Is "Fiber to the Premise" Safe?

One of the first things to understand regarding FTTP (fiber to the premise) is that fiber optic cable has no emissions. It is not a copper cable carrying an electrical signal. It is not a Wi-Fi signal broadcasting radio frequencies through the air, nor is it a cellular frequency including the new Fifth Generation Cellular (5G). The fiber optic cable itself carries no electrical signal. The signal is simply infrared light through a tiny solid glass core. Not only does fiber have no electrical signal, but there is also no electrical equipment between our central office and your home or

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative and WT Services, Inc. both use GPON technology. GPON is the acronym for Gigabit Passive Optical Network. This allows our companies to run fiber from our central office all the way to your home or business without adding any additional electrical power, Electro Magnetic Frequencies (EMF), or Electro Magnetic Interference (EMI) in the areas or streets of your towns and neighborhoods. No other technology can provide the data speed benefits of fiber optics.

Benefitting from the speed of fiber optics does require an Optical Network Terminal (ONT). An ONT is a converter, and because this is a digital conversion, it is not actually a modem, but for easy reference it serves the same purpose as a modem. This ONT may be inside or outside, and its function is to use electrical power to convert the signal coming in on the fiber to a signal that can be transmitted through your house on an Ethernet cable to a router.

The ONT is grounded to prevent any kind of radio frequency (RF) or interference. The fiber optic cable, and the GPON have no electrical current and no RF signal. The only place where any electrical signal is applied is at the ONT. The ONT is powered by a standard 110-volt connection.

We understand that technology changes quickly, and as it does, it can be easy to be overwhelmed or confused by information or misinformation. The EMFs and radio frequencies we discuss and sometimes worry about are around us all the time. Our Wi-Fi devices in our houses and businesses and even in open areas or gathering places are using the same frequency as our sealed microwave ovens.

Every Wi-Fi device in our lives has at least 2 radios constantly transmitting and receiving RF data. A cellular device that we carry around has at least three radios on different RF channels. These Wi-Fi and cellular devices are broadcasting and receiving all around and even through our bodies.

The new 5G cellular is somewhat feared because it is a shorter wavelength and may penetrate the skin of humans even easier than current cellular frequencies, but no one really knows the effects or how to test for them. The FCC has performed studies and determined that Wi-Fi and cellular devices, meeting required safety regulations, do not produce enough energy to damage DNA or body tissues.

Answering the question in the title of this article is not a certainty, but understanding the technologies involved, we can say yes, fiber optic cable is safe. I'm not sure anyone can say anything is absolutely without risk, but the risk, in comparison to the EMFs and RF's our bodies and brains are subjected to every day

Commissioner Frye elected Judge Pro-Tem

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in special session on Friday, February 17, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the January 23rd meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved.

Approval was given for a policy of emailing Minutes of the previous meeting to Commissioners in advance so they would have time to study them before meetings.

Funding to make the Parmer

County website compliant with current Disability Law was reconsidered. A motion was approved at the last meeting for an amount of \$490. The actual cost was \$1,490. A new motion with the correct amount was approved.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Kirk Frye was elected to serve as Parmer County Judge Pro-Tem for 2023. Frye is currently the longest serving commissioner on the Court.

ARPA funds for County employees who were not included in the previous distribution were approved.

Approval was given for Parmer County to join other counties in a lawsuit against drug companies for fraudulent and reckless marketing of opioids.

The annual lawn maintenance contract for the Courthouse and Law Enforcement Center was awarded to Eric Chadwick.

In other business, a water line under a county road in Precinct 3 was approved. Consideration of an estimate from Claiborne Refrigeration to repair a water line in the old jail was tabled to give the company time to amend the estimate in order to include repairs needed at the Courthouse. Consideration of the COVID-19 Leave Policy was also tabled.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske reported to the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 19 inmates of which 2 are paying customers from Dawson County.

The next regular meeting is Monday, February 27th.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

Beto. On Wednesday, February 22nd, Beto and two other Webelo rank scouts, will be completing their Cast Iron Chef Adventure Loop when they present a buffalo meat lasagna at their weekly pack meeting.

"Our scouts have posted the colors at several community events and led the parade at Maize Days." Cub Master Vickie Rando commented. "We went to the Space Derby and Spook-O-Ree in October. We've had a lot of fun. Scouting has been good for the kids and the adults. We've seen some of them come out of their shells. Some of our families had never been camping before going to the Cub Scout Family Campout."

"A scout is helpful, and our kids have even completed a community service project making pet treats for Parmer Paws. This summer, we want to do a lake clean up. This will teach the scouts to take pride in their community and to be civic minded," said Senior District Executive Michael Lopez. Last year, Pack 56 participated in the Scouting for Food drive and raised 9,506 meals for High Plains Food Bank partner Calvary Baptist Church. "The community has been very supportive of the pack. We are grateful for everyone that supported our hamburger sale, but we need more help. We will be selling Camp Card coupons starting March 2nd. The cards sell for \$5 and \$2.50 from each card sold goes back to the pack. We want to sell 1000 cards." Camp Cards are coupons with deals from businesses throughout Friona, Hereford, and Farwell. "One of the tenets of the scout law says that a scout is thrifty which means scouts learn to pay their own way. Selling camp cards introduces scouts to customer service concepts, sales, and money management while earning their way through their scouting Journey," said Golden Eagle District Michael Lopez.








