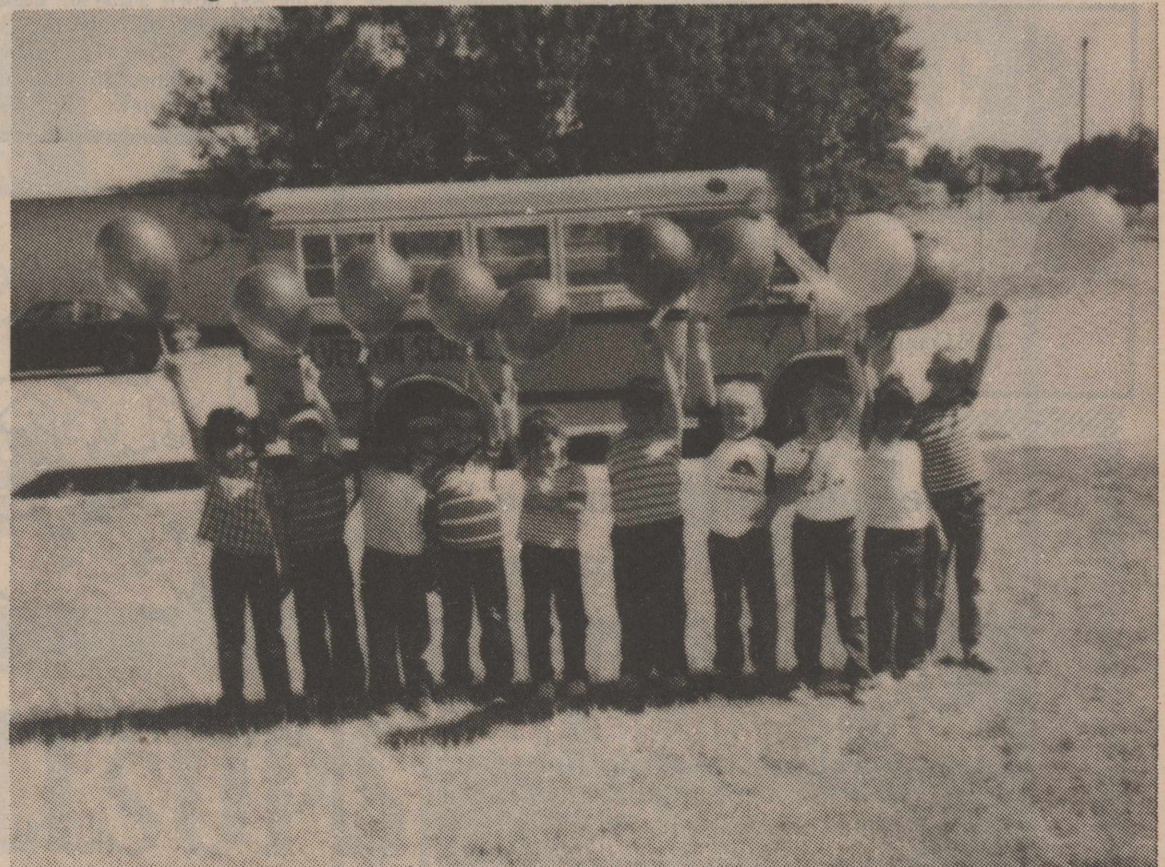
Volunteers will be answering the local pledge phone during these hours. Anyone wishing to pledge can call 823-2125 or bring your money to the City Hall.

Sales Tax Rebate Checks Mailed To Texas Cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$109.2 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Houston's check for \$18.3 million was the largest, bringing 1985 payments to \$66.3 million. Dallas received \$13.4 million, pushing payments since January to \$48.9 million. San Antonio's payment was \$6.6 million for a total of \$23.9 million this year.

Austin received \$5.2 million, increasing 1985 payments to \$18.8 million. Fort Worth's payment of \$3.9 brought this year's total to \$14.3 million. El Paso's check for \$2.3 million increased 1985 payments to \$8.9 million.

May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and the first quarter and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

Silverton's sales tax rebate check amounted to \$2,793.87, down from the \$3,418.76 received for the same period in 1984. This brought the 1985 payments to date to \$8,918.46, down 4.35% from the \$9,323.95 received for the same period in 1984.

Quitaque's check was for \$2,638.43, up from the \$2,481.98 received for the same period last year. This brought Quitaque's total for this year to \$6,003.07, up 6.69% from the \$5,626.46 received for the same period last year.

