Cash Prizes for first and second place in each division will be awarded.

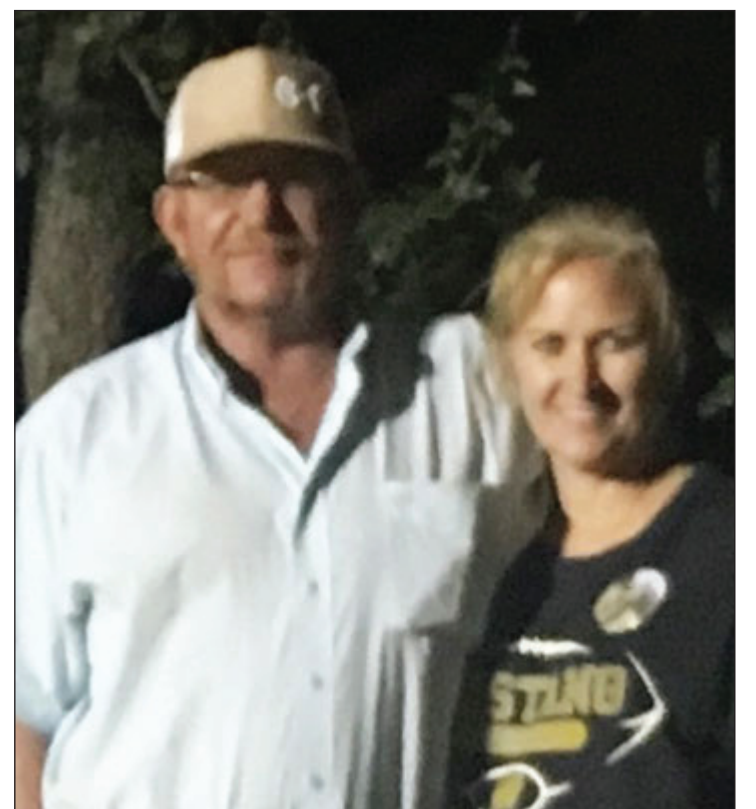
The entries will be displayed at the Tippy Bird's Fall Fling.

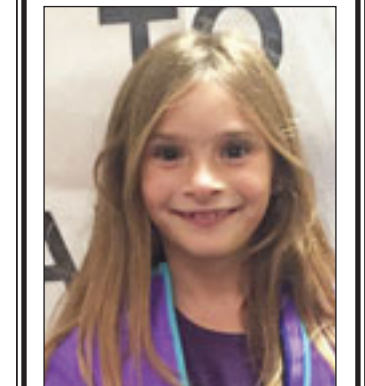

As this article is being published our Library Community Quilt is being put together to quilt on Cindy's long arm machine. We can't express our appreciation enough to those who took time to donate a quilt block hopefully, by the middle of November it will be hanging in the Wheeler Public Library. It has already been bought even before we started on it. We've had several folks ask about auctioning the quilt off but we will have to get back with you on this.

As a child, when my Mom took my brother and I to the library, we were under the (miss) conception that the lady or man behind the desk had a pretty cushy job and they were ordained by God for that

position! They always looked perfectly groomed, their manners were above board and they seemed to know the answers to any and all questions. They had organizational skills that amazed me and they always, I mean always, had this certain dry pucker to their lips. Mostly, when children or adults walked through the door you DID NOT SPEAK above a strangled whisper! They put the fear of God in us at an early age. Does this sound familiar to any of you readers out there?

I want to share a story with you that will pretty much shatter your traditional idea and image of a little library in the Texas Panhandle. This library has moved several times and through thick and thin has survived each one. It is in a small community rich in oil, gas, cattle, wheat, cotton and families. Lots of the folks come to this library to get books, catch up on the latest news or just to visit. They are lonely, sad, broke, rich, opinionated, Godly, you name it they have those kinda folks all the time. Some come in whispering because this is the "library" and you have to be quiet or some come in raising the roof just glad to be alive and needing some help finding a book, an author or just to visit. Visitors they have galore because they remember this building and the memories it held for their families! This little library is thriving because the rules are set aside most times

because it makes their folks feel comfortable. Children are welcome there and come in and go immediately to their own personal area. They feel comfortable to look at books, play with available toys, stack cushions or visit with the librarian and ask millions of questions, get their first library card and knowing before they leave there are stickers and tatoos for them. This library doesn't have off limits areas to its patrons because it is a comfortable, welcoming place to study, read a paper, discuss in a NOT LIBRARY VOICE about a new author or book, work on the computer etc.. Nope, that library doesn't fit the bill when it comes to the old traditional library! They seem to want to help their patrons and meet their needs in whatever capacity that would be. Lots of folks don't think these small, rural libraries fit the bill anymore because of electronics in the world today. You would be surprised how many folks still like to hold a book, smell the pages or just come and look or have a person listen to them. Yes, I do believe this little library will be around for a long time!

