### **Rural Postal Patrons Requested** To Keep Approach to Box Clear

The Postmaster listed these points of particular concern:

1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by

2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.

Where rural boxes post a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056, "Your Mailbox Needs Attion," a notice to keep box approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impossible.

Unless approaches are cleared it may be necessary to tempor arily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster pointed out.

Rural carrier are not required to perform service on foot Saturday. when roads cannot be traveled Mr. and with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost, he explained.


