Commissioners approve new salary for court reporter position

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, February 27, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

Commissioners discussed a request from District Judge Kathryn Gurley concerning the salary for the court reporter position. The current budgeted yearly salary is \$50,000 and approval was given to increase that amount to \$89,000 of which Parmer County will pay 60% and Bailey County will pay 40%.

The Court also heard a request from District Attorney Jackie Claborn regarding funding for a forensic accountant involved in a specific felony case. An amount of \$7,500 was approved.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske reported to the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 18 inmates of which 2 are paying customers from Dawson County.

In other business, approval was granted for a water line to be placed under County Roads J and 11, which are located in Precinct 2. Also, Commissioners received updates on current legislative initiatives involving election laws, an update on plats, and information on lease arrangements for procuring equip-

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the February 27 meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved. The next regular meeting is Monday, March 27th.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

Senate rolls out property tax cut packages

Texas homeowners would see the largest cut to their property taxes in history according to lawmakers at a Tuesday press conference as the Lt. Governor and members of the Senate unveiled the chamber's plan for tax cuts this session. The three bills presented represent \$16.5 billion in tax savings across Texas. "It's important to know that we're touching every taxpayer, every homeowner, every business owner, with needed tax relief," said Houston Senator Paul Bettencourt. "We're spending the money as wisely as we can to get the maximum tax relief possible - and this plan has eyepopping numbers."

Senate Bill 3, by Bettencourt, would raise the homestead exemption - the amount of value a homeowner can write off before taxes - by 75 percent up to \$70,000. This was the plan announced by Lt. Governor Dan Patrick earlier in the session,


but Bettencourt revealed Tuesday that a second component will triple the senior property tax exemption for homeowners 65 years of age and older to \$30,000. Combined with the increase in the base exemption, Texas seniors would qualify for an exemption of \$100,000, said Bettencourt. Based on the average home value, he said homeowners would see a reduction in their property tax bill of around \$800 in the first two years. For senior homeowners, Bettencourt said they would see savings above \$1000 each year. "It's an astonishing number," he said. Twopoint-two million homesteads, about 40 percent of the state total, are owned by seniors.

Senate Bill 4, also by Bettencourt, would buy down local school property taxes by another \$5.83 billion on top of on-going rate compression from 2019's education reform

bill for a total of \$10.68 billion in school property tax rate reduction. Senate Finance Committee chair and bill co-author Joan Huffman said that the legislature will ensure the state will cover any lost local revenue. "Where this empties the bucket, the state is going to continue to fill up the bucket," she said.

The third bill, SB 5 by Flower Mound Senator Tan Parker, is aimed at business taxes, and would increase the exemptions for the tax on business personal property up from two-and-a-half to twenty percent, and would reduce inventory taxes by 20 percent. "We hear so much from the business community about the importance of reducing the inventory tax," said Parker. In all, the bill would represent \$1.5 billion in tax reductions for Texas business owners.







Texas Breaks Jobs Record

Governor Greg Abbott celebrated the state's growing workforce and strong economy following the latest employment release from the Texas Workforce Commission showing Texas again broke the all-time record for total jobs in January for the 16th consecutive month. With Texas employers adding 48,600 nonfarm jobs in January, total jobs in Texas reached a new historic high of 13,782,300.

"Texas truly is America's economic engine as we continue to break our all-time record for total jobs, now for 16 consecutive months," said Governor Abbott.


From January 2022 to January 2023, Texas added 654,100 jobs, marking an annual growth rate of 5 percent, outpacing the national rate of 3.3 percent. Notable January job gains in Texas included 8,300 jobs added in Leisure and Hospitality, 8,100 jobs added in Professional and Business Services, and 5,900 jobs added in both Construction and Manufacturing employment.







