Region 16 Visual Art Scholastic Event 2016

On Saturday, February 27, 2016 approximately 1,028 pieces of high school artwork were judged at the Region 16 Visual Art Scholastic Event, VASE. Students and teachers from all over the Texas Panhandle came to Amarillo High School for this annual event sponsored by the Texas Art Education Association. VASE is a UIL equivalent contest much like TMEA All-State Music.

The students may enter one or two pieces of original artwork that they prepare for the contest by matting and composing a written response to six statements. At the event, students meet with a qualified judge where they will be interviewed on their concept and artistic decisions. The judge then rates the artwork and the student's artistic knowledge and content according to TAEA standards. Students like receiving the highest rating

will be awarded regional medals and their work will be judged again in the Area Contest at the conclusion of the regional judging.

Area winners will also receive an area medal and their work will go on to compete at the State Visual Arts Scholastic Event on April 22-23, 2016 at James Madison High School.

This is an exciting and valuable educational experience for high school art students throughout the Panhandle.

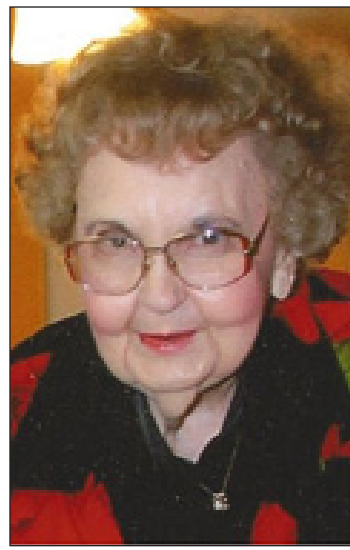

Runoff To Decide Sheriff's Race

A runoff election on May 24, 2016 will determine the Wheeler County Sheriff's Election. In the Primary on March 1, 2016, Incumbent Wes Crites received 817 votes, 49.16%; Jimmy W. Adams received 602 votes, 36.22%, and Larry Z. Ashurst received 243 votes, 14.62%. Since Crites did not receive a majority, over 50% of the votes, the runoff is necessary between Crites and Adams. Absentee voting in the May

24 election will be May 16 thru 20.

Winning the other county contested races were:

County Attorney—Leslie Standerfer with 1,022 votes; Misty Walker received 551 votes.

County Commissioner, Pct. 3—David W. Simpson had 248 votes, 59.05%; Rick Wright received 27 votes; Doug Atkins, 67 votes and Richard Kincannon, 78 votes.

 player Meranda Varela. "We have come such a long way. I remember when I was in fourth grade and I wanted to be a part of the band and help it go far and we did that this year!"

The journey to success has not been an easy one, though. According to Bratton, a couple of years ago, the band had a very low skill level coupled with very low expectations. As they have improved as musicians, the students have really raised their standards with each competition, he said.

"Honestly, getting a

Sweepstakes never came to my mind. We always talked about how getting one was very hard, but with our hard work and dedication, we managed to overlook the obstacles and we did it!" said Junior flute player Maria Gonzalez.

On Tuesday, the band first performed three concert selections which they have been working on this semester. 'Spania' by David Shaffer, 'As Twilight Falls' by Robert Sheldon, and 'Moscow, 1941' by Brian Balmages.

The concert music must be selected from a UIL approved list. "The songs we performed

this year actually were chosen from the 3A high school list even though we are only 2A." Bratton said.

Essentially the music was more challenging than what the band has attempted in the past two years. This was done purposefully in order to continue to push the group's abilities.

"I am super-stunned that we got a Sweepstakes!!" said Junior trumpet player Rissa Meadows. "My favorite song that we played was 'Moscow, 1941' because it has a deeper meaning and sounds mysterious."

The band actually got a history lesson while preparing

for their performance of 'Moscow, 1941.' The piece is about the attempted invasion of Moscow by the Nazi army during WWII. Joseph Stalin's Red Army managed to not only defend Moscow, but to drive the Germans back 200 miles that winter.

"I enjoy history and I think World War II is fascinating," said Bratton. "I think it is a great opportunity to have a piece that is tied to something of historical significance. One of our other songs was music from a Spanish bull-fight. It is good for the students to be exposed to music from other places."

In addition to the prepared pieces, the Mustang Band also competed in a Sight-Reading contest. During this portion of the event, a new song was passed out to the group and they were allowed to look at the music as Mr. Bratton described the piece to them.

