"Hidetown", Sweet Town, Sweetwater, Mobeetie

(A bit of history from some old brochures at the Old Mobeetie Museum.)

Under the protection of Fort Elliott, Hidetown—a trading post established by buffalo hunters and later called Sweetwater or Sweet Town, became the economic and cultural center of the Panhandle.

Wheeler County was one of twenty-six counties created out of Clay County Territory in 1876, and named for Supreme Court Justice Royal T. Wheeler. The county was organized in 1879, and by a petition signed by one hundred fifty qualified voters and was assigned jurisdiction over the Panhandle counties.

In 1879, Wheeler County was formally organized and Sweetwater, renamed "Mobeetie", became the county seat and the center of government for the twenty-six

counties of the Texas Panhandle.

For the first time, settlers in the Texas Panhandle began the task of building a permanent community and developing a vast empty region.

Beginning as a buffalo hunters' rendezvous, in 1875, the settlement near the Sweetwater Creek was known as Sweetwater, Sweet Town or Hidetown. The settlement was at first dominated by Charles Rath and Lee Reynolds of Dodge City, Kansas, who picked up hides and dropped off supplies there. The settlement covered 40 acres on the south side of the Sweetwater Creek. When it was discovered the settlement was located on the Military Reserve, the town had to relocate. Sweetwater moved about 2 miles northwest to section 45, closer to Fort Elliott.

Sweetwater was the first town in the Panhandle. It was built on Sweetwater creek, 2 miles east from (the later) Mobeetie. It was built the same year that Fort Elliott started to build—1875. There were about 150 persons living there, Chinese laundry and a restaurant. The saloon men were Henry Fleming, Joe Mason and W. H. Weed. The dance hall man was Bill Thompson, brother to the noted Ben Thompson, gunman of Austin, who was killed in San Antonio. The restaurant was run by Tom O'Loughlin, and his wife, Ellen, the only virtuous woman in the town at the time. There were about 15 dance hall girls there then. There also was a barber-shop and a big store that sold goods to the buffalo hunters. (Continued Page 5)

Texas Sales Tax Free Weekend

Texans can save on the purchase of school supplies, book bags, clothing and footwear that cost less than \$100 during the annual Texas Sales Tax Holiday that begins on Aug. 10 and ends on Aug. 12. This will save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend. Texas legislators established the first sales tax holiday in 1999.

Officials of the Texas Office of the Comptroller estimate shoppers this year will save about \$90.3 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday weekend. Medicare Plays Big Role In Protecting Nursing Home Patients

By Bob Moos, Southwest regional public affairs officer for the U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services — works closely with the states to accomplish that. Trained health professionals make unannounced visits to nursing homes to check whether the health and safety standards are being met and, if not met, to ensure the problems are addressed. An inspection is often the result of a complaint lodged by a patient or family member.

Nursing homes that don't promptly correct their shortcomings may be subject to fines. If the health and safety violations persist and pose a serious enough threat to patients, the facilities may be terminated from the Medicare program and forbidden to bill the government for patient care.

Unless and until a nursing home actually loses its Medicare funding, this regulatory process often goes unnoticed by the general public. But you can see how the nursing homes in your community have fared in recent health and safety inspections by visiting Medicare's Nursing Home Compare website — at www.medicare.gov/nhcompare.

Besides providing detailed information on inspections, the website reports on facilities' staffing and such quality measures as whether residents are in pain or losing weight. The site uses a five-star rating

system to help you understand the differences in the quality of care between nursing homes. Families must often search for a nursing home for a spouse or parent at a moment's notice, after some crisis or emergency. With little time to spare, many turn to Nursing Home Compare to begin their research. The website receives more than 1 million visits every year.

The website enjoys a solid reputation among consumers, having been revised over the years to make it even more trustworthy and user-friendly. You can search for facilities by city, county, state or ZIP code. As helpful as those online comparisons are, Nursing Home Compare isn't meant to be the final word on the subject. It's just one guide to use when looking for a nursing facility.

If you're the one who's been hospitalized, your physician, discharge planner or social worker can help identify an appropriate facility for your recovery. If you're the one assisting a spouse or parent about to enter a nursing facility, you also might:

- Ask for recommendations from friends, family or neighbors who may have had a loved one in a nursing home.
- Call your state's long-term care ombudsman to find out

Visit the nursing homes that interest you. Make an appointment and think of the questions that are important to you. Nursing Home Compare contains a helpful checklist of questions that covers everything from care and safety to activities and food.