Plant Easy Care Daffodils Now for Added Spring Beauty

Daffodils have a cheery presence in the spring garden and are a surefire way to chase away the winter blues. These fall-planted bulbs are also reliable perennials that require no maintenance and are not bothered by deer or other pests. The National Garden Bureau has declared 2017 the Year of the Daffodil, and with the fall planting season right around the corner, now is the time to choose your favorites.

Yellow trumpet daffodils are classics, but there are many other flower styles and colors to choose from. Double-flowering types like white and yellow Lingerie and long lasting lemon-yellow Sherbourne feature multiple rows of petals and some varieties look more like peonies than daffodils.

Multi-flowering varieties like Beautiful Eyes, display several flowers on each stem. This variety's white and orange blossoms have a gardenia-like fragrance. Miniature daffodil Baby Boomer has five to ten flowers per stem. After bloom-

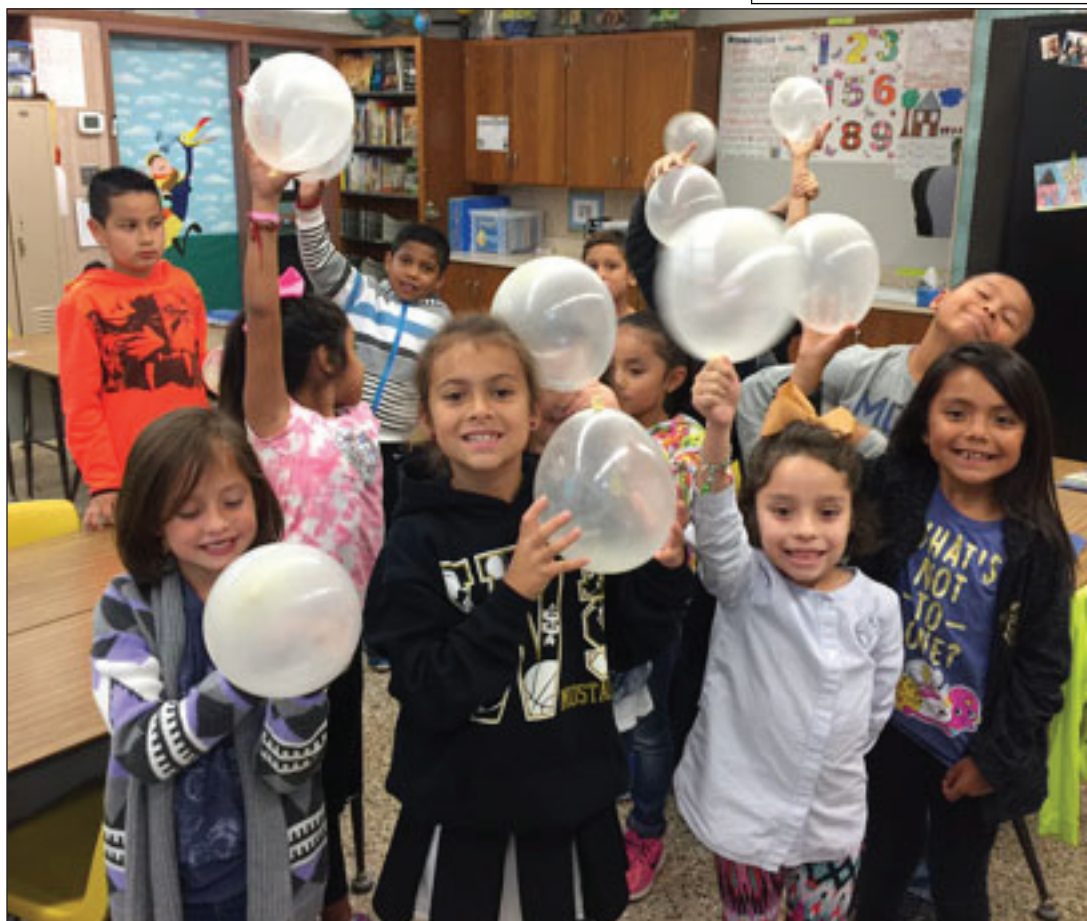
ing, the grassy foliage quickly fades away, allowing nearby perennials to take center stage.

