Buena Tierra Project is underway

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture conducted a ribbon cutting ceremony Wednesday morning to highlight the Buena Tierra Project which is Friona's newest home building venture. TW&M Properties, LLC has been working with the Friona Economic Development Corporation and the City of Friona to make the project a reality.

ribbon cutting ceremony included Mayor Greg Lewellen, City Manager Lee Davila, Chamber VP Emma Rector, and City Council members Brent Loflin, Esmeralda Mills, and Alan Monroe.

The Buena Tierra Project is located at the block west of Legacy Pointe Senior Apartments between North Main & Euclid and 15th and 16th streets. The project consists of 4 phases with three 3-bedroom and/or 4-bedroom homes built in each phase.

Phase 1 (southeast corner) Friona officials attending the of the project is currently under construction and consists of a 3-bedroom home and two 4-bedroom homes and is scheduled to be completed by

August 13th. All of the properties will feature a family patio, front porch, 2-car garage, and pantry.

The estimated cost of the Buena Tierra Project is \$2.5 million and the final completion date is scheduled for February 13, 2025. After Phase 2 is completed, 15th Street will be curbed and paved. After Phase 4 is completed, 16th Street will be curbed and paved.







Senate, House begin budget reconciliation process

The Texas Senate unanimously approved a \$308 billion twoyear budget last week, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The next step is to reconcile that budget with one passed earlier by the Texas House.

The Senate's budget funds \$10 billion in electric grid reforms, provides pay raises to state employees, and devotes more than half of its budget to funding education.

"Over the next few weeks, I will be working with my colleagues in the Senate and the House to reach a consensus on the differences between the two chambers, and I look forward to sending the final appropriations bill to Gov. (Greg) Abbott before the legislative session ends," state Sen. Joan Huffman, R- Houston said in a statement. Huffman chairs the finance committee.

The main difference in the two budgets is in how to provide property tax relief. The House version dedicates \$17.3 billion to cutting the annual amount a home's appraisal can increase, from 10% to 5%. The Senate budget allocates \$16.5 billion for property tax relief by increasing the homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$70,000, with added breaks for homeowners 65 and older.

Medicaid expansion for new moms possible

The Texas House has passed a bill that allows low-income moms to stay on Medicaid for a full year after childbirth.

The Texas Tribune reported that is a marked increase from current practice, in which postpartum Medicaid expires two months after birth in Texas.

The bill has widespread support, including from Gov Greg Abbott and more than 170 groups in the state across the political spectrum. However, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, has not publicly stated his position on the measure.

Texas has the largest uninsured population in the country, with nearly 1 in 5 Texans lacking health insurance, the Tribune reported.

"As I have said before, it is essential that the Texas House makes meaningful progress this year on better supporting mothers and children in the state and that starts with extending health coverage for new moms to a full year," House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, said previously when outlining his priorities for the legislative session.

Bill bans 'sexually explicit' books in school libraries

The Texas House last week passed a preliminary measure that requires vendors to assign a rating to books with sexual content before selling them to school districts, The Dallas Morning News reported. The measure requires one more vote in the House before heading to the Senate, where it is likely to pass.

"This bill is about radically sexual content in the hands of unaccompanied children in public school libraries," state Rep. Jared Patterson, R-Frisco, the bill's sponsor, said from the House floor Thursday.

Opponents to the measure are concerned it would lead to books about LGBTQ people being banned from libraries. About a dozen people with the Texas Freedom Network held a read-in on the Capitol rotunda's floor as the bill was being debated.

State Rep. Venton Jones, D-Dallas, is one of eight openly LGBTQ legislators. He said the bill would hurt children who grow up feeling out of place because of their sexual orientation.

"I remember going to my school library looking for books when healthy conversations with my loved ones were not always available or always comfortable," Jones said. "What I was looking for was materials that spoke to me and for stories of the people who came before me."

Billions more for university research likely

Billions of dollars for higher education research appear likely as two bills have passed the House, the Statesman reported. One measure changes the name of the National Research University Fund to the Texas University Fund, while another proposes a constitutional amendment to enact the bill and allocate \$3.5 billion to the fund.

Both bills were filed by state Rep. Greg Bonnen, R-Friendswood.

"This is a transformative piece of legislation that will allow Texas for generations to come to be the intellectual capital of the world," Bonnen said last week. "It changes the eligibility requirements for access to this fund, and it does so in a merit-based approach and in an approach that, as other universities grow and enhance their research performance, they will be able to access this fund and not dilute the ones that are currently in the fund."

