Alan Bean, Apollo Moonwalker & Artist, Dies at 86

Family Release Regarding the Passing of Apollo, Skylab Astronaut Alan Bean

HOUSTON, Texas — Apollo and Skylab astronaut Alan Bean, the fourth human to walk on the moon and an accomplished artist, has died.

Bean, 86, died on Saturday, May 26, at Houston Methodist Hospital in Houston, Texas. His death followed his suddenly falling ill while on travel in Fort Wayne, Indiana two weeks before.

“Alan was the strongest and kindest man I ever knew. He was the love of my life and I miss him dearly,” said Leslie Bean, Alan Bean’s wife of 40

years. “A native Texan, Alan died peacefully in Houston surrounded by those who loved him.”

A test pilot in the U.S. Navy, Bean was one of 14 trainees selected by NASA for its third group of astronauts in October 1963. He flew twice into space, first as the lunar module pilot on Apollo 12, the second moon landing mission, in November 1969, and then as commander of the second crewed flight to the United States’ first space station, Skylab, in July 1973.

“Alan and I have been best friends for 55 years — ever since the day we became astronauts,” said Walt Cun-

ningham, who flew on Apollo 7. “When I became head of the Skylab Branch of the Astronaut Office, we worked together and Alan eventually commanded the second Skylab mission.”

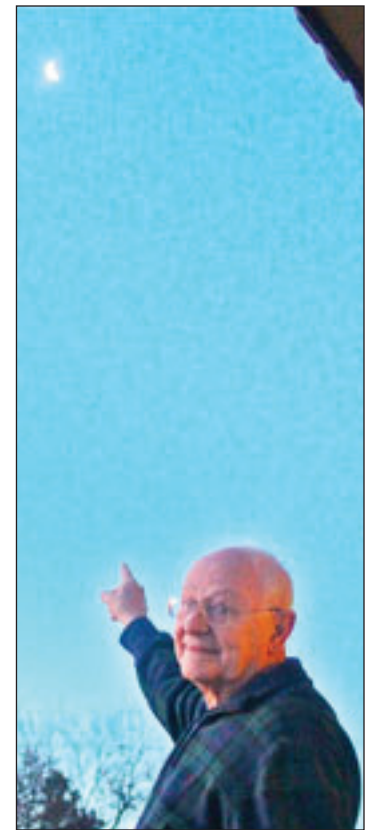
“We have never lived more than a couple of miles apart, even after we left NASA. And for years, Alan and I never missed a month where we did not have a cheeseburger together at Miller’s Café in Houston. We are accustomed to losing friends in our business but this is a tough one,” said Cunningham.

On Nov. 19, 1969, Bean, together with Apollo 12 com-

mander Charles “Pete” Conrad, landed on the Ocean of Storms and became the fourth human to walk on the moon. During two moonwalks Bean helped deploy several surface experiments and installed the first nuclear-powered generator station on the moon to provide the power source. He and Conrad inspected a robotic Surveyor spacecraft and collected 75 pounds (34 kilograms) of rocks and lunar soil for study back on Earth.

“Alan and Pete were extremely engaged in the planning for their exploration of the Surveyor III landing site

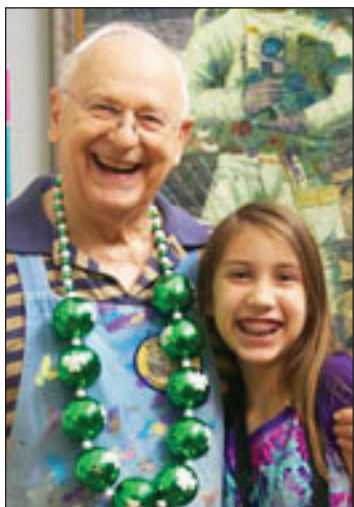

Community Care: Distracted Driver Takes Life of Child on Roadway

Such a headline is one that captures the attention and breaks the heart of all who see it. The irony is the news story itself captures attention, while the reason for the story is the lack of attention. The tragic reality is the people who cause such accidents carry haunting memories with them throughout their lives.

Few people realize the third leading cause of death for kids 5- to 9-years-old is them being hit by a motorized vehicle.

The chance of this kind of avoidable accident has naturally increased, now that school children throughout America are no longer in classrooms throughout the week. Although the subject receives little attention, a multitude of circumstances in small towns actually increases the chances of such an accident occurring.

For instance, most small communities do not have dedicated bike paths. Therefore, children can be seen in roadways from early in the morning

to late at night on a multitude of wheeler devices including bicycles, roller blades, skateboards and hoverboards.

Another contributing factor in small communities is drivers are more likely to be distracted drivers because laws about checking electronic devices while driving either do not exist or are not strictly enforced.

Small town drivers are also more likely to treat stop signs as yield signs, choosing to only slow down at intersections, instead of completely stop-

ping. In this situation, children have the expectation that vehicles will come to a stop, when that is not the case. A vehicle traveling only a few miles per hour that impacts a pedestrian or person on a wheeled device can have tragic consequences.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that inattentive drivers have caused more than 27,000 deaths since 2009.

Numerous national campaigns exist that promote

public safety, like Buckle Up and Make it Click, which encourages drives to use safety belts. However, there is no nationwide campaign that specifically reminds motorists to pay special attention to children in roadways during the summer months. For this reason, some people are using the influence of social media to address the issue.

Posts that promote the issue are creeping up on numerous social media sites. Some of these posts remind drivers

that they share America’s roads with children on wheeled devices during the summer months. Others are directed toward the youth who are taking to the streets – reminding them that there are motorists on the road that are not watching out for them, so they have to watch out for themselves.

