Conservation Stewardship Program Contracts Announced By Local NRCA

The City of Wheeler will hold an election on May 7, 2016 to name a Mayor and two councilmen to serve for the next two years.

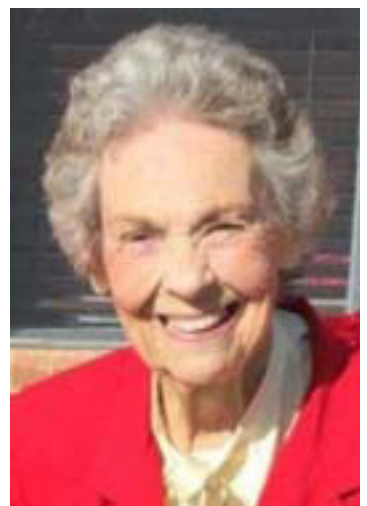

Notice of Draft Federal Operating Permit

Draft Permit No.: O3793

Application and Draft Permit. Enbridge Pipelines (Texas Gathering) L.P., 1100 Louisiana St., Ste. 3300, Houston, TX 77002-5227, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for an initial issuance of Federal Operating Permit (herein referred to as Permit) No. O3793, Application No. 22872, to authorize operation of the South Zybach Compressor Station, a Crude Petroleum and Natural Gas facility. The area addressed by the application is located from the intersection of FM 1046 & FM 592 southwest of the town of Allison, travel approximately 2.1 miles west on FM 1046 & then turn south on a lease road & travel approximately 0.4 mile to the site in Allison, Wheeler County, Texas 79003. This link to an electronic map of the site or facility's general location is provided as a public courtesy and not part of the application or notice. For exact location, refer to the application. This application was received by the TCEQ on May 26, 2015.

The purpose of a federal operating permit is to improve overall compliance with the rules governing air pollution control by clearly listing all applicable requirements, as defined in Title 30 Texas Administrative Code § 122.10 (30 TAC § 122.10). The draft permit, if approved, will codify the conditions under which the area must operate. The permit will not authorize new construction. The executive director has completed the technical review of the application and has made a preliminary decision to prepare a draft permit for public comment and review. The executive director recommends issuance of this draft permit. The permit application, statement of basis, and draft permit will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ Central Office, 12100 Park 35 Circle, Building E, First Floor, Austin, Texas; the TCEQ Amarillo Regional Office, 3918 Canyon Dr., Amarillo, Texas 79109-4933; and the Wheeler Public Library, 306 S. Canadian St., Wheeler, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The draft permit and statement of basis are available at the TCEQ Website:

www.tceq.texas.gov/goto/tvnotice

At the TCEQ central and regional offices, relevant supporting materials for the draft permit, as well as the New Source Review permits which have been incorporated by reference, may be reviewed and copied. Any person with difficulties obtaining these materials due to travel constraints may contact the TCEQ central office file room at (512) 239-1540.

Public Comment/Notice and Comment Hearing. Any person may submit written comments on the draft permit. Comments relating to the accuracy, completeness, and appropriateness of the permit conditions may result in changes to the draft permit.

A person who may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the permitted area may request a notice and comment hearing. The purpose of the notice and comment hearing is to provide an additional opportunity to submit comments on the draft permit. The permit may be changed based on comments pertaining to whether the permit provides for compliance with 30 TAC Chapter 122 (examples may include that the permit does not contain all applicable requirements or the public notice procedures were not satisfied). The TCEQ may grant a notice and comment hearing on the application if a written hearing request is received within 30 days after publication of the newspaper notice. The hearing request must include the basis for the request, including a description of how the person may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the application area. The request should also specify the conditions of the draft permit that are inappropriate or specify how the preliminary decision to issue or deny the permit is inappropriate. All reasonably ascertainable issues must be raised and all reasonably available arguments must be submitted by the end of the public comment period. If a notice and comment hearing is granted, all individuals that submitted written comments or a hearing request will receive written notice of the hearing. This notice will identify the date, time, and location for the hearing.

Written public comments and/or requests for a notice and comment hearing should be submitted to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, Office of the Chief Clerk, MC-105, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, or electronically at www.tceq.texas.gov/about/comments.html and be received within 30 days after the date of newspaper publication of this notice. If you communicate with the TCEQ electronically, please be aware that your email address, like your physical mailing address, will become part of the agency's public record.