Similar measures have already passed the Senate, though that body allocated \$1 billion less than the House measure.

'Lights out' across Texas helps birds migrate


The annual migration of birds through Texas to northern breeding grounds has begun, and Texans are urged to help by turning off outdoor lights at night from now through May 12, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Bird mortalities are associated with light pollution, which disorients our winged friends. One of every three birds migrating through the United States comes through Texas in the spring and fall - nearly 2 billion in total, according to TPWD.

Texans can help by:

- Turning off all nonessential lights from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. during this migration period.
- Not using landscape lighting to illuminate trees or gardens where birds may be resting.
- Aim security and safety lighting downward.
- In commercial buildings, ensuring custodial work is done by 11 p.m., and lights are turned off.

Cover to Cover

The Library of Congress has the world's largest portfolio of books, films, videos, audio recordings, photographs, newspapers, maps, and manuscripts.

On April 24, 1800, President John Adams signed legislation that provided \$5,000 for the purchase of books. Two years later, the library had 964 volumes and nine maps. But according to History.com "the British army invaded the city of Washington [during the War of 1812] and burned the Capitol, including the then 3,000-volume Library of Congress."

Former president Thomas Jefferson came to the rescue [and sold] "his personal library [6,487 volumes], the largest and finest in the country," to restart it. "In 1851, a second major fire at the library destroyed about two-thirds of its 55,000 volumes, including two-thirds of the [Jefferson's books]. Congress responded quickly and generously to the disaster, and within a few years a majority of the lost books were replaced."



School News — The State Line Tribune reported last week that the Lazbuddie School Board voted to move to a 4-day school week for the 2023-24 school year. The new school week will be Tuesday through Friday.

When Pigs Fly? — In research published in Wildlife Society Bulletin, investigators used drones to capture images of the agricultural damage caused by wild pigs, which now number over 6.9 million in the U.S. Most damage occurred in later

growth stages, when corn ears were maturing, seed was most nutritious, and producers had already invested in the majority of annual crop inputs. Wild pigs damaged up to 9.2% of a single monitored field, which resulted in an average loss of 3,416 kg of corn per hectare and a direct cost to producers of \$17.18 to \$48.24 per hectare of damage.



Shrimp Scampi

This shrimp scampi recipe is a quick and easy to prepare and clean up recipe. It is recommended that you purchase deveined and shelled shrimp to make your life easier. If you use frozen shrimp, be sure they are just frozen and not pre-cooked. What better way to celebrate National Shrimp Scampi Day on April 29th?

SHEET PAN SHRIMP SCAMPI (NO WINE!)

TOMATOES AND ASPARAGUS 1 pound thin/medium asparagus chopped into 1" pieces 1 pint cherry tomatoes 2 tablespoons olive oil

1 garlic clove minced

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper **SHRIMP**

1 pound medium uncooked shrimp, shelled, deveined tails off*

1 tablespoon olive oil 1 tablespoon lemon juice 4 garlic cloves minced 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 tsp EACH paprika, onion powder, dried basil

1/8-1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes 1/8 teaspoon pepper 4-8 tablespoons butter cubed (see notes)**

GARNISH

3 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

1-2 tablespoons lemon juice or more to taste freshly grated Parmesan optional **SERVE WITH**

1 pound linguine (or other pasta) zoodles

Rice bread

INSTRUCTIONS

LINGUINE (optional): Cook linguine in salted water according to package directions until al dente. Reserve ½ cup water before draining. Drizzle drained pasta with olive oil and toss to combine.

Preheat oven to 400oF. Line a Jelly Roll Pan (10×15) with foil and lightly spray with cooking spray. Add tomatoes and asparagus, olive oil, garlic, salt, and pepper. Toss until evenly coated then line in a single layer. Roast for 5 minutes. Meanwhile, add all of the Shrimp Ingredients to a medium bowl EXCEPT butter and stir to evenly combine. Remove pan from oven and push tomatoes asparagus to one side of the pan (keep in a single layer). Add shrimp and line in a single layer. Top asparagus with 1 tablespoon cubed butter, evenly spaced. Top shrimp with 3-7 tablespoons cubed butter, evenly spaced. Roast for 6 minutes or just until shrimp is opaque. Remove pan from oven and drizzle with 1-2 additional tablespoons lemon juice (to taste). Season with additional salt and pepper to taste and garnish with fresh parsley. If serving with linguine: add all pan contents to linguine in a large bowl including all melted butter/ juices. Add desired amount of olive oil or reserved pasta water to reach desired consistency (you may not need it). Add Parmesan (I use ¼ cup), salt, pepper, and additional lemon juice to taste.