They were not allowed to play any part of it and Bratton was not allowed to perform any of the song for them, only talk to them about it. After seven minutes, the band is then required to perform the piece without having ever heard it.

"I'm thrilled that we got first divisions in Sight-reading because it proves that our students really know how to read music!" Bratton said.

In every aspect of both competitions, the judges were very complimentary of the Pride of Wheeler.

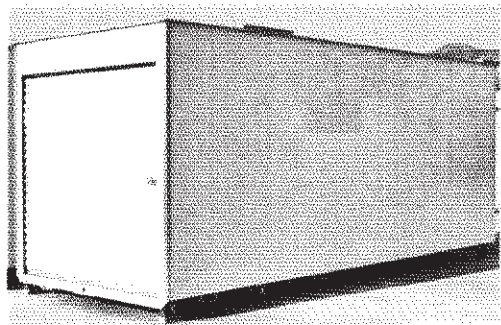

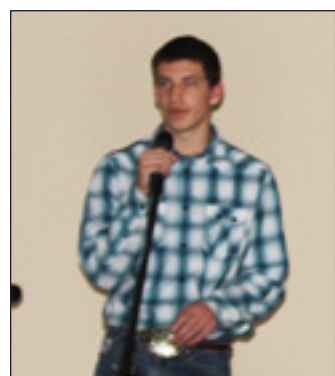

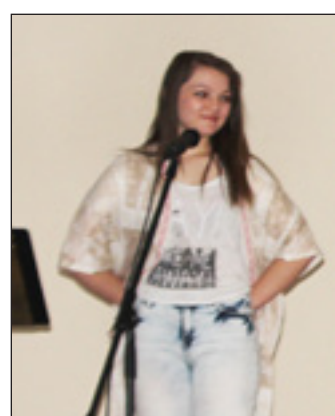

and Trenton Jasper (Division I). Ten out of eleven of these students received a Rating 4 on their art, which is the best rating you can get. From the 4 rated entries three Kelton ISD students are advancing on to State VASE. Three out of six students that attended are going to state. The students that didn't go to state Mrs. Harless is also very proud of because they were just as much apart of the competition as the rest and handled it well.

Jurors will look for originality of concept, technical expertise, understanding of the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) for visual art, and the interpretation of the student's stated intent. Jurors will evaluate student artwork using the following standard:

- * Rating 4 Superior
- * Rating 3 Excellent
- * Rating 2 Average
- * Rating 1 Below Average

Students compete on four different experience levels depending on the credits in art that the student has received at the time of the regional event:

- * 0 to 1 credit in art are juried on the Division I level
- * 1.5 to 2 credits in art are juried on the Division II level
- * 2.5 to 3 credits in art are juried on the Division III level
- * 3.5+ credits in art and/or AP are juried on the Division IV level

Medals are awarded to those students receiving a Superior (Rating 4) rating in each division at the regional event and medallions are awarded to those students receiving a Superior (Rating 4) rating at the state event.

State Bound
The three students going to State VASE are:

Justin Baker with artwork titled "Texas Justice", Quentin Parker with artwork titled "Girl", and Felipe Covarrubia with artwork titled "Perennial Petals." They are among the top 10% in the whole state of Texas going to State. These three students are advancing to STATE VASE in San Antonio Texas on April 22-23 2016.