Other cities in the area and the amounts of their increase or decrease in sales tax rebates include Claude, \$1,828.43, up 1.49%; Hart, \$1,670.21, up 30.04%; Nazareth, \$2,001.59, up 5.25%; Childress, \$32,260.21, down 2.72%; Dickens, \$1,893.12, up 1.21%; Spur, \$4,045.57, up 6.13%; Clarendon, \$10,402.66, down 6.31%; Hedley, \$1,430.85, down 6.94%; Howardwick, \$898.29, down 14.81%; Floydada, \$12,364.17, up 13.93%; Lockney, \$7,186.53, up 14.69%; Lefors, \$318.85, down 25.71%; McLean, \$2,408.89, down 17.54%; Plainview, \$130,847.99, up 6.63%; Edmonson, \$580.97, down 10.19%; Estelline, \$574.00, up 13.36%; Lakeview, \$333.86,

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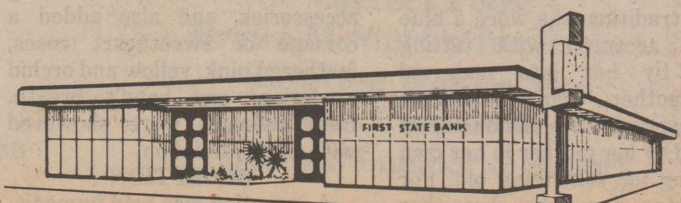

The new Miss Floydada, who is a freshman in Floydada High School, rode in a convertible in the parade for Old Settlers Day.

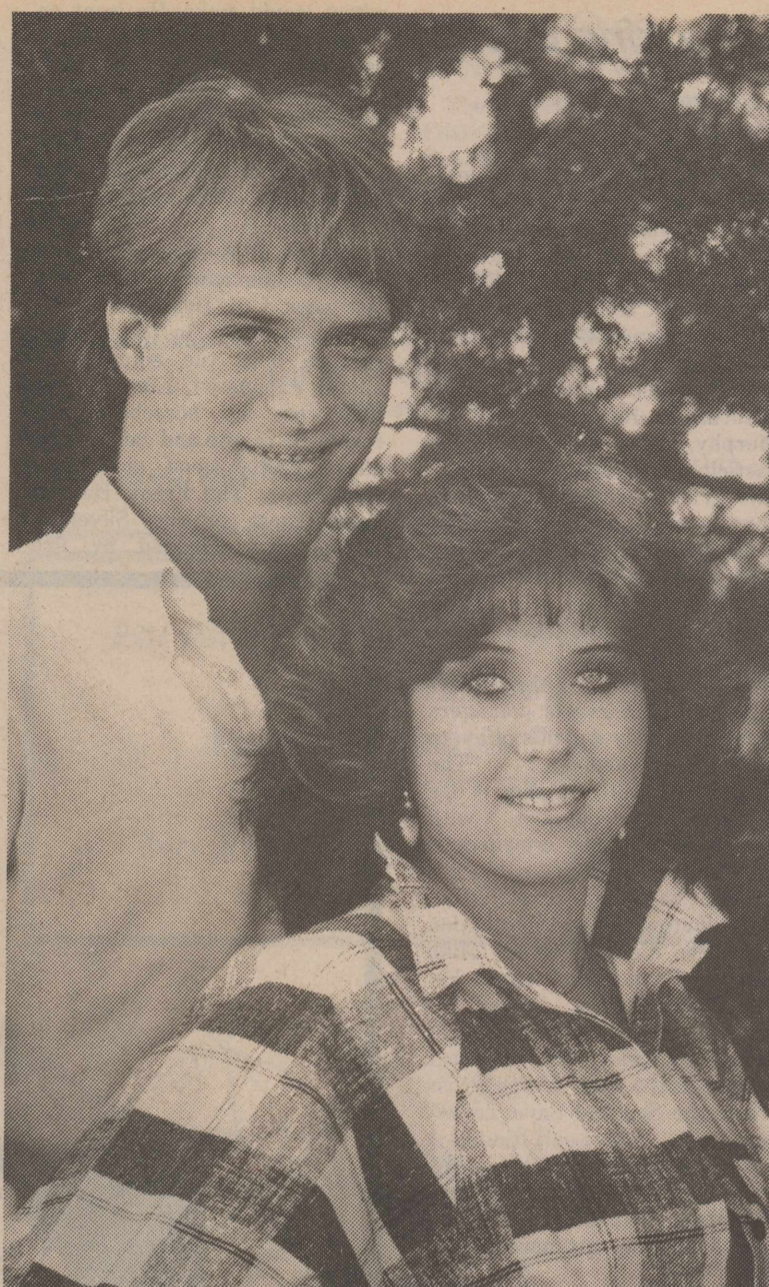

Telethon To Benefit Childrens Hospital Unit

The Children's Miracle Network Telethon, scheduled June 1-2, is being sponsored in this area by the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services and the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service.