When you or a family member become a patient in a nursing home, you have a right to expect the facility will comply with Medicare's health and safety standards. The thousands of unannounced inspections done each year by federal and state surveyors put teeth in those standards and hold rule-breakers accountable.

This regulatory process aims to call out the poor performers and bring them back in compliance. It is a vital mission for Medicare.

Xcel Energy Is Meeting Record Electricity Demand This Summer

Some of you may recall that Xcel Energy was seeing record demands on our system two weeks ago during an exceptional heat wave that affected most of our Texas-New Mexico service area. On July 19, our regional transmission network handled a record 6,151 megawatts of demand at 5 p.m. This is an all-time record, and is 350 megawatts above our forecasted peak for 2018. If daytime highs stay within the normal range for the next few weeks, this record will likely stand. For reference, a single megawatt can serve up to 500 typical homes.

Our system demand generally peaks around the first week of August, so this peak came earlier than most. Our analysis shows it wasn't only hot weather, but also economic growth in the region, that is pushing our demand higher. We are seeing especially strong growth in portions of our New Mexico service area

where oil and gas operations are booming. Amarillo, our largest concentration of customers in the region, is also an area of high demand that saw a double-digit increase in demand on July 19 when compared to the same day in 2017.

We're often asked how we prepare for this high summer-time demand, and this release outlines two main strategies. One is freeing up power plant capacity as our wholesale customers leave the system. This extra capacity provides new generating resources for our industrial, commercial, and residential customers at a cost much cheaper than building new power plants. Additionally, the investments we've made in expanding and strengthening our transmission and distribution networks have helped us mitigate areas of overloading and have provided us new pathways to import additional, and often less expensive, power supplies.

TxDOT Provides Car Seat Check-Ups

The Texas Department of Transportation is scheduling appointments for a series of car seat checkups across the Childress District. Trained and certified technicians will perform inspections and train parents and caregivers to install and adjust their car seats properly. Car seat checks are free.

Almost thirty-four percent of Texas children from birth to four years old were buckled incorrectly or not at all, according to a recent study conducted by Texas A&M Transportation Institute. Common child safety seat errors include: connecting the device too loosely; putting the harness straps through the

wrong slots; leaving harness straps too loose; positioning the chest clip incorrectly; and using the wrong seat belt path.

"Losing a child in a traffic crash has got to be devastating so we want to help parents ensure their children are properly buckled in the correct car seat for their age and size," said Jolie Person, TxDOT traffic safety specialist in Childress. "We need to know the child's height and weight, so please have that information when calling to make an appointment."



If you really feel the need to take a knee, come with

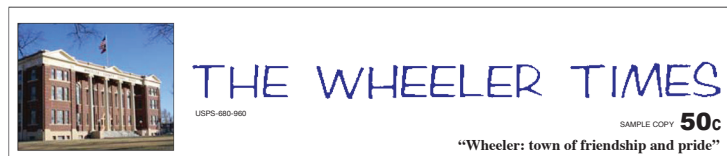

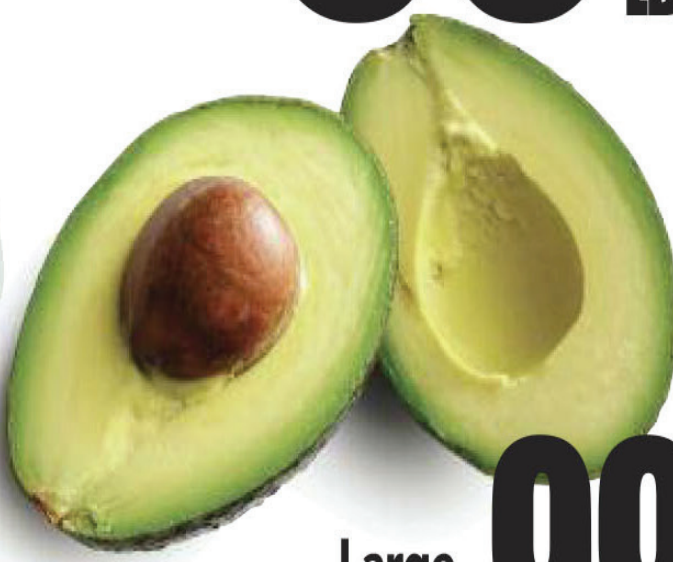