A notice of proposed final action that includes a response to comments and identification of any changes to the draft permit will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments, a hearing request, or requested to be on the mailing list for this application. This mailing will also provide instructions for public petitions to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to request that the EPA object to the issuance of the proposed permit. After receiving a petition, the EPA may only object to the issuance of a permit which is not in compliance with the applicable requirements or the requirements of 30 TAC Chapter 122.

Mailing List. In addition to submitting public comments, a person may ask to be placed on a mailing list for this application by sending a request to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address above. Those on the mailing list will receive copies of future public notices (if any) mailed by the Chief Clerk for this application.

Public Comment/Notice and Comment Hearing. Any person may submit written comments on the draft permit. Comments relating to the accuracy, completeness, and appropriateness of the permit conditions may result in changes to the draft permit.

A person who may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the permitted area may request a notice and comment hearing. The purpose of the notice and comment hearing is to provide an additional opportunity to submit comments on the draft permit. BE ROADWISE IN THE DARK
Safety Tips for Driving at Night
According to research from the National Safety Council, driving at night is more dangerous than any other time of day, with traffic deaths three-times greater at night compared to daytime hours. The reason for this is that driver vision — the most impor-

tant sense necessary for driving — is compromised at night, including depth perception, color recognition, and peripheral vision. Additionally, the glare from an oncoming vehicle with their high beams on can temporarily blind a driver.

Headlights on vehicles can only illuminate about 500 feet (with high beams), and 250 feet for normal headlights. With visibility limited, there is less time to react to something unexpected in the roadway. Driving at high speeds at night with reduced visibility makes the situation even more dangerous. Drivers should not "out-drive" their headlights. In other words, do not drive faster than you can stop within the distance illuminated by your headlights. At 50 miles per hour it takes about 268 feet to slow down, including the distance traveled during reaction time. That would easily "out-run" the illumination of your normal headlights. Remember that the posted speed limit is the highest legal limit under ideal conditions and not necessarily the highest safe speed. One of the best plans for night driving is to simply drive slower.

Age is also a factor when it comes to night vision, which is the ability to see in low light. At 50 years of age, a driver needs twice as much light to see as well as a 30 year old driver. At 60 years of age and older, night vision is further reduced, making evening driving a risk — especially on unfamiliar roads.

Nighttime also brings on fatigue, and with the fatigue comes reduced alertness. Driving long periods of time late at night can further reduce reaction time. The only safe cure for fatigue is to get some sleep. Driving while sleepy is not only dangerous for the driver, it also puts other drivers and passengers on the road at risk.

Wendy Hazzard, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent in Wheeler County, reminds drivers to follow these safety tips for nighttime driving from the National Safety Council.

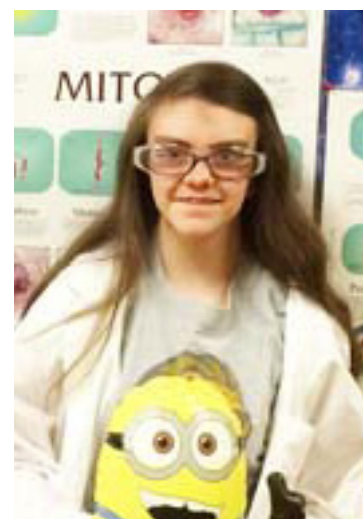
- Drivers of all ages:
- Aim vehicle headlights correctly, and make sure they're clean
 - Dim lighting on dashboard
 - Look away from oncoming lights
 - If eyeglasses are needed, make sure they're anti-reflective
 - Clean the windshield to eliminate streaks
 - Slow down to compensate for limited visibility and reduced stopping time
 - Stop driving when you are fatigued
 - Older drivers
 - Have annual vision exams
 - Reduce speed
 - Take a driving course; even experienced drivers can benefit from a refresher course, and some of the rules have probably changed
 - Minimize distractions at night, like talking with passengers or listening to the radio
 - Check with your doctor about side effects of prescription drugs
 - Be honest about your ability to drive after dark and limit driving to daytime hours if necessary

I remember seeing some of the buffalo things when we went to see the arrow in the park, but I didn't remember everything. I learned that the Indians used to use glass beads to decorate. The old things can only have glass beads. The ones that are not that old have plastic. I saw some tiny little shoes that the Indian girls made for their dolls. They were beautiful. That's it!