Split corona daffodils have an unexpected beauty and are lovely cut flowers. The cups on these daffodils are divided into segments that are pressed back against the petals. Narcissus Cassata has a ruffled yellow split cup and white petals. Lemon Beauty's shorter split cup is adorned with a yellow star.

These are just a few of the many choices that are available for gardens, containers and spring bouquets. Most daffodils are hardy in growing zones 3 to 8. In warmer zones, look for heat tolerant varieties such as Thalia and Silver Smiles.

Mix daffodils into shady gardens filled with hostas, ferns and other shade-loving perennials. As the daffodil blooms fade, the perennials will grow, mask the foliage and provide beauty throughout the remainder of the season.

Plant daffodils on a hillside, woodland border, beside a pond or under trees and shrubs. Over time, the bulbs will grow and

multiply with minimal care from you. Choose cultivars with different flower styles and bloom times, and plant in drifts to create an attractive display.

Can't decide? Consider one of the many pre-mixed packages such as Longfield Garden's Fragrant, Double, Miniature or Multi-flowering daffodil collections (www.longfield-gardens.com). Or, create your own long-lasting display by combining early, mid and late blooming varieties.

Get your daffodils off to a

great start with proper planting. Order the bulbs early for best selection, and plant them in mid to late fall, any time before the ground freezes. Dig a hole and position the bulbs 6" deep with the pointy side up. Cover with soil, apply a low nitrogen slow release fertilizer and water thoroughly. Once in the ground, the bulbs can remain in place for years to come.

Reserve a few daffodil bulbs for your containers and window boxes. Pot them up in the fall and make sure they get at least 15 weeks of chilling at 40-45°F. In mild climates, the containers can be left outdoors. In zones 6 and colder, they should be stored in an unheated garage where they will be cold, but

won't freeze.

Start now and enjoy a brighter beginning to next year's garden season. The daffodils you plant this fall will delight you year after year as their carefree blooms announce winter's end and spring's return.

The volatility of natural gas is a driving factor behind the company's recent announcement it plans to add 1,230 additional megawatts of wind energy to its regional power generation mix. Wind energy has no fuel costs associated with it, and by adding these new wind facilities, the company expects it can save customers \$2.8 billion in power generation costs over 30 years by displacing a percentage of its natural gas and coal generation with more wind energy.

The wind projects are being reviewed by utility regulators in both Texas and New Mexico, with anticipated approvals coming in 2018. Once the necessary approvals are obtained, construction on the 478-megawatt Hale Wind Project in Hale County, Texas, would start immediately with a planned completion in 2019. The other facility – the 522-megawatt Sagamore Wind Project in Roosevelt County, N.M., would be in service by 2020. An additional 230 megawatts of wind energy would be purchased from two facilities being developed in Texas by NextEra Energy Resources – one in Cochran County and the other in Hale County.

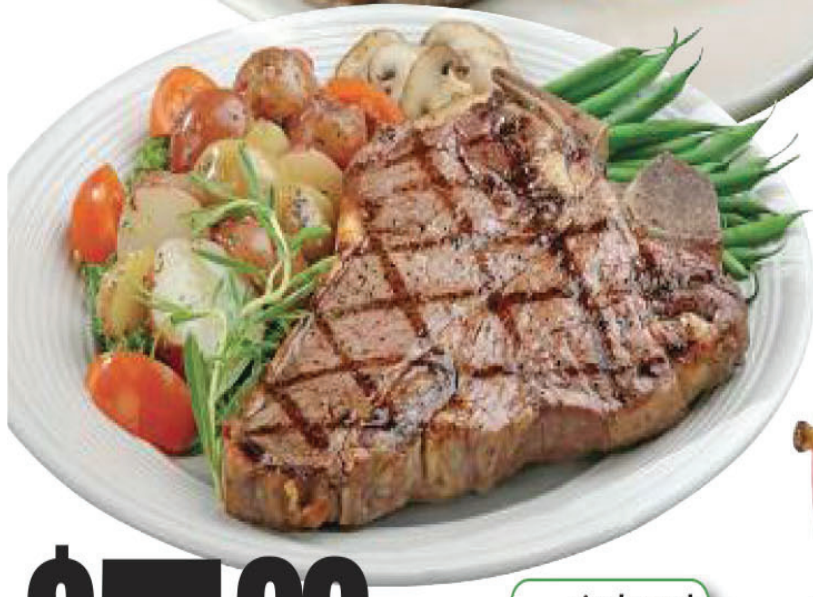