Gas prices may have peaked


Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 9.4 cents last week, to an average of \$3.26 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 19.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 49.9 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.65 while the most expensive was \$4.29 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 0.8 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.64 per gallon. The national average is up 22.8 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 46.4 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 3.0 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.12 per gallon.

"For the first time in several weeks, the national average price of gasoline has seen a decline, and while the fall was quite small, the bigger news may be that we may have seen a short-term peak for the price of gasoline. While any unexpected outages could push it up again, there is a rising possibility that barring such, we may have seen our high water mark for the national average for the summer," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan explained, "Typically, gas prices peak between May and June, and with the oil market showing significant cracks in strength, we may have seen the peak in the national average already occur, a few weeks earlier than average. While it's possible we could go higher later this summer should a major hurricane target sensitive infrastructure, it appears the odds that the national average will miss the \$4 per gallon mark are rising. It's certainly looking optimistic for motorists."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Wrong Turns

Just a few months after we moved to Friona in 2009 we met some family at Leal's in Muleshoe, and by the time we headed back home, a severe thunderstorm was bearing down on us as we drove home. One vehicle made it back safely to Friona, with a small bit of rain and hail, but the vehicle I was driving didn't experience the rain and hail, because I had missed my turn and ended up in Earth. By the time my bad directions were realized, it was time to turn back and face nature's fury as I headed home.

In a similar way, we have all missed our turn in the journey of life and had to pay the consequences. This was also the case for the Israelites when God delivered them from Egypt and set their direction on the Promised Land. Things went well for a while, but in Deuteronomy 1:19-33, we see that fear led to failure when they were on the doorstep of taking the land God had given them. They had seen the Lord do amazing miracles, crush the mighty Egyptians and display His faithfulness at each turn, yet they refused to continue trusting

God after the spies returned with their bad report of the land and its inhabitants. Although they heard the truth of God and knew He would fight for them, verse 32 says, "Yet in spite of this word you did not believe the Lord your God." Their disbelief led to disobedience. Their doubt led to disaster. Their lack of faith caused them to fail miserably. Its not that the people disowned God in their words and theology, but it is that they chose to listen to their fears and murmurings instead of trust God and move forward as He commanded them.

Today, believers are in a similar danger in of rationalizing away the direction of God, compromising on His Word, and allowing disbelief to grow in greenhouses of comfort and complacency. Such unbelief won't express itself in an agnostic or atheistic rant against Jesus, but it will manifest itself in partial obedience, lukewarm love for God and a powerless Christian life. In the wrong turns you have taken, turn back in the right direction as you confess sin and walk in faith and obedience to the Lord.

She was in and out of relationships each time thinking this was the one only to leave a string of 5 divorces and not the energy to marry again, shacked up with some fella. She was the talk of the town in a bad way other women didn't even want to be around her.

He was a rich thief. Extorted money from those who barely had any and lived like a king or so he thought, but when he looked around there was no one he could trust. His greed was his only friend.

At sixteen she was on the streets learning harsh realities about life that no child should have to face. By eighteen she was a pro in a very old profession. No self-worth, no home and no future.

The first four little stories come from the Bible. The adulteress in John 8. The lame man in Acts 3. The Samaritan woman in John 4. Zaccheus in Luke 19. The last story is a modern day representation of any one of us, but for the decisions we made.

They all were opportunities for redemption. Jesus did not condemn the woman in John 8, but told her to go and sin no more. The beggar was healed in the name of Jesus by Peter and John. The Samaritan woman's encounter with Jesus lead the whole town out to meet him and the rich thief found a friend and the value of his soul. What about our girl? What if she found the Lord? Let's pretend she did. She found her value, married a godly man and now counsels girls caught in the sex trade.

Aquifer down .71 feet from last year

High Plains Water District (HPWD) field staff recently completed the 2023 water level measurements and the results are now available on the HPWD interactive web map. Visit map.hpwd.org to view those results.

HPWD field technicians measured approximately 1,338 water wells during the first part of 2023. From these measurements, about 1,285 were also measured in 2022, allowing HPWD to calculate the average change.

An average decline of -0.71 feet was calculated in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala/EdwardsTrinity (High Plains) Aquifer (ETHP) from 2022 to 2023.

Also of importance is the saturated thickness of the Ogallala and ETHP, which is the thickness of the water-bearing formations. For 2023, the average saturated thickness of all observation wells is about 52 feet. This compares to the average of 53 feet in 2022.