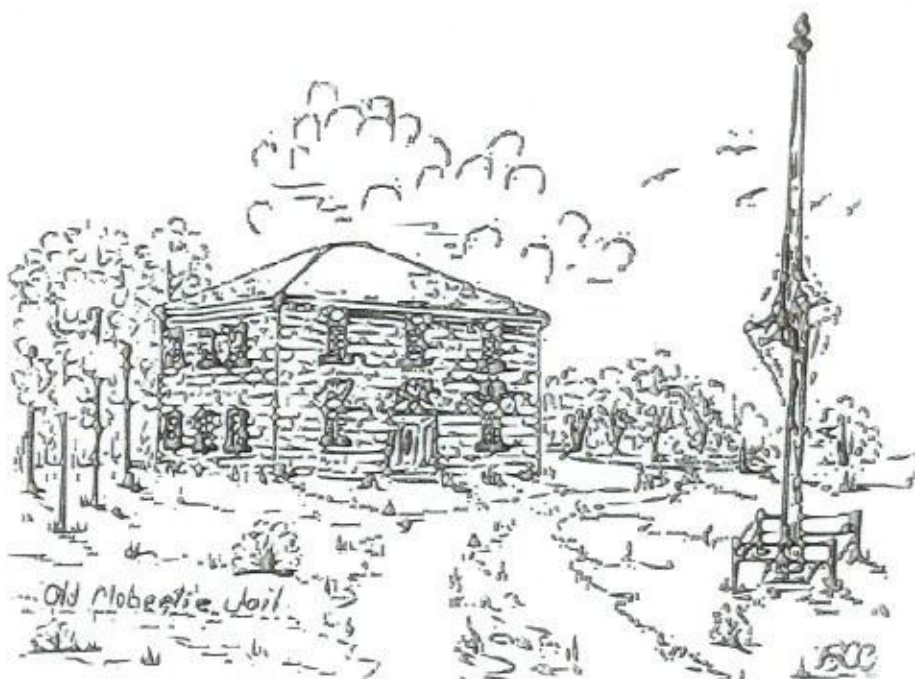

Texas Takes Aim at Zika Virus DSHS Launches Lab Testing, Birth Defects Review, Website, Community Guidance Today's State Case Count Jumps from 14 to 18

The Texas Department of State Health Services has ramped up efforts to protect people from Zika virus and is urging people to follow mosquito precautions.

"Mosquito season is approaching, and the number of travel-related cases continues to inch up for Texas. It's only a matter of time before Zika virus is locally transmitted here by mosquitoes," said Dr. John Hellerstedt, DSHS commissioner.

While there is no evidence of local transmission by Texas mosquitoes now, state health officials have quickly implemented Zika virus prevention plans in anticipation of increased mosquito activity and the potential for local mosquito transmission. Zika virus is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected *Aedes aegypti* mosquito. *Aedes aegypti* mosquitoes can be found in Texas, particularly urban areas in the south and southeast portions of the state, but can live anywhere humans are present.

Texas has confirmed 18 cases of Zika virus disease. Seventeen of those are related to travel abroad to areas with active Zika transmission. One case, from Dallas County, was likely the result of sexual contact with someone who acquired the Zika infection while traveling abroad.

State Action

Texas is now testing for Zika virus at its public health lab in Austin. Current state lab capacity is up to 135 human specimens per week, and capacity across the state is increasing as local labs add testing capability in anticipation of a possible surge in demand. This testing, called polymerase chain reaction or "PCR" testing, is used to detect Zika virus in human specimens collected less than seven days after illness onset. The PCR test is considered confirmatory for the presence of Zika virus. Specific testing guidance is available at www.TexasZika.org.

Texas is also adding the more complex serologic testing for Zika virus. The benefit of serologic testing is that it can detect Zika infection in people who may not have had symptoms, and the test can be conducted up to 12 weeks after a person is infected. A positive serologic test result requires confirmatory testing to definitively pinpoint Zika because it can cross-react with other viruses, such as dengue.

Texas is working with local officials in the Rio Grande Valley area to monitor mosquito activity and conducted spot trapping in the area in February, which yielded no *Aedes aegypti* mosquitoes. The Rio Grande Valley is considered to be a potential area of increased risk of Zika virus transmission. DSHS is urging communities to consider expanding their surveillance in coordination with local mosquito control efforts.

The agency's Birth Defects Epidemiology and Surveillance Branch is analyzing historical microcephaly data to better understand patterns, trends and causes of microcephaly in Texas. Microcephaly is a birth defect that may be linked to Zika virus infection in other parts of the world. Texas also is implementing the "rapid ascertainment" of microcephaly, which means the condition will be closely monitored going forward for Zika virus and other causes.

The Governor's 31-member Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response, directed by Dr. Hellerstedt, will meet in Austin March 9 to discuss infectious disease prevention, and Zika will be part of that discussion.

Texas is urging health care providers to be aware of and consider Zika virus as they see patients. State health officials are actively coordinating with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and local officials about surveillance, testing and mosquito control. Texas is educating the general public about Zika in English and Spanish through its new website www.TexasZika.org and will host a Zika-specific Twitter chat at 2 p.m. Friday, March 4.

"We're focusing on urging people to strictly follow the guidance to prevent the disease," Dr. Hellerstedt said. "We need everyone on board, helping to cut down mosquito populations and avoid mosquito bites as we head into spring."