President Jimmy Adams called the meeting to order at 5:00 PM on the above date with the following members present; MEMBERS PRESENT: Jimmy Adams, Rhonda Meriwether, Louis Stas, Pam Hill, Margaret Dorman, and Kathleen Cross

Board members Brenda Mitchell, Linda Hink, Frankie Jackson, Roland Miles and Debbie Glazner were absent. President Adams declared that a quorum was present. GUEST: Ada Lou Lester

READING OF MINUTES: Secretary Margaret Dorman read the minutes from the December 9, 2015 meeting. After discussion the following corrections/additions were made: Alan Bean exhibit-approximate cost of life size mannequin will be \$9,200.00

Schools exhibit-name of the Kenneth Wyatt painting offered, "Pop the Whip"

St Patrick's Banquet-Mr. Bean was to have been paid \$3,000.00 and he wanted \$1,500.00 of it to be paid to the WCHA and \$1,500.00 to the Pioneer West Museum, Shamrock.

Louis Stas made a motion which was then seconded by Pam Hill to approve with the corrections/additions. Motion carried.

TREASURERS REPORT Treasurer Kathleen Cross gave the report with the following fund balances: \$76,490.49 in museum account and \$10,000.00 plus in the Pay Pay Account. She has paid the bill to Jaime Madrid in the amount of \$10,235.00; B&G Electric bill for receptacles and a new panel has not been paid; all utilities bills have been paid to date and she stated that she has received a check from Paula Helton, but does not know the amount.

PRESIDENTS ANNUAL REPORT President Adams read the annual report which included progress on the building, acquisitions, and activities-which included Alan L Bean's birthday celebration, participation in Texas Independence Day celebration and attendance by members at historical lectures and tours. The volunteer hours were not given and the financial activity for the year was not given.

Kathleen Cross made a motion which was seconded by Rhonda Meriwether to accept the annual report as given.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Building and Maintenance: It was reported that the inside and outside of the building had been treated for termites by Terminex. An annual treatment will be \$234.76. It was decided that a Notice/Memo board of some type be placed in the building so that notes to members/workers could be displayed for future reference. Each winter, vast quantities of de-icing salt are applied to state and municipal roads to keep them safe for commuters, and salt is spread near houses to avoid pedestrian injuries. This is necessary for safety, but did you know excessive salt can cause widespread damage to trees and shrubs - possibly leading to permanent decline and even death?

Plant salt-resistant trees in areas where high salt spray is inevitable i.e., near walkways, driveways or roads.

Provide adequate irrigation and mulching to reduce water loss.

Landowners across these initiative areas will further enhance the habitat of these valuable working lands through additional conservation enhancement efforts. NRCS and landowner commitments to CSP remain strong with more than 6.3 million acres currently enrolled in the program in Texas."

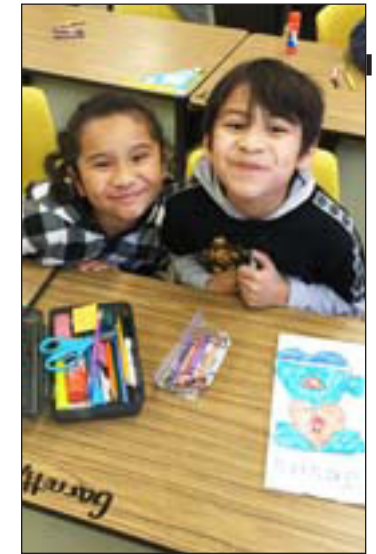

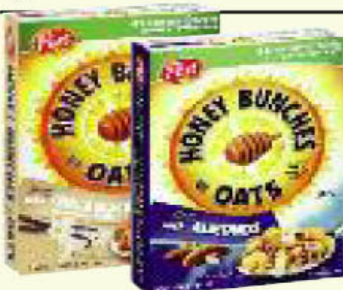

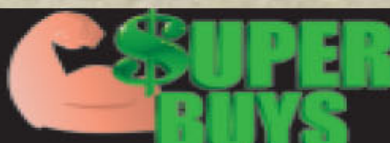