On February 22, 1819, "after years of negotiations, Secretary of State John Quincy Adams achieved a diplomatic coup with the signing of the Florida Purchase Treaty, which officially put Florida into U.S. hands at no cost beyond the U.S. assumption of some \$5 millions of claims by U.S. citizens against Spain."



National Clam Chowder Day

Next to an excellent Lobster Bisque, New England Clam Chowder is Bill's favorite soup. We will probably celebrating National Chowder Day with a bowl of full of chowder. Don't be too intimidated by the canned clams. I have made this chowder before, and all went well. You will just want to rinse them well coming out of the can.

..... **New England Clam Chowder**

Ingredients

3 6.5 oz. cans chopped/ minced clams in clam juice

8 ounces clam juice 6 thick center-cut bacon strips chopped

1 tablespoon butter 2 stalks celery finely chopped

1 large onion chopped 1 ¼ pounds russet potatoes peeled and diced into ¼-½" cubes, approx. 3 ½ cups

3-5 garlic cloves minced ¼ teaspoon red pepper flakes optional

⅓ cup all-purpose flour 2 cups low sodium chicken broth

2 teaspoons chicken bouillon 2 bay leaves

½ teaspoon each dried

parsley dried oregano, salt

¼ teaspoon each dried thyme pepper 1 cup heavy cream

Garnishes (Optional) Oyster crackers Fresh parsley

Instructions

Drain clam juice from cans into a measuring cup. Add enough bottled clam juice to equal 2 ½ cups. Set aside. In a Dutch oven, cook bacon over medium heat until fat is rendered and slightly brown. Remove half of the bacon with a slotted spoon to a paper towel lined plate. To the remaining bacon and drippings, melt in 1 tablespoon butter over medium heat. Increase heat to medium high and add celery

and onion. Sauté for 5-7 minutes or until onions are soft. Add potatoes, garlic, red pepper flakes (if using) and sauté 30 seconds. Sprinkle in flour and cook an additional 1 minute. Stir in chicken broth, reserved 2 ½ cups clam juice, chicken bouillon, bay leaves and all seasonings. Bring to a boil then reduce to a simmer. Simmer, uncovered, for 15-20 minutes or until potatoes are very tender. Stir in heavy cream and

bring to a simmer to heat through. Discard bay leaves. Remove from heat and stir in clams. Taste and add salt/pepper to taste. (You may or may not need additional salt depending on how salty your clams and bacon are.) For a thinner or less chunky soup stir in additional heavy cream/milk or chicken broth. Top individual servings with reserved bacon and oyster crackers and fresh parsley if desired.

My eulogy for the man from Plains, Georgia

Biographer Jonathan Alter has written about Jimmy Carter's "core decency." It is my hope that when our country's 39th President moves beyond this earth's existence, that description will live after him.

The announcement last week of former President Carter's transition to hospice brought some reflection. When I voted for the first time--in the 1976 presidential election--my ballot was not cast for him. That year the two candidates were, in retrospect, both decent to the core. Gerald Ford's experience on a national stage and getting us through Watergate were factors in my inexperienced decision-making process. Carter won. Ford lost. The two remained cordial, professional, and modeled civility in politics.

James Earl Carter, Jr., was an ineffective president. He was unable to manage an economy wracked with inflation and unemployment, oversaw a botched rescue attempt of the American hostages in Iran, and received pushback from special interest groups when he considered renewable energy. An idealistic outsider to Washington, D.C., Carter was outmanned by the system and deterred by what some observers saw as stubbornness and piety.

In fairness and truth, these are the historical low moments networks will rehash upon his passing.

Below is the programming I hope will be added to media eulogies.

CNN, please remind your viewers that Carter had every intention of pursuing a military career, graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1946. Tell them that he was an engineering officer on submarines and was selected in 1953 to help develop the up and coming nuclear submarine program.

ABC, point out that he gave up that naval career because his dad died the same year. As the eldest son, Carter felt the obligation to come home and manage the family peanut farm in Plains, Georgia, (population just under 400). Carter was only 29; his father only 58.

PBS News Hour, I hope you will devote an entire segment to his 76-year marriage to Rosalynn, the woman who chose to wear the same dress to the inauguration ball that she wore when her husband was sworn in as governor of Georgia. Frugal and practical, Rosalyn's mental health advocacy and caregiving training programs remain vital policy at the Carter Center in Atlanta today. Be best? Rosalynn genuinely was.

NBC, show footage to your nightly viewers of President Carter with the leaders of Egypt and Israel-countries who were bitter enemies since 1948—at the Camp David Accords in 1978. Then display the photos of those historic handshakes and signatures on a long-awaited peace treaty.

Any chance, Fox, you could say something nice about a Democrat who taught Sunday School Class for Maranatha Baptist in Plains until he was 90 years old, who handcrafted the wooden collection plates which are still passed around, and who along with his wife has, for every year since 1984, donated time to Habitat for Humanity building projects in the United States and abroad? I dare you to show the quote from David Gergen, who worked for three Republican presidents. "Jimmy Carter won't go down as great president but should be remembered as a great saint."

As if destined to live a long life of service, Carter was spared the health problem that took the lives of his father, two sisters, and younger brother-all dying in middle age from pancreatic cancer. Carter, diagnosed with melanoma in 2015, is
