SCHOOL NEWS

We are not at all pleased with the work of many of the high school pupils this first semester. We were hoping that there would be an improvement this semester over the first semester of last year.

The teachers are not at fault for this condition. They are working faithfully and conscientiously. Later on in this article I will show that this fault lies with the home. If the pupils are to secure the very best of results in their school work there must be a mutual understanding and complete cooperation between the home and the

school. We have a complete report of the work of every pupil in each class of the high school. There were forty-five per cent of the pupils of the Haskell High School that failed in one or more subjects—a slight increase over that of last year.

Ninety per cent of these pupils could pass in their work if they would study from two or three hours at home each school night. Over half of these pupils failed in only one subject. About one-fourth of them failed in two subjects.

We said in the beginning of this article that the parents were largely to be blamed for these pupils failing. I have come to this conclusion because I have asked these boys and girls how many hours they studied at home and

the most of them said they studied from an hour to one and a half hours at home. It is absolutely impossible for the ordinary high school pupil to prepare his work properly with only from an hour to one and a half hour's study at home.

It is just here where the parents' duty comes in. The parents should see that their children in high school study at least two and a half hours each school night at home. The ordinary high school boy and girl can not look far enough into the future to see the great rewards that will come to them as a result of close application to their studies. They live more in the present. Because of the parents' experience and judgment and the interest they should have in their children's success, they should see that their children carry out this suggestion of the schools that they do real studying at home each school night of a period of from two and one-half to three hours. Even most grown people these days will not do more than is required of them. So we can not expect many of our children to do more than is required of them.

Then, again, the results of this World War has demoralized people. It has begotten a spirit of indifference to things worth while. Many people want to have a good time and want to be entertained continually. It is going to require much attention and interest on the part of us parents to prevent this dangerous and demoralizing spirit from getting a strong hold upon our children. It is going to require complete cooperation of the home and the school to overcome that dangerous influence.

Before closing this article, we must also say that the work in the lower grades of the elementary school was no better this semester than that of the high school. We were in a seventh grade class today when 75 per cent of the class indicated that they had done practically no home studying.

The fifth, sixth and seventh grades should study from one and a half to two hours at home each night. The third and fourth grades should study at least an hour at home.

Our advice to the parents of all high school and grammar grade pupils is that they carefully prepare their lessons at home and then they should review them at school before they recite. If these pupils have no study period at school during which they may review these lessons, they should review these lessons next morning before going to school.

If the pupils and parents will carry out consistently the suggestions we have made in this article, at least eighty per cent of these pupils that have failed would pass in their work.

We will be glad to advise or talk with any of the parents concerning this home-study work or the work of their children. In fact all of the teachers will gladly advise with the parents concerning the work of their children.

If there is any way to remedy this situation in these schools, we want to do it. The only way we can remedy this condition is by the parents carrying out the suggestions we have made in this article.

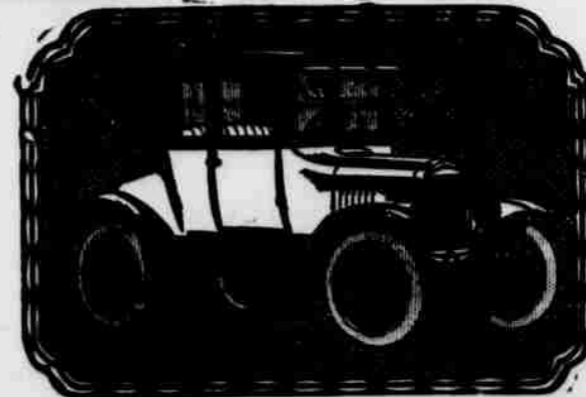

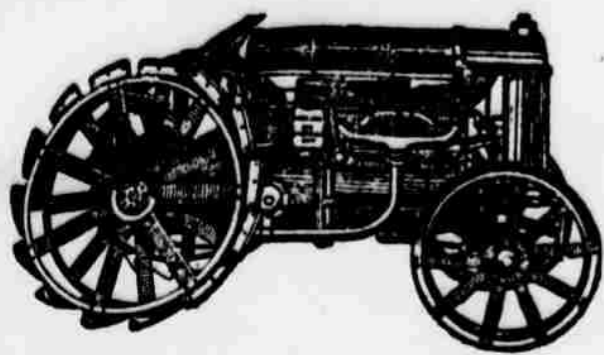

Increased Demand for Grapes.

Shipment of grapes in 1922 from the three leading grape-growing states in the East—New York, Michigan, and Pennsylvania—was double their average annual shipments, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture. New York shipped 7,484 cars, compared with an average of 3,584 for the years 1917-1921; Michigan shipped 5,833 cars, compared with an average of 2,912; and Pennsylvania, 1,514, compared with 737.
