





Public Comment/Notice and Comment Hearing. Any person may submit written comments on the draft permit. Comments relating to the accuracy, completeness, and appropriateness of the permit conditions may result in changes to the draft permit.

The purpose of the notice and comment hearing is to provide an additional opportunity to submit comments on the draft permit. 





It was fun on Friday. We didn't have school so we went to my favorite thing, the museum. This time it was at OU. They have a very nice museum. It was my first time to go there. I liked the dinosaurs. They have a huge one that was found in Oklahoma. They found some of the bones and then they made the whole dinosaur like his skeleton used to be. It is very very large. Also they had the tiniest dinosaur I have ever seen. It was a bird about to catch a mouse.

In the Indian room a lady came to us and said, "Welcome to Wal-Mart!". That was strange. Then she told me all about the ways their way of life, just like "Wal-Mart". The Indians killed the buffalo, which is really a bison. They used stone and bones to scrape the meat off the skin. Then to make it soft they rubbed the buffalo brains on the skin. That seems gross, but it makes the leather very soft. That makes it comfortable for clothes. The Indians used the organs of the buffalo to carry water or to make a purse to carry their scrapers and needles. I remember seeing some of the buffalo things when we went to see the arrow in the park, but I didn't remember everything. I learned that the Indians used to use glass beads to decorate. The old things can only have glass beads. The ones that are not that old have plastic. I saw some tiny little shoes that the Indian girls made for their dolls. They were beautiful. That's it!

De-Icing Salt Can Harm Landscape Plants

Each winter, vast quantities roads to keep them safe driveways or roads. for commuters, and salt is pedestrian injuries. This is loss. necessary for safety, but did you know excessive salt can cause widespread damage to trees and shrubs - possibly leading to permanent decline and even death?

Even severe salt damage might not be visible on a tree until the end of summer, homeowners leaving wondering what might have caused the problem. In some cases, decline might not be visible for years.

"Salt deposits migrate to the stems, buds and roots of trees," explains Tchukki Andersen, BCMA, CTSP* and staff arborist with the Tree Care Industry Association (TCIA). "This causes disfigured foliage, stunted growth and severe decline in tree health. Salt runoff washes from pavement into the ground, increasing salt levels in the soil."

There are steps you can take to ward off tree damage from salt. TCIA recommends taking the following measures:

Avoid use of de-icing salt unless necessary. Mix salt with abrasives such as sand, cinders and ash.

Use alternative de-icing salts such as calcium chloride and calcium magnesium acetate.

Improve drainage of soils. Add organic matter such as activated charcoal or gypsum, and thoroughly leach salt residues from the soil by flushing with water.

Erect barriers between pavement and plants.

Plant trees in locations away from any type of salt spray.

NRCS accepts applications for CSP throughout the year, but producers should submit applications by March 31, 2016 to local NRCS offices to ensure they are considered for enrollment in 2016.

Participants with existing CSP contracts that will expire on Dec.31, 2016, have the option to renew their contracts for an additional five years if they agree to adopt additional activities to achieve higher levels of conservation on their lands. Applications to renew are also due by March 31, 2016.

"CSP offers landowners the opportunity to be rewarded for the good resource conservation efforts they are currently undertaking," "This program provides additional incentives for them to continue their enhancements on a voluntary basis.'

NRCS also makes CSP available to producers as an additional opportunity to participate in regional landscape-level conservation efforts including the Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative, Longleaf Pine Initiative and Ogallala Aquifer Initiative.

NRCS Texas State Conservationist Salvador Salinas said "Texas is once again able to offer CSP on three of the four approved national landscape initiative areas. Landowners across these initiative areas will further enhance the habitat of these valuable working lands through additional conservation enhancement efforts. NRCS and landowner commitments to CSP remain strong with more than 6.3 million acres currently enrolled in the program in Texas."