Friona to receive a \$50,866.97 tax allocation payment for March 2023

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1 billion in local sales tax allocations for March. The total is 9.9 percent more than in March 2022. Cities will receive \$633.2M, transit systems will get \$215.7M, counties get \$62.1M, and special purpose districts will get \$92.4M. These allocations are based on sales made in January by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2022 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

The City of Friona will receive \$50,866.97 in sales tax allocation for the month of March. This payment is a 24.36% decrease from the \$67,253.14 received in March of 2022. For year-to-date 2023, Friona has received \$167,641.98 which is a 17.74% decrease from the YTD amount of \$203,807.81 received in 2022. The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$12,716.74 of the allocation for its operating budget.



The Senate plan focuses on exemptions, said Bettencourt, cause that's the best way to deliver lasting cuts to taxpayers. "An exemption is permanent," he said. "These permanent exemptions will be there year after year to save Texas homeowners and Texas business owners the money they need plus [tax rate] compression." He said that combination has led to the reduction of the property tax burden across the state. Because the state capped local government spending growth in 2019 - 3.5 percent for counties and cities and 2.5 percent for schools when appraisal values go up, the taxing entity must lower their tax rate to stay under the spending cap.

This has largely disconnected appraisal growth and property tax growth, said Patrick. "We all got calls about appraisals going up, but we didn't get calls in October when the bills went out," said Patrick. "The real key to saving Texans' taxes is limiting the size of government." It's the state's cap on its own spending, combined with record

revenue projections and a record budget surplus, said Patrick, that's driving the size of the relief package. Bettencourt agreed. "We've never had \$16.5 billion to throw at property tax relief, and that is a record number," he said. "It is well spent and I believe it's going to be well received by the citizens and taxpayers of the great state of Texas."

Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

Oatmeal Cookies

The thought of this recipe made me want to go straight to the kitchen and stir up a batch. What could make oatmeal cookies better? Probably brown sugar. These are a thinner and more dense oatmeal cookie, but they will be the perfect way to enjoy National Oatmeal Cookie day on March 19th.

Brown Sugar Oatmeal Cookies

Ingredients

1 c. salted butter, softened 2 c. packed dark brown sugar 2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 whole eggs 1 1/2 c. all-purpose flour 1 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. baking soda



Directions

Preheat the oven to 350oF. In the bowl of an electric mixer (or using a hand mixer) beat together the butter and brown sugar until fluffy. Beat in vanilla. Add eggs, one at a time, scraping the bowl after each one. Mix the flour, salt, and baking soda in a medium sized bowl. Add it into the creamed mixture in 2 to 3 batches, mixing it until just combined. Mix in the oats until just combined. Use your preferred size cookie scoop (or a regular spoon) to drop portions of dough onto a lightly greased cookie sheet, spacing them a couple inches apart. Bake for 12-13 minutes or until dark and chewy. If you'd like a crispier cookie, just cook a little longer! Let them cool slight on the pan after removing from the oven, then transfer the cookies onto a plate

* Note: Add 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts to the flour mixture if you'd like a nutty flavor and crunch.

House pushes armed officer at all schools

Under legislation prioritized by House Speaker Dade Phelan, every Texas school would have an armed police officer, and aspiring teachers would receive extra support.

The Dallas Morning News reported the bill would also provide \$15,000 in annual funding for safety measures for each school in the state. Another bill would increase the annual allotment per student for safety measures from \$10 to \$100.

Another House mea-

sure is aimed at improving teacher retention and recruitment, The Morning News reported. The measure, sponsored by state Rep. Harold Dutton, D-Houston, would create a new grant to help prospective teachers pursing special education or bilingual certification, and would increase funding for educator mentoring. Special education and bilingual teacher positions are especially hard to fill in Texas.

Rising car insurance rates causing sticker shock

Average statewide auto



insurance rates are up nearly 24% over last year, according to a report by the Texas Standard. That is the highest increase in at least 20 years, according to the Texas Department of Insurance. That comes on top of increased costs for vehicles both new and used, and higher fuel costs.