More detailed statistics of the measured change include:

- 20 wells with declines of 5 feet or more
- 14 wells with declines of 4 to 4.99 feet
- 35 wells with declines

of 3 to 3.99 feet

- 98 wells with declines of 2 to 2.99 feet
- 248 wells with declines of 1 to 1.99 feet
- 564 wells with declines of 0 to 0.99 feet
- 310 wells with rises of 0.01 feet or more

For the Dockum Aquifer, HPWD measured 31 observation wells. The average change for the Dockum Aquifer was -2.51 feet for 2023.

My Plates unveils Texas' top license plate designs for 2022

It's official! The number one specialty license plate design in Texas for 2022 was the ever-popular and timeless Classic Black, from My Plates. com. This retro design has held the position as Texas' most popular plate since its official launch in 2016. The Classic Black design claimed over 19,000 of the more than 91,000 sales of State and My Plates specialty license plates sold in 2022, making it the top selling plate by My Plates. The popularity of this design reaches back to 1958 when a fully black Texas license plate was a general issue plate design.

The Lone Star Black design came in second with over 7,900 plates sold in



2022. Although it came in second, this design still holds the title for the most sales of any plate design within the My Plates program since the design debuted in 2008. Over 119,000 Texans can say "We Got That" design!

In third place selling 5,665 plates is the Carbon Fiber plate design that launched in 2017. Carbon Fiber narrowly beat out the new Classic Black Silver plate design, which launched in May of 2022,

and managed to secure 5,616 sales. Small Star Black completes the top five plate designs with 4,369 plates sold in 2022.

The top 3 charity plates were Texas Parks and Wildlife's Monarch Butterfly, Bluebonnet, and Whitetail Deer. The top 3 college plates were Texas A&M, University of Texas, and Texas Tech University. The top 3 sports plates were Dallas Cowboys, Houston Astros, and San Antonio Spurs.

Commissioners extend burn ban

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, April 24, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

Commissioners approved a 90-day extension of the county burn ban. The ban will be in effect until July 24, 2023.

Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske reported to the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 16 inmates of which 1 is a paying customer from Dawson County.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the April 10th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved. The next regular meeting is Monday, May 8th.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

TDHCA awards \$8.1 million for weatherization contracts

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) has announced the allocation of \$8.1 million for weatherization contracts to 21 statewide organizations, including Panhandle Community Services, and city offices.

The funding is made available through the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) from the US Department of Energy (DOE), which allows for the installation of energy saving materials, such as

caulking, weather-stripping, ceiling, wall and floor insulation, and the repair or replacement of energy inefficient heating and cooling systems in order to help low-income households control their energy costs.

Panhandle Community Services was one of 21 organizations chosen to be 2023-24 WAP providers and received \$226,464 in grant allocation funds.





What's in a name?

My mother Lillie is taking up a bit more space in my head and heart this week. Springtime reminds me of her birthdate, April 28, so I suppose it is only natural to feel a stronger tug to memories and moments shared with her.

From her days on a farm in the 1930s to graduate school in the 1980s, she was a reader and a learner. The decades of her 50s and 60s found her teaching the second language (Spanish) she had fallen in love with at Rotan High School under Miss Josey Baird. After retirement, Mother's residences went from Pt. Townsend, Washington, back home



to the dusty plains in Brownfield. Lillie Mae's final three years gave her proximity to doctors and family in Lubbock as she continued to read, color, sleep, and watch all the sports she loved on cable television.

The photos are of a person I did not know: the little girl who thought she needed to entertain her family through their griefstricken years after her father died. The solemn nine-year-old in front of their sand-blasted farmhouse in the 1930s. The 15-year-old starting a new school after the Dowell School closed. And almost two years later, the high school senior ready to tackle the world. She had no way of knowing how cruel and beautiful life would be after high school graduation in 1948.

From her graduate school days, her cursive class notes jumped off the page when I read them. All these years later, I can see her writing with a fury about a truth



she had long known.

I am sad that her final years brought a bitterness while watching her country regress into a divisive abyss. My well-read and informed Mother suffered no fools when it came to politics, and she



saw an abundance the last two years of her life. It makes me happy to think she did get to vote for a woman in her last presidential election.

I miss her laugh especially. Fewer things made my brothers and sisters happier than to make her laugh. It was a competition among the five of us to do so.

In memory and honor of Lillie Mae McCleskey Sullivan, her namesake Lillie and Lillie's sister Ellie will make a cake April 28. I bet they will decorate it with hideous blobs of multi-colored sprinkles.

And if Mother were with us, she would laugh and laugh and laugh.