Take Action in Communities

DSHS today sent a letter to local leaders asking for help in protecting people from the Zika virus and outlining steps to prevent or delay Zika virus transmission by local mosquitoes. Eliminating potential mosquito breeding areas, especially near homes and communities, is an effective way to protect against all mosquito-borne diseases including Zika. These are the recommended actions local leaders can take to help protect communities from Zika virus:

- Initiate or enhance monitoring and surveillance of mosquito activity.
- Accelerate mosquito abatement efforts.
- Develop a local contingency plan for mosquito abatement and surveillance; plan for additional control measures if needed.
- Encourage people to report illegal dumpsites and standing water, and respond quickly to these complaints.
- Implement efforts to clean up illegal dumpsites and collect heavy trash.
- Keep public drains and ditches clear of weeds and trash so water will not collect.
- Treat standing water with larvicide (such as mosquito "dunks") when it cannot be drained and the water will be present for more than seven days.
- Conduct neighborhood outreach about precautions people can take to protect themselves and their families from mosquito bites.

Take Action Around Homes

DSHS suggests the following steps people can take in and around their own homes to help reduce potential mosquito breeding habitats:

- At least weekly, empty or get rid of cans, buckets, old tires, pots, plant saucers and other containers that hold water.
- Keep gutters clear of debris and standing water.
- Remove standing water around structures and from flat roofs.
- Change water in pet dishes daily.
- Rinse and scrub vases and other indoor water containers weekly.
- Change water in wading pools and bird baths several times a week.
- Maintain backyard pools or hot tubs.
- Cover trash containers.
- Water lawns and gardens carefully so water does not stand for several days.
- Screen rain barrels and openings to water tanks or cisterns.
- Treat front and back door areas of homes with residual insecticides if mosquitoes are abundant nearby.
- If mosquito problems persist, consider pesticide applications for vegetation around the home.

Avoid Mosquito Bites

People living or traveling to areas with active transmission should carefully follow steps to avoid mosquito bites while there and for at least seven days after leaving the area. Precautions include:

- Wear insect repellent.
- Cover up with long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Keep mosquitoes out with air conditioning or intact window screens.
- Limit outdoor activities during peak mosquito times.

Zika virus is primarily spread to people through mosquito bites. The virus also can be spread from mother to unborn child or to her newborn around the time of birth. Spread of the virus through blood transfusion and sexual contact also has been reported.

The disease can cause fever, rash, muscle and joint aches and red eyes but also has been linked to the birth defect microcephaly and other poor birth outcomes in some women infected during their pregnancy. The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting for several days to a week, and hospitalizations are rare. A small number of cases of Guillain-Barré syndrome, a paralysis disorder, also have been linked to Zika virus infection. Most people exposed to Zika virus won't develop any symptoms at all. There is currently no vaccine or treatment for the virus.

TORNADO INFORMATION

The next few months are "tornado season" in Texas, so a few pointers and safety tips on tornadoes are in order.

**Tornadoes generally travel an average speed of 30 miles per hour but have been clocked at 70 miles an hour.

**Tornadoes normally move from southwest to northeast although their direction of travel can be erratic and change suddenly.

**Tornadoes are often spawned in thunderstorms that have accompanying large hail.

**Most tornado damage is caused by violent winds but most tornado injuries and deaths result from flying debris.

**Tornado winds may produce a loud roar similar to that of a train or airplane.

**Tornadoes can occur with little or no warning although most occur during the mid afternoon or early evening hours.

Stay tuned to weather forecasts during times of unsettled weather. When a tornado or severe thunderstorm "watch" is issued, it means that tornadoes or severe weather are possible in the area designated. On the other hand, a tornado or severe thunderstorm "warning" means that tornadoes or severe weather are occurring. Persons in or near the storm path need to TAKE COVER IMMEDIATELY!

**Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.

**In small buildings or homes, go to a basement or an interior part of the lowest level. Closets, bathrooms and interior halls offer the best protection many cases. Seek cover under something sturdy.

**In schools, local businesses or hospitals go to a pre-designed shelter area. Interior hallways on the lower floor are usually best.

**In mobile homes or vehicles, leave and take shelter in a substantial structure. If non is available, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine and shield your head with your hands.

The key to surviving severe weather such as a tornado is prior planning. All family members should know where the safest areas of the home are in event of threatening weather.

The door on the south side of the door on the south side of Agri-Life building on the north edge of Wheeler is a tornado shelter and will be open when Wheeler is under a warning.