Michael Schnurman, a business columnist with The Morning News, was interviewed on the Standard and had this to say, in part:

"There are several elements that play into it. One...is the higher values of cars and used cars in particular - they really shot up during the pandemic," he said. "But the claims are also up a lot... When driving resumed, the number of accidents and the severity of accidents has really been a lot higher. If you look at fatalities, I think they were up 18%."

Schnurman suggested consumers shop around for auto insurance and look for discounts for bundling it with homeowners' insurance or multiple vehicles on the same account.

Texas Senate passes first bill of session

The Texas Senate last week passed a bill that would close a loophole in state law that allowed gun sales to people between the ages of 16 and 18 who have been involuntarily hospitalized for mental illness. The Texas Tribune reported it was the first bill passed by the Senate this session.

Courts are supposed to report all involuntary mental health hospitalizations to the Texas Department of Public Safety, which then sends them to the FBI's national background check system. However, problems with how existing state law was written led to those hospitalizations not being reported by courts.

The measure comes an 18-year-old after shooter in Uvalde with a history of mental health problems killed 19 students and two teachers at Robb Elementary last year. However, since that shooter was never hospitalized, closing the loophole would not have prevented him from legally buying two assault rifles.

Gas prices also look to spring forward

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 13.1 cents last week to an average of \$3.07 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 12.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 92.2 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.57 while the most expensive was \$4.17 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline rose 8.0 cents per gallon last week, averaging \$3.44 per gallon. The national average is up 7.1 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 87.7 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 4.1 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.30 per gallon.

"With the transition to more expensive summer gasoline underway coast to coast, wholesale gasoline prices continue to inch up at a rate typical for this time of year, reflected in the national average rising for the second straight week," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

Greatness in God's Kingdom

Patrick Mahomes recently won his second Super Bowl Championship, and people are wondering if he will one day be the GOAT (Greatest Of All Time). Meanwhile, Tom Brady, the current GOAT, has retired and looks to be riding off into the sunset. In the financial sector, the gargantuan fortunes of a very few resonates their successes and greatness by the world's standards. Measuring greatness in sports looks at stats, greatness in business looks at revenue and wealth, greatness in music results in albums sold and awards received, but what does greatness in God's kingdom look like?

Greatness in God's kingdom is not a matter of stats, sales and stardom, but it is a matter of glorifying God. In Mark 10:32-45 Jesus and his disciples begin an important discussion about greatness in God's kingdom, and Jesus makes clear that greatness in God's kingdom always includes the cross. As they walked down the road toward Jerusalem for the last time together, Jesus tells his disciples again that betrayal, beatings, and death await him there. In verse 34, Jesus prophecies of himself in Jerusalem, "And they will mock him and spit on him, and flog him and kill him. And after three days he will rise." It is amazing that the disciples forgot what Jesus said about his death and resurrec-

tion multiple times before it happened, but in a similar way, we often forget that greatness in God's kingdom always includes the cross. On the cross, Jesus suffered and died for sin and because of sin, and it is only through faith in Jesus' perfect sacrifice and triumphant victory over death, hell and the grave that you can be saved. After salvation, God gives you commands and responsibilities to make much of him in all areas of your life. As you look to Jesus' death on the cross, you are reminded that before the crown of glory, there was the crown of thorns. Before the empty tomb, there were nails through His hands and feet, before Jesus ascended back to glory, he endured the pain and gore of the cross to accomplish your salvation. Jesus went to the cross, before he walked out of the tomb. There was no shortcut to greatness for the Son of God, and there are no shortcuts to greatness for His followers. Greatness in God's kingdom is not a path of comfort and ease, but one that follows the footsteps of Jesus, making much of Him through your trials and temptations, so that others too, will come to know Jesus as their Lord and Savior. It is impossible to be great in the Lord's kingdom without making much of Jesus' death on the cross, which begins with one's own salvation, then seeks to point others to Christ.








Takin' it to the Bank