This week’s question is: What will you do to help ensure your community has no tragic headline involving a child this summer?

Capt. (from Page 1) in the Ocean of Storms and, particularly, in the enhanced field training activity that came with the success of Apollo 11. This commitment paid off with

Alan's and Pete's collection of a fantastic suite of lunar samples, a scientific gift that keeps on giving today and in the future," said Harrison Schmitt, Apollo 17 lunar mod-

ule pilot and the only geologist to walk on the moon. "Their description of bright green concentrations of olivine (peridot) as 'ginger ale bottle glass,' however, gave geologists in

Mission Control all a big laugh, as we knew exactly what they had discovered."

"When Alan's third career as the artist of Apollo moved forward, he would call me to ask about some detail about lunar soil, color or equipment he wanted to have represented exactly in a painting. Other times, he wanted to discuss items in the description he was writing to go with a painting. His enthusiasm about space and art never waned. Alan Bean is one of the great renaissance men of his generation — engineer, fighter pilot, astronaut and artist," said Schmitt.

Four years after Apollo 12, Bean commanded the second crew to live and work on board the Skylab orbital workshop. During the then-record-setting 59-day, 24.4 million-mile flight, Bean and his two crewmates generated 18 miles of computer tape during surveys of Earth's resources and 76,000 photographs of the Sun to help scientists better understand its effects on the solar system.

In total, Bean logged 69 days, 15 hours and 45 minutes in space, including 31 hours and 31 minutes on the moon's surface.

Bean retired from the Navy in 1975 and NASA in 1981. In the four decades since, he devoted his time to creating an artistic record of humanity's first exploration of another world. His Apollo-themed paintings featured canvases textured with lunar boot prints and were made using acrylics embedded with small pieces of his moon dust-stained mission

patches.

"Alan Bean was the most extraordinary person I ever met," said astronaut Mike Massimino, who flew on two space shuttle missions to service the Hubble Space Telescope. "He was a one of a kind combination of technical achievement as an astronaut and artistic achievement as a painter."

"But what was truly extraordinary was his deep caring for others and his willingness to inspire and teach by sharing his personal journey so openly. Anyone who had the opportunity to know Alan was a better person for it, and we were better astronauts by following

his example. I am so grateful he was my mentor and friend, and I will miss him terribly. He was a great man and this is a great loss," Massimino said.

Born March 15, 1932, in Wheeler, Texas, Bean received a Bachelor of Science degree in aeronautical engineering from the University of Texas in 1955. He attended the Navy Test Pilot School and accumulated more than 5,500 hours of flying time in 27 different types of aircraft.

He is survived by his wife Leslie, a sister Paula Stott, and two children from a prior marriage, a daughter Amy Sue and son Clay.

Brain Mapping That Seeks To Identify 'Normal' Could Aid Alzheimer's Treatment

Inside Florida's largest retirement community researchers using new brain-mapping technology are trying to peel back the secrets of the brain.

The goal: Make world-changing discoveries about how our minds work that could lead to earlier detection of Alzheimer's and other brain diseases. The research's success could allow physicians to start treatments earlier than ever and perhaps delay the onset of this memory-robbing condition that haunts the older population.

"As you look at people as they grow older, from a health perspective they are probably more afraid of losing their memory than they are of getting cancer," says Dr. Jeffrey Lowenkron, who is chief medical officer of The Villages Health, a medical practice in The Villages, a Florida retirement community that's home to more than 125,000 people.

There is no cure for Al- zheimer's. Part of the prob- lem in finding one: For all the world's scientific and medical advances, there is still a lot we don't know about the brain, Lowenkron says.

"What happens with the electrical activity of the brain as it ages?" he says. "What's normal and what's abnormal? No one really knows."

With this trailblazing re- search in The Villages®, we may be drawing closer to finding out.

About 1,000 residents of The Villages volunteered to participate in the brain-health research that's being con- ducted in partnership with faculty from the University of South Florida and an Israeli company called EIMindA that originally developed the so- phisticated BNA™ (Brain Network Activation) technology for use in concussion treatment with young people. All of the partners believe that the technology holds the potential to revolutionize the diagnosis, monitoring and treatment of brain-related disorders.

Here's how it works: An electrode monitoring device that resembles a hair net is placed on the volunteer's head. The volunteer is then given a series of computer tasks to perform during an EEG recording. From there, a 3-D representation can be created to show what the brain looked like when the volunteer was responding to the tasks.

The goal is to develop a baseline of what a healthy brain looks like. EIMindA says the results can give physi- cians:

Villages Health and is a faculty
member at the University of
South Florida

The BNA technology also
has been used in assessing
brain damage caused by con-
cussions, especially sports-
related concussions, and it's
hoped it will be effective with
other brain disorders, such as
depression and dementia.

For the Alzheimer's study,
there's probably not a better
place in the country than The
Villages because no where
else can you find a commu-
nity this large that's made up
mostly of people the right age
for the study.

The community has a re-
search board that gave the go-
ahead and the project began
in July 2017. The goal was to
recruit 1,100 volunteers, and
so far about 1,000 people be-
tween the ages of 55 and 84
signed on to help out.

"We are recruiting enough
people to get a sense of how
normal looks in the brain
based on age categories and
gender," Lowenkron says.

The research participants
will be monitored several times
over the course of the study,
which Lowenkron says will go
on for about another year.

to participate will never gain
any personal benefit from