Thousands of area children will be helped with funds raised by the telethon because all money donated in the Panhandle will stay in the Panhandle for use in the neonatal and pediatric units at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

In its third year, the telethon benefits pediatric hospitals throughout the United States and Canada. With more than 130 television stations carrying the show, the Children's Miracle Network Telethon is the second largest telethon in the world.

The telethon airs from 8:00 p.m. June 1 to 5:00 p.m. June 2 on KAMR-TV Channel 4 in Amarillo. Twenty minutes of each hour will be broadcast live from Channel 4 studios with local hosts. The remaining 40 minutes will be broadcast from Osmond Studios in Orem, Utah.

National co-hosts are Merlin Olsen and Marilyn McCoo, with John Schneider and Marie Osmond serving as national co-chairmen.

All monies raised in the local event go to help every child treated at Northwest Texas Hospital. The hospital is the regional center for the care of critically ill newborn infants and receives many of the seriously ill pediatric patients from the West Texas area, Eastern New Mexico and Western Oklahoma.

For years, the welfare of sick children has been at the top of the Osmond family's priority list. In 1970, this interest led to the formation of the foundation, which has a purpose of raising funds to improve the health of children through research, medical service and education.

Preparations for the event go on all year and depend on a tremendous amount of volunteerism. In Silverton, members of the ambulance service and others will be acting as volunteers.

The telethon is a unique concept in children's hospital fund raising. One hundred percent of the funds raised go directly to the pediatric health care center in the care region of the donor. Viewers therefore are able to donate directly to the facility that cares for the children from their community.

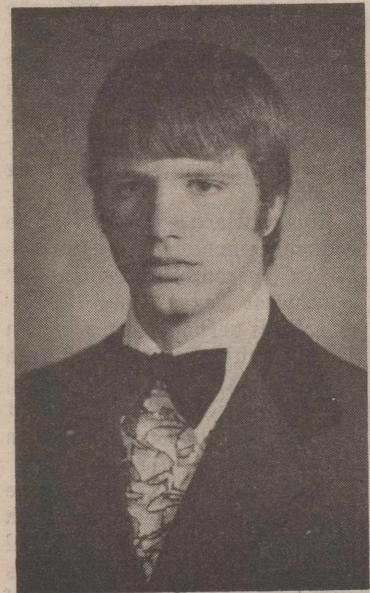

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REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

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Extension Highlights

Since last week's article, I've talked to several of you local home gardeners and your BIG questions were what about the bugs, weeds and disease. We can all agree that as safety and economic minded as we are, that the long-handled hoe is our best tool for weed control. Chemical weed control usually is undesirable and unsatisfactory because of the selective nature of weed control chemicals.

The wide variety of vegetable crops normally planted in a small area prohibits use of such chemicals. Cultivate and hoe shallowly to avoid injury to vegetable roots lying near the soil surface. Control weeds in the seedling stage to prevent them from seeding and reinfesting the garden area. Finally, always remove the weed debris from the area. This again will assist in stopping the recurrent weed problem.

Our other major problem is insects. Everybody is interested in identifying and killing those pesky rascals. In the home garden there are various chemicals on the market to control all or some of the more common insects. When using any of these chemicals always follow the manufacturers' directions on the label, to prevent any harmful damage to the plant or people.

The most common pests posed to our home gardens are the thrip, apid, leafhopper and spider mite. Insecticides that show the best results in controlling most of these pests are Diazinon, Sevin and Malathion. Remember, for best results, always follow the

directions on the label. Also remember that there is a time interval between when you spray and when you can harvest. It is different for each chemical.

For control of all common diseases such as spotted Wilt Virus, Curly Top Virus, Potato Y Virus, Tobacco Mosaic Virus and early blight, use the common chemicals such as Benelate, Captan or Maneb. All of these products are suitable for control of these common diseases in the home garden.

If a gardener follows some simple cultural practices in and around the garden area he can reduce or eliminate many insects and subsequent disease problems. These practices are as follows:

1. Maintain a clean, closely mowed area adjacent to the

garden.

2. Dispose of any trash, boards or old plant debris in the area.

3. Keep the soil at maximum fertility level and well watered.

4. If only a few plants are involved, hand-pick larger insects, crush insect egg masses, or wash smaller insects off plants with a water hose.

5. Use cardboard protectors around transplants.

6. At the conclusion of the season, remove all plants and debris.

In closing, I hope that all of you have the best of luck this year and hope your thumb is as green as ever.


