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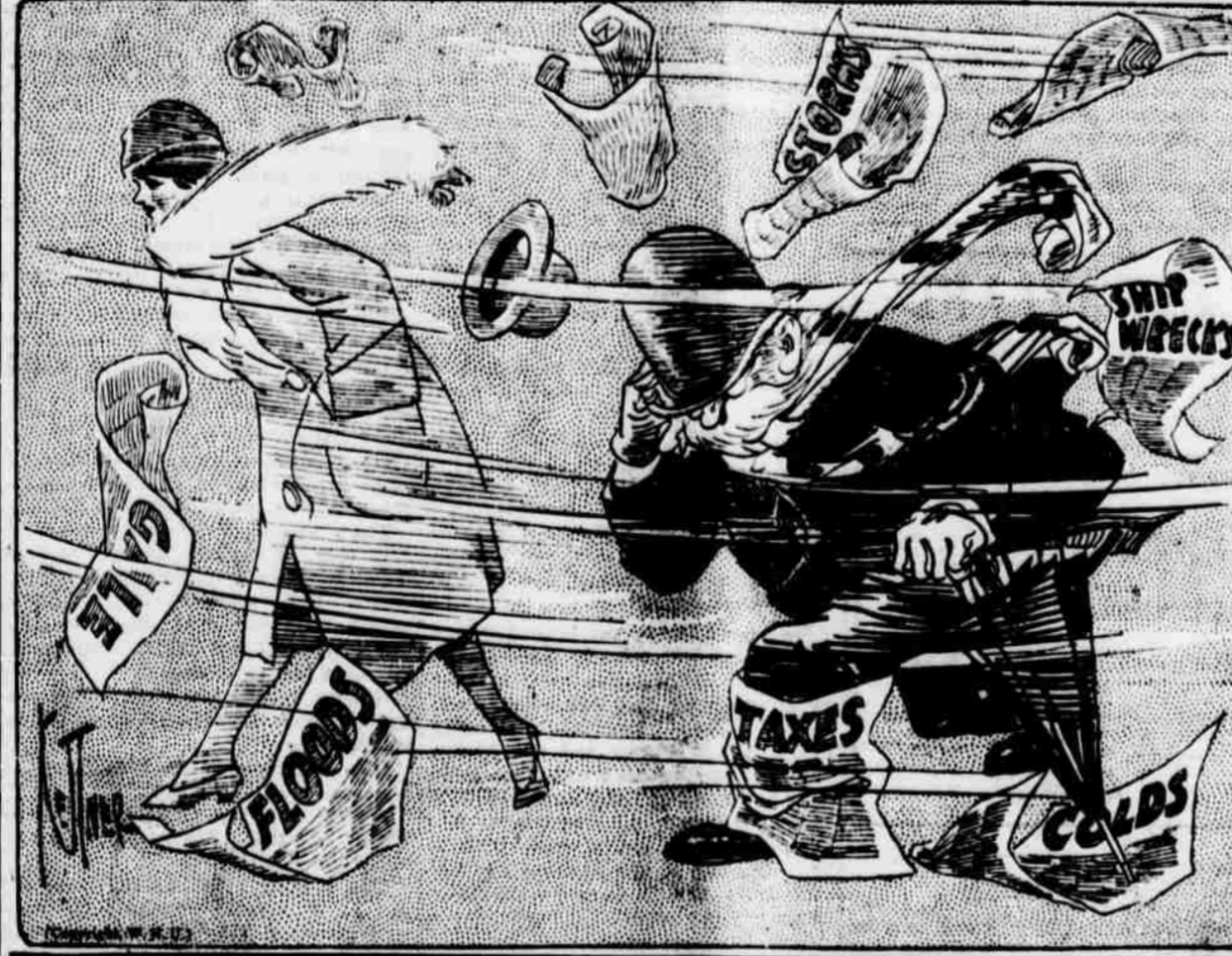

## UNLAWFUL TO CATCH WHITE PERCH, CROPEE OR BASS

It is unlawful to catch white perch, cropee or bass in the Clear Fork of the Brazos River during the months of March and April with artificial bait or to use seines or nets of any description in said river during said months for any purpose, except minnow nets not exceeding twenty feet in length which may be used to catch minnows for bait. White perch, bass and cropee minnows so caught must be returned immediately to the river and not used as bait. It is unlawful to keep at any time white perch, or cropee under seven inches in length, or bass under eleven inches in length. All persons violating these laws will be vigorously prosecuted. These laws apply to the lake at Leuders and all parts of the river.—I. W. Kirkpatrick, Deputy Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner.

His talk was applauded by the boys and it is believed that an excellent club will be organized there in a few days. This is a splendid school taught by Prof. Susan C. Williams and Misses Lucile and Mary-Ann Taylor of Hessel, Missouri, is a strong community. Many progressive citizens live in that community and they are behind the school with all their might and the credit of the school manifests the cooperation and the excellent work accomplished by the excellent corps of teachers. It is an intention to visit this school and catch the spirit of enthusiasm which pervades it with a mention

also that the people of this school are just on the best animal program we have found from any school up to the present. It is worth the money to have this school put on a song.
