Community mourns death of Dr. Frank Cadenhead

"I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received." These words found in the book of Ephesians, seem to sum up the life of Dr. Frank Cadenhead, Jr.


Anyone who knew the quiet spoken and gentle spirited Dr. Frank, knew he was very committed to his calling as a Christian, a family man, a doctor and an active member of the community.

Dr. Frank knew at an early age he wanted to be a doctor, following in the footsteps of his father, Dr. J.F. Cadenhead, who had a practice in Weinert. His preparation to that end began when he finished high school at the age of fifteen, and then enrolled at Hardin-Simmons, graduating in three years with a degree in chemistry and biology. From there he went to Vanderbilt University Medical School in Nashville, Tennessee where at the age of twenty-one, he earned his medical degree. During this time, he was also a member of the Air Force Reserve.

After finishing school, he was sent by the Reserve to San Antonio for an internship, where he met a young nurse from Mississippi by the name of Billie Buntyn. They married and spent the next sixty-eight years together, raising a family of two sons and two daughters.

Dr. Frank was later stationed at other Air Force bases, where he made the rank of captain and was named Chief of Medical Staff.

In an earlier interview with Mary Kaigler for the Haskell Free Press, he said he returned to this area, to assist his ailing father in his practice. His plans of

Dr. Cadenhead received between 2500 and 3000, manyhonorsandrecognitions extending into second and throughout his career,

including being awarded the prestigious Keeter Award for outstanding service. He was also recognized by the Taylor, Jones, Haskell County Medical Society for "a lifetime of exemplary commitment and service to family, patients, church and community." He and his wife were also named Citizens of the Year in 1991. He served many years on the Board of Development for Hardin-Simmons University.

Although a skilled and successful doctor, Dr. Frank felt his family and his church were his most rewarding things in life. He served as a deacon of the First Baptist Church since 1955, and was very active in church missions. He and Billie made many mission trips where he served as a doctor and surgeon.

He was very proud of his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, and enjoyed taking pictures of his family, which he shared with family and friends.

Dr. Frank Cadenhead retired in 2000 from his role as doctor, after fiftythree years of compassionate care of his patients. He continued to enjoy reading and keeping up with medical advancements.

He told Kaigler in that interview, that he was convinced that nothing in life is a coincidence, believing instead that there is a plan, a reason and a purpose for all that happens. Dr. Frank Cadenhead knew what his calling was, and this community and the surrounding area, as well as those he helped on mission trips, were the beneficiaries of the life he truly lived "worthy of his calling."

Dr. James Frank Cadenhead, Jr., was born Nov. 7, 1923. He was the first born of two sons to Dr. James Frank Cadenhead, Sr., and Jewel Cadenhead of Weinert.
